Our Natal Day. Last week in the Local Legislature a bill, introduced by Mr. Fisher, M. P. P. for Pictou, to make Dominion day a holiday for provincial officers and school children, was voted down by a large majority.

It occurs to us that such a course has been taken by the members of the Legislature based upon such grounds as being about a spirit of division and disloyalty. The provincial parliament has no right to look upon a portion of the people as disloyal.

Again so noticeable an omission as a failure to publicly celebrate our country's natal day, is pronouncedly adapted to keep open for time to come the gulf between the confederates and the anti-confederates.

On the other hand if the bill had been allowed to pass, the celebration of the day of our Dominion's birth by patriotic speeches and manifestations, when the children would have been taught to look upon their country with love and pride.

The fading of the party badge, which is a characteristic development of free government everywhere these latter days is very noticeable just now, both in Canada and the United States.

Today who acts now with this party and again with that, making his choice according to the issues at stake, no longer hears the epithet "turncoat," for he travels usually with a large crowd, and the language of contempt is kept for those who are banished in staid party hierarchy and cannot move.

The Remedial Bill.

The long expected remedial bill for Manitoba was given to the public last week. The bill consists of 112 clauses, the preamble reciting the steps taken up to the time the parliament of Canada was given power to legislate on the subject.

The bill provides that school assessment shall be laid equally according to valuation upon the real and personal property of Roman Catholics (other than that of those who have given the notice prior to assessment referred to in section 25 of this act) in the school district and shall be payable by and recoverable from the owner, occupier or possessor of the property liable to be rated and shall, if not paid, be a special mortgage, and not requiring registration to preserve it on all real estate, and a special charge and lien upon all personal property liable to assessment to the value of \$500.00 belonging to bona fide owners of real estate of at least forty acres.

Clause 79 states that any school not conducted according to all the provisions of this act in force for the time relating to separate schools or the regulation of the board of education in force under its authority, shall not be deemed a separate school within the meaning of the law and such school shall neither participate in the educational fund nor in the legislative grant.

Appeal to the Women of Nova Scotia. The Local Council of Women of Halifax, (affiliated to the National Council of Women of Canada), representing 699 women of different religious denominations in that city, appeals to the women of Nova Scotia to send a message of sympathy to the persecuted, helpless and starving women and children of Armenia.

The latest and most reliable accounts from this unhappy country assure us that the destitution there is truly awful and that unless immediate financial relief be forthcoming, thousands will perish of cold and hunger.

We appeal to you therefore in all confidence to listen to the exceeding great and bitter cry which comes to us, from far across the sea, from homes laid waste and smiting villages desolated, from the mother weeping for her murdered babe, the wife for her tortured husband, the fair young girl driven to despair and madness by cruel insult and shameful outrage.

We rejoice to think that everywhere Christian womanhood has come to the rescue, and that in the person of the noble and undaunted Clara Barton, it has uttered its living protest against Turkish tyranny and misrule.
