

Langemarck is a village in the famous Ypres salient, both on a nghroad and railway from Ypres to Thourout. It was a peaceful illage, situated in the dull, monotonous plans of rianders, and the horrors of war first broke over it in the fall of 1914, during the first battle of Ypres. On that fateful April evening of two years 190 Langemarck was directly east of the left wing of the Canadian

line, and in it were bulked several battalions in reserve.





These bomb frames are usually slung on either side of the fuse-lage below the lower plane and aft of the axle. In all of the above cases the bomb is held horizentally in a fore and aft position, the nose of the

bomb pointing forward.

"In all the latest types of machines however, the bombs are carried in a vertical position, inside the body of the airplane, noses downward. This is a very great saving of head resistance. For obvious reasons it would

"Dropping bombs weighing 500 pounds or more is not difficult. Heretofore it has been more difficult to get large airplanes capable of carrying them.
