THE SEASONS.

Vernal Equinox—Spring begins March 20th, 3h. 16m., Morning.
Summer Solstice—Summer begins June 21st, 4h. 50m., Morning.
Autumnal Equinox—Autumn begins September 22nd, 7h. 12m.,
Morning.
Winter Solstice—Winter begins Dec'r. 21st, 1h. 8m., Evening.

ECLIPSES.

I.—There will be a partial Eclipse of the Moon in the evening of January 27th. In Montreal it begins at 7.34 and ends at 9.54. In Toronto it begins at 7.11 and ends at 9.31.

II.—There will be an Annular Eclipse of the Sun on the 11th of February, but it will not be visible in any part of North America.

III.—On the 23rd of July the Moon will be partially Eclipsed, but this also will not be visible in North America.

IV.—On the 7th of August there will be a total Eclipse of the Sun, visible. This Eclipse becomes total first at noon in Alaska, and from thence runs South-Easterly. It will be discerned in Montreal at 5.9, evening, and ends 6.54; in Toronto it begins at 4.43 and ends 6.36, the greatest quantity in Canada being from 8 to 10 Digits.

PLANETS.

Venus will be a Morning Star until 9th May, and from that date to the end of the year an Evening Star. Mars will be an Evening Star throughout the year. Until 17th April, Jupiter will be an Evening Star, from that date to 12th August a Morning Star, then an Evening Star to the end of the year. Saturn will be a Morning Star until the 7th of March, and from that date to the 11th of December an Evening Star. Venus will not be very conspicuous until the latter part of the year. Mercury will be brightest soon after sunset, 1st February, 26th May, and 22nd September, and in the East before sunrise, 21st March, 19th July, and November 7th. Mars will be brightest 13th of February, about sunset. Jupiter will be brightest 8th November, about sunset, and Saturn will be brightest 4th June, rising about sunset.

HERSCHEL'S WEATHER TABLE.

The following Table, constructed upon philosophical considerations of the attractions of the Sun and Moon in their several positions respecting the Earth, and confirmed by experience of many years' actual observation, furnishes the observer, without further trouble, with the knowledge of what kind of weather there is the greatest probability of succeeding, and that so near the truth, that in very few instances will it be found to fail:—

MOON.	SUMMER.	WINTER.

For each close carriage, or corresponding winter vehicle, £5; four-wheeled half-covered carriage, or do., drawn by two horses, 60s.; four-wheeled half-covered carriage, or do., drawn by one horse, 50s.; double dennes, &c., or do., 40s.; gig, caleche, spring cart, or do., 30s.; waggon or vehicle, not above specified, or winter vehicle, adapted for draught of two or more horses, 20s.

Dogs, 7s. 6d. each. (Permitting to resort, is keeping a dog).

Theatres—Annual duty of £20 (and assessments) on proprietor.

Proprietors of Caravans of wild beasts, Circuses, &c., to obtain permission from His Worship the Mayor, and pay £25 therefor, and £10 for each subsequent day that the same is open.

Brewers, or agents of brewers—15 per cent. on the whole of the rental of business premises.

Ball-alleys, skittle grounds, nine-pin alleys—an annual duty of £12 10s.

Brick-yards, an annual duty of £10.

Horse-dealers, an annual duty of £2 10s.

TAXES COLLECTED BY THE CHIEF OF POLICE.

For licenses issued to carters and others using hackney carriages, or vehicles for the conveyance of passengers or transport of goods, wares, merchandise, building materials, produce, or other articles in the city of Montreal.

Hackney-Carriages.—For every cab, caleche, or other two-wheeled vehicle, \$5; for every four-wheeled carriage drawn by one horse, \$7; for every coach or four-wheeled carriage drawn by two horses, \$9; for every omnibus or stage coach, \$16.

Carts, Trucks, Wagons and other Vehicles.—The licenses for carts, trucks and other vehicles used for the conveyance of goods, wares, merchandise, &c., shall be divided into three classes:—

The first class shall include all carts, trucks, waggons, and other vehicles running within the city for hire or reward not otherwise expressly provided for, and shall pay:—For every cart, truck, or other two-wheeled vehicle, \$2; for every waggon or four-wheeled vehicle drawn by one horse \$6; for every waggon or four-wheeled vehicle drawn by two horses and made to carry a load under 4,000 lbs. weight, \$7; for every heavy waggon, float, or other four-wheeled vehicle drawn by two or more horses, and made to carry heavy articles or materials weighing 4,000 lbs. or upwards, \$9; for every Diabie, \$4.

