

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 8 Martial law has been proclaimed in the city and suburbs. The impression prevails here that Montenegro in declaring war acted at the behest of the league of Balkan nations, with the object of blocking the proposed inter vention of the Powers.

Special to Evening Telegram.

BELGRADE, Oct. 8 Reports have reached here that Montenegrin troops have crossed the Turkish frontier. The Servian parliament to-day, voted an extra credit of \$8,900,000 for military purposes, while merchants of this city are making large donations. Funds are being raised for the assistance of poor families whose breadwinners have been called upon for military service.

SOFIA, Oct. 8. The Austrian and Russian ministers have made joint representations to the Bulgarian government on behalf c the Powers to-day. They informed Bulgaria that the warlike attitude of the Balkan States, and urged upon them a prompt cessation of military concentration. They advised the Government to leave to the cabinets of the great Powers the task of assuring Macedonian reforms.

PARIS, Oct. 8. Bulgaria, in reply to the Powers will thank them for the interest manifested in the cause of the Balkan people. After setting forth the exact ask the Powers to obtain from Turkey a similarly precise statement of Turkey's proposed programme of reform. The correspondent adds,- Bulgaria cannot afford to brook delay, as this would compromise her military situation. Concentration of troops by Bui garia is almost complete. It is expect ed that strategic points on the frontier will be occupied to-morrow, possibly producing skirmishes between them and the Turkish advance posts. Czar Ferdinand may leave for the front to-



Dominion Coal Company.

Reported to Have Purchased Large Areas in Alberta.

Calgary, Alta., Sept. 30 .- A deal is eported closed betwen the Dominion Ccal and Iron Company and A. H Ford, of Calgary, whereby the former becomes possessed of the Ford Coal areas in the High River District, comprising 12,000 acres. The purchase price is said to be \$1,000,000, and gives ossession of one of the largest anthracite fields in Canada. Seams have been prospected for a distance of 15 miles, and range in width from seven and a half to 30 feet. The deposits carry both cooking coal and anthracite of quality equal to that of Pennsylvania, both of which will be developed.


