John Bull is sweating under intense heat. In London the thermometer had touched 100 in the shade.

The St. John papers are active in suggesting improvements in the bridge and laying out of their city. They advocate the widening of the streets both in Portland and in St. John. Mill street in the latter, and Main street in the former, are especially pointed out for improvement.

Some time ago Miss Parker, a Boston lady, spent several days at the Russell House, Ottawa, and fell in love with a good-looking water man named John Fields. She proposed and on Tuesday they were married. She is worth nearly \$100,000, and belongs to one of the best families in Boston.

The body of Frederick Sweet was found on Sunday morning in the St. Croix River. The deceased had been working for Mr. Richard Cockran, of Wentworth, and was returning on Saturday night, after his week's work, to his home at St. Croix. It is supposed he was walking along the narrow path on the ledge near the St. Croix bridge, when he slipped and fell over into the water.—Witness.

WESTERN COUNTIES RAILWAY COMPANY.—The Yarmouth "Herald" says:—The Western Counties Railway Company have lately purchased the stock for the Windsor Branch, and will commence working that line on the 1st of August, at which time it is to be delivered to them by the Dominion Government.

The agents of eighteen insurance companies doing business in St. John, four American, seven British and seven Canadian, having signed an agreement not to accept or grant any assurance upon any wood, veneered, or brick-cased building hereafter erected, or any stone or brick building roofed with shingles or the contents thereof within the limits of that city.

A curious item in the military estimates of the greater military powers of Europe is the sum now set down annually for the providing and maintenance of a certain number of pigeon-breeding establishments and rolling. The last German fortress of Cologne, Metz, Mayence, Strasbourg, and others are all supplied with a supplement of pigeons, and in France great efforts have been and still are made to ensure that there shall be a good stock of these birds in every garrison town.

The "Boston Journal" says that a new grove of giant trees has recently been discovered in California about 200 miles south of the famous grove of Yosemite, 6,000 feet above the level of the sea. Instead of being a small cluster of 30 or 40 trees, like the Yosemite grove, it contains over 10,000 trees, and covers a section of country six miles square. Excavations at the roots of these trees have revealed their buried ancestors, some of them 30 feet in diameter, and estimated to be 8,000 years old.

BEATEN TO DEATH.—On Friday night last a man named Brun Burns, who kept a liquor saloon at Point du Chene, on the I. C. R., was attacked by a man and badly beaten. He was found in a very bad condition, and was barely able to tell who his assailants were. After suffering great agony, Burns died on Saturday morning. It is said that the assault was instigated by a married man who believed he had cause to be jealous of Burns. Warrants were taken out on Saturday for all concerned in the assault.—Herald.

DEPARTURE.—The Rev. Henry Pope, Senr., one of our oldest citizens, died on Friday morning at 2 o'clock. Mr. Pope had attained a ripe old age, having entered his 89th year, and was one of those men who had the happy faculty of ranking himself agreeable, and popular with all with whom he had intercourse. Over seventy years ago he arrived in Quebec from England, as a missionary of the Wesleyan Methodist Church. He had labored, we believe, with acceptance and usefulness in the interests of his Church in different parts of British America, and his record is one that is intimately associated with the improvements of over half a century.—Chronicle.

The war correspondent of the "Daily News," speaking of the way in which the Russian troops are fed, observes:—The extraordinary thing was that the country did not seem in any way over taxed to support them. As an officer who has served in the French army, observed, there was not enough of the way of meat to satisfy two companies of English soldiers, yet here were 3,000 to 4,000 men, many of them of the upper classes. With a little millet boiled into a pudding or "pas" some goat's milk, cheese and onions, and a goblet of "vin du pays," the chiefs even are quite contented, while their retainers make good cheer over cake of Indian corn flour, some curds, a piece of dried fish, or a strip of tuff beef among half a dozen. The Russian soldier is happy with his lump of black bread and a glass of whiskey, or tumbler of weak tea, with, in the evening, perhaps a basin of weak soup, something like the black broth of the Spartans.

There is a diamond in Salt Lake City which weighs eight and a half carats, and is half an inch in diameter. For many hundred years it was in the family of an Indian prince. By him it was presented to Queen Christina of Spain, who gave it to her daughter, Isabella, on the occasion of her marriage. The ex-Queen of Spain was forced to part with it. After she had abdicated, a gentleman of St. Louis bought the jewel at an auction in London. Subsequently it was stolen from him at Saratoga Springs. He got it back by giving a reward of \$1,000, and the question asked:—Afterwards the purchaser went to Salt Lake City where he sold the stone to a speculator, who sold it at \$22,000. The mine developed and the lucky speculator made over \$60,000 by his bargain. The diamond passed into rude hands. The mine who had bought it was cheated out of it by some Chicago gamblers, who sold it to a diamond dealer, who in turn sold it to parties in Salt Lake City who now own the stone.

EUROPE.

