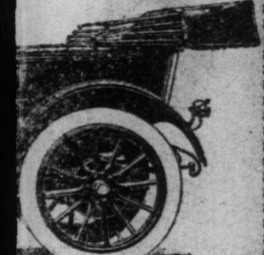

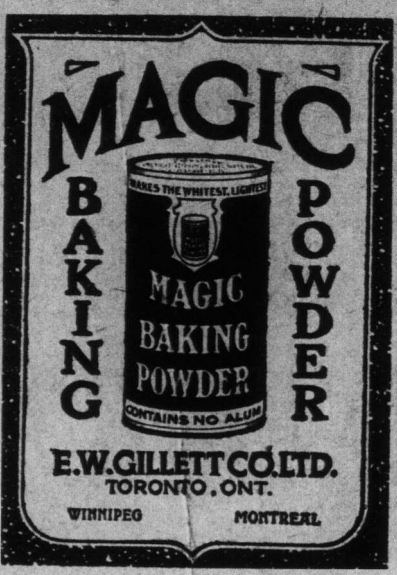

One of the fundamental instincts of the human race is to hunt for someone to blame when anything goes wrong—and to hunt with field glasses. The idea that the trouble may be nearer home usually has difficulty in finding its way into the mind.

A friend of mine was bewailing the carelessness or selfishness of a friend of hers who had not answered an important letter. "I think it's either very unkind or inexcusably careless of her," she scolded; "I told her how much it meant to me to hear within two or three days. A smart jacket frock is developed of finest white serge and the short-waisted coat has a vest of flowered silk, which disappears beneath a broad girle of black satin.


The wide crush girle of satin, finished with a large bow tied so the ends and loops extend above and below the girle several inches, is very becoming to the girlish figure.

Anderson, J. Miller, T. Urquhart, Hon. W. C. and Mrs. Job, Miss Job, Master Job, Miss Scott and 16 second class, besides a couple of hundred emigrants, mostly British people, who are bound to the Canadian Northwest.

Pleasant Trip.

Mr. George Geary, the veteran sheriff and goal keeper at Ferryland, who is now bordering upon his 80th year, returned from a two months vacation in New York by the Stephano. He saw all the sights, visited Sing Sing, sat in the electric chair, went amongst the 1,600 prisoners confined there, and was shown about a Newfoundland, Mr. C. C. Pike, formerly at Pleasant Street, St. John's, but who had been in the New York Police Force for 30 years, who is a veteran of the Civil War and is now being light duty on a pension. Mr. Geary was in New York 62 years ago when he made his first visit there.

From Labrador.

The s.s. Kyle, Capt. Parsons, arrived here at 7.30 a.m. yesterday from Labrador, completing her first trip to that coast in 14 days, going and returning. The ship went down as far as Smoky Tickle, which she reached on Monday last, the 9th inst. and met a good deal of ice, but the ship proved herself a fine ice-breaker and forced through it without difficulty, while she also proved to be an excellent sea boat. The ship could not proceed further north than Smoky, as a solid jam of ice confronted her, and having landed the crews and freight for that and other places, the ship started south. The Kyle made this run back, calling at all the ports of call in 5 days, and but for heavy fog and the presence of innumerable icebergs, she would have arrived here Saturday. The residents of the coast report they had a stormy and very cold winter, furs were comparatively scarce and trappers did not get much more in the shape of peltries than they did for the season of 1912. The food the ship carried in her cargo was a welcome sight to the crew. Not much news was reported on the coast the past winter. Her passengers here were W. G. Glesch, P. G. Smith, F. Lewis, Rev. G. Fadden and 4 steerage.

Lost Foremast.

The schr. Nellie M. Capt. Keefer, left here yesterday for Cape Broyle deeply laden with supplies and carrying a deckload. Capt. Keefer was in company with the schr. J. J. Nolan and Mignonette, and it blew a stiff gale from N. W. by N. At 8.15 a.m., when trying to negotiate Cape Spear, a much heavier squall heavy squalls struck her and carried the foremast out of her. It came to the deck with a crash, but fortunately none of the men on board were near or they might have been killed. Skipper Keefer signalled for the tug and the Ingraham Mr. Foskitt. The foremast was hoisted up at Goodridge's wharf at 11.15.

