
TREES FOR DRAINAGE.

Land That Would He Improved by Being
Drier Should He Planted.

It is a popular belief that trees about a house tend to make it damp. It is true that after heavy rains a dwelling with trees surrounding it takes more time to dry out than one not so surrounded. On the contrary, it is just as true that where trees are the soil is very much drier than it would be otherwise. Some years ago the daily papers had much to say of the drainage of a malarious district in Rome by the planting largely of the fast-growing blue gum tree of Australia. Kucalyptus globulus. There is no doubt that this rapid-growing tree would quickly change the character of a half-swamp, as it grows fast and has thick foliage. When there is a lot of trees full of foliage there is great call for moisture from the ground. The roots are drawing it in continually, and this in the long run accomplishes as much as a system of drainage would do. I have myself witnessed the great change brought about by the cutting down and clearing of trees from a low piece of land. What was a fairly dry place while the trees stood became aimost a swamp. It is not as easy to start evergreens in such a spot as it is deciduous trees, otherwise they would be better for the purpose, as there is more evaporation from them in the winter season. But it must not be supposed that there is entire rest on the part of a deciduous tree in winter. The roots are active and especially toward spring an enormous lot of water is taken from the earth; by the roots of a large tree. This is why trees near dwellings which are in damp situations are so valuable. The callar of a house which is surrounded by large trees will be very much drier than before the trees were there. This I have seen many examples of. There is no need to plant trees so close that the branches will reach to the house and it is not at all desirable that the limbs overhang it. Buckwheat in Orchards

Buckwheat is Orchards.

There is no grain crop that can be grown in orchards to better advantage than buckwheat. It is not exhaustive and its broad leaves shade the soil so that it does not make the land dry as other grain crops do. Besides, one of the effects of buckwheat growing is to keep the soil mellow so that every rain will soak into the soil instead of remaining on the surface until winds and sun dry out the moisture. It is the practice of some orchardists to sow buckwheat in orchards two or three times each year, plowing under the growth as soon as it was in biossom or before. This fills the soil with vegetable matter, making it very porous. It often nurns the last buckwheat growth to humic acid if a wet winter follows.

Ground Bone for Layers. Ground Bene for Layers.

The use of ground bone in the poultry yard should be encouraged. With ground bone in reach of the poultry, there is no danger of the egg-eating habit assuming large proportions, and it is doubtful if the habit will be practiced at all, where ground bone is accessible. We have noticed that when the fowls are thus supplied they even lose their liking for breken egg shells, which is certainly an indication that ground bone is effective.



Home Cheesemaking.

cheese of a ceriain standard quali-whether of domestic or factory ufacture. This standard must be market requirements he should consider milk as too valuable material to experiment with.

Nearly every one, however, who contemplates home cheesemaking possesses a general idea of the subject, with more or less experience, and to such I direct my remarks. You will not find it profitable to attempt home cheesemaking with too small a quantity of

it profitable to attempt home cheese-making with too small a quantity of milk. I would place the minimum dai-ly quantity that you should attempt to make up at all at 150 pounds, while 300 pounds and from that up would be better.

ly quantity that you should attempt to make up at all at 150 pounds, while 300 pounds and from that up would be better.

Do not attempt the manufacturing task with crude apparatus any more than you would think of producing No. 1 butter from a ramshackle churn. Aim to have a cheese factory jin miniature, without, of course, many of the accessories that a large factory would find necessary. The heating arrangement of your dwarf vat should be perfect and above reproach. A zinc lined wooden tank, in which rests on supports a removable tin receptacle for the milk, should be used.

There should be from one to twe inches of water space between the tin and zinc sides and bottom, the water of which can be heated from a copper flue, with zinc water packet under all. This is simply a counterpart in principle of the old fashioned factory underheater vat, and I believe can be obtained in any size of most manufacturers of dairy apparatus.

In the improved modern factory vat steam from a furnace instead of hot water under the vat supplies the heat, the principle of cooking the curd being the same.

While obtaining a small vat from a reliable dealer one had better get all the other accessories necessary, as they will be better suited to the purpose if made by an experienced manufacturer than a local workman.

