Prosper with Thy blessing the designs of this Society. Comfort with Thy grace, those benefactors who contribute to its support. Bless the ministry of Thy servants, the Clergy: the endeavours of all who are engaged in spreading the knowledge of true religion in the dominions of our Sovereign, and the labours of those Missionaries who are proclaiming the same in this Province. And may Thy Holy Spirit direct all our consultations to the advancement of Thy Glory, and the good of Thy Church, through Jesus Christ our Lord.—AMEN.

O MERCIFUL GOD, who hast made all men, and hatest nothing that thou hast made, nor wouldst the death of a sinner, but that he should be converted and live: Have mercy upon all Jews, Turks, Infidels, and Heretics, and take from them all ignorance, hardness of heart, and contempt of Thy Word; and so fetch them home, blessed Lord, to Thy flock, that they may be saved among the remnant of the true Israelites, and be made one fold, under one Shepherd, Jesus Christ our Lord, who liveth and reigneth with Thee and the Holy Spirit, one God, World without end.—AMEN.

## CONSTITUTION OF THE SOCIETY.

---

### I.

THE Society shall be called the DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY OF NEW BRUNSWICK.

### II.

No alteration shall be made in the Constitution of this Society, nor shall any Bye-Law, Rules or Regulations of the Society be repealed, annulled, or altered, except at a meeting of the General Committee, by the vote of at least two-thirds of the members present, nor until it shall have received the sanction of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese; which sanction must be given in writing, and delivered to the Secretary within six months of the said Meeting.

### III.

No alteration or amendment in the Constitution, nor any repeal, cancellation, alteration or amendment of any Bye-Law, Rule or Regulation of the Society, shall be proposed or made at any Meeting, unless notice shall have been given in writing at the next previous Annual Meeting of the General Committee, or at the next previous Anniversary Meeting, of such proposed repeal or cancellation, nor unless the terms of such proposed alteration or amendment shall have been stated in writing at some previous meeting; from which, without the unanimous consent of the members present, no deviation, except of a mere formal nature, shall be permitted.

### IV.

No repeal, cancellation, alteration, or amendment shall be proposed except by a member qualified to vote, at the Anniversary Meeting, whose name shall be entered on the Minutes of the Secretary, together with the said proposition.

### V.

The payment at any one time of a sum not less than Ten Pounds, shall constitute a Life Member; and the payment annually of any sum, however small, shall constitute the person paying the same, a member of the Society. Provided that

no member shall be qualified to vote at any General Meeting of the Society, unless of the full age of twenty-one years, nor unless he be a Life Member, or shall have subscribed and paid at least five shillings during the year preceeding such Meeting.

#### VI.

##### *Officers.*

1. The Officers of the Society shall consist of a President, two or more Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, one or more Secretaries, and two Auditors of Accounts.

2. The Lord Bishop of the Diocese shall be President of the Society, and the Archdeacon the Senior Vice-President : and any Life Member may, at any Anniversary Meeting, be elected a Vice-President of the Society.

3. The Treasurer, Secretary, or Secretaries, and the Auditors, shall be annually elected at the meetings of the General Committee : and in case of the death, resignation, or removal from the Province, of any such Officer, the vacancy shall be filled up by the Executive Committee, at its next or any subsequent Meeting within the year ; and the Lord Bishop shall, if he see fit, call a Special Meeting of the Executive Committee for the purpose of filling any such vacancy.

#### VII.

##### *Executive Committee.*

1. There shall also be an Executive Committee, to be composed of the following Members, viz. :

The Officers of the Society as provided for in the next preceeding Article.

All Clergymen resident in the Diocese, duly licensed by the Lord Bishop, and Subscribers to the Society.

And twenty-four Lay-Members of the Society, being Life Members, or Annual Subscribers of at least One Pound : to be annually elected, at the meetings of the General Committee, provided that no Annual Subscriber shall be qualified to be elected, unless he shall, during the year preceeding each meeting, have paid the subscription of at least One Pound.

2. Five Members of the Executive Committee, three of whom to be Laymen, shall form a quorum.

3. The Executive Committee shall meet either at Fredericton or Saint John, on the first Wednesday in January, on the day next following the Annual Meeting, on the first Wednesday in March, on the first Wednesday in June, and on Wednesday after the first Tuesday in October.

4. Special Meetings of the Executive Committee may be summoned by the President, or in case of his death or absence, by any two Vice-Presidents of the Society, to meet at such time and place as may be fixed by the notice of meeting; but so far as may be, alternately at Saint John and Fredericton.

