We, the undersigned Commissioners appointed under Your Majestrs Sign Mamal for the purpose of carrying out a scheme of colonisation in the Dominion of Canala of crofters and cottars from the Western Highlands and Islands of Scotland, imd from the congested districts of Treland, desire limmby to submit to your Majesty the following Report:-

Reports have been received from the agent of the Board in Canada relating to the settlements at Killarney, in Manitoba, and at Saltcoats in the North West Territories of Camada, for the year 1897. The former was established in the summer of 1888 , prion to the constitution of the Board, and the latter in the spring of 1889, most of the families also having heen selected before the first meeting of the Board.

Statements are appended containing extracts from the agent's reports (Appendix A.) and statistics (Appendix B.) showing the position of the settlements in 1897, and giving the acreage under various crops, live stock on the farms, and other information.

## Kïlurwey Settlement.

There are 54 homesteads under cultivation in the Killarney Settlement, which numbers about 160 persons. The area under cultivation in 1897 was 2,401 acres, and the arditional area broken and under summer fallow was 1,077 acres, or a total of 3,478 acres, as compared with 3,741 acres in 1896. Dividing this area among the 30 . families forming the settlement, the average is $1: 20$ acres per family. It includes $1,07: 3$ acres under crop and in summer fallow, on the homesteads of 19 younger members of the various families, an average of about 56 acres each.

It will be seen that the yield of wheat in the settlement in 1897 was 19,878 bushels, as compared with 27,845 in 1896. There were also 7,856 bushels of oats raised, and 2,960 bushels of potatoes, as compared with 11,075 bushels and 3,415 bushels respectively in the previous year. The value of the wheat raised was $\$ 14,908$, of oats $\$ 1,964$, and of potatoes $\$ 992$, as compared with $\$ 16,707, \$ 1,993$, and $\$ 683$ in 1896 .

In addition to the ammals remaning of those originally supplied by the Boad, now in the possension of the crofters, they have acquired 92 howes, 23 oxen, 8 , cows, ti heifers, 30 steers, 1 bull, and 16:3 pigs. The number of chickens and other poultry ownel by the various families is. l,5\%. These figures show a slight decrease over the previous year (owing to sales, prices having been fivourable) but, as will be seen from the returns, the increase as compared with 1890 is considerahle.

The families in the settlement lave cat 818 tons of hay.
The whole of the croters have now accepted leases from the Board in which they promise to repay their indebtedness in instalments over a period of eight years. Certain of the crofters ohjected for a time to the terms offered, although, in order to make the repayments easier, the Board agreed to waive all interest upon the alrances up) to the commencement of the year, and also half the expenses emmected with the foredosure procedings, in the event of the instalments under the leases being properly and promptly met. In the end the Board was compelled to take further procedings to protect its interests, and the matter is disposed of as stated. all the ohjecting crofters having signed the leases, and paid the costs that were incured.

So fill no armagement has leen made hetween the crofters and their outside creditors for the disposal of the dehts, so unwisely incurred, which have tended to retarl the progress and welfare of the settlemeat. The Board offered to allow the lebts due to the other creditors of the crofters, if they were reduced to a comsiderable extent and the items properly verified, to rank puri pusen with the ohbigations of the crofters to the Board, in order that the whole of the deht might he liquidated in a reasonable time without pressing unduly upon the settlers. The creditms. while agreeing to the reductions, declined to accept the other combitions: of the proposal, arging that their chams should have a prionty over those of the Boarl.

While it camot he stated that the settlement is in a satisfactory condition, so long as the outside indebtedness remains outstanding it is believed that the acceptance on the leasse offered by the Board on such favourable terms, is a step in the right direction. and it is hoped that the other creditors may yet he disposed to regard the Bomils proposil more favourably.
ittention is called to a paragraph in the report of the agent, stating that with few exceprions the settlers have promptly paid their mumicipal taxes, and now that the remainder at the settlers hare accepted the leases, it is belierel that they also will pay due regarit the the monicipal liahilities.

