THE STATEMENT OF THE CHARGES OF THE PRESENT COMPARED WITH THOSE OF THE LATE QUEEN'S PRINTER.

Having promised, previous to the transfer of my Printing establishment to my son, to lay before the public a comparative statement of the charges made by me for public printing, when I held the office of Queen's Printer, and of those made by the individual who at present holds that office, I now give the subjoined, both sides of which have been copied from the Journals of the Assembly, as an evidence of the excess and unjust increase of charge in that department of the public service, which indeed is only the natural fruit of that system, the Responsibility of which consists of making officials accessible to themselves.

I have been waiting to get into my possession the accounts of 1851 and 1852; but, up to the present time, all I can obtain, is, from the 14th July to the 15th November, 1851. Thus, although the present "Responsible" Government has been in operation for upwards of two years, the public have before them, the accounts of the Queen's Printer for no longer a period than four months.

In order to facilitate comparison, I have stated the charges, &c., in four columns: and for the present, I subjoin them to the public "without note or comment." The unforced evidence afforded by them, is, of itself sufficiently condemnatory of the present system of official responsibility. I shall, shortly, however, follow up this statement by some remarks upon the speeches of certain Honorable gentlemen in the Assembly, when this subject was before the House, for the purpose of correcting some of their mistakes, and of placing some of their distorted "facts" in a proper light.

At these very moderate charges about one-eighth, on some items, were deducted from J. D. Haszard's Accounts by the Executive Council, but E. Whelan's excessive amounts were paid. On what principles? Surely not in those of honesty.

The above statements are extracted from only three Departments, but show the sum of £25 and upwards, which with smaller items will exceed £400 taken from the public for four months services.

A similar service was often performed, but never charged for by J. D. Haszard.

E. Whelan supplied the Gazette to those Offices only from 14th July, and yet he has charged and been allowed payment for the whole year.

The charge for Advertising Average Return of Grain was never allowed to me.

Under the head of the Col. Secretaries Department there are several items of over charges amounting to £4 10s. 3d. not included in the above statement other Departments have not been so closely examined although the same style of charging exist.

To the Electors of the Second District of Queen's County, GENTLEMEN:

THE result of the canvass for your suffrages at the ensuing Election has been highly gratifying to me, and, upon the whole, such as to justify an almost confident expectation that: were I to abide the issue of a contest at the Hustings, I should have the honor to be returned one of your Representatives. This, however, for reasons which I cannot yet well know how to appreciate, I have determined not to do.

Since the publication of my Address to you, two other Candidates for the same place, Mr. McDowell and Mr. McLean, have withdrawn, both professing the same political principles that I myself entertain, have the one after the other, thought fit to tender you their services; and it appears to me, almost certain that were we all three to continue Candidates upon the present occasion, our doing so, would through the division which it would occasion among the common friends of our cause afford some advantages to the enemy. I have come to the conclusion that under these circumstances by withdrawing my own personal pretensions to your support, I shall offend you the best evidence that I have it in my power to offer, to the sincere and zealous friends of our cause which have stood forward as the advocates of those principles of Government, the practical adoption of which I hold to be necessary to ensure the just and efficient working of the Responsible System and the future well-being and prosperity of the Colony.

On my return from the contest, for the reasons above stated, I respectfully tender you my grateful acknowledgments, for the very kind and flattering reception, which you have generally accorded me, throughout my canvass and, in my declining to prosecute it to the last, proceed from no other feelings than a desire to ensure the promotion of your best interests, and those of the Country in general, by the most economical and judicious arrangement of your various and political friends, in regard to Mr. McDowell and Mr. Longworth, the latter at the Electrode, with which you intended to favor me, for it is only by the election of such men to the Assembly, that any sufficient check or remedy can be provided against such errors in Legislation and abuse of power as have hitherto marked the progress of the Responsible System in this Colony.