The apparatus necessary to equip a small cheesemaking plant ought not to cost much if any more than the utensils properly required to turn a like quantity of milk into butter.

While alming to make the same quality of cheese that comes from a larger factory, you should understand that the greatest opening for the sale of dairy cheese lies in the direction of small bulk.

The demand for fine full cream cheddar cheese that do not weigh over five or ten pounds aplece is never fully satisfied. Most factories object to producing them on account of the increased labor involved and the larger percentage of milk necessary to make a pound of cheese. The increased ratio is caused by the more extensive evaporation of moisture from t

Again we call attention to the fact that good dairy bred cattle can be had at quite reasonable prices. In fact we believe that this is a good time for those who need this kind of stock to invest in it. It is not hunting buyers at scrub prices, but as compared with the way other classes of pure bred stock are selling it looks cheap. There will sooner or later be a reaction from the craze for beef that has invaded even the dairy indistricts, and with the dairy industry promising a healthy condition pure bred dairy cattle will be in better demand than now. The time to get good blood cheap is when it can be had. Those who let pass bargains in trotting bred mares, beef cattle and sheep a few years ago are paying much better prices for the same stock now, and they might have been sellers now instead of buyers had they invested at the lower prices then.—National Stockman. RUMBLINGS.

Various Theories have been Advance as to the Origin of These Odd Sounds—Some Scientists Have Attributed Them to Earth. quakes.

"Mistpoeffers" (literally, "hiccoughs or eructations of the fog" is the name given by dwellers on the shores of the North sea, Europe, to a mysteriously auditory phenomenon not infrequently noticed in their vicinity, says Dr. Glau-reaud.

Yarious theories have been advanced as to the origin of these sounds. Some savants have attributed them to earthquakes, but this fails to explain why they are perceived only in the daytime. On the other hand, the fact that their time of maximum occurrence is from noon to 3 p. m. decreasing afterward until sunrise. appears to support the opinion that they are due entirely to the action of solar heat upon the water vapor of the atmosphere.

It is remarkable that when heard on land they always appear to come from far out at sea, and similarly on board ship they never seem close at hand, and they strike the ear from all sides at once. Is there, then, asks the author, a mirage for the ear as well as for the eye? But, if so, how does it originate? On the Campinse of Antwerp the noises were heard very distinctly—so much so, indeed, as to profluce a sort of haunting effect—for several days in succession, by a party of French engineers, who at first thought that brisk artillery practice must be going on somewhere in the neighborhood.

Near Ostend the coast population is quite accustomed to the mistpoeffers. They often say, "There goes the sea guns; we shall have warm weather now," or, "There will soon he a change." Sailors at sea exclaim, "The fog is breaking," under the same circumstances. These facts all point to a reliation with atmospheric phenomena.

Bright sunshine and some degree of fogginess seem to be constant factors in causing the detonations, while the sea is not a necessary element. 

MAUNA LOA ACTIVE.

GREAT OCEANIC VOLCANO THREAT-ENS TO OVERWHELM HAWAII.

Results to the Inhabitants -- Effect Felt in California, and It Is Thought Lake

Mauna Loa, central vent of a great roleanic belt in Oceanica, is threatening to overwhelm the Island of Hawaii with its many villages and plantations and the principal town of Hilo. Definite advices as to the character of the cruption now in progress are lacking owing to the slow transmission of news from Hawaii, but that there has been a serious outbreak there appears to be no doubt. Mauna Loa is to the Hawaiian group of Islands what Krakatos is to the Sunda group or Heela to the Icelandic range. On the Island of Hawaii there is a remarkable group of mountain peaks and velcances, originally constructed by hot

matter hurled from the bowels of the earth into the ocean depths and then by successive eruptions built upward until the caps and craters of Mauna Kea. Mauna Los, Hualaisi, Kohala, Kilauca and Kulania rose above the waters and became at their visible bases habitable [and.]

