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

If any love me let them be glad, not sad; because if they consider my happiness better than their own, they should realize that my soul must have gone to a higher and better plane, where it would not be content if I knew that my friends on earth were weeping because of my promotion.

A philosopher—
Yes, I've used that quotation before.
But in a different connection. Last time I used it, it was to point a few remarks on the abominableness of that soul-harrowing device for making unhappy people as much more unhappy as possible—the ordinary funeral service.

To-day I use it to help me in attacking a custom that is first cousin to that device, and that is the wearing of mourning.

Now, why should virtually doing the same thing by wearing mourning be considered any less selfish?

What would you think of a woman who walked about the streets saying to everyone whom she met, "I have had a crushing sorrow. I am desperately unhappy." think if it didn't have the unfortunate sanction of fashion and of usage, if, in short, such a custom were suggested as a new thing to-day, we should be quick to call such a parade of grief "vulgar" and "common."
And then think of the inconsistency of such a custom for a Christian. How with any show of reason can a Christian dress in black because the one she loves has been translated to a happier home? She has her own loss to grieve for, to be sure, but any real Christian who truly loved her friend, must believe that her own loss is as nothing to the other's gain, and be glad even if she cannot be happy.
If one is to be logical about it surely the "red, white and blue" in my first paragraph that doubtless offended and shocked some of you would be more appropriate than black.

Respect for the dead is, I suppose, the plea on which this abominable custom got itself established in our midst. The woman who wears mourning is by that fact safely excluded from taking any diversion. But is that a result to be desired?

Don't you think you are insulting your dead to believe that they would be gratified to see you husbanding and cherishing your grief, secluding yourself from society, morbidly running away from anything that could cheer you, instead of healthily seeking it?

Isn't the respect that keeps a shrine in the heart before which it lays a sacrifice of kind words and good deeds a far finer tribute than the respect that shows itself merely in stilted custom?

Take it home to yourself. What would you wish if you were to die?

If you saw those whom you loved grieving you'd long to comfort them of course. Then surely you'd wish them all the comfort the most cheerful clothes and surroundings could give.

Why not credit your dear ones with equal consideration?



Rosebery Moves to Reform Lords.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, March 14. An interesting phase of the political situation to-day was Premier Asquith's announcement in the House of Commons that the Budget would be "introduced and disposed of before the House rose for the spring recess. The House of Lords entered upon a discussion to-day of the self-denying ordinance proposed by Lord Rosebery, preparatory to the Radical reform of the Upper Chamber. Not a seat in the Chamber was vacant, and Lord Rosebery rose to move that the House resolve itself into a Committee of the whole to consider the best means of reforming the existing organization so as to constitute itself a strong and efficient second chamber. At the same time to present a set of resolutions to the effect that such a chamber was necessary and would be best obtainable by the reform and reconstruction of the House of Lords and that a necessary preliminary to such reform and reconstruction was the acceptance of the principle that the possession of peerage itself should no longer afford the right to sit and vote in the House of Lords. Lord Rosebery declared that the time had come for a reform from within without waiting for the Government to carry out its proposals to hamstring the peers, and emasculate the House of Lords that it would become no better than a painted chamber in which no self-respecting person would care to sit. He said that it was wished to establish the elective principle, but it must not be through popular elections, but the elections by associations, corporations and County Councils. Lord Rosebery poured scorn upon the suggestion of a single chamber, which he declared was a proposal to dig the grave of the empire. In America, he said, the Veto of the Senate was stronger than was ever the Veto of a Sovereign. He trembled at the scorn of the United States, when contemplating Great Britain's one-eyed, one-legged search for a constitution. The House of Lords adjourned the debate after a discussion which revealed marked difference of opinion as to the value of Lord Rosebery's proposal. Viscount Morely expressed surprise that Lord Rosebery had not waited for the Government proposals, and pointed out that the Rosebery plan of reform would entirely fail to remove the real difficulty to be solved.

