Small Flocks Pay. MISTAKEN FOR KEEPING TWO HENS WHERE THERE IS ONE IS THE GREAT MISTAKE OF THE FOWLS.

It is a mistake to keep too many fowls as crowded tenements are for human beings. A space of ten feet square should be allotted each fowl for exercise. A house 10 by 10 is not too large for ten hens and one male, and a dozen hens are sufficient as the maximum number for that space.

Small flocks pay in appropriating waste food that would otherwise be of no value, and the labor bestowed on a small flock is of no consideration whatever, as a child may perform all the work.