The second class shall include all carts, waggons, or other vehicles used by merchants, traders, manufacturers, or contractors, for the conveyance or delivery of the articles or effects dealt in, manufactured, or made use of by them, for each of which there shall be paid, in addition to the rates charged for in the first class, \$2.50.

The third class shall include all carts, waggons, or other vehicles used by expressmen, bakers, brewers, distillers, farmers or gardeners, for each of which there shall be paid, in addition to the rates charged for in the first class, \$5.

Parties obtaining licenses, as aforesaid, shall moreover pay the annual assessment on all working horses employed in drawing the above-mentioned vehicles or carriages, at the rate of \$2.50 each, and also twenty-five cents for each number granted by the Chief of Police.

Firewood, green, or from rafts, half a cord, three feet long, 20 cts. Furniture or Luggage, per load, 20 cts. Lumber, green or hard, from rafts, 500 feet, board measure, 20 cts. Molasses, Sugar or Oil, one puncheon, hogshead or load, 20 cts. Pig Iron, Lead, Copper, or Tin, one ton, 25 cts. Bar Iron or Steel, one ton, 30 cts.

For every additional $\frac{1}{4}$ mile for above description of goods, 10c. And from any of the Harbour Wharves to any place in the 2nd or 3rd Division, within $\frac{1}{4}$ mile distance from the boundary line of the first division and *vice versa*, or from any place (exclusive of the wharves), to any other in the city, and *vice versa*, provided the distance do not exceed $1\frac{1}{4}$ mile,—instead of 15, 20, 25, and 30 cents, the rates shall be 25, 30, 35 and 40 cents.

From any place in the Western Section of the First Division :
To the stores and wharves below Wellington Bridge, north side of Lachine Canal, 20c. The stores and wharves below Wellington Bridge, south side of Lachine Canal, 25c. The Basins above Wellington Bridge, south side of Lachine Canal, 25c. The Basins above Wellington Bridge, south side of Lachine Canal, and the stores, stations, &c., at Point St. Charles, 35c. The factories, &c., at and above St. Gabriel Locks, north of Lachine Canal, 30c. The St. Bonaventure Street Railway Station, 20c. The St. Bonaventure Street Station, from the lower wharves of the Harbour, 25c. And *vice versa* for one load.

And from any place in the Eastern section of the 1st Division, instead of 20, 25, &c., the rates shall be 5 cents additional. For any excess over the weight fixed for a load, additional, *pro rata* rates shall be paid. If delay is caused to the carter, by the employer, beyond the usual time, the carter shall be paid *extra*, at the rate of 5c. for every quarter of an hour. If a carter is called and there be no load ready for him, or if unable to load without assistance, he shall be paid as if he carried a load the distance thus unnecessarily traveled.

DIVISIONS REFERRED TO ABOVE

The *First Division* shall comprise the East, Centre and West Wards, (including the south-west side of McGill street, and the north-west side of Craig street), and shall be subdivided into

REGULATIONS AND RATES.

Letter-Rates.—Letters posted in Canada, addressed to any place within the Dominion, pass, if pre-paid, for 3 cents per half-ounce, but if posted, unpaid, are charged 5 cents per half-ounce.

On letters to Prince Edward's Island, the rate is 3 cents per half-ounce, if pre-paid, 5 cents, if unpaid.

The rates on letters to the United Kingdom will be:

By Canadian Packet, 12½ cents per half-ounce.

By Cunard Packet, 15 cents per half-ounce, advancing by one rate for each half-ounce.

Letters for the United Kingdom must be pre-paid, or they will be charged a fine of 6d. sterling in addition to the deficient postage on delivery in England.

Letters for British Colonies and Possessions, beyond sea, and for Foreign Countries, *via* England, must be pre-paid.

The rate on letters for the United States, 6 cents if pre-paid, 10 cents if unpaid.

N. B.—With the exception of those marked with an asterisk, all are to be sent by *Canadian Line* only; for Cunard Line, add to the above rates 3 cents for letters.

The British Post Office forwards letters to Canada by the first packet sailing after the letter is posted, unless the letters bear a special direction,—“By Canadian Packet,” or “By British Packet,”—and in that case, they are kept over for the packet designated. “By Canadian Mail” is not a distinctive superscription; for any mail for Canada is a “Canadian Mail,” by whatever packet forwarded.

Registration Charges.—For the registration of a letter addressed to any place in British North America, the charge is 2 cents.

For the registration of a letter to the United Kingdom, 8 cts.

For the registration of a letter to the United States, 5 cts.

