NEWFOUNDLAND PATRIOTIC AS-SOCIATION EMPLOYMENT COMMITTEE.

The Employment Committee has been appointed by the Newfoundland Patriotic Association "to take into consideration applications for employment in civil life from returned Soldiers and Sailors of the Newfoundland iers and Sailors of the Newfoundland Regiment and Newfoundland Royal Naval Reserve who have been granted honourable discharges." The Committee can only perform this duty to our returned soldiers and sailors with the fullest help and co-operation of all those in the Colony who employ labour or require help or service of any kind in which these men may be employed. The Committee will prepare and keep on file a register of all employed. The Committee will pre-pare and keep on file a register of all men seeking employment, giving their age, qualifications and experience, so far as possible, of each applicant. This information will be available to prospective employers, and steps will be taken to bring about interviews or correspondence between employers and soldier or sailor applicants. Evperson or firm when requiring help for either domestic or busiess purposes is therefore invited to communicate to the Committee the nature of the help required, and of the work to be done, and such other information as may be useful.

At the same time the other members of the Commission were being entertained to dinner at the Sixteenth-Street Mandinner at the Sixteenth-Street Mansion occupied by Balfour's immediate party. The British Cabinet officer party. The British Cabinet officer began the day with a trip to the State Department, which, because of his long association with foreign affairs and with American Statesmen, he had always been eager to see. Ambassador Spring Rice and Hugh Gibson, the latter assigned as Balfour's aide, accompanied him to the door of Secretary Lansing's office. When the visitor came out later with Lansing for the trip to the White House, he was greeted in the corridor with applause by a large gathering of the State Department employees. Balfour was ushered into the White House by Secretary Lansing and introduced to

Secretary Lansing and introduced to President Wilson in the presence of Military and Navay aides for what was expected to be a few minutes con-Military and Navay gides for what was expected to be a few minutes conversation. The Statesmen withdrew into the Blue Room, however, and were engrossed for over three-quarters of an hour. Balifour afterward expressed himself as more than delighted with his call and as feeling flow his trip was justified if nothing else were to take place. A large crowd surrounded the White House Lawns, resplendent in all the green luxuriance of spring to wait for the visitor. In the meantime a Wild West show passed with a huge Calliope playing "God Save the King" and the "Marseillaise," and as Balfour came out of the gates a great cheer broke out and he bowed. A quick automobile took him to the Capitol where another enthusiastic group greeted him on his way to Vice-President Marshall's office. There he spent about ten minutes. After lumcheon at the French Embassy, Balfour returned again to headquarters where he met former Secretary Bryan who came to pay a courtesy call because of their former acquaintance in England and to tell the British statesman of the month's speaking tour on which he was leaving to-night throughout the Southwest on increased food production. After that Balfour went out for a long walk as he did yesterday in Rock Creek park.