Of this group Mauna Loa an active wolcano, has been in a state of perturbation for months past, indicating that an overflow was pending with accompanying tidal waves and carthquakes. When the steamship Australia left Honoiniu early in July evidence was at hand that Mauna Loa was engaged in destroying herself. The lars flow was within ten miles of Hilo, the sky was overcast with clouds charged with gas, the sea was much perturbed, and sulphur smoke filled the air for miles beyond the shore lines.

much perturbed, and supart supart silled the air for miles beyond the shore lines.

On July 22, there was a severe earthquake shock in southern Californis, and at practically the same time a great tidal wave in Lake Superior, neither easily explained unless it is assumed until scientific explanation may be had that way down in the interior of the earth there might be found sharp traces of a seismic wave extending from boiling Mauna Loa to the uttermost parts of the earth and producing at Los Angeles and in Lake Superior the phenomena which has troubled the people.

Mother Earth is in travail as she wills, and where her upper crush may be thin she finds a vent for her inward commotions, and the result at unexpected moments is an earthquake, a tidal wave, a destroying flow of lava. It is within the range of possibilities that, constructed as it has been by volcanic action. Hawaii may be efficaced from the map, sink back to the depths from which it came, and Mauna Loa and Kilauea become but names on the pages of natural history.

The highest volcances and vastest caldrons of seething lava are round in Hawaii, the largest member of the group at its southeastern extremity. In Hawaii the volcano of Mauna Loa, or the Great Mountain, rises to sheight \$87,80 feet, or about 3,000 feet above the vegotable zone. Her create is in reality tongue as the Mokuavcorco. They open on the very summit of the mountain, forming a symmetrical cavity. In the center of this cavity is the vast primitive or mother creater, with a mean diameter of this cavity is the vast primitive or mother creater, with a mean diameter of \$600 feet and depth of over 1,000 feet. Offspring of Mauna Loa is the vast lateral crater of Kilaues, which opens on the east flank of its parent. Northwest of Mauna Loa is Mauna Haulali, occasionally active. Still farther on is Mauna Kes. 13,850 feet in height, extinct and annew-capped. All volcanic entytions of any importance in Hawaii are now confined to Mauna Loa and Kilaues, and it is around them that intervest centers in view of the startling tremblings of the earth and the fear that Hawaii itself is deemed to a terrible visitation.

The gigantic proportions of Mauna Loa and companion creaters leave no room for doubt that they form one of the principal vents of the earth through which gases and molten matter are hurled out from the interior to the surface. Here are proportions of the crater of Mauna Loa.

So, If Mauna Los is to-day the veleano-queen of the Hawaiian group, a time was when Haicakala must have been supreme and afforded cruption spectacles such as earth may never see again.

Hawaii is but 100 miles in length, 90 miles in width, with an area of 2,500,000 acres (a large portion of which is lavabed or crater surfaces), and has a population of less than 40,000. Thus, whatever Mauna Loa may have in store for the island, there is not so very much to be destroyed. The island is really formed by the gentle slopes from the four volcanoes—Mauna Loa. Mauna Koa, Mauna Huaiali and Mauna Kobala.

The great volcances of the world are divided inte twe classes—central and linear. The central class consists of several vents or craters grouped together, and only one of which is active at a time. The linear class consists of a series of vents or craters extending in one direction along a mountain range. The principal volcances of the central class now active are: Mauna Loa, Hawaiian Islands; Stromboli, Lipari Islands; Etna and Vasuvius; Heela, Iceland.

The active volcances of the linear class are: Than-Shan, Asia; Moluccas, Formasa, 37 in all, 28 active; Sunda Group, Sunda Isles, 80 in ait, Krakatoa the principal one, the greatest eruption of modern times from this, Aug. 26-28, 1883; Bolivian-Peur group, 19 in all, and one of the highest in the world; Erebus, Antarctic continent.

The volcano farthest north is Jan Mayen, 70.49 north latitude. The outlean farthest south is Krebus, 77.32 south latitude. The number of human lives estimated to have been destroyed by volcanic eruptions since the destruction of Pompetit is 1,000,000. The value of the property destroyed cannot be estimated.


