FIFTH YEAR.

HAS KHARTOUM FALLEN?

THE INDICATIONS INCREASING THAT IT HAS NOT.

What Members of the British Cabinet Had to Say on the Fall of Khartoum.

LONDON, Nov. 3.—The Times considers the report that Khartoum had fallen and Gordon been taken prisoner as extremely doubtful. This view, it thinks, is especially reasonable in the absence of advice on the subject from General Willshire.

The Times traces the report to the Egyptian and dubious French organs, which may have given the European version of the Cairo. Lord Granville assured the press to-day that the government had received no confirmation of the news up to noon to-day, and nothing has been received at the government offices in regard thereof.

After the crisis are harvested the Mahdi's forces will be largely increased.

The Daily News has a despatch from Dabab stating that Gen. Gordon attacked a force of rebels at Andermann, and after eight hours fighting put them to flight.

Gen. Gordon had twelve vessels well manned with Krupp guns, one of which burst during the engagement. When the news of the attack was received, the British government sent a telegram to the governor of Khartoum, announcing the fall of Khartoum and the capture of Gen. Gordon.

Lord Salisbury, referring to the indications given by the report of the fall of Khartoum and the capture of Gordon, said it appeared to be the intention of the government to abandon all the Egyptian garrisons in the Sudan.

Earl Grey said he believed that the government had no intention to abandon Khartoum, but admitted it had no intention of prolonging the campaign in the Sudan.

LONDON, Nov. 3.—The Times' Alexandria correspondent states that the report of the fall of Khartoum originated from the following source: A French merchant formerly in Khartoum and who is now in London, had been contacted by a messenger who had arrived from Khartoum, that Gordon was in want of provisions.

The French Chambers in Paris have decided to dissolve the French Chamber in February. A party of deputies in the union and republic in the senate resulted in their decision to dissolve the parliament. A second dissolution is also possible.
