His Appointm at Officially Made by the Dominion Government.

the Most Likely One to Lead the Opposition — Mr. Howland's Chances—The Contest

TORONTO, Oct. 6.—Mr. Meredith has sent to the city hall his resignation as city solicitor, giving as his reason that he has accepted the position of Chief Justice of the Common Pleas, and that he had telegraphed his acceptance to Ottawa. He thought he would be able to arrange with the Department of Justice at Ottawa for two weeks' time in which to arrange the legal business of the city.

William Ralph Meredith is 54 years of age. He was born on March 31st, 1840. In 1859 he entered Toronto University and in 1861 was called to the bar. He moved to Toronto in 1888 when he replaced the late W. A. Foster, Q.C., in the firm of Foster, Clarke & Bowes. Mr. Meredith was first elected to the Ontario Legislature in 1872, succeeding Sir John Carling, and elected one month before Sir Oliver Mowat was first chosen in Oxford. The member from London was chosen as leader of the Ophosition in 1878. A few years ago Mr. Meredith was offered a junior judgeship, but he refused the appointment.

There are staunch supporters of the Conservative party who do not know Mr. Howland. At his nomination a prominent Tory politician even called into question his orthodoxy, and said he had

question his orthodoxy, and said he had never heard his name mentioned before in a Tory caucus or a Tory gathering of any kind. Mr. Howland was elected by the largest majority ever given a Conservative candidate in Toronto.

James Pliney Whitney, Q. C., is the member for the county of Dundas. He was born at Williamsburg, Dundas county, in 1843, and was called to the bar in 1876, and was married in the following year. He is a licutenant-colonel in the militia ned to the Assembly in 1888, the member having lost his seat hrough bribery by agents. He was re-slected in 1890, and again in 1894. Mr. Whitney has always held a seat near his eader on the front row and is recognized leader on the front row and is recognized as the strongest remaining member of the past Parliament. There are other prom-inent Conservatives mentioned, men who would first have to secure a seat in the local Parliament.

CANADA'S PORTS FOR SHIPPING Board of Trade Conference at St. John Advocates This.

Sr. John, N.B., Oct. 5.—The conference of Provincial Boards of Trade opened here yesterday with a very large attendance from all the leading points in New Brunswick and President Troop. of the Halifax Board, and E. Curry, of Amherst. After an address of welcome from the president of the St. John board the business of the conference was taken up. The question first considered was the license fees of peddlers and this provoked considerable discussion.

A resolution was moved asking that the Provincial Legislature amend the law governing them and that each licensed peddler shall wear a badge with a number. Mr. McLean, of Toronto, sald they had fought the question out and the decision of the Privy Council had shown the Provincial Legislatures had not jurisdiction in the matter. In view of this it was decided to postpone the matter.

The next topic was railway freight rates, and under this heading the Canadian Pacific came in for considerable discussion, the merchants present from non-competition and the merchants present from non-competition.

R. points claiming that the road has arbitrary rates, which is a source of great grievance to manufacturers and business men. A resolution condemning the rates as arbitrary against Woodstock was carried unanimously. Another resolution was passed condemning the discriminating policy of the Grand Trunk and I. C. R. in freight matters against the northern portion of New Brunswick. A resolution seeking to adopt standard time provoked a lengthy discussion and was finally defeated.

President Troop, of Halfax, moved a resolution to the effect that it was advisable to form a maritime board of trade. This was carried unanimously and a committee appointed to carry the idea of the

mittee appointed to carry the idea of the resolution into effect.

At the evening session Lieut.-Governor Frazer was present and addressed the convention at some length on the importance of the matters to be considered.

The resolution touching the peddlers was again taken up and passed.

The next subject was the necessity of the importation of Canadian goods through Canadian ports. This brought out a round of speeches and all were of one mind that Canadian goods should not be brought into the country through United States ports, nor should they be shipped from the United States on steamers subsidized by Canada. Resolutions strongly condemning this were passed.

His Father's Residence. MYSTERY SHROUDS THE CRIME

The house and grounds of Mr. Westwood have a large frontage on the lake, and are known to everyone for their beauty and extent. Frank at once rose and went to answer the summons. He had no sooner opened the door than a pistol shot rang out on the night air, startling the already frightened mother and rousing the entire household.

Mrs. Westwood ran to the door, but for a moment could not see her son or anyone else for the smoke from the powder. When it cleared away she saw the form of her son lying prone on the floor with his When it cleared away she saw the form of her son lying prone on the floor with his life-blood ozing from a wound in his side. Although almost prostrated by the terrible event the mother recovered herself sufficiently to reach the side of the wounded lad, and with the other members of the family who had hastened horror-stricken to her assistance, conveyed him into the parlor. DEATH OF HON. S. RICHARDS

He Was Once a Member of the Sandfield Macdonald Government.

