Had this loss continued the Germans had the right to expect, not, indeed, military victory, but a peace that would mean something much less than defeat. This was Germany's only hope, and it was the Allies' only anxiety. "In the first fortnight of November, the rate of loss of British tonnage of ships greater than 1,600 tons each has fallen to about one million tons a year. Attention was called to the recent regulation of the Government prohibiting the use of grain for distilling of liquor for drinking purposes, a feature of the address greeted with hearty appliause.

Fight Social Evil.

Dr. H. W. Hill, M. O. H., urged upon the Women's Institute branches the importance of giving their support to any measures to deal with the problem of social evil, owing to the menace to the national life of the prevalence of veneral diseases. Emphasizing that they are germ diseases, communicable as are scarlet fever, and other such diseases, he stated that it is a misfortune that they are labelled "venereal," owing to the fact that half the cases are innocently contracted.

On this subject, he continued, while it is true the organization for tracing and following up disease in the men enlisted for service has brought to light the extent of the disease, the army is not responsible for the disease. The soldiers are affected in a proportion to the civilian population of about one to two. The difference is that it is discovered in the army and isolated as long as the case is open. This is what should be done with civilians. Further, he declared that legislation is needed which will authorize the medical officer of health to isolate these most dangerous communicable disease, which is one of the mildest forms of communicable disease,

Has No Authority.

"I can arrest and isolate a man who has smallpox," he said, "but I have no authority to arrest a woman who is going about the streets of London whom I know is responsible for the isolation of four cases of venereal disease among soldiers, and who may be responsible for as "many more. We need lock hospitals for people who do this damage, at least, until they are rendered non-infectious. They should receive in these hospitals the best modern treatment known."

Referring to the necessity for safeguarding girls as well as young men, Dr. Hill spoke appreciatively of the "women police patrois," which have been doing effective work in the parks, etc., in Toronto, and urged the value of women police officers or police matrons.

Many Questions Asked.

In the discussion which followed, the

Many Questions Asked. In the discussion which followed, the question was asked Dr. Hill if, so far as the girls are concerned, a large proportion of them are not feeble-minded. He replied in the affirmative, stating that proper custodial care of feeble-minded girls would go a long way towards wiping out the evil. It is understood that a resolution on this subject will be brought in today to be forwarded to the Provincial Government.

In the course of his report of the year's work of the Women's Institute throughout Ontario, Provincial Super-Intendent G. A. Putnam especially commended the patriotic achievements of the 30,000 or more members in the way of Red Cross knitting, sewing, canning, etc., in addition to keeping up the institute work proper. With regard to the introduction of moving pictures as an educational feature of institute work, he stated that the department of agriculture has a number of moving picture machines which can be obtained by districts. In localities where there are a number of institutes and farmers' clubs these machines may be used almost continuously. A number of all the continuously and the continuously are the continuously.

Use the Builetins.

Institute officers were urged to make full use of the builetins and other literature obtainable from the provincial health department. Mention was made of the popularity of the demonstration and lecture courses in cooking, sewing, first aid, etc., and this comment added: "Considering the value of the courses and the excellence of the instruction, I do not think the Government will dare refuse in the days to come service to any small country sideroad in the province that expresses desire for such opportunity." Mention was made of the manner in which the Women's Institute is here and there keeping up medical inspection of schools. "I believe," said Mr. Putnam, "we will have facts and figures to present to the Toronto convention and the Government which will result in the not far distant future in a general plan for medical inspection."

Evening Session.

The answer of Dr. Anna Backus of Ayimer to the question, "Why conserve" at the evening session of the Women's Institute convention was forcibel and original, like all her utterances.





Now, don't tell us to "change over"—that is every pro's advice, And not worthy of a stanza from the pen of Dr. Rice; But some day, when you're not busy, search the records for the name Of a good left-handed golfer who can really play the game.

Though the run of most left-handers has a record something flerce, One of those who once stopped Evans was a southpaw known as Pearce. ABOUT THE SAME.

An army statistician has discovered, after interviewing various military chiefs, that the best soldier age is around twenty-five and twenty-six. This age has been found to average better than a younger or an older span, despite various exceptions of note.

The same statistics cover baseball. If you care to examine the record, you will find that the most effective age is precisely the same. Ty Cobb, around twenty-five and twenty-six, worked his way above .400. So did Joe Jackson. Christy Mathewson at this age had just come to his top form. He was twenty-five when he world series shut-outs, back in 1905.

NO MERGER NOW; PLAN VOTED DOWN AT LOUISVILLE

Barrow's Motion to Redistrict Minors Turned Down 11 to 2.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Nov. 14.-There will be no formation of a new league to include the Louisville, Indianapolis and Toledo clubs of the American Association and certain clubs of the International League. This was definitely discussed today when the National Association of Baseball Leagues voted down an amended resolution of fered by Ed Barrow, president of the International League, to redistrict every minor league in the country. The vote was 11 to 2,

Allan T. Baume of San Francisco, president of the Pacific Coast League, was unanimously elected vice-president of the National Association of Raseball Leagues, to succeed Timothy H. Murnane of Boston, who died last February. The election came as such a surprise to Mr. Raume that he was taken suddenly ill. Physicians said, however, that his condition was not serious.
