Hockey League DELEGATES MEET.

A special meeting of the League Delegates took place yesterday afternoon to investigate into an alleged improper action on the part of a city hockeyist, it being reported about the city that he confronted the Manager of the visiting hockey team to cook the second game which took place between St. John's and Windsor. A lengthy conference was held in which every club was represented. There were present: G. Herder (Presidents); N. J. Vinicombe (Victorias); D. Walsh (St. Bon's); H. Dickenson (Feldians); also Secretary, Mr. John Tobin, F. Chesman, G. Marshall and J. P. Blackwood.

The chief item of business was the hearing of Mr. Chesman's evidence who was present when Mr. Marshall, of the city team, interviewed Mr. Mitchell of the Windsor team. It was found that the rumours afloat were greatly exaggerated, although it was upheld by the League that Mr. Marshall did not display good judgment by saying anything out of the ordinary that would give the foreigner an opportunity of reporting him. Before the adjournment the following Resolution was passed:—

"That the League strongly disapproves of the action of Mr. Marshall in visiting the Crosbie Hotel on the evening in question, and discussing with the Manager of the Windsor team the result that the second match would have on the financial outcome of the series; that such action was unknown to the other members of the City team; and that it was such as might seriously reflect on the success of the League in the conduct of Hockey."

The League is, however, of opinion from the evidence disclosed that Mr. Marshall acted without due thought as to the consequences of his discussion, and that his action on the occasion does not merit further steps being taken by the League.

Hon. John Harvey and Sir. Wm. MacGregor.

In the Evening Chronicle's report of what the Hon. John Harvey said in moving the second reading of "A Bill to Prevent Promiscuous Spitting," and which was published last evening, the following occurs, namely:—

"He then explained very fully and clearly the attitude of Sir William MacGregor towards sanatoria as a good deal of misapprehension had been created regarding the gentleman's position. He said that at a public meeting in the British Hall on February 29, 1908, Sir William MacGregor in his speech advocated sanatoriums as one of the items in a general policy for the conservation of the public health, but that a year later when addressing a meeting of the A. P. C. which had been formed meantime, Sir William advised that Association not to have anything to do with a sanatorium because it was beyond their means."

We do not think that the slightest "misapprehension" exists as to Sir William MacGregor's position in respect to the Establishment of Sanatoria in the country for Sir Robert Bond put the position so clearly that "the wayfarer man though a fool need not err therein." Sir Robert said that in the year 1909 at a public meeting held in the British Hall Sir William MacGregor advocated Sanatoria, and that twelve months later at the "Second Public Meeting" held in the British Hall on June 1st Sir William MacGregor had said, in addressing that public meeting "I warn you against the establishment of Sanatoriums. They are beyond our means." The Hon. John Harvey is in error in stating that "Sir William MacGregor" advised the Association "that his remarks only applied to the means at the disposal of the Association. Sir William did not say their (the Association's) means, but our means, that is to say the public means, for he was speaking at a "public meeting" presided over by His Lordship Bishop Jones. The wording of the whole paragraph in which the above occurs clearly indicates that the interpretation placed upon them by Sir Robert Bond was the correct interpretation, and if any person questions this we refer them to a pamphlet containing the full report of Sir William MacGregor's speech entitled, "Second Annual Public Meeting Report of the Association for Prevention of Consumption," published by Barnes & Co., in 1909.

Lecture to S. U. F.

Last night in the British Hall Rev. H. Uphill, Rector of St. Mary's Church, lectured before a large number of members of the S. U. F. The subject was "Studies in human nature" and the rev. gentleman handled it in a most clear and entertaining manner. He recounted in a most interesting way experiences of his own in some of the London dioceses in which he laboured, especially amongst the dwellers in the slums and many pathetic as well as humorous incidents were narrated. The lecture was thoroughly enjoyed, and at its close Grand Secretary J. C. Phillips proposed a vote of thanks which was seconded by Mr. T. Leveuve and carried by acclamation. Mr. Uphill thanked the audience for this and the cordial reception and attentive hearing given him. Grand Purser W. H. Goodland presided. After the lecture the monthly meeting of the Lodge was held when two candidates were initiated and five others submitted for membership. A deal of important business was transacted.