A Splendid Yacht.

Messrs. Wm. Thos. and Isaac Bowring, of Bay Roberts, built a beautiful yacht the past winter at that place. The yacht is named "The Yacht" and is moored here in Job Bros. & Co's dock. On the run over she proved herself a splendid sailor and she was yesterday hoisted up over her and moored here in Job Bros. & Co's dock. The yacht is 32 feet long, ten tons burden and her lines are extremely pretty and remind one of the handsome creations of the noted builders. The yacht is decked, has a house forward for the accommodation of the crew and is a splendid model. She was built for the Hudson Bay Co. and will be sent along to the stations by the s.s. Nascoptic. At Hudson Bay a powerful motor will be placed in the yacht. Yesterday hundreds visited Job Bros. premises to see her and all were delighted at this excellent display of marine architecture.

FOR HOSPITAL.—Mrs. Wm. Webber, of Maine River, Bay St. George, died here by the express yesterday and was taken to hospital by Mr. E. H. Whiteaway. She suffers from an internal malady and is very ill.

Excursionists Leave.

The excursion train at 2.30 p.m. yesterday took over 200 passengers. Quite a number on the train and the express got off at Bowling Park and the bus and carriages also brought large numbers there in the afternoon. The excursion train returned at 9.15 last night.

Bankers Arrive.

The schr. Hazel B. Mosher and Robert reached St. Jacques on Saturday from the Gulf with 450 and 250 quintals of fish respectively. The schooner J. A. MacLean arrived from the Grand Banks with 350 quintals of fish. All three bankers report cod plentiful but weather conditions bad.

Farewell Sermon.

There was a large congregation at the Kirk last night, when Rev. Dr. McPhee preached an able and impressive sermon on "Abraham the Hebrew." Dr. McPhee, who had been substituting for Rev. Mr. Sutherland, made numerous friends during his sojourn here. It is to be hoped that Dr. McPhee will visit our shores in the near future again.

Fishery North.

From Capt. Kean of the Prospero we learn that there is an improvement in the fishery north. Last week cod were abnormally plentiful at Twillingate and skipper T. White, got seventy quintals in his trap. Other fishermen secured good fares. There is a good sign of fish in White Bay and chances for "floaters" getting well fished are good.

Tourists Here.

The Bruce express, Conductor Kelly, which arrived here at noon yesterday, dropped off a large number of American tourists at Stephenville, Doyle's, Rattling Brook and other places, where they will spend a fine salmon fishing. Mr. C. C. Pike, formerly at Pleasant Street, St. John's, but who has come along yearly with his wife, got off at Nardinis and will remain there fishing. Mr. Pike also will come by the Lintrose express, due to-day.

Heat.

Heat is a commodity which is served free of charge in the summer and bought by the short ton in the winter. Its principal ingredients are perspiration and sunstroke, both of which are caused by coming in contact with large quantities of unrefined heat and allowing it to settle in one spot.

Summer heat is produced by the earth edging in so close to the sun that there is nothing to interfere with telephone communication except 395,000,000,000 miles of unused atmosphere. In the winter the sun is several miles farther away, so that we do not feel it unless seated over a hot-air register. Some parts of the country have more heat than others, and are able to produce a very satisfactory imitation of a crematory without any effort on the part of the citizens. This tendency is easily overcome by liberal use of the shower bath, the ice pack and the porous union suit.

In the south the heated term usually begins on January 1 and runs without successful interruption until the judgment day. People in the south never feel the heat at all when they are writing home for the newspapers, and by careful management are able to work several hours a day by keeping in the shade with a tub of iced tea at their elbow.

