

All kinds of reports and rumors regarding the war between Spain and the United States have been going the rounds within the past few days; but very little of a definite and reliable nature has been or can be ascertained; for the reason, in the first place, that about all the information that reaches us comes through United States channels, and is consequently colored to suit the prejudices of the people of that country, and secondly because the press, so far as war news is concerned, has been placed under a censorship.
