



The story in yesterday's Advertiser was not based upon mere rumor. An actual offer was made by the Canadian Northern for the controlling interest in the London street railway, and agents of the company have inspected the London and Lake Erie Traction line. Whether the Canadian Northern has secured an option on either property, The Advertiser has not yet been able to ascertain,

Mackenzie & Mann have been developing the eastern portion of their transcontinental system, but hitherto have made no extension in Southern Ontario, west of Toronto. They may believe this territory is adequately served by steam railways, and that electric traction offers the only opportunity, or they may be disposed to

The London street railway and the London and Lake Erie line would fit into their other electrical schemes, which are based upon their control of the Electrical Development Company's plant at Niagara. Mackenzie & Mann supply the power which lights the city of Toronto and runs its street railway The latter is also a Mackenzie & Mann property. A line from the Falls to London and Port Stanley would provide a larger market for their Niagara power concern. Trolley Paris, and the London and Lake Erie able that he will be

The city will be fortunate if it is brought within the scope of a Mackenzie & Mann enterprise. The system would naturally be extended west of London, perhaps to Windsor or Sarnia, and any increase of railway facilities in the neighboring counties would redound to the city's advantage. Nothing would do more to improve London's position as a purchasing and distributing centre than the multiplication of radial roads.

Great corporations like the Canadian Northern do not throw their cards on the table when they are contemplating a business game, so that the motives behind the overtures to the London street railway are to outsiders still a matter of conjecture. The







"A duty on power would, of course. put a stop to the importation of Canadian electricity, either at Detroit or at any other point where a similar invasion may be planned, and I am told a bill for the purpose will be passed at the coming session.' Mr. Beck's Opinion.

Mr. Beck was shown the foregoing and asked for his opinion. "The Michigan electrical interests," he said, "are making an effort to save a milliondollar plant in Detroit, forgetting that fifteen or twenty millions of American money are invested at Niagara Falls. The company from which we purchase power has a lot of American capital behind it. So if they prevent the exportation of power at Detroit, they are liable to cause some trouble to the American investors at the Falls. Personally, I do not know how they are going to prevent the exportation of power at Detroit, and overlook Buffalo. The principle is the same. However, we have nothing to
