York, Jan. 18.—(Canadian Press)-There is "an approach to cossibility" that the name of Mat-thew Bullock, the North Carolina negro now under arrest in Hamilton entario, will have the sort of immortality that was conferred on the name of Dred Scott, declares the

New York Times this morning.

After reviewing the circumstance which led to Bullock's flight from the United States and his arrest in Canada, the Times calls attention to the report that Canada will not give the negro up because he claims that if taken home the chances are he will be lynched without trial.

Situation Is Delicate. "The situation thus created is a very delicate one, and may become nightly embarrassing," the Times continues. "Bullock is in Canada illegally, and could be deported on that ground alone. The offence with which he is charged, and for which he has ben indicted, make alm extraditable under the treaty. Receiver To Be Elevated 25 Feet To Aid Transmission of Aerial Waves.

Have you ever listened in London and heard an orchestra in Pittsburg or New York City play selections of popular music?

'Can't possibly be done," one would have declared a decade or so ago But time is ever changing, and the scientific strides of only the past few years have been so gigantic that even today the average person does not yet realize fully just what man with his acquired knowledge of electricity

On Tuesday evening The London Advertiser at its new building, York and Richmond streets, treated an interested gathering of the public to the first of its nightly demonstrations of science's latest miracle, "The Radiophone," when several operatic selections were transmitted with Varying distinctness, direct from concert halls in Cleveland and Pitts-

Roland Gurd Is Operator.

Operations were in charge of Roland Gurd of this city, recognized as one of the most competent amateur wireless operators west of Toronto. Taking his post shortly after 8 o'clock, Mr. Gurd, after first exchanging greetings with a number of wireless enthusiasts, and "re-ceiving" three victrola selections transmitted by wireless waves from his own home on Elmwood avenue, "listened in" on a Pittsburg theatre. As a first experiment the result was favorable.

It was nearly 10 o'clock before Cleveland was heard, when strains of stirring music were "switched" northward for the benefit of the Canadian section of the audience, and shortly before 11 o'clock the Londoners heard snatches of the closing selection in a New York play-

Mr. Gurd explains that the demonstrations to be continued through-out the week will be featured with more satisfactory results. At interbuildings, more particularly the Tecumseh Hotel directly opposite, interfered to an appreciable extent ith the operation. The higher buildings, he explains, absorb consider able of the current, lessening the distinctness of the aerial waves.

It has been assured, however, that this difficulty will be to some extent overcome in time for Wednesday's demonstration at 8:30 p.m. The Advertiser apparatus will be elevated to a distance of at least 25 feet, minimizing local interference as far as

FARMERS REPORT LIVESTOCK ACTIVE

Cattle Change Owners in Ontario Counties At Fair Prices.

Following is a summary of reports made by the agricultural representatives to the Ontario Department of Agriculture:

South Simcoe claims that the quality of livestock recently sold is showing improvement, some good neavy steers being seen in this week's shipments.

Bruce states that a few butcher steers were loaded during the week bringing from \$6.50 to \$7 per cwt., and that choice cows, springers, have been selling at from \$70 to \$90 each. A number of grade milch cows

have changed hands in Hastings at prices ranging from \$40 to \$60. Good grade cows are selling at from \$50 to \$75 in Brant, which is about one-third the price of the mature cows at the recent Shorthorn

Club sale in that county, the average there being \$184. Elgin states that the supply of milk is falling off with the cold weather, but that dairy cows are bringing fair prices at auction sales. Carleton holds that the demand for

butter is being affected by importations from New Zealand.

A few late lambs were recently shipped from Bruce at \$12.35 per

Bacon hogs range in price from \$9.75 to \$10.50 per cwt. Little pigs at from \$8 to \$10 a pair, six selling on the market on Saturday for \$31. Hay is selling in Brant at from \$14 to \$16 per ton; in Bruce, \$15 to \$20; in Durham, \$25 to \$30. Nearly 500 tons of hav were sold in Preshood of Plantagenet, around \$21.75 per ton. O. A. C. EXPERT TELLS NEED OF

Professor James Neilson, Guelph, Urges Development of Hardier Trees.

WINTER DAMAGE SEVERE Advocates More Experimental

Work in All Branches of Horticulture.

Professor James Neilson of the O. A. C. Horticultural Department fold the Association at a meeting held in the department of agriculture office Tuesday afternoon that the outlook for tree fruit was more than favorable. He pointed out that fruit trees had been considerably reduced in numbers during the past ten years, due partly to the unfavorable winter of four years ago. Apple trees in particular had been

"No province can produce as good ality fruit as Ontario," said Professor eilson. "We have the land and the climate favorable for the production of he best of fruit. It means a great deal f work to keep your orchards in good shape, but it will pay in dollars and cents. The man who has a good apple orchard need not be afraid of the future."

Drainage Important. The speaker laid special stress on unerdrainage. He declared that in order o grow fruit successfully, the land must

properly underdrained In speaking of the best varieties of apples to plant, Professor Neilson stated hat instead of telling what to plant, would mention varieties not to plant. In this list he included Baldwir

Ionathans, Delicious and Ben Davis, He would not plant Baldwins unless it was on a well-drained sandy loam. Ben Davis was susceptible to winter injury and of poor quality, although a heavy bearer. The Delicious and Jonathan had both been "boomed" by nurseries, but had not stood the test. He recommended the planting of McIntosh Reds, Snows and Spies. The Northern Spy was still one of the best and should have a place in every orchard. The Scarlet Pippin and the Blenheim Pippin were also well worth planting.
A great deal of damage was done in

he winter to orchards through winds, the speaker declared. He advocated wind breaks, and was throughly con-vinced that it would pay to plant trees that would break the force of the winter

Need Careful Pruning.

In speaking of nursery stock, Profes-or Neilson declared that hardy varieties only should be planted. He would prefer trees one or two years old. The initial pruning was important, although heavy pruning was not desirable, as a good

many young trees had been injured by too much early pruning.
"When the trees begin to bear. gradually bring them into shape,"

It was time that something definite was done in the way of experimenta work to produce hardy varieties in all fruits, and this could be done through criticism of the nurserymen and ex-perimental stations. A start had been made along these lines by Professor

Crow of the O. A. C.
"The fruit growers and nurserymen should get together and get the tree fruit industry on a better basis," said the O. A. C. expert, "and this can be lone by using hardier stock. It is the iggeot problem that faces us today. Professor Neilson was tendered a earty vote of thanks on behalf of the ruit growers by the president, William



He pointed to the fact that the diet of the soldiers was such as would enable them to do hard work but they were not satisfied and patronized the canteens liberally.




Sir George Expresses Hope **Dominion Building Will** Soon Be Possible.



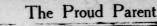

this carbuncle is an ordinary one or that of anthrax except by examin-ing the blood for anthrax bacilli under the microscope. This form of anthrax is not as violent as others, since two-thirds of these cases get

No doubt some cases of anthrax are diagnosed as ordinary carbuncles. If the patient were not a dairyman, hostler, shepherd, butcher, tanner, wool sorter or rag picker it would hardly occur to the physician to examine the secretion of the carbuncle under the microscope.
