Uaz or PLASTER.—General R. Harmon of Wheatland, Monroe county, New York, in a recent communication to the Chronicle, says that for the last "twenty years no indicious farmer has thought of sowing clover seed without giving it a dressing of plaster." Clover is not the only crop that requires this dressing; almost every crop is benefitted by being plastered, if manured. The application of one hundred pounds of plaster to an acre of grass will give one-third more grass. Where is the farmer so blind to he own interest as not to apply it? He gives the following directions for applying it. own interest as not to apply it? He gives the following directions for applying it:—" Plaster should be sown at the rate of one hundred pounds to the acre, and as early in the spring as the ground is settled, so as to admit of going on to it, and on all grain crops as soon as they make their appearance above ground. Potatoce should never be planted without being wet and rolled in plaster. Plaster draws the ammonia from the air, and increases the dew on the plant, and retains it much longer on grasses, than it would remain were plaster not sown. On clay soils that are somewhat wet, plaster has not been beneficial; on sandy, gravelly, and loam soils, plaster shows its operation to the best advantage."
