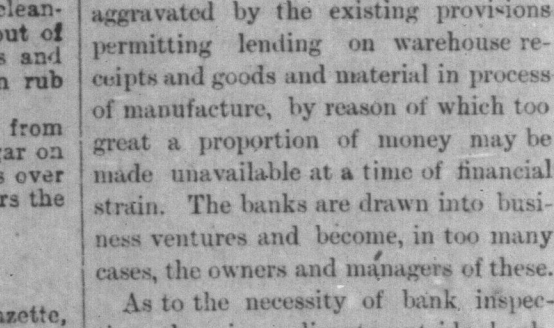
The Toronto Weekly Sun, one of the ablest papers published in Canada makes the following pertinent remarks regarding the coming revision of the banking act.

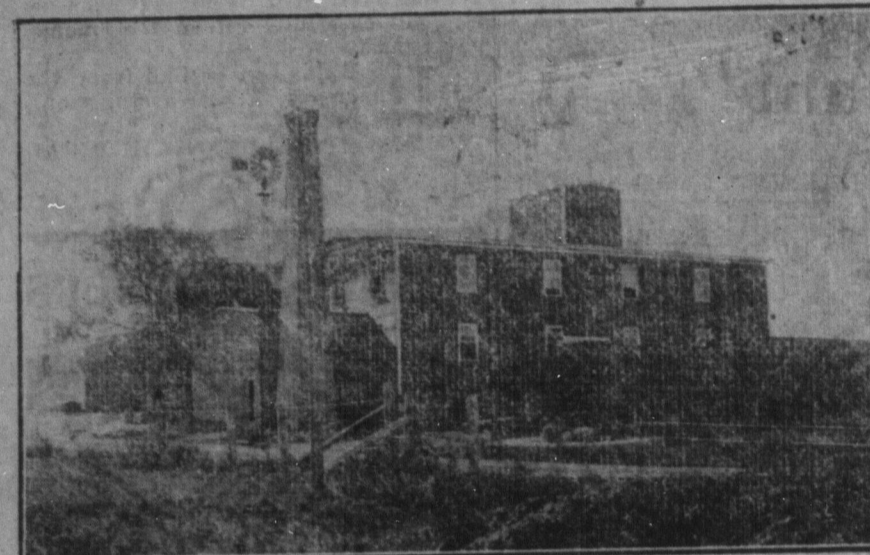
