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



The Nova Scotia Blueberry a Chief Article of Export

SHIPMENTS FROM PROVINCE VALUED AT \$200,000.

Recent sharp frosts and heavy rains have brought to a lingering end the 1925 Blueberry season. For well-defined reasons, the crop has been considerably smaller than in 1924, and export shipments have accordingly fallen off: nevertheless, the blueberry holds its place and this may be a surprise to many! as an important factor in the agricultural and commer ciel life, particularly in the western counties of the Province.

Most of us have had more than a passing acquaintance with the blueberry for many years, extending, in fact, as one can remember. Earliest recollections are mingled with those of certain "blueberry picnics," when it was the custom for all the young peoand sometimes grand-parents, to join in a happy, noisy harvesting expedition. These were great days! With school-bags well-filled with lunches and milk pails for the berries, off would go the whole crew at sunrise for a long day on the blue barrens. Other unforgettable recollections have to do with certain pies and "grunts" and "fungi," that resulted in very black mouths for everyone, and, be it said, very broad, contented grins, Oh Yes! 

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

TINNERS OF THE PULLT. The Grand Jury were in attendance at the Supreme Court this morning and former B.F.C. Pumade the following presentment:-Wour Lordships .- We, the members of the Grand Jury, acting on your suggestions, have visited and inspected the following Public Institutions, and now beg to present our report on

Insane Asylum-Arriving at the Asylum we were met by the Doctor and attendants in charge, who explained the arrangements and work of the Institution. As we inspected the different parts of the building we found, in our opinion, everything satisfactory and up-to-date. With the new additions and operating room, everything seems to have been well provided for the welfare of the inmates. The roomy corridors, neat and well aired rooms. ample light and heat, combined with the ideal surroundings of the building should effect the objects aimed at. There is some room, however, for im provements in the Kitchen and Laundry Departments. We were informed there was no refrigrator in the building-hence large quantities of food material each season had to be dumped, at a considerable loss. The Laundry did not possess one single Washing Machine which would greatly facilitate matters in that particular

We also understood that the portion of the building set apart for acute casryard will receive es is badly heated, poorly ventilated ur years. The four and subject to noise from other parts. being a part of the original building sides being badly heated and poorly





British Exhibition to Study Whales

(Special Correspondent).

he most famous Polar expeditions of nodern times were present at Portsmouth, Eng., recently, when L. S. M. S. Amery, British Colonial Secretary, inspected the Royal Research ship Discovery, the late Captain Scott's Antarctic ship, which had just been put into commission to carry out whaling research work for the Government of the Falkland Islands. 'The vessel's field of operations will be "from the Equator to the Antarctic," and her task will be to mark whales, and to inquire into their migrations, haunts, habits and food. The expedition is considered urgently necessary, as whaling is one of the chief industries of the Falklands and there are grave doubts about its furure.

The plans and equipment have been worked out and the staff selected by a committee composed of experts in seamanship and zoology. Seldom has so areful preparation been made for a oyage with so destined a purpose. aptain J. R. Stenhouse, the commanding officer, who was captain of the Aurora when she rescued Shackleton after drifting in the ice for eleven months, and Stanley Kemp, the scientific chief, are distinguished in their professions and have been given time concert their plans, a large power selection in the appointment of their colleagues, and skilled advice from Government departments and from the Natural History Museum in London. Elaborate methods of many kinds have to be used, because, although the natural history of whales s the sole purpose of the expedition, very little would be achieved by the simple device of trying to catch as many as possible.

The Discovery is a floating laboratory rather than a "whaler" in the technical sense. She is not fast enough to run down whales, and is not equipped for taking them It is intended, however, to mark as many as possible, of all ages and species, by firing into their hides, non-corroding and labelled discs. With luck a few whales may be marked from the ship herself, but she is equipped with a 12-knot motor boat, to be launched at all suitable places. The work of marking will begin in the Gulf of Guinea (at present supposed to be the northern limit of the southern whales) and will be continued down the coast of Africa at such whaling stations as Cane Lonez, Walfisch Bays and Saldanha Bay After coaling at Cape Town, a course will be laid for Port Stanley, in the Falklands, taking South Georgia on the way, and making halts of four hours on an average at over 100 points on the route, so as

Co-operation to Check Smuggling

VICTORIA, B.C., Sept. 30 .- Cooperation with the United States authorities in ending the menace of border smuggling is being sought by the British Columbia provincial police, and it is expected here that before long the system of border patrol now in operation will be rendered very much more effective.

The American authorities are even more anxious than the British Columbia government to improve the system, for the United States is hit hardest by the lawless element which operates along the land and sea boundary in the West. The smuggling is invariably from Canada to the United States. Most of the contraband is liquor although large quantities of narcotics are said to have been surreptitiously shipped across the border as well as aliens from the Far East.

Liquor smuggling from British Columbia ports to Washington state is well organized, and the smugglers are well financed and equipped. Their launches in which they transport liquor and other contraband are usually speedier than the vessels whose business it has been to pursue them, with the result that the dry agents and police have been severely handicapped. The United States prohibition enforcement forces recently placed several armed speed craft into commission and these have been effective, but the area that must be patrolled is so great that vast stretches of coast line have to be neglected.

The use of airplanes has now been resorted to by the smugglers and in an effort to strike back it is being recommended that government planes be nut in service. Canadian aircraft is at present being used in northern waters to prevent fish poaching, and the provincial police is now negotiating with the federal authorities for the use of an airplane at present stationed at the University of British Columbia, in emergency cases where quick pursuit is necessary.

British Columbia authorities are more interested in running down bandits and other fugitives from justice than in chasing dope and rum runners, although the latter is of primary concern to the United States forces. Within recent months several big robberies have been staged on Vancouver Island, and it is known that in at least one case the bandits pade a successful getaway by using 3 high-powered launch. An airplane, available at short notice, could have overtaken the launch before it had reached safety at a point along the Washington coast and forced the desperadoes into submission by machine gun fire.

Remarkable Speed in Seaplane

BRITISH FLIERS ARRIVED AT NEW YORK WITH THE "MY. STERY SHIP."

SOUTHAMPTON, Oct. 6 .- Before lang for the Schneider Cup races at Baltimore, Captain Henry Baird, one of the British entrants, in a secret trial with the supermarine Napier S-4 attained a speed of 226,752 miles an hour, it is announced.

The International Federation of Aeronautics verified the speed, which was said to constitute a world's seaplane record, although reports from the United States claim one of their

ships has gone even faster. The British fliers who will participate in the Schneider Cup seaplane race on October 23 and 24, arrived in New York yesterday bringing two seaplanes with them the S-4, a monoplane which has been termed the "Mystery Ship" of the Royal Air Forces.