Grand Falls Paper.

By the mail yesterday we received copies of the Daily Mail. In the issue of March 2nd we find a half column article headed "The Daily Mail Paper—To-day's New Era—The production of Newfoundland." The opening paragraph runs:—"From to-day The Daily Mail will be continuously printed on paper made at Grand Falls, on the River of Exploits, in Newfoundland, for the use of the Associated Newspapers and the Amalgamated Press." Then follows a short description of the conversion of spruce trees into pulp and paper, the plant, and the carriage of the output as parcels of pulp and the reels of paper to London. "The Ulunda's first full cargo represented 1,353 tons of paper and pulp. Packed carefully in her hold there were 1,600 reels of paper. Experts declared its condition excellent, despite the severity of the voyage." This is satisfactory as regards the paper. As to the pulp the writer says "the paper mills in the country are evincing great interest. While the cargo of paper is destined entirely for The Daily Mail, this pulp is to be sold to various paper-mills, who will convert it into paper. Practically all this first consignment of pulp has been disposed of, the mills being eager to test its qualities. Experts have pronounced the pulp excellent in every way." Referring to the advantages Newfoundland possess for this class of work, the writer declares that "Paper for newspapers can only be made on a large scale where spruce is plentiful and great power available; and both for trees and rivers Newfoundland should long ago have been famous."

On the Magazine page of the same issue is an article showing by picture and pen how trees are turned into pulp and paper in Newfoundland. It is gratifying to note the publicity the promoters of the Grand Falls enterprise are giving to Newfoundland as a pulp and paper producing country. They are behaving with generosity and doing their best to induce other capitalists to follow in their footsteps. "The croakers of less than five years ago have now to change their tune, and Sir Robert Bond can smile sternly at those who denounced the Harmsworth project as a fake and fizzle and point to the great works and the model settlement at Grand Falls.

Let us examine some of Prowse's supposed proofs:—

1. The logic is quite convincing. It runs in the form of a *Sorites* thus. Cabot came across the ocean; he must have had a ship; (there were no aeroplanes in those days) his ship must have had a keel. The keel must have been dirty after the voyage. It would want to be cleaned. It would require a beach to be cleaned on. There is a beach in Bonavista Bay. The people keep their boats there. Cabot must have done the same. (It does not matter; about there being a thousand other beaches on Newfoundland and Labrador Coast). Clements Markham says Cabot must have hauled up

his boat in this strand; and he is a wonderful man, so therefore Cabot first saw Bonavista Cape, q.e.d.—as clear as Daylight—of the John Anderson type:

2. John Cabot hoisted the Royal Ensign at his landfall. There's a place in Bonavista Bay called King's Cove. Therefore John Cabot first saw C. Bonavista. See?

3. It was on St. John the Baptist's day that Cabot made his landfall therefore he didn't call the place St. John's, but he called it after St. John's Grandfather (was it?) Zacharias! This reminds us of the man who was asked if he spoke German: "Well, not exactly," he answered, "but I have a cousin that plays the German flute."

4. But the most convincing proof of all is that on Majollo's Map of 1527, a map named in Spanish, there is a Rio Jordan or River Jordan on it. Now no one will presume deny that St. John Baptized in the Jordan, therefore Cape Bonavista was the site of Cabot's Landfall! There is of course just a slight difficulty, namely that Cabot tells us that he arrived at the land on St. John's Day, and called the place

(how stupid of him!) and it has retained the name ever since. But such evidence as that is of course of no weight against the assertions of Sir Clements Markham and Judge Prowse to the contrary.

Big Naval Estimates.