TORONTO, Oct. 5.—The Hon. Stephen Richards, Q.C., one of the few remaining members of the John Sandfield Macdonald Government, and a well-known legal practitioner in the city, dropped dead yesterday afternoon at the Toronto Ferry Company's shelter on the dock at Centre Island.

Hon. Mr. Richards was a 'rother of the late Sir W. B. Richards, Chief Justic of Queen's Bench. He was born in Broville in 1820, was educated in Toronto, called to the bur in 1841, and created a Queen's counsel in 1852. His law practice became extensive and few became better known than he in legal circles. His eminent standing at the bar won for him the Conservative nomination in South Leeds for the Local House in 1861, but he was unsuccessful, and his first return to Parliament was in December, 1867, on the resignation of the then sitting member for Niagara. In that year he was appointed a member of the Executive Council and Commissioner of Crown Lands. 




A CHEAP GYMNASIUM PLANS FOR CONSTRUCTION BRING-ING THE COST DOWN TO \$8.

Ing Bag—Chest Weights and Details.

Having a great desire for a gymnasium, but living in a small town that had none, and not possessing the means to "order" an outfit from those seductive catalogues of sporting goods houses which every school-boy has longingly perused I decided to devise and construct one. It was such a success and the cost so small that I believe there are many boys in the country who will be glad to know how it was made.

The total cost of my gymnasium was \$8. A boy in any country town can make one as cheap, and perhaps cheaper. With the outfit described below you can get enough exercise in volume and variety to suit the average amateur athlets.

First, a tall frame is erected. Get three large beams 6x3 inches, two of them 16 feet



THE GYMNASIUM COMPLETE. three feet, and run guy wires from the top or else use wooden props, in order that there shall be no oscillation. Upon this frame the several applications are fixed. The most important of these is the hori-

zontal bar.

There is, probably, in your neighborhood a turning lathe. If so, you can get a seasoned hickory bar turned in a few minutes somed nickery or turned in a lew initides for 75 cents. It should be about 14 inches in diameter and six feet long! If you can-not get one turned, a carpenter will hew and draw one out for you. About two inches at each end of the bar should be inches at each end of the bar should be left square, the roundness tapering off from the squareness. Before using the bar should be well sandpapered in order to make it as smooth as possible. The bar fits in the frame between the two upright beams. To make it adjustable to the different heights and removable in a few seconds' time, several corresponding holes must be cut into each of the uprights. 

Word From Missionaries at Han Kow A nounce Their Safety and That They Fear no Trouble—Uprising in the Province of Mon-

LONDON, Oct. 6 .- The Central News co

LONDON, Oct. 6.—The Central News correspondent in Shanghai telegraphs: "Seventy Japanese transports passed the northeast promontory near Chee-Foo on the morning of October 2. New-Chwang reports are to the effect that the Chinese are in full retreat from Moulden. Ten thousand armed Coreans are receiving Japanese pay."

A despatch to the Morning Post from Shanghai says that several Japanese warships are patrolling the sea near Wei-Hai-Wei with the object of preventing the Chinese from leaving Wei-Hai-Wei or Port Arthur. The warships approach the coast at nightfall and steam away again at dawn.

The Morning Post insists that it is impossible to allow Japan to dictate terms to China without consulting the European powers. The Post discusses America's interest in the questions and concludes that these are purely commercial while Europe's are also political. For the sake of the world's peace, it says, Russia, Germany, France and Great Britain must intervene. The Japanese Prince Yamashina, who was recently recalled to Japan to assume an important command, is a passenger on the Hamburg-American steamer Augusta Victoria which sailed from Southampton yesterday for New York. Prince Yamashina has been serving in the German mayy.

The British missionary society has received a telegram from the missionary station at Han-Kow saying: "We are all well and apprehend mo danger."

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 6.—J. S. Van Buren, agent of the Pacific Mail Steamship Company at Hong Kong was one of the passengers on the steamer Gaelic which arrived here. Mr. Van Buren says that it is impossible to get trustworthy news of the war at any place in the east. All Chinese news comes by way of Shanghai, and as the government controls the wires all information concerning engagements between the contending forces is garbled to suit the Chinese authorities. The news obtainable at Yokohana is no more satisfactory as it is modified or exaggerated to suit the ideas of the Japanese authorities. Tien-Tsin, Oct. 6.—According to reports received here, the Province of Mongolia is eceived here, the Province of Mongolia is in a state of rebellion and troops have been lespatched from Pekin to subdue the re-redit. There is also said to be grave trou-ble in the Pekin palace, but full informa-tion is lacking. Every precaution is being aken by the residents of Tien-Tsin against threatened attack by the natives.
