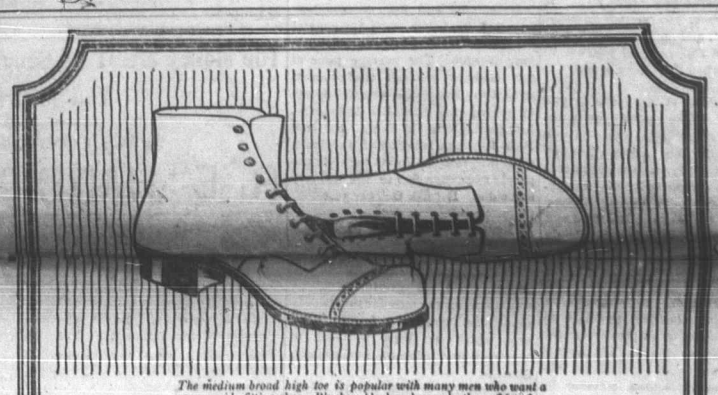

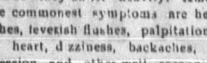

Editorial Briefs.

To carry through their big job to a smashing victory, the boys 'over there' need guns, shells, cartridges, tanks, aeroplanes, not to mention food and clothing. Money to buy these must come from those who are not fighting. A Victory bond is a weapon of defence. The more you have the better you are fighting.

Your country, at war, calls on you for money. Why should you withhold from it any money you have to loan? Security the country offers and the interest it pays is better than that of any private corporation—two substantial reasons for buying Victory Bonds, if there was not the third and greater reason that it is a duty to do so.

Next Monday, Oct. 28th, the canvass for the Victory Loan, 1918, commences. The government is asking for \$300,000,000 from the whole of Canada, and \$25,000,000 from the province of Nova Scotia. It is up to every one to see that Canada goes over the top in this as in all former loans.

First, the money is needed to enable Canada to continue her glorious part in the fight for British and world freedom, and to maintain our industrial prosperity.

Second, the Victory bond offers the most favorable investment today, perhaps the last chance to purchase tax free bonds.

Third, if after the war you are unable to show your children scars of battle on an honorable discharge from military service in the great war, you may be able to show a Victory bond as proof that you had a part in winning the fight for liberty.

The bonds will be issued in denominations of \$50, \$100, \$500 and \$1000; and the interest is the same as the last to 5, 5 1/2 per cent. Payments are due as follows: 10 per cent on application, 20 per cent on December 6th, 20 per cent on January 6th, 20 per cent on February 6th, and 20 per cent and accrued interest on March 6th.

The amount allotted to Kings county in this campaign is \$650,000, but it is hoped that we can raise at least \$750,000. The following is what is expected in Wolfville and vicinity.

National Fish Day.

October 31st is National Fish Day. It is the new national day which for its benefits ought to be as well known as Thanksgiving. The intention is to make known the tremendous wealth of our Canadian seas and lakes, now largely going to waste because people's tastes have run toward meat. At present the annual value of Canadian fisheries is \$52,000,000 or only about one-eighth of a dollar a week for each person. Forty-three years ago it was \$35,000,000. The fish industry and fish consumption have not kept pace with the general progress of the country. A revival is long overdue. The average price of fish is about one-half that of meat, so that the housewife who insists upon getting fish from her dealer, combats the high cost of living. National Fish Day was established to give a right direction to the thought of the people respecting fish in the ordinary home diet. Eat fish October 31st.

The Canada Food Board.

