Editor Evening Telegram. Dear Sir:-After the ending of the Great World War the problem that worried the people of Newfoundland was,—"What were the authoriti oing to do in the matters of Re-Esblishing returned Soldiers and ailors in civil life"? After much liscussion an arrangement wa nade. It was to form a Civil Re-Establishment Committee. This Comtitee were to look after the applicaions of returned men for schooling and employment, and to assist then in gaining these two things in the best ossible way.

The school formed by this Comnittee has been a great success. It s under the management of several able and energetic teachers. who do everything in their power to help a man to succeed in whatever course he has undertaken. Besides giving a man an education, he is paid a salary towards his upkeep while attending school. The subjacts taught are numerous, commencing from the Alphabet to Commercial training and other higher subjects. After a man finishes his course his first object is to obtain employment, and naturally the first step he takes is to apply to the Civil Re-Establishment Committe to see if they can assist him to attain his object. Here is where the problems are reversed. The worry falls from the minds of the people to the minds of the Civil Re-Establishment Committee as to how they are going to obtain employment for the soldier or sailor. It is'then up to the business men of Nfld, to do their part in help ing to re-stablish the soldier or sailo in civil life. "Are they doing this" They are in a sort of way, but not satisfactorily. They can do a wiole lot more. As a matter of fact they can never do enough to repay those men who gave their blood for them that they might live.