## The Sulterouts Settlement.

The siltconts settement contains about 90 persons. They had to acres under coltivation.

The crofter have not, it is stated, sown a larger area of grain, because they prefer to derote more attention to the raising of live stock, which besides being more profitahle, enahics them to go out to earn money cluring the seeding and harvest seasoms.

It will be seen that the crofters now have 29 horses, 2 oxen, 60 cows, 61 heifers, 35 steers, + bulle, 72 sheep, 15 pigs, and 417 chickens. These figures show an increase as compared with the previous year.

The Saltcoats settlers have not incurred outside debts to any appreciable extent; they rarely atk for credit, and where credit is given they seldom allow the date of payment to pass without discharging their obligations.

It is a matter for regret, however, that the Saltcoats crofters retuse to take advantage of the legislation passed by the Parliament of the Dominion of Canada for their relief. This legislation was obtained at the request of the crofters themselves, and its object was to enable those who remained in the settlement to choose other homesteads which
they regarded as being more suitable. Thr intention was that their accounts should be credited with the value of the homestends given up, the balance of the indebtedness being secured upon their new homesteads by means of mortgages. Such an arrangement would obvionsly have heen in the interest hoth of the crofters and of the Board.

The matter is receiving careful consideration with a view to steps being taken to protect the Board's interests.

All of which we humhly submit to Xour Majesty's gracious consideration.

It will he wan. by momaing the statement with the one sem by the herat last year (1896) that althongh the settlers erow hav wot yehed an moch per aere as they thid in lsam, they have reseved 3 for whent, and 7 conte for was. per lnokel more thim they did the berions yex, It will also be ohserved from the state-ment- in que-tion that the setters have preparel durins the wason of $1-95$ a hager area of land for seed, than thes did in 1896.
The eatuse assimend by the sethers for the low average vieh of sram per acre was eary fronts in May, and subsequent dry weather. While this may partly accomet for the los yich the Agemt contends that the real canse, in many instaces, is arectly traceable to the mamer in which the haw has heen tilled, preparatory to wwing the sterl, and also to the continuons sowinge, year after year, of the same land and seed. On the agent remonstrating with tertaim of the settlems for cultivating the land im shed an minushandilie manner, he has been informed: "We may just as woll take all we can ont of the land before it is taken from us." Vnder the terms of the new leases the Board has the authority to compel the lessees to coltivate their lands in a good hasbandlike aud proper minner.

It will be further ohserved from the comparative statement that in 1800 the erofters purchased 1 horse, and in 189 they hal in their possession 92 an increase of 91 . In 189, the number of oxen (I.C.B) was 57 ; and in 1897,10 , a decrease of 47 . Again in 1890 the settlers purchased of oxen; and in 1890 they han in theip posession 23 , a dervease of 1 . In 1890 the settlers hard 37 of the original cows supplied to them

We the Bumd; and in 1897, I, a dermase of 33. Cow: purehued by settlers in addition be thone supplied by the Board in 1890 nmmbered $2-5$, and in 1897 this umber wats increated by 3 .i.


The agent is pleased to io able to inform the Board that sevaral of these settlen have discharged debts inotrred in purchasing horses.

The catse of the decrase in the live stock origimally smpplied to the settlers is accomuted fer loy death and sale, while the dectease in the private stock is directly traceable to sules made to American cattle lmyers, who bay 8 cents a poind, live weight, for yo ing catitle.

## Jfunicignt Trisers.

It is gatifying to the arent to le able to report that, with few exceptions, the Roard's actlens have jromptly paid their municipal taxes. 'The exceptions referred to are Nos. 2, 4, 6, 8, 1:3, 17, 54, and 61, whe positively refused to sign the Bomal's lemee:-

## Leviecs, 18 ss

In acoordance with instractions contained in your lotter to the agent, and dated the 20th hanuary last, the Boart's solicitors (Macdrmald, Thper, Phiphin, and Tuppery are prepuring new lemes for the settlers to sign.