Many a club of business men's committee in the towns and cities of Canada could aid greater war-time production on the farms if they would adopt the tractor and contractor idea, which has been initiated in Ontario, and adopted in Chatham, Ontario. The contractor idea as applied to farming is simply this. A club of business men in a town form a little company, with a capital of perhaps \$10,000. They buy a tractor at a cost of about \$1,000, and undertake to plow idle land or regular farm land on contract. They employ a practical man as their contractor, a man who has been used to handling labour and getting things done. The war has altered the activities of many of such men. Railway contracting, bridge building and such work has been greatly limited by reason of the war upon capital, upon labour and upon other energies of the people. In Montreal, Mr. J. P. Anglin, the well known engineer and building contractor, has undertaken a big contract to plow idle acreage near Montreal, and a syndicate of business men has been formed to do similar work in Kent county, Ontario. These examples might well be followed throughout Canada.

The Soldier's Chance.

Great as the danger and large as the losses in the aggregate, the individual soldier has plenty of chances of coming out of the war unscathed, or at least not badly injured. Based on the mortality statistics of the allied armies, a soldier's chances are as follows: Twenty-nine chances of coming home to one chance of being killed.

Miss Marion Ryder.

Word has been received at Yarmouth of the death of Miss Marion N. Ryder, which occurred in the Knickerbocker hospital in New York City, Wednesday after a brief illness of pneumonia. The deceased was the eldest daughter of the late Captain George N. Ryder, who passed away in New Orleans a few months ago. For some years previous to the death of Miss Ryder's mother she resided at Wolfville where she attended Acadia University but after the death of her parent she came to Yarmouth making her home with relatives. In the early summer she went to Boston where she entered St. Simon's College and took a librarian's course, the conclusion of which Miss Ryder went to New York and secured a position as assistant librarian in one of the city's public libraries. Miss Ryder was twenty-nine years of age, and is survived by one sister, Mrs. Vernon Anderson, of British Columbia.

Dear Sir:—May I through the medium of your paper ask a momentous question? Is there or is there not influenza in Wolfville? I do not refer to Spanish influenza, which I understand is merely influenza in an aggravated form, but influenza as we have known it until recently. Why all this mystery? Why all these rumors? Why all this sickness throughout the town? If, as I hear, one doctor states there are ninety cases in town and at the institutions on the hill, why is it not made known and proper precautions taken to annihilate it while in the early stages and before it becomes an epidemic? Why, if there is nothing beyond colds at the Seminary, are the girls forbidden to leave the grounds? Why, if it is not colds, are town girls permitted to attend classes and become exposed to whatever sickness is prevalent there? From another medical standpoint that the proof of these being no Spanish or any other kind of influenza is the fact that there has been no deaths. Surely we are not going to wait until lives are endangered and lost before we awake to the fact that we are as negligent as Knoxville was.

Let me assure you, I do not desire to cause any unnecessary alarm concerning this matter. A statement from our health officer would allay your fears or warn you to take steps to prevent a serious epidemic in our midst.

Capt. Macdonald has served his country since the beginning of the war, returning last year on instructional service. His bride was one of Wolfville's most popular young ladies.

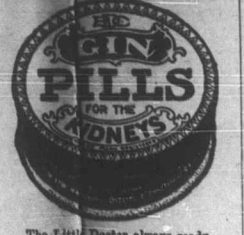
The happy couple are followed by the bridesmaids and groomsmen.

The New President of the C.P.R.

THE Presidency of so vast a system as that of the Canadian Pacific Railway is no easy position to fill—so varied are the interests and covering so large and manifold a territory. The railway itself has eighty thousand employees and more millions even than any of the great systems of the United States—no less than 15,000 miles of track being operated or controlled from Montreal. These things, therefore, are the great Angus Shops at Montreal, with other large shops also at Winnipeg and Calgary, where so much of the rail-

Subsidiary to the railway company itself are the Canadian Pacific Ocean Services, representing one of the largest passenger fleets of the world, amounting to almost 40,000 tons, and providing one of the most vital links between Europe and the Orient.

As a common carrier the railway serves all the broad interests of Canada—agricultural, industrial and commercial—and is naturally in close touch with the financial institutions, several of which are represented on the Board of Directors. The position of the President on financial questions carries enormous weight in Canada, which naturally takes most interest in such American financial movements as affect the component parts of the British Empire.