Special to Evening Telegram.
LONDON, March 14.
Introducing the navy estimates in the House of Commons to-day, Reginald McKenna, First Lord of the Admiralty, expressed regret that he was unable to hold out any hope for the future of a decline in the estimates. He defended the present large increase, which he said had been rendered necessary by the building programmes of foreign nations. An expenditure of over two hundred millions was imperative to properly safeguard the security of the country and to provide against contingencies. Mr. McKenna explained that counting the Australian and New Zealand ships, which would still be in British waters, Great Britain would have in the summer of 1912 twenty-two Dreadnoughts, while in the following January five Dreadnoughts in addition to this year's programme would be added to the fleet, and thus Great Britain's insularity through this type of ships would be absolutely secure.

30 Ton Air Cruiser.

Special to Evening Telegram.
TRIER, Germany, March 14.
An immense air cruiser to carry from 50 to 60 persons, and intended to travel at from 44 to 50 miles an hour, is approaching completion here and will be launched early this spring by its inventor, Anton Bisor, engineer, of this city. It introduces an entirely new departure in the construction of airships, as it is built of iron. The skeleton of the balloon is formed of rolled iron piping. The central hollow shaft is 410 feet in length. The gas is contained in 12 ring balloon nets in the same manner as in the Zeppelin craft. These balloon nets are just over 27 feet long by nearly 40 feet in diameter, and they lie end to end along the body of the airship. The vessel is provided with no fewer than five motors, developing four hundred and eighty horse power. The entire weight of the frame work, motor and equipment is 30 tons.

French Grafting.

PARIS, March 14.
A cipher list of persons from whom M. Duez, the embezzling liquidator of the properties of the Religious Orders declares he received hush money promises to play in the present scandal a part similar to that of the famous check book of M. Thirret, which served to compromise so many French politicians in the Panama Canal affair. None of the names from this code list has yet been published. Duez' accounts show a shortage of something like two million dollars in connection with church properties taken over by the State.

An Indian student named Savarak was arrested here on his arrival last night from the Continent on a warrant charging sedition. He is held for extradition.

It is reported that an avalanche at Wellington, the scene of the great northern disaster, in which more than 100 lives were lost two weeks ago, has buried a rotary snow plow and two engines with their crews.

25,000 Firemen Strike.

At midnight to-night W. S. Carter, President of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engineers, announced that a strike of twenty-five thousand firemen on practically all the Western railroads had been called.

Lecture by Mr. J. L. Slattery.

The captain received a cut on the head, but it was only skin deep. The seaman about separated the men, and one of them disarming the frenzied sailor threw the knife overboard. The captain's face was also cut where the button of the man's coat, while he had the captain's head pressed under his arm, took effect. Williams was arrested and promptly placed in jail.

Mayor Gibbs Lectures on City Life.

His Honor Mayor Gibbs delivered a well prepared lecture at the British Hall last night. He dealt with civic problems in general as well as those of St. John's, and emphasized the fact throughout his whole dissertation that the manner in which a city was governed and its affairs administered always indicated the character and culture of its people. After alluding to the attractions and the hardships of city life, the successes and the struggles, the Mayor led up to the housing problem. This question had been much discussed of late in other countries as well as our own. A great deal depended on having good houses for the working-men. Unsanitary surroundings and domestic overcrowding bring on squalor and despondency which are the forerunners of intemperance and despair. Then follows eviction and the status of the hardened criminal.

Not only does the man himself suffer but his family also, and hence we have the slum child, the waif and the jail bird. Those conditions must be ameliorated by the interference of the State, and men and women must be made to feel the dignity of citizenship and to appreciate their responsibilities. The mind must be directed into purer channels. Germany was chiefly ahead among the nations going on account of the policy of elevating the common people to a higher state of culture by providing them with parks, baths, concerts and lectures free and proper sanitation. England would have to do more for the poor in the cities in order to have a sound superstructure to rely upon in time of national emergency. The time was come when no community could afford to neglect this problem of improving the conditions in city life, especially the lot of the workingman.