France, and other countries for which letters pass through France, an amount equal to the postage.

No letter can be forwarded, as registered, unless postage and registration fee are both pre-paid.

Miscellaneous Charges.—The charge on parcels, by Parcel Post, to any place in Canada, is 12½ cents per half pound, (with 5 cents additional, if registered). No parcel must exceed four pounds in weight.

One cent per ounce, payable in advance by postage stamp, is the rate on printed circulars, prices-current, hand-bills, and other printed matter of a like character; and on books bound or unbound, when posted at a Canadian Post Office, addressed to any place in Canada, British North America generally, or the United States.

The charges upon prices-current, when addressed to the United Kingdom, is 2 cents each, and must be pre-paid by postage stamp.

Postage Rates on certain Miscellaneous Matter passing within the Dominion of Canada, or to and from the United States:—

1.—Packages of seeds, cuttings, bulbs, roots, and scions, or grafts and Botanical specimens, may be posted in Canada for delivery within the Dominion, or to an address within the United States on prepayment by postage stamp of a rate of one cent per ounce; and when received from the United States, addressed to any place in Canada, such packages may be delivered on payment, by the person addressed, of a like rate.

2.—The limit of weight for such packages will be one pound. No letter or communication intended to serve the purpose of a letter must be enclosed in them; and they must be so put up as to be easy of examination, for the purpose of verifying the alleged contents. If put up in bags, the bags must be simply tied at the neck, so as to admit of inspection; and, in the case of such packages mailed in Canada, the nature of the contents, such as “Seeds,” “Roots,” &c., as the case may be, must be marked on the package by the sender, as a statement of the claim to pass at the reduced rate above mentioned.

3.—Book and newspaper manuscript, and printers' proof-sheets (whether corrected or not,) maps, prints, drawings, engravings, photographs (when not on glass or in cases containing glass,) and sheet music (whether printed or written,) to any address in Canada or the United States, may pass in covers open at the ends or sides, and provided that no letter, or other communication intended to serve the purpose of a letter, be enclosed therein, on prepayment, when posted in Canada, by postage stamp of the ordinary printed-matter rate of one cent per ounce; or upon payment of that rate on delivery on such matter when received in the mails from the United States.

Transmission of Patterns of Merchandise and Samples between Canada and the United Kingdom, and certain other countries:—

4.—Patterns of merchandise and samples may be forwarded between Canada and the United Kingdom, and Denmark, France, Italy, Belgium, the German States, Netherlands, Portugal and Switzerland, by the Canadian packet mails, at book-post rates, and subject to the following conditions:

A—The patterns or samples must not be of any intrinsic value; and this rule excludes all articles of a saleable nature, and whatever may have a value of its own, apart from its mere use as a pattern; nor must the quantity of any material or article, sent as a pattern or sample, be so great that it could have on this ground an intrinsic value.

On this point an explanation in a subsequent Departmental Order, appears as follows:

B—It has hitherto formed part of the Imperial Post Office regulations that "*samples or patterns must not be of intrinsic value,*" but in consequence of the difficulty that has been experienced in determining what is, and what is not, a pattern or sample of merchandise of intrinsic value, this prohibition has been removed.

The modification is a verbal one, and will not alter nor enlarge in any way, the character of the transmissions permitted to pass by pattern post.

The special prohibition as to intrinsic value has, it is understood, been withdrawn, not because the question of value will not still influence a decision as to whether an article offered for transmission by pattern post is a genuine commercial sample (or pattern) or not, but because as a general proviso it could not well be enforced; inasmuch as every article whether properly a pattern or sample or not, has necessarily more or less of an intrinsic value, and might be held to be amenable to a strict construction of this prohibitory clause in the regulation.

C—The patterns, &c., must be sent in covers, open at the ends, so as to be easy of examination. Samples, however, of seeds, drugs, and such like, which cannot be sent in open covers, may be enclosed in bags of linen or other material, simply tied at the neck; or, provided that bags be transparent, they may be entirely closed, if they are for delivery within the United Kingdom. Bags, however, entirely closed, even though they be transparent,

must not be used for the transmission of seeds to foreign parts.

D—The rule which prohibited the transmission through the post, as patterns, of articles of cutlery, &c., has been rescinded; and scissors, knives, razors, forks, steel pens, nails, keys, watch machinery, metal tubing, pieces of metal or ore, and such like articles, are now allowed to be forwarded by the post as samples, provided they be packed and guarded in so secure a manner as to afford complete protection to the contents of the mail bags, and to the persons of the officers of the post office. Such articles, however, must be so packed that they may be easily examined; and it is made a rule that any packet containing such articles, which may be found to be insufficiently guarded, shall not be forwarded through the post.