Owing to its economic position the Canadian Pacific is naturally of great interest to the political leaders at Ottawa, and no economic legislation is likely to be brought forward by any Government without obtaining at least an expression of opinion from the Canadian Pacific President. In this respect it is known that the leaders at Ottawa have the greatest respect for the capable judgment of Mr. E. W. Beatty, who, in spite of his comparative youth, has proved in many cases his mature and sound economic judgment.

No finer description could be given to the new President of the C. P. R. than the tribute paid by Lord Shaftesbury, in the official statement regarding his accession:—"One who has shown notable administrative ability, and who enjoys to a marked degree the confidence not only of the official and business leaders of Canada, but also of the employees of the Canadian Pacific Railway itself."

Mr. Beatty was born in Thorold, Ontario, forty-two years ago. Canadian parents—his father being Henry Beatty, a prominent steamship owner. He graduated from Toronto University, studied law, and entered the C. P. R. service in 1901, in the legal department. He was appointed vice-president in 1914, and director in 1916.

Sir George Foster, speaking at the Dominion W. C. T. U. convention, said in part:

"It is an awful troublesome thing that you've got," he said, a troublesome thing to the woman who realizes what it is that she has. 'But,' he went on to say, 'I have no doubt that women will inject into the public life of this country a power and vitality for good which can scarcely be measured. To accomplish this, women must make themselves close and careful and prayerful students of society and the needs of society. It is to give women franchise and not to emphasize the facts that they must study the needs of the element in which they mingle. First, they will learn the affairs of municipalities, then of provinces, then of the Dominion, and then of the empire, finally becoming co-workers with every one in this great empire that belts the globe.'"

In giving what he qualified as some very modest advice, which his audience might take or not as they cared, Sir George recommended them to keep their ballot as a personal possession, not belonging to this or that party or cult, for the best support of a party. A party did best that had to deal with conscientious individuals thought which made it secure the voice of that element.

"This new girl," said Sir George, "is not for you to flourish and to say, 'See what I've got,' but to put into practical use in the furtherance of the object for which you are striving. Tracing the history of the temperance prohibition movement in Canada in very brief resume, Sir George remarked that sometimes he thought workers of to-day did not realize upon what true and firm foundations of past work they were building. But, he warned his audience, they must not rest on their laurels now that Dominion-wide temperance and prohibition has been obtained. All retrograde movements of reform were traceable to over confidence, and the

CLASSIFYING IRELAND.

At the census of 1911 the principal religious professions of Ireland were recorded as follows: Roman Catholics, 2,242,737; Protestant Episcopalians, 376,611; Presbyterians, 440,525; Methodists, 62,382. All other professions were 68,921. The majority of Roman Catholics in Leinster, Munster and Connaught was overwhelming. In Ulster, the Protestant stronghold of Ireland, there was a Protestant majority in all except three counties, but a Roman Catholic plurality, as shown by the actual figures: Roman Catholics, 690,816; Protestant Episcopalians, 266,772; Presbyterians, 421,419; Methodists, 48,816; other professions, 53,881.

The total population of Ireland in 1911 was classified as follows, by occupations: Professional class 141,134; domestic class, 370,749; commercial class, 112,143; agricultural class, 780,867; industrial class, 613,297; indefinite and non-productive class, 2,572,929; total population, 4,529,219.

The estimated population of the registration area of Dublin in 1911 was 406,000. The estimated population of Belfast at that time was 399,000.

The total acreage of Ireland exclusive of water is 20,371,124, or 100 acres for every twenty-one persons.

In 1915 Ireland had 701,475 electors, who returned 103 members to the British Parliament, in which Scotland, with 84,909 electors, had only 72.

An act to establish a separate Parliament in Ireland was passed in 1914, but its operation was postponed pending the termination of the war.

Women are eligible for election as members of all local government elected bodies in Ireland in the same manner and on the same conditions as men.