The most energetic brand of heat is manufactured in the north during July and August. This kind of heat will follow a man home at night and pursue him up four flights of stairs into a corner room, where it will camp by his bed until morning and cause him to pant with the untrammelled orator of a Newfoundland dog. When this kind of heat is working properly it will shrivel the wings off a June bug and give a pink and white complexion a coat of sunburn over night.

The only reason heat was invented was for the purpose of maturing the corn crop. It is also used to blast Kansas wheat, and promote the sale of electric fans to people who would rather put the money into lingerie dresses.

Dancing to Destruction.

When I hear the music to the "Turkey Trot," the "Tango," the "Grizzly Bear" and the "Bunny Hug," I can see the devil fiddling in the band. A few years ago, the police interdicted stage exhibitions of a less gross character. To-day, fathers, and husbands and brothers "trot" and "hug" in company with mother and daughters and sisters—the spectacle is appalling.

The minuet is stately and exquisite; the waltz is poetry in motion; there is pure rhythm in the schottische and the polka; joy of living in the maourka and chardash, and rollicking fun in the Virginia reel. But the "trots" and "hugs" and "tangos" are heritages from the bagnio—gifts of the brothel.

A strong-willed and clean-minded woman can at least restrain the impulses that must arise when her whole body is clasped against the sensuous person of her partner, but the menace therein for the ignorant and irresolute of every age, is self-evident. New York has gone dance-mad. The Broadway restaurants are crowded nightly with "trotters" whose activities continue until the closing hour. Road-houses advertise dancing for their patrons, and halls devoted solely to "trotting" and "ragging" are being opened in all quarters.

The seriousness of the situation is intensified by the sale of drinks; and between lascivious music, lustful dancing and liquor, the toll of dishonour is bound to be heavy.

To make matters worse, many hotels announce tea-dances, affording opportunity for girls to elude the vigilance of their parents and for married women to take advantage of their confiding and unsuspecting husbands.

Meanwhile, the devil fiddles and smiles—business is picking up in Hell.—Herbert Kaufman, in the Woman's World for July.

Among the most attractive dresses are those worn with the high-neck ruffles, of pleated tulle and lace. The sleeves are trimmed with similar ruffles of tulle strapped with brackets of ribbon.

Stabbing Affray at Inverness.

Belgian Seriously Wounded a Fellow Coal Miner.

Inverness, N.S., June 9.—Yesterday about 5 p.m., a Belgian, Anselm Lonche, twenty-two years of age, met a fellow coal miner, Joseph McInnis, aged twenty-one, on Central Avenue, and invited him for a walk. The two walked up Forest Street about ten yards when without warning, the Belgian drew a knife from his pocket, and stabbed McInnis immediately above the heart. The wound is serious, but probably not fatal. The wound bled very freely for a time, indicating that an artery had been severed. Lonche made good his escape and has not yet been captured.

Lonche has a wife and two children residing here. He is a smooth faced man, standing about five feet nine inches, dark hair and deep set dark eyes, slightly stooped, good features.

It appears that McInnis and Lonche had a disagreement in the mine here a few days ago, which probably led up to the stabbing. Drs. Proudfoot and McMillan attended to the wounded man.

Craft in Collision With an Iceberg.

The Prospero brought word that a week ago a Harbor Math schooner, Spraclin, master bound to Griffin's Harbor, Labrador, laden with supplies, put into Conche in a badly wrecked condition. While going through the Straits of Belle Isle, dense fog was met and when about thirty miles from the land, the vessel struck an iceberg. The craft was injured and started to leak fast and the forty persons on board thought they would meet watery graves.

"Scientific" Effect.

For some time past the Telegram had been aware that a party from abroad had been residing here and that the eyes of the police were keenly focused on him. The man was believed to be engaged in a doubtful transaction. These suspicions have been known to us since a few days after the arrival of the "visitor" and we also know that the police were watching him had not evidence sufficient to make an arrest.

Cable News.

SPECIAL TO EVENING TELEGRAM. NEWBURY, N.S., To-day. Twenty-one buildings, including three stores, a hotel and a residence, were destroyed by fire that swept Newbury last night. The loss was \$125,000.

