





TRIER, Germany, March 14. An immense air cruiser to carry rom 50 to 60 persons, and intended to travel at from 44 to 50 mfles an hour, is approaching completion here and will be launched early this spring by its inventor, Anton Bisor engineer, of this city. It introduces an entirely new departure in the construction of airships, as it is built o iron. The skeleton of the balloon is formed of rolled iron piping. The central hollow shaft is 410 feet in length. The gas is contained in 15 ring balloon nets in the same manne as in the Zeppelin craft. These balloon nets are just over 27 feet long by nearly 40 feet in diameter, and they lie end to end along the body of the airship. 
Former Fireman Returns to Town.