By the Local Government Act of 1898, popularly elected councils for counties and rural districts are principal local authorities.

In 1911 the Irish who could speak only Gaelic numbered 16,873, while in Wales and Monmouthshire there were 190,292 who could speak only Welsh, and in Scotland, 18,400 who could speak only Gaelic.

From 1853 to 1911 the total number of Irish who emigrated was 7,122,564. The emigrants from 1861 to 1870 numbered the maximum of 818,582.

Stories from France.

In stories about experiences in a soldier's home in Paris Miss C. K. Corey tells in the National Geographic Magazine how one of the men on leave from the front brought her a bunch of violets because she "was so good to him yesterday." "He had had to search for it, and said, 'Why didn't somebody tell me just to walk till I smelled the perfume? I found it all right, and it cost him a pretty penny, too.' 'Say, I'll bet a guy could spend a thousand francs a day in this town and lead a righteous life. And if he lived the other kind of life, he'd be a hero.'"

Another story told by Miss Corey concerns the British soldier's love of jam. "I hand the jam to a chap who wants to know if I've ever seen the cartoon where poor Tommy, opening another tin of apple jelly, is saying, 'longingly, 'When'll it be strawberry? I nod, but tell him not to be afraid of this brand.' So he decides to 'take a chance.' I notice that his 'chance' is a liberal one. As he scrapes the

bowls he volunteers the information that his mother always used to let him lick the spoon. At which everybody present yells 'Kamarad!' including me."

Another man just from the trenches found that he couldn't sleep in a quiet place like Paris. The strange feeling of a mattress under him and four walls around him had chased away all thought of sleep, and he turned and twisted from nine o'clock till 11 30. At that moment came an air raid in the Bois de Boulogne. "Then," he said, "it was just like 'Home, Sweet Home' in my pill-box, and I didn't wake up till next morning at eight."

A Misunderstanding.

"Take it from me," said Ivy L. Lee, the Red Cross propagandist, a few days before his departure for France—"take it from me, when you hear anything generous or kind or noble on a German's part, the thing turns out to be a misunderstanding. It's like the talk between Skinner and Grabbie, the two storekeepers. 'Say, Skinner,' Grabbie asked, 'what base of profit do you work on?' 'One per cent,' said Skinner promptly. 'One per cent!' said Grabbie. 'Holy smoke! That ain't no profit at all. Why, man, I run my store on a profit of 25, 40, yes, and sometimes even 50 per cent.' 'Well, yer a greedy devil,' then," said Skinner. 'One per cent is enough for me. If an article cost me a dollar, I let it go for two.'"