No packet of patterns or samples, posted for delivery within the Dominion, must exceed 24 oz. in weight.

A packet of patterns or samples sent to France or Portugal, must not exceed 18 inches in length and 12 inches in width or depth; a packet to any other place abroad must not exceed 24 inches in length, or 12 inches in breadth or depth.

The limits of weight are as follows :

None of the articles named in the rule D may be sent as patterns or samples to any place abroad, except Germany, Belgium and the British colonies, and not to these places when addressed "via France."

There must be no writing or printing other than the address of the person for whom the packet is intended, the manufacturer's or trade mark and number, and the prices of the article.

Any infringement of the above regulations will render the packet liable to be treated and charged as a letter.

The rule which forbids the transmission through the Post of any article likely to injure the contents of the mail-bags will apply to patterns and samples; any package transgressing this rule is to be sent to the Postmaster-General.

Transmission of Patterns and Samples within the Province of Canada:—

Patterns or samples of merchandise and goods for sale may be posted in Canada to be forwarded to any place within the Province, on prepayment by postage stamp of a rate of one cent per ounce, under the following regulations :

I.—Patterns or samples must be sent in covers open at the ends, so as to be easy of examination. Samples, however, of seeds, drugs, and so forth, which cannot be sent in open covers, may be enclosed in bags of linen or other material, fastened in such a manner that they may be readily opened—or in bags entirely closed, provided that they be transparent, so that the offi-

cers of the Post Office may be able to satisfy themselves as to the nature of the contents.

II.—The packet may bear on the *outside* the address of the sender in addition to the address of the person for whom it may be intended—also a trade mark and numbers, and the price of the articles enclosed—*inside*, there must be no enclosure but the samples or patterns themselves—the particulars, however, of the trade marks, numbers and price, may be marked on the articles themselves instead of on the outside of the packet at the option of the sender.

III.—Any sample or pattern packet containing a letter or otherwise violating the conditions of the preceding rules is to be rated and treated as a letter.

IV.—The rate of 1 cent per ounce is to be prepaid by Postage Stamp,—and if such rate be not fully prepaid by the stamps affixed—the packet is to be rated with the deficient postage and a fine of 5 cents in addition.

V.—Packets of samples and patterns may be registered on prepayment by postage stamp of a registration fee of 5 cents in addition to the postage rate—and provided such packets be duly handed in to the Post Office for registration.

A registration receipt or certificate should always be given for such packets when presented for registration.

VI.—No packet of samples or patterns must exceed 24 ounces in weight; any packet exceeding that weight is to be sent to the Postmaster-General.

Book Post.—Books, bound, or unbound, posted in Canada, and addressed to any office in the Dominion, British America, and the United States, are chargeable with a rate of one cent per ounce which must be pre-paid by postage stamps.

Book packets are forwarded by post from Canada to the United Kingdom *vice versa*, by Canadian steamer, at the following rates:—For each packet

And so on, adding one rate for every 4 ounces.

5.—No prints or printed matter will be allowed to pass by book post between the United Kingdom and Canada, unless printed on paper, parchment, or vellum.

Book packets addressed to the United Kingdom can be registered on payment of the ordinary registration fee (8 cents) in addition to the postage.

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Book Post with France.—For a packet of printed matter, or single newspaper, book, &c., not over 2 ounces 5 cents.

Ditto, exceeding 2 ounces, and not over 4 ounces . . . 10 "

Ditto, " 4 ounces, do 8 ounces . . . 20 "

Ditto, " 8 ounces, do 16 ounces . . . 40 "

And so on, increasing 20 cents for every additional half-pound.

The Book-post Regulations between Canada and England apply to matter between Canada and France.

Newspapers and Periodicals.—Newspapers published in Canada may be sent by post from the office of publication, addressed to any place in Canada, at the following rates, if paid quarterly in advance, by either the publisher at the post office where the papers are posted, or by the subscriber at delivering post office:—

For a paper published 6 times a week 30 cents per quarter.

Ditto do 3 times a week 15 "

Ditto do 2 times a week 10 "

Ditto do 1 time a week 5 "

When the above rates are not paid in advance, by either publisher or subscriber, such papers are charged one cent each on delivery.

Transient Newspapers.—Transient newspapers, that is to say, Canadian Newspapers, posted otherwise than from the office of publication, and American or British papers posted or re-posted in Canada, must be prepaid two cents each, by postage stamp, or they cannot be forwarded; except only *British newspapers* distributed to regular subscribers by Canadian booksellers and news-agents, such papers pass free, as they would do if received in the Canadian Packet Mail.