5. The Executive Committee shall have all such right and power in and connected with the management, control, and disposal of all lands, real estate, and property whatsoever, which may now or may hereafter be vested in the Society, and with respect to the use of the Corporate Seal of the Society, as the General Committee or any General Meeting of the Society would have in Session, and shall further be authorized to depute all and any such powers to any sub-committee of such Executive Committee.

#### VIII.

##### *Board of Home Missions.*

There shall also be a Board of Home Missions, to be composed of the following Members, viz.:

1. The President, Treasurer, and Secretary or Secretaries of the Society *ex officio*.

2. Three Clerical and five Lay Members of the Society, qualified for election as members of the Executive Committee, who shall be chosen annually on the first day of meeting of the General Committee, by ballot, on nomination of each proposed member by two members of the General Committee.

3. The Board of Home Missions shall have all such power relative to the preparation of the Missionary Schedule, and carrying the same into operation and effect, and the appropriation or disposition of the funds to the object of the Society, as may from time to time be vested in them by or pursuant to any Resolution, Bye-Laws or Regulations of the General Committee.

4. Five members of the Board, three of whom shall be Laymen, shall be a quorum.

5. The Board of Home Missions shall meet whenever summoned by the President, Treasurer or Secretary of the Society, and at such place as may be fixed by the notice of meeting.

#### IX.

##### *Objects.*

The Society shall embrace the following objects, and none other, viz.:

1. Missionary visits to places where there is no settled Clergyman, and aid to new and poor Missions.

2. The establishment of Divinity Scholarships; and assistance when necessary, to those who may be under preparation for the Ministry, especially sons of Clergymen.

3. Aid to Sunday and other Schools in which Church principles are taught, and the training and encouraging of Schoolmasters and Catechists.

4. The supply of such Books and Tracts as are on the Catalogue of the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, and none other.

5. Aid to the building and enlarging of Churches and Chapels.

6. Aid to the building of Parsonage Houses.

7. The creation of a fund towards the augmentation of the stipends of clergymen who are poor; and towards the education of children of such Clergymen, and towards the making a provision for those who may be incapacitated by age or infirmity.

8. The creation of a Fund for the Widows and Orphans of the Clergy.

9. Aid to the Endowment Fund in particular Parishes.

10. The formation of a Fund for receiving Money or Securities as Special Trusts.

#### X.

The Society will employ no Clergyman on Missionary services without the Bishop's license and appointment, and will submit its choice of Divinity Scholars to his Lordship's approbation.

#### XI.

It shall be competent to any member of the Society to limit his subscription to any one or more of the objects above recited, which he may be most anxious to promote.

#### XII.

##### *Local Committee.*

1. The Members of the Society in each Parish, or in each Mission, consisting of two or more Parishes, shall, at the discretion of the Missionary of such Mission, constitute a Local Committee; and so also the members residing in any District of a Parish set off under the authority of the Lord Bishop, with the concurrence of the Rector and Church Corporation

and none

of such Parish (there being in such District a Church duly consecrated, and a resident Clergyman licensed thereto by the Lord Bishop), may, at the desire of such Clergyman, and with the approval of the Bishop and the Rector of the Parish, form a separate Local Committee; and in that case the District shall, for the purpose of the Society, be considered as a separate Parish.

2. Each Local Committee shall hold an Annual Meeting on some convenient day previous to the Anniversary Meeting, when the recommendations to the General Committee of special objects shall be determined on.

3. Each Local Committee shall be empowered to depute two Lay Members of the Society, to be elected at the Annual Meetings of the Committee, to assist the Missionary in submitting the recommendations of the Committee to the consideration of the General Committee.

4. It shall be competent to each Committee to recommend any of the above recited objects to the special consideration of the General Committee, in the appropriation of the funds of the Society.

5. The members of the Society, attending the public services at the Cathedral in the City of Fredericton, shall have the right to elect two Lay delegates annually. The meeting for the election of the said delegates, to be held annually at such time and place as the Lord Bishop of the Diocese may direct; and the said delegates upon being so elected, and their election duly certified by the Lord Bishop or other person presiding at the said meeting, shall be taken to be, and shall be thereby qualified as members of the General Committee.

### XIII.

1. The Society shall hold its Anniversary Meeting at Fredericton and Saint John alternately, on the first Thursday in July in each year.

2. A Special General Committee may be called at any time by the President, or in his absence by any two or more of the Vice-Presidents, four weeks notice being first given thereof by advertisement in one or more newspapers, published in Fredericton and Saint John respectively.