A man-o'-war-man on a visit to his native city gave an amusing instance of the readiness and resource of naval seamen. He had made an arrangement at London to meet a chum from his own ship, but he had forgotten the number of the house, and he did not care to knock at every door until he came to the right one. 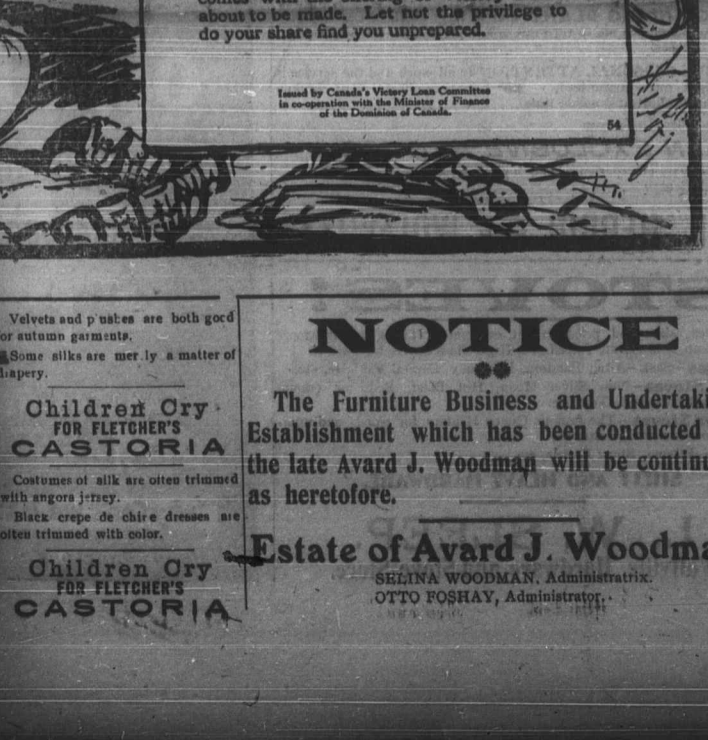
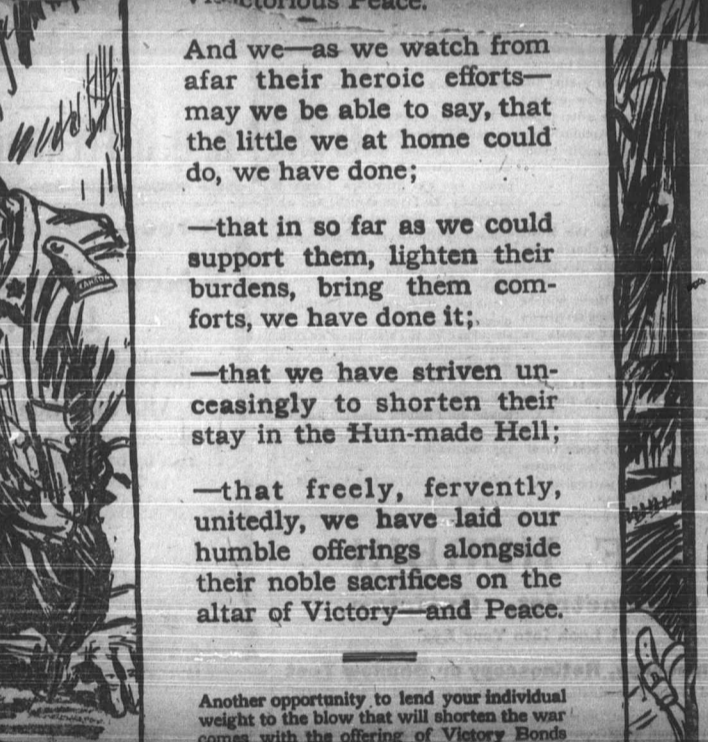
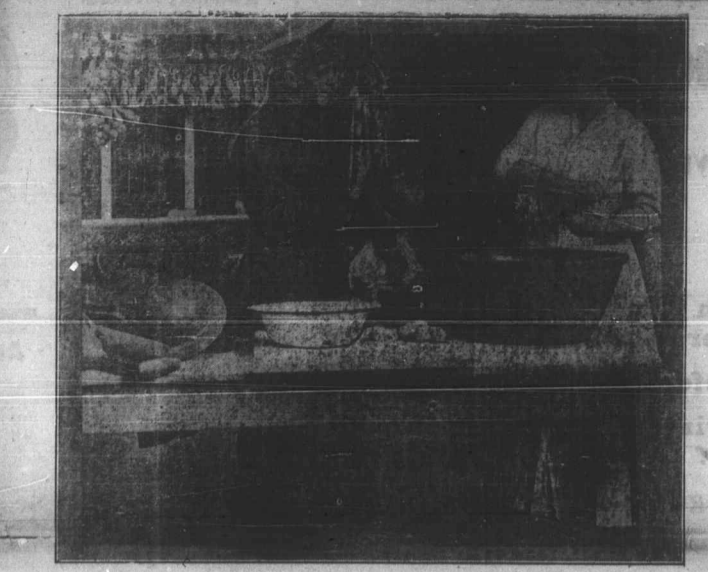