Newspapers by Mail from England or United States.—Newspapers received from England by the Canadian Packet Mails are delivered free.

Newspapers from England by the Cunard Packet are charged 2 cents each on delivery. [This is the American transit charge.]

United States newspapers, to regular subscribers, are charged 1 cent each on delivery. Transient papers two cents each.

Periodicals passing by Mail in Canada.—

The rate on all periodicals, other than newspapers, passing by mail in Canada, save such as may be addressed to or received from the United Kingdom, will henceforth be one cent per four ounces weight of package containing periodical matter, whether the package contain one or more numbers.

Any fraction of 4 ounces to be charged as a full rate.

Periodicals weighing less than one ounce per number, posted in Canada for any place within the Dominion, when sent singly, pass for one half cent per number if pre-paid by stamp.

The above rate will be payable on delivery on all periodical matter received from the United States, except that Canadian editors may receive exchange periodicals from the United States free of Canadian postage.

Canadian Periodicals, posted for United Kingdom by Canadian Packets:—

Periodicals, printed and published in Canada, may be posted, addressed to any place in the United Kingdom by *Canadian Packet*, on pre-payment by postage stamp of 2 cents each number.

This rate will be applicable to all classes of Canadian periodicals posted as above for the United Kingdom. No package of Periodicals can be sent through the post if it exceed four pounds in weight.

Postage Stamps.—Postage Stamps of the respective value of $\frac{1}{2}$ cent for small periodicals; 1 cent for newspapers; 2 cents for prices-current for the United Kingdom; 3 cents for ordinary Provincial letters; 6 cents for United States rate; 12 $\frac{1}{2}$ cents for Canadian Packet; and 15 cents for Cunard Packet,—are provided for sale to the public.

Penal Clause.—The Act contains the following penal clause: To enclose a letter or letters, or any writing intending to serve the purpose of a letter, in a parcel posted for the parcel post, or to enclose a letter, or any writing, or make any written marks to serve the purpose of a letter, or to enclose any other thing in a newspaper, posted to pass as a newspaper, at the rate of postage applicable to newspapers (except in the case of accounts and receipts of newspaper publishers, which are permitted to pass folded within the newspaper sent by them to their subscribers), is an offence punishable by a penalty of not less than ten and not exceeding forty dollars.

MONEY ORDERS.

Money Orders on Canada.—All the Money-Order Post Offices in Ontario, Quebec and New Brunswick, are authorized to draw Money-Orders on each other for any sum up to \$100, and for as many Orders of \$100 each as the applicant may require, upon the following terms, viz:—

On Orders up to \$10.....	5 cents.
On Orders over \$10, and up to \$20.....	10 "
On Orders over \$20, and up to \$40.....	20 "
On Orders over \$40, and up to \$60.....	30 "
On Orders over \$60, and up to \$80.....	40 "
On Orders over \$80, and up to \$100.....	50 "

Money Orders on the United Kingdom.—The Money Order Offices in the Dominion also draw upon all the Money Order Offices in England, Ireland, and Scotland, and the Channel Islands, for any sum up to £10 sterling, and grant as many Orders for £10 sterling each, as may be needed to make up the amount to be remitted. The terms are as under:—

On Orders up to £2.....	25 cents.
On Orders over £2, and up to £ 5.....	50 "
On Orders over £5, and up to £ 7.....	75 "
On Orders over £7, and up to £10.....	\$1.00

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Money Orders on the Lower Provinces.—The Money Order Offices in Ontario, Quebec and New Brunswick, draw also upon Money Order Offices in Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, and Newfoundland. The Orders, like those of the United Kingdom, are made payable in Sterling money, and for sums up to £10 sterling. The terms are:—

For Orders up to £5..... 25 cents.

For Orders over £5, and up to £10..... 50 "

The Money Order Post Offices in the Dominion are furnished with lists of all the Money Order Offices in Canada, the United Kingdom, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island and Newfoundland; and the Postmasters are instructed to afford every information in their power, in respect of the places upon which they draw, together with any other information relating to such issues as the intending remitters may desire.

POST OFFICE SAVINGS BANKS.

The Post Office Savings Banks, established by Statute in the last Session of Parliament, commenced operations in Ontario and Quebec on the 1st April, 1868.