CARDIFF, Wales, To-day. The Terra Nova, Capt. Scott's antarctic ship, arrived here from Lytleton, N.Z. by way of the Straits of Magellan. Thousands of persons lined the quays and met the surviving members of the expedition.

SYDNEY, Mine, To-day. The bankhead of No. 2 colliery was destroyed by fire and the rest of the other bankhead machinery totally destroyed. The loss reached \$15,000. It is fairly covered by insurance. The origin of the fire is unknown.

PORT ARTHUR, To-day. Dr. J. A. MacDonald, editor of the Toronto Globe, was injured when the stairway of the Mills Lake Superior Paper Company collapsed during an inspection tour by the Board of Trade at Detroit. His injuries are not nearly so serious as first reported.

STOCKHOLM, To-day. At the conclusion of the athletic meeting in the Stadium, the King bestowed the trophy won by James Thorpe, Carlisle, an Indian, in the Olympic Games, on H. Wieslander a Swede, who finished second. C. Gomborn and G. Holmer, both of Sweden, were awarded second and third prizes respectively.

MONTREAL, To-day. Three men were injured, damage done to the extent of several thousand dollars, and a number of fatalities narrowly averted last night when a tank car filled with coal tar broke loose from the engine on a heavy grade and crashed into the Viger station. The car rumbled through the side of a building into a waiting room where many persons were awaiting outgoing trains.

LEEDS, To-day. Sir Edward Carson, the leading spirit in the fight against Home Rule for Ireland, was struck in the head by a missile thrown by some unknown person while he was proceeding to the Town Hall Saturday night. The procession which was being formed for his arrival, met with considerable obstruction and caused disorders.

EDINBURGH, Scotland, To-day. At the World's Conference of the Young Men's Christian Association, Turkey and Bulgaria joined the alliance of thirty-four other countries. Their delegates were received together on the platform amid wild enthusiasm. On motion of Lord Balfour, seconded by Count Von Moltke, Germany, and Count de Pourtales, France, the conference declared in favor of international arbitration. The feature of the proceedings was a series of three-minute valedictory addresses by delegates from all parts of the world. Dr. Paul Degouttes was elected Chairman of the World's Committee.

HALIFAX, June 15. Premier Borden and Minister Cochrane arrived here Sunday night, in connection with the proposed new terminals for Halifax. Fifteen thousand of the Premier's constituents were at the station to greet him, and a party reception was held in the City Hall, 1,500 persons greeting him with handshakes, bouquets, and Cochrane delivered short addresses from the steps of the City Hall. Speaking of terminals, Borden said it seemed to the Government the time had come when not only Halifax, but Nova Scotia should take a step forward. It was essential there should be a new terminal facilities at Halifax as anywhere on the North Atlantic sea-board.

Oporto Market.

The accompanying letter was received from Lind and Co. of Oporto, on Saturday: "Since we last wrote our market has been heavily supplied with fish from all parts, and although the demand for Norwegian fish has been exceptionally good owing to its lower price, it has not been possible to get dealers to take British fish in the same proportion. German, Icelandic and Scotch cods are now coming here in large quantities, and we fear that with the great heat we are now experiencing, a great deal of deterioration will take place and prices suffer accordingly. We have been doing our best all along to keep the British fish moving off at the best prices obtainable, as at this time of the year it is very risky to hold fish 'long in store'."

Obituary.

Mr. Archibald Pike received a telegram on Friday from Halifax, informing him of the death of his brother, John, aged 55, which sad event occurred on May 22nd, at 22 Alma Street. Mr. Pike was only ill for about five days. He leaves a wife, three sons and two daughters in Halifax, and two brothers, one in Australia and Archibald Pike, this city, to whom the Telegram extends its sympathy.

KILLED A CARIBOU.—A couple of days ago a young caribou came out of the woods at Chanaan and swimming off to one of the Islands near the place was killed by two young men who followed it in a boat. They will likely be prosecuted for killing deer in the close season.