Cities that have been in the van of such work and profiting by the results materially as well as socially. The juvenile criminal is sent to a farm for correction and is not dragged further down by the stigma of the prison life. The adult also is treated humanely; what is good in him, little though it be, is appealed to and in many cases he leads afterwards a new life. In order to bring about civic reform the people must be willing to pay the price as it cannot be done without money. The sooner that the people realized this the quicker would we have a town worth living in. The city should be made beautiful and attractive in its streets, houses, parks and trees and have perfect sanitation. The Mayor quoted statistics showing how death rates had been suddenly reduced in cities where such improvements had taken place, and where also the criminal records were lessened in a marked degree.

At the conclusion Vice-President McCoubrey proposed a vote of thanks seconded by Mr. A. H. Martin, and being put to the audience by President Goodland was carried by acclamation.


Former Fireman Returns to Town.

The Festival of Empire.

Editor Evening Telegram. Dear Sir,—I am very much afraid that the Newfoundland part of the Festival of Empire is going to be a failure to some extent. In the first place the time is far too short to get up a really good exhibition, and there is danger of attempting too much in that brief time.

Let us by all means fully exploit our fisheries, our mines, our pulp industries, our game, our fur, our lumber, and any other commercial enterprises we have. Send all the specimens, models, sketches and photos necessary for advertising them, but leave other unnecessary things out.

I was pleased to learn that it was suggested at the last meeting of the Committee to practically drop out any musical display by the Colony at the Festival—partly for lack of time and partly for other good reasons given.

The idea of a Newfoundland contingent taking part thrice each week for six successive weeks in the Pageant was stated to be impractical, and should also be dropped. If the Colony limits itself to taking part in the final scene of the Pageant, it will be as much as ought to be attempted.

Then, again, this Colony might well drop the idea of painting a set of 4 panoramic pictures for the Festival,

as there is certainly not time to get the work done well. The Committee had an offer some time ago from the leading artist in Paris—an expert on this particular work—who offered to do them. It is stated, for about \$800. Surely the Committee are not going to pay the same extravagant price for work done here with so little time left to do it in! Now, to my mind, a series of enlarged photographs similar to those of Canadian scenery hung in our railway depot would answer better than paintings by any artist who has not ever seen the local views. By sharing the work promptly amongst our city photographers we could have the views enlarged quickly and well, besides saving hundreds of dollars. The many smaller pictures and sketches of Newfoundland scenery, which will doubtless be loaned, would give truer ideas of the beauty of our country than mere panoramic decoration.

As it is certain there will be lots of unexpected and heavy expenses turn up on the other side, it would be well for our Committee to be as careful as they can here whilst the project is under their control.

Dear Sir,—Our football effusion in Friday's issue of your esteemed paper over the non de plume of 'Old Spider' proved a corrective nature as far as the scribbling "Fly" of the Chronicle is concerned, for he admits his slight error in the "Queen's Parkers" (as he calls them) in Saturday's Chronicle.

The "Fly," however, makes another slight error or mistake when he gets "buzzing" around the edge of our ancestral football web with his expressed doubts about our connection with Scotland's pioneer "soccer" club and its famous players named by us, for our very earliest ideas of football and business life generally were formed when in touch—close touch—with the famous Hampden Park Club, its members and followers.

This, Mr. Editor, being of a rather personal nature we shall be glad to discuss at any time with the "Fly" in our little football parlor.

After expressing his doubts about our connection, the "Fly" says: "He may be familiar with the well known couplet:

"Who in Britain does not fear The 'prince of dribblers,' Jimmy Weir?"

And here again he is slightly in error, for we never heard of any such "well known" couplet as he quotes. It is just possible, however, that my friend of the Chronicle has got mixed up a bit in his quotation, and that he

refers to a popular topical ditty of Harry Linn's, the famous Scotch comedian, or Lauder of the seventies, who in his well known song "Through thick and thin" thus refers to J. B. Weir, the most popular exponent of the dribbling game at the time. Thus did Linn sing:—