2. The direct security of the Dominion is given by the Statute for all deposits made.

3. At each Savings Bank Post Office, the Savings Bank regulations may be read by the public, giving full information with respect to the mode of depositing and withdrawing money, and these regulations are printed on the cover of the Pass Book supplied to each depositor.

4. Any person may have a deposit account, and deposits are received daily, during the ordinary hours of Post Office business, of any number of dollars, from \$1 up to \$300, the total amount which can be received from a depositor in any one year, except in cases to be specially authorised by the Postmaster-General.

5. The Postmasters of the Savings Bank offices will act as agents for the receipt of the money deposited for transmission to the Postmaster-General, and for the payment by the Postmaster-General of money withdrawn by depositors.

6. Each depositor is supplied with a Pass Book, and the sums paid in or withdrawn, are entered therein by the Postmaster receiving or paying the same. In addition, a direct receipt for each amount paid in, is sent to the depositor from the Postmaster-General, and the Postmaster-General will issue a cheque, payable at any Post Office Savings Bank desired, for any sum withdrawn.

7. Every depositor's account is thus kept with the Postmaster-General, and a depositor may pay into his or her account with the Post Office Savings Bank, at any of the Savings Bank Post Offices which at the time may best suit his convenience, and exercise the same choice in drawing out money, subject only to the obligation of producing the Pass Book, in proof of identity—whenever paying in or drawing out money.

8. Interest at the rate of 4 per cent. per annum is allowed on deposits lying in the ordinary deposit accounts, but when a de-

positor has \$100 deposited, he or she may request the Postmaster-General to transfer this sum to a special account, and will then receive a Certificate of such special \$100 deposit, bearing interest at 5 per cent. per annum.

9. Postmasters are forbidden by law to disclose the name of any depositor, or the amount of any sum deposited or withdrawn.

10. No charge will be made to depositors on paying in, or drawing out money, nor for postage on communications with the Postmaster-General in relation thereto.

11. The Postmaster-General will be always ready to receive and attend to all applications, complaints, or other communications addressed to him by depositors or others, relative to Post Office Savings Bank matters.

12. Additional Post Offices will, from time to time, be authorized to act as Savings Bank agencies.

Extract from the Act 31st Vic., cap. 6, entitled “An Act respecting the Customs;”

The Fair Market Value for Duty of Goods imported into Canada, shall be the fair market value of such goods in the usual and ordinary commercial acceptance of the term at the usual and ordinary credit, and not the cash value of such goods, except in cases in which the article imported is by universal usage considered and known to be a cash article, and so *bona fide* paid for in all transactions in relation to such article, and no discounts for cash shall in any case be allowed in deduction of the fair market value as herein above defined; and all invoices representing cash values, except in the special cases herein above referred to, shall be subject to such additions as the Collector or Appraiser of the Port at which they are to be presented, may appear just and reasonable to bring up the amount to the true and fair market value as required by this section.

Packages delivered before Examination.—All the packages mentioned in any one Entry, although most of such packages may have been delivered to the importer, shall be subject to the control of the Customs authorities of the port at which they are entered, until such of the packages as have been sent for examination to the Examining Warehouse, shall have been duly examined and approved, provided such examination take place within three days after the delivery of the package or packages into the Examining Warehouse, and after twenty-four hours' notice by the importer to the collector; and a bond shall be given by the importer conditioned that the packages so delivered shall not be opened or unpacked before the package or packages

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sent to the Examining Warehouse, shall have been examined and passed as aforesaid, provided they are examined within the delay aforesaid; and the packages so delivered, or the goods if lawfully unpacked, shall, if required by the Collector of Customs, be returned to the Custom House, within such delay as may be mentioned in the bond under a forfeiture of the penalty of such bond; provided that the Collector shall use due diligence in causing such examination to be made, and may, if he sees no objection, permit the remaining packages to be opened and unpacked, as soon as those sent to the Warehouse have been examined and approved.

Collectors to File Invoices.—The Collectors of Customs, at all the ports in Canada shall retain and put on file, after duly stamping the same, all invoices of goods imported at such ports respectively, of which invoices they shall give certified copies or extracts, whenever called upon so to do by the importers, and such copies or extracts so duly certified by the Collector or other proper officer, and bearing the Stamp of the Custom House at which they are filed, shall be considered and received as authentic, and the Collector shall be entitled to demand for each certificate a fee of fifty cents, before delivering the same.

COASTING REGULATIONS FOR THE DOMINION.

Sanctioned by Order in Council 28th of July, 1868.

1. Vessels and Boats employed solely in the transport of Goods or Passengers from one Port or place to another Port or place within the limits of the Dominion of Canada, shall be deemed to be engaged in the Coasting Trade, and shall be subject to the Regulations governing the same.