The agent hegs to tender to the Board the thanks of a number of the crofters friembs in this cometry, who are aware of the very generons terms under which their vettlers are to he given the opmathonty of hecoming the proprietors of some of the nonst desirable farming lands bhtaimable in the lrovince of Manitab:

With the view of convinuing the Board's settlers how necessary it is that the conslitions of their new leases should be arlhered to, the agent mosit respectfully suggests that move freguent visits shonld be made by the arent to the colony tham hitherto, as he believes they womld he benefieial in stimulating the settlers to farm their holdings in a more hasbandike manner, and
 relative to their future welfare in this comatry, and materially minimise their present chances of olitaining undesumble advice, er., and fimally assisting the Board's agent to wateh their interest more vosely.
Since the ugents lint ammal rejort, the crofters have huilt in their colony a very fine sulntantial stone church, well finished inside. heated hy a modern hot air furnace, and comfortahly furnished with serviceable seats. The cost of the chureh (ahont 82,500 ) has been defrayed by the crofters and their friends in this country, and the agent is credibly informed, free from delst. Mr. Duncan MeLeod, a Gaelie speaking missionary, is in the near future to take charge of the parish. He appears to have a elear insight as to the special fatings which have retarded the crofters' porress in this conntry, and has expressed his intention of using his influence amongst his congregation in reeonding the agese's cfforts for the well-being of the colony.

for reference. They contain a record of the lien mumber, name, age, and location of each settler, together with the name and age of ench member of every family. The number of acres nuder anltivation of wheat, oats, and potatoos, averge per aere, yield and market value. Total acres under cultivation, breaking, backsettins and summer fallow, done during the year amb gand total of ateres, that can be bronoht wader antination daring the season of 1898 , as well as the live stock on the fams, value of inymovements, dre, on each homesteal, present approximate vahe of the Board's secturity, amonnt of principal alvanced by the Poand, to ench settlor, and senemal rematks.

## Recripulalation.

A comprative statement has been added for the reats 1890 and 1897, which shows that the tatal mumber of atres brought under the plough by the fifteen settles; at present remaming on their homesteads in 189\%. was
 that the totainumber of acres wher maltivation for 1890 was 83, and for 1897, to!, a decrease of 35: acres. In 1890 the totat acreare under wheat was 23 , whel vielided over 16 busheds, amd in 1897, 8 , a deorease of 5 arres. ly 1890 the mminer of atres under oats was 39 , whind yielded 23 hashels to the arre, and in 1897, 24, aderreave of 15 aneres. In 1890 the arreage under potatoem was 6 which yielded 1,108 hathels; while in 1495 the settlens


The settlers conld have found a ready matket for their erops, at an avemge of 75 for wheat, wats es, and jotatoss 20 cents per bushel.
The eattse of the decrease in the acrease of coltivated
 "by the settlers having given nu grain prowing and levoting their attentions to the mising of live stock, whieh they contem pays best and allows its to sont and carn moncy during the sowing and havest weanons." In case it might be inferred by the bharl, as it has heen by some of the settlers, that the land and chmate is not supable for whin growing, the agent bers to record the fint (which can easily be verified hy peterence to phatical farmers living in the same dintrict as the Bondes seatlers) that the famer who properly prepares and soms his land, very suldom reans a crop that doen not pay him manifold. The direct cuase of the crofters fainue to smecessfally grow grain man only be explaned by the momshandlike manner in which they howe attempted to farm.

The emparative statement also shows that in 1 s90 the corfters had no honses, and in 1897 they hat in their possession 29 head. In 1890 the momber of Imperial Colonisation Board oxen were 18 , and in 1s 58,1 , a decrease of 17 . Again in 1890 they had no other oxen, lout those sapplied by the Board; while in $189{ }^{\circ}$ they had two. Imperial Colonisation Board cows in indo, monbered 10, and in 1897 none. Cons pinchased ly the settlers, $i_{4}$ addition to those supplied by the lomad in 1890, numbered 4 , and in $189 \%$ this momber was increased to ( 60 .
