

OUR PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

We were treated in the Advertiser of Friday to a very windy article, in which, after some vague assertions in no way complimentary to the status and condition of our public schools, a violent attack is made on the School Trustees for their alleged apathy and indifference in the discharge of their duties.

Passing by the solemn lecture the writer reads to these guardians of our educational interests, we proceed to notice one or two points in his article. He claims that our schools are not what they ought to be, and that they do not reflect much credit on the Trustees who have to do with their management.

The real question is, what is the status and condition of our common schools compared with those in other places? Our unhesitating answer to this is, that our schools, in point of attendance, in the progress and proficiency of the pupils, and in the talent, experience and devotedness of the teachers, will compare very favorably with the schools of any city, town or village in the Dominion.

While they deplore this fact, and have done the best they could to temporarily remedy the evil, they know that no radical cure can be effected till a Central School is provided. But here again another difficulty meets them. The taxation is already as high as the ratepayers can well stand, and in the face of this, would the Trustees be warranted in incurring an additional heavy expenditure without asking and obtaining the sanction of their constituents?

The writer complains that the attendance at the Grammar School is not as large as it ought to be, considering the size of the town, the number of common schools, and the expenditure necessary to keep it up. We are sorry to say that this is quite true, but whose fault is it? Granted that the trustees ought to put in force some system for promoting pupils, would that remedy the evil? We scarcely think so under present circumstances.

Some other cause must be found for the marked decrease in the attendance than this silly excuse for a reason, and we leave it for the writer in the Advertiser to find out. The Trustees have engaged a Head master at a large salary, and when he complained that he was not able to manage the school alone, they procured an assistant teacher for him.

not on the Trustees. The writer informs us with much modesty that the honors recently conferred on its Head master have won for the school a name. A name for what? For the proficiency of its pupils? For distinguished honors any of these pupils have received at our Universities or Colleges? Nothing of the kind.

The Nova Scotia Repeal Revolution. In the Local Legislature on Friday, Attorney General Wilkins moved the adoption of the resolutions prepared by the Repeal Committee, composed of members of the House. As they are lengthy we can only give such a summary of them as will make them intelligible to our readers.

The resolutions then advert to the presentation of the petitioners to the Imperial Parliament praying for repeal, and to the refusal to grant its prayer. They therefore resolve that "this House regards with indignation and alarm, the refusal of a majority of the House of Commons inspired by the leaders of Government to grant even an enquiry into the grievances of a people second to none in the United Kingdom, for public spirit and intelligence, and attachment to the throne—a demand which could not be safely disregarded if made by the smallest corporation in the British Isles, and we believe could not have been refused if the population of Nova Scotia were as great as that of the two Provinces of Ontario and Quebec."

The last resolutions repeat the statement that Confederation was forced upon the people of Nova Scotia against their will, that it is a fraud, and that nothing but Imperial coercion can force them to be bound by the Confederation Act. They invoke the sympathy and support of the people of the adjacent Colonies and the lovers of freedom in every part of the civilized world. The resolutions were ordered to be pressed before any discussion.

Attorney-General Wilkins also submitted a minute of the Executive Council forwarded to the Imperial Government, similar to the resolutions Repeal meetings are being held in the country.

The walls of Paris are now plastered with posters, bearing in letters of enormous size the legend—"Don't go to the sea shore without Amelia." This indispensable companion is not, as might be supposed, an agreeable young woman, but a species of shoe adapted to walking on the sand.

Until this summer mosquitoes were a species of pest never seen in England. But they have at length made a formidable invasion of the sea-girt isle, and the unprecedented occurrence now agitates the British mind.

It is said Mr. Sandfield McDonald is about to appoint Mr. J. Pennington McPherson, of Ottawa (a nephew of Sir John's), to the office of County Attorney of Frontenac.

EVENTFUL CAREER OF A CHEROKEE.—A man named Powell was recently convicted of fraud at the Middlesex Sessions, London, and, before sentence was passed, his counsel handed in a written statement of his career, which revealed a singular history. It attributed his fall entirely to the "unconquerable love for drink." He had been engaged, he said, to a wealthy widow, and everything was prepared for the ceremony, when yielding to temptation, he became intoxicated, and "failed to be there as appointed." The match was consequently broken off, and from that hour "he rushed headlong into drink and gay company until he was quite mad." He had been in prison on charges of stealing, toddy-ladies, and of disappearing with his landlord's coat and watch; then he was nine months in Bethlem; next, curate of a parish in Surrey, afterwards he underwent eighteen months imprisonment for forgery, and then became Secretary to the Male Lock Hospital, Dean Street, Soho. For the offence with which he was now charged, he has been sentenced to five years' penal servitude.

DEATH FROM DISAPPOINTMENT IN LOVE.—The Boston Journal tells the following: A sad but interesting case of the death of a young lady named Susan King, is a general topic of conversation at Woburn at the present time. The deceased had been affianced to a young man, to whom it appears she was deeply attached. Some weeks since she happened to observe him in company with another young woman under such circumstances as to give rise to feelings of jealousy on her part. She upbraided him for his conduct, and he replied to her remonstrances in a spirited manner, which further provoked her to dismiss him. It seems, however, that she still cherished in secret the old affection, and the disappointment so weighed upon her mind as to cause a severe nervous attack, resulting, about ten days since, in utter prostration. She remained in this condition until her death, which occurred on Saturday last. The circumstances have been so peculiar, and the malady having baffled the skill of the physicians, it was deemed proper an autopsy should be performed, which was done on Monday by Drs. Cutler and Abbott. No trace of disease, or obvious cause of death was discovered, but the system was apparently in an entirely healthy and normal condition. The deceased was a person of excellent character and fine personal appearance, and was much esteemed and beloved.

A young man, an excursionist on the City of London, from Ryerse to Erie, on Tuesday last, fell overboard and was drowned, although all possible assistance was rendered, one of the crew even jumping overboard and diving after him.

THE ORGAN QUESTION.—At a meeting of the Presbytery of Montreal of the P. C. Church, held on Wednesday last, the Rev. Mr. Gordon brought up the question of instrumental music, and complained of its use in Knox's Church, characterizing it as a violation of the laws of the church. On motion of Mr. D. Mackey, it was decided by a majority to leave the question where the Synod left it, viz., on the table.