2. None but British registered Vessels and Boats, wholly owned by British subjects, can lawfully be engaged in the Coasting Trade of the Dominion of Canada, and the name of such Vessels or Boats and the names of their Ports of Registry, shall be distinctly painted on the stern of the said Vessels or Boats.

3. Such Vessels and Boats, may, without being subject to entry, or clearance as required by law, for Vessels trading between Ports in the Dominion of Canada, as well as with Foreign Ports, carry goods, the produce of Canada, or goods duty free, or goods duty paid, or passengers from any Ports or places in the Provinces of Ontario and Quebec, to any other Ports or places in the said Provinces, or from any Ports or places in the Province of New Brunswick, to any other Ports or places in the said Province, or from any Ports or places in the Province of Nova Scotia, to any other Ports or places in the said Province, provided always that the owners or masters of such Vessels or Boats shall take out a license for the season for that purpose from a Collector of Customs in Canada, and that the owners or masters in taking out the said License shall enter into Bonds of \$500 conditioned that such Vessels or Boats shall not be employed in the Foreign Trade, and provided also that the master of every such Vessel or Boat shall keep or cause to be kept, a Cargo Book in

the form prescribed by the Customs Department, to be registered by the Collector of Customs who granted the License, in which book shall be entered at the Port of Lading, an account of all goods taken on board of such Vessel or Boat, stating the description of the packages, the quantities, the descriptions and values of the goods therein, as also of the goods stowed loose, and the names of the respective Shippers and Consignees, as far as any of such particulars shall be known to him; and at the port of discharge shall be entered in the said Cargo Book the respective days upon which any such goods shall be delivered out of such Vessel and also the respective times of departure from the Port of lading and of arrival at the Port of unloading.

4. The master of any such Vessel or Boat shall produce his License and Cargo Book to any Officer of Customs, whenever the same shall be demanded, and answer all questions put to him; and such Officer of Customs shall be at liberty to note any remark on the Cargo Book which he may deem proper; and if the Cargo Book shall not be kept in the manner hereby required, and the particulars of all cargo laden and unladen, duly noted therein, the goods and vessel shall be forfeited, and the master shall incur the penalty of \$100.

5. Before any coasting vessel or boat shall depart from any Port of lading in any one of the Provinces of the Dominion of Canada for any other Port in the said Dominion, not in the said Province of departure, an account or report with a duplicate thereof, in the form or to the effect following, and signed by the Master, shall be delivered to the Collector, who shall retain the duplicate and return the original account or report dated and signed by him; and such account or report shall be the clearance of the Vessel or Boat for the voyage and the transire or pass for the goods expressed therein, except for goods under Bond or goods liable to Excise or Internal Revenue duty, which shall require the entries and warrants for landing to be signed by the proper officers as required by Law; and if any such account or report be false, the Master who signed it shall forfeit the sum of \$100.

6. Within twenty-four hours after the arrival of any coasting vessel or boat at the Port of discharge, which requires a *transire* as above described, and before any goods shall be unladen, the *transire* with the name of the place or wharf where the landing is to be discharged, noted thereon, shall be delivered to the collector, who shall note thereon the date of the delivery; and if any of the goods on board such coasting vessel or boat shall be subject to any customs duty the same shall not be unladen until due entry has been made at the Custom House and a warrant granted for the landing thereof; and if any of the goods on board such vessel or boat be subject to any duty of Excise or Internal Revenue the same shall not be unladen without the authority or permission of the proper officer of excise; but no entry shall be required at the Custom House for any goods brought coastwise the produce of Canada or goods on which the duties, whether of Customs or Excise, have already been paid or which are duty free.

7. Vessels and Boats employed in the Coasting Trade and that shall not have taken out a License for carrying goods, and obtained a Cargo Book as above provided, shall report inwards and outwards at the nearest port to their place of arrival or destination and require clearances whenever they depart from any port or place within the Dominion of Canada, and in default of their so reporting the vessel or cargo, the Master shall in such cases be subject to the penalty of \$100 for departing and arriving without due entry inwards or outwards as the case may be; provided that when a vessel shall sail from any place where there is no Custom House, or officer of Customs, it shall be sufficient for the carrying out of this regulation that the owner or Master of such vessel do, as soon afterwards as possible, forward to the nearest Custom House a similar report in duplicate, or lodge the same at the first Port at which he shall touch where there is a Custom House officer.