London, July 5.—The "Standard" Berlin special says Austria has resolved to support the Russian ultimatum only when she heard that Italy was about to make a naval demonstration along the Albanian coast to relieve the Montenegrins. In consequence of this interference, it is said the Turks have resolved to withdraw all their troops except small corps.

The British Cabinet has officially informed the various cabinets that the best was sent to Bosnia Bay for the protection of British interests and the Christians.

An Erzerum despatch says it is unlikely even if the Russians are strongly reinforced that they can successfully renew the Asiatic campaign this year. A Vienna special also says that ten weeks hence the climate will preclude any effective warfare.

Private correspondence of Turkish officers intercepted by Russian scouts furnished full accounts of recent disorders by the Russians and writers indulge in bitter regrets over bad management of their General.

The indications are that Russia fought successful battles at Biala and Tirnova. Supra efforts will now be made by the Russians on the Danube to make up for reverses in Asia Minor. Tirnova is still the scene of fiercely contested battles.

London, July 5.—The "Scotsman's" special correspondent at London, discussing the rumor that it is proposed to despatch the fleet to Bosnia Bay, says one or two ministers would instantly resign rather than be seen with Russia on a question of neutrality of the Dardanelles.

London, July 5.—It is stated all news correspondents have been ordered to leave Russian headquarters.

The Emperor of Germany and Austria are to meet at Salzburg, date not fixed. The Russian brigade over the Danube at Simniza is reported weak, and broken twice.

It is asserted the Carowitch will command the left wing of the Russian army.

It is rumored that an informal armistice is to be established in Montenegro. The bombardment between Rustchuk and Slobosia has been resumed.

A body of Roumanians now occupy Turna-Magurilla. The Russian advance is reported half way towards Tirnova. The Turks appear to be concentrating in the vicinity of Shumia. The invaders, it is conjectured, intend to push forward to that point, when a battle in the open country is inevitable.

A Sistoia despatch says that provisions in the Turkish camps are falling and the Turkish authorities are in sore straits.

A flotilla of gunboats is stationed in Port Said to ensure protection to the Suez Canal.

A Shumia despatch says a battle of 15 hours duration was fought between Ashkani and Bula. The Russians were defeated with great slaughter, and retreated precipitately towards Sistoia.

Next week about 30,000 Turkish troops will embark for Trebizond to reinforce the army in Armenia.

In consequence of the remonstrances of England the Porte has sent imperative orders to the commander of the Black Sea fleet to render the Ulska more efficient.

The arrival of the British fleet in Bosnia Bay is regarded with great dissatisfaction by the influential Turks, who consider it a sign that England is preparing to seize her share of plunder.

London, July 7.—The military situation now appears as follows: The Turks changed front and faced to westward since the Russian entrance into Bulgaria. The Russians left flank rests on the Danube, facing the Turkish line from Rustchuk to Shumia. A general battle is expected to ensue if the Turks fall back to the Balkans or the Russians make the whole quadrilateral and turn it by passing the Balkans.

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 6.—Rufit Pasha has abandoned the intention of re-establishing communication with Erivan.

A despatch from Simniza says the Turks evacuated it Friday morning, falling back on the Rustchuk line.

Twenty thousand newly arrived Russian troops are reported to be marching from Jassy to Malatania.

The abandonment of Montenegro by the Turks is confirmed. Of 15,000 Bashibazouks who entered Montenegro 11,000 are dead or missing.

London, July 9.—In the House of Commons, this afternoon, Sir Stafford Northcote said Minister Layard had informed the House that the necessity for English troops to occupy Constantinople.

The Turks have not been driven from Timrod. A battle, in however, soon expected to occur at that place.

The Carowitch telegraphs that the Russian cavalry and one battery surprised Timrod on Saturday, capturing the Turkish camp, ammunition and baggage. The retreated on Osman.

New York, July 9.—A despatch from Penance, Wis., says a terrible whirlwind struck the town on Sunday night, leaving but three houses standing. Six persons killed, 20 wounded, and five missing, including some guests at the hotel, besides heavy property.

A SNOW STORM. MEADVILLE, Pa., July 6.—Railroad engineers and other train men from the east report a heavy snow storm at Kennedy, N. Y., about nine miles north east of Jamestown, on the Atlantic Great Western Railroad. The snow was eight inches deep on a level, and covered a belt about a mile wide. The cold wave was sensibly felt for many miles this side of the storm, and bears the potatoes, including bugs, and the fields of grain are entirely destroyed.

SAD ACCIDENT. On Tuesday, William Calhoun, about 18 years of age, assistant to Mr. Lindsay, while playing on the track of the Toronto, Grey & Bruce Railway, was struck by the engine of a passing train and thrown a distance of about twenty feet. With the exception of some bruises, there were no other injuries.

The royal tigress in the Berlin Zoological Gardens lately brought forth a litter of two, which she nursed and took care of until they were accordingly placed amidst the family of a Newfoundland dog, who welcomed the newcomers warmly, and bestows upon them all necessary maternal attentions.
