

THE FOURTH OF JULY.

The annual recurrence of the Fourth of July is an event which no American citizen can allow to pass without reflecting what the day means and what the associations are connected with it. All the sacred traditions of his country, all the most cherished principles of freedom and equity in governmentthe enduring rocks upon which the great republic was founded-cluster so closely around the national holiday that its celebration becomes almost a national duty.

The establishment of the American republic upon the lines laid down in the constitution, which already has: stood the test of a century and a quarter, was an object lesson the effect of which has been recognized in modifications in the form of government in nearly every one of the old world powers.

It is a most striking commentary apon the spirit of the times that Great Britain is the most cordial of all the great powers in according recognition to the United States for what it has accomplished in uplifting the standard of humanity and spreading the gospel of the freedom and equality of all men.

Joseph Chamberlain, the great secretary for the colonies, in a recent speech, referred with much feeling to this fact. He deplored the circumstances of the American revolution as an event brought about through one of those mistakes to which every government is liable, and mentioned the fact that the attitude of the British ministry toward the American colonies, which resulted in the revolution, did not represent the true feeling of the great masses of the English people. To those who are familiar with the history of both nations the soundness of this argument must be at once apparent. Since the time of the Norman conquest England has been leading the van in the march of governmental progress. The rivers of England had run with blood, shed in defense of the very principles for which the colonies contended, long before any confederation of the American settlements had been thought of. The raw recruits who rallied at Lexington and Bunker Hill were Englishmen contending for rights identical with those for which thousands of Englishmen long before had given up their lives upon English soil. The feudal barons who confronted King John upon the island of Runnymede and with drawn swords forced his signature to the great charter of English liberties, and the stardy men who followed Cromwell to the bitter extremity of beheading a British sovereign, were but prototypes of Washington and his devoted and loyal troops. There is nothing strange or inconsistent, therefore, in the fact that British and American subjects join with each other in exchanging felicitations upon such occasions as the Queen's birthday and the Fourth of July. Such influences as a common language, a common religion, close commercial relations and rapid and frequent communication between the two nations have worked. marvels in binding them together inclose relationship.
