

Trip Through Arctic Territory Planned by Members of Shackleton's Expedition.

Archangel, Feb. 21.—An Arctic journey of probably the greatest magaitude since the famous Klondike gold rush has brought additional British troops to the Archangel front to reinforce the greatly outnumbered troops fighting the Bolsheviki. Hundreds of sleighs, driving in single file over frozen tundra and along roads cut through pine forests, completed the most difficult part of their 300-mile trip in twelve days. The trip was planned and directed by members of Sir Ernest H. Shackleton's Antarctic expedition, including Dr. Macklin, and was a signal success. [By Victor Lauriston.] Middlesex is steadily becoming a more and more important factor in

Canadian oil production. True, that production is merely a drop in the bucket as compáred with the immense consumption of crude oil in the Canadian factories. But the fact that the 1918 production is some 40 per cent in excess of that for 1917 is due solely to the rapid development of the new Glencoe field.

This field—officially styled the "Mosa field"—first produced oil in February or March, 1917. Since then it has come rapidly to the front. It was something of a surprise to oilmen, who doubted that anything of value could be developen so far to the east. When F. J. Carman, the pioneer operator in this territory, started his first tests in the fall of 1916, many shrewd operators regarded the proposition as a hopeless venture.

Were Pessimistic.

Even after the Secord well, the first big producer, was drilled, the more cautious among oilmen anticipated that—following the precedent of the early Bothwell filed, some 50 years before—the Mosa development would be merely a flash in the pan, a "top show" proposition, rapidly petering out. So that when Mosa Township was credited with a production of approximately 21.000 barrels in 1917, a lot of people thought that the field had seen its best days, and would rapidly decline.

Instead, the production in 1918 was five times as large as in the previous year. For the last few months of the year the average monthly production was as large as the entire production for 1917.

The total oil production from Mosa Township in 1918 amounted to 108,988 barrels. This, according to J. C. Waddell, supervisor of crude petroleum bounties, is a high record for a new field in Canada.

The Dover field in Kent County—officially included in the Tilbury returns—has attracted quite a lot of attention since the first deep oil production was secured there, in the spring of 1917. All told, some 22 wells have been started in this field. Four of the completed wells are apparently productive. They were large enough, however, to considerably swell the returns for the Tilbury field for 1918, and to offset in some measure the declining production in the older oil pools of Southwestern Ontario. The old Tilbury field, near Fletcher, which was in 1907 the most important producing area in Canada, still has a small production, but most of the oil attributed to the Tilbury field came from Dover Township.





FRANCE HAS REDUCED MILITARY EXPENSES HALF, SINCE NOV. 11

Decrease of 3,656,000,000 Since Last Quarter of 1918.

PARIS, Feb. 20.—Finance Minister Klotz today presented to the Chamber of Deputies the provisional credits for exceptional military and civil expenditures for the second quarter of 1919. They aggregate 8.577,000,000 francs, a decrease of 257,000,000, as compared with the first quarter of 1919, and a decrease of 2.656,000,000 francs as compared with the last quarter of 1918.

The daily expenditure asked by the minister for military service is less than one half the average amount expended daily at the time of the signing of the armistice. The bill calls for an expenditure of 635,000,000 francs for the reconstruction of industries and 1,256,000,000 for the needs of the liberated regions.

NATURAL GAS ACT IS **SCORED BY MEMBERS** OF BAR ASSOCIATION

Say Gas Companies Hand Is

NOT CONSTITUTIONAL

New Law Violates Principles of British Institutions.

TORONTO, Feb. 20.-Warm criticism of the natural gas act was a feature of the convention of the Ontario Bar Association today at Osgoode Hall. "This law violates the fundamental principles of British institutions, and the provisions set forth in the Magna Charta," declared J. M. Clarke, of To-

The discussion started when Frank Denton, K. C., convener of the legislation committee, making his report, read a letter from Matthew Wilson, K. C., of Chatham, outlining the effect of the act on industry. Mr. Clarke stated that the law treated all existing contracts as "scraps of paper." The law was, he said, preventing investments and expansion in Industry.

J. S. Robb of Windsor, spoke of the emergency that had caused the framing of the legislation. Too evidently, he said, the gas companies have had a hand in drawing up the act, as it gave them the power to disregard all their contracts and raised the price of gas for them. Farmers, from whose farms the gas had its origin, and who had agreements with the company for a free supply of gas so long as it lasted, had been discriminated against in the same way as others, he declared.

Finally the question was referred to the law reform committee and they were instructed to take the matter up with the authorities immediately.
