SABLE ISLAND IS A REPOSITORY OF WEALTH UNTOLD

Speaking of The Sunday Leader's gripping story of lost treasure on Sable Island, Maurice Noonan, the veteran life saver who spent over 60 years on that lonely sand bar, says he is firmly convinced the island contains untold wealth both in gold and silver coins and bullion.

Gold coins, he says, were very often icked up on the beach. Every great wird-storm reveals some hidden wreck embedded in the sand far removed from the water. He relates that one day he came across a big brass cannon protruding from a sand hill and on closer examination found ilso a sword in its scabbard, the mounting of which he took to be pure gold. At this spot a French warship was lost in the early history of the

During his earlier days on the sland a Spanish brig was driven ahore there and became a total wreck. This was at a point removed from the life stations. The captain and crew got ashore all right and when the life-savers came across them the next day, they were seated around a fire they had started. The captain told the life-savers that his vessel was the Isabella Maria, that sue was bound to Newfoundland from Bilbao for a load of fish and that not knowing what sort of an island they were cast away on, they had buried the gold, with which they intended to pay for the cargo of fish, in the sand

over which their fire was burning. "There must be an immense amount of gold and silver on Sable Island," said Mr. Noonan. "I often wondered why people did not think of it before."