8. Goods under a removal Bond from one Canadian Port to another Canadian Port, may be carried in any British registered vessel or boat, trading Coastwise with a proper License and Cargo Book upon such goods being properly entered in the Cargo Book and in the account or *Transire*, in duplicate, the

Collector at the Port from which such goods are removed, being required to forward by Mail, to the Collector of the Port for which the goods are destined, all the particulars and description of the goods so forwarded, and the Packages shall be properly marked in Red as now provided, but no goods under Bond shall be carried in any Coasting Vessel or Boat until the Master has delivered an account in duplicate or transire to the Collector of Customs at the Port of lading.

9. No Coasting Vessel or Boat to touch at any Foreign Port unless forced by unavoidable circumstances, and the master of any Coasting vessel or boat which has touched at any Foreign Port, shall declare the same in writing under his own hand, to the Collector or other proper officer of Customs at the Port or Place in Canada where his vessel or boat afterwards first arrives, under a penalty of \$100.

10. If any goods are unshipped from any vessel or boat arriving coastwise, or unshipped, or water borne to be shipped to be carried coastwise on Sundays or Holidays, or unless in the presence, or with the authority of the proper Officer of Customs, or unless at such times and places as shall be appointed and approved by him for that purpose; the same shall be forfeited and the Master of the vessel or boat shall forfeit the sum of \$100.

11. Officers of Customs may board any Coasting Vessel or Boat in any Port or Place, and at any period of the voyage search her and examine all goods on board, and demand all the documents which ought to be on board; and the Collector may require such documents to be brought to him for inspection.

12. No Fishing Boat, or boat used in Ferrying, under 15 tons burthen, shall, except by special license or permission, carry any goods from a Foreign Country, which are liable to duty, under pain of seizure, unless the same (in the case of Ferry Boats) be for the sole use of some passenger then on board.

13. No goods can be carried in any Coasting Vessel or Boat, except such as are laden to be so carried at some port or place in Canada, and no goods shall be taken into or put out of any Coasting Vessel or Boat while on her voyage, by River, Lake or Sea.

14. The Transire Coastwise required by these regulations may in the case of any steam vessel carrying a Purser, be signed by such Purser with the like effect in all respects, and subject to the like penalty on the Purser, and the like forfeiture of the goods, in case of any untrue statement in the transire, as if the transire was signed by the Master; and the word *Master* for the purposes of these regulations shall be construed as including the Purser of any steam vessel; but nothing herein contained shall preclude the Collector or proper officer of Customs from calling upon the Master of any steam vessel to answer all such questions concerning the vessel, passengers, cargo, and crew, as might be lawfully demanded of him if the report had been made by him, or to exempt the Master from the penalties imposed by these regulations for failure to answer any such

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question, or for answering untruly, or to prevent the master from making such report, if he shall see fit so to do.

15. The Coasting Regulations of the late Province of Canada, dated the 12th April, 1861, and all regulations heretofore existing in the Province of New Brunswick or Nova Scotia in reference to Coasting in any of the said Provinces are hereby repealed.

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

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

Their jurisdiction extends to all personal actions where the debt or damages claimed do not exceed \$200; and to all suits relating to debt, covenant or contract, where the amount is ascertained by the acts of the parties or signature of the defendant to \$400. An appeal lies to either of the Superior Courts of Law. These Courts also possess equity powers to the amount of \$200, subject to an appeal to the Court of Chancery.

Surrogate Courts.—The jurisdiction of these courts relates to all testamentary matters and causes, and to the granting or revoking of probate of wills, and letters of administration of the effects of deceased persons having estate or effects in the Province of Ontario, and all matters arising out of, or connected with the grant or revocation of probate or administration, subject to an appeal to the Court of Chancery. The County Judges are also Judges of the Surrogate Court. J. Fraser, Registrar.

Law Circuits.—The Circuits are held twice a year in each county; between Hilary and Easter Terms, and at Michaelmas Term, Clerk of Assizes—Deputy Clerk of the Crown, *ex-officio*.

Division Courts.—For the summary disposal of cases by a Judge, put a jury of five persons may be demanded in certain cases. Their jurisdiction extends to action of debt or contract amounting to \$100, injuries or torts to personal chattels amounting to \$40, but not to actions for gambling debts, liquor drunk in a tavern, or notes of hand given therefor, ejectment, title to land, &c., or any toll, customs or franchise, will or settlement, malicious prosecution, libel, slander, crim. con., seduction or breach of promise, or actions against a J. P., for anything done by him in the execution of his office, if he objects to it. Courts are held

once in two months in each division or oftener, at the discretion of the Judge.