### XIV.

#### *The General Committee.*

1. The General Committee of the Society shall be composed of the following members, viz.: The Lord Bishop of the

Diocese, who shall be the Chairman; the Vice-Presidents of the Society; in the absence of the Lord Bishop, the Committee may elect a Chairman from the Vice-Presidents present, and if none be present, from other members of the Committee; the Secretary or Secretaries who shall also serve in that capacity at the meeting of the General Committee; the Treasurer and the Auditors, the Rector or Missionary of each Parish or of a Mission comprising two or more Parishes, and the Clergyman of any separate District of a Parish (provided that in the absence or sickness of the Rector of any Parish, the duly licensed Curate or Assistant Minister shall be considered *pro hac vice* a member of the General Committee), and the Lay Deputies elected by the Local Committees as before provided; all such persons being Subscribers to the Society.

Proof of the election of such Deputies by each Local Committee to be the certificate of the Chairman or Secretary thereof.

2. The members of the Executive Committee shall be *ex officio* members of the General Committee.

3. The General Committee shall meet on the two days next previous to the Anniversary Meeting, to make the Annual appropriations of the funds of the Society, and a report of the proceedings of such meeting shall be made at the Anniversary Meeting.

4. The Order of Business in General Committee shall be as follows:—

*Firstly.*—Production of Certificates of Lay Delegates.

*Secondly.*—Secretary's report to be read, and also a report of the proceedings of the Executive Committee for the past year.

*Thirdly.*—Report of the Auditors to be read and laid before the General Committee.

*Fourthly.*—Such appropriations or disposition of the funds to the objects of the Society as a majority of those present may determine.

5. The General Committee shall have power to adjourn its meetings for any special purpose from day to day, or to any day subsequent to the Anniversary Meeting of the Society, by a vote of at least two-thirds of the members present; and to determine, by like vote, the place where such adjourned meeting shall be held, provided that in every such case, a report of such adjournment, and the cause therefor, shall be made at the Anniversary Meeting.

The Clergy are requested to preach annually two Sermons in their respective Churches, with a collection on each occasion, for the general purposes of the Society.

### RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE BOARD OF HOME MISSIONS.

Whereas, it is desirable for the better provision for the ministrations of the Church in the Diocese of Fredericton, that there be a systematic and permanent plan for the payment of the stipends of Missionaries; therefore resolved,—

1. That in order to encourage the established Missions to become gradually self-supporting, all grants made by or through this Society in aid of Missions (not including stipends secured to any of the elder Clergy on the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel grant during life) shall from henceforth be made conditional on the contribution by the Mission itself of a stated sum towards the Missionary's stipend.

2. That all grants made by the General Committee be made subject to these Resolutions, and be distributed under the direction of the Board of Home Missions, who shall have at all times all such and like powers and rights with respect to the same, or any of them, as the General Committee of the Society would have if in Session.

3. That the Board of Home Missions annually present to the General Committee of the Society, on the first day of their meeting, a full and detailed account of all business transacted during the expired year, and also a list of grants recommended for the ensuing year, with the conditions to be annexed to each, and shall also report to the Executive Committee at each quarterly meeting thereof.

4. That on the approval by the General Committee of the grants recommended for the year, the same shall forthwith pass into operation on the basis of the foregoing Resolutions, and subject to the following regulations:—

(a.) The Board of Home Missions (acting in conjunction with the Lord Bishop) shall forthwith, after the annual meeting, communicate with the Wardens or other Lay Members of the Church, in each Mission, requiring them to enter into engagements (A) with the Society, to contribute the sum required of the Missions for the year.

(b.) Should such engagement not be entered into to the satisfaction of the Board before the 15th day of August then next, they shall communicate with the Missionary, requiring him to give each of his congregations notice (B) of withdrawal of all payments as a Missionary receiving stipend through this Society on 1st October then next, unless the engagement be meantime completed.

(c.) Should such engagement not be entered into to the satisfaction of the Board before the 1st of October then next, all payments to the Missionary's salary, through the Society, shall be withdrawn, and no stipend shall thereafter be payable in respect thereof: Provided that should the Missionary see fit to resign his cure, he shall, if stationed for the remainder of the year by the Lord Bishop in any vacant Mission which may be willing to comply with the terms required of the defaulting Mission, be entitled, in respect of the services to be rendered in such new Mission, to such stipend as may be agreed upon between such Missionary and the Board, not exceeding that provided for the continuation of his services in his former Mission, and upon the like terms and conditions. Provided, also, that any such Missionary, if not so appointed to any new Mission, may nevertheless be permitted by the Board, on special application, to draw on 1st of April for a sum in their discretion; but not exceeding his previous quarter's stipend from the Society.

(d.) Where such engagement is entered into, the Board shall forthwith notify the Missionary, who shall thereupon (unless the terms of such engagement shall not be fulfilled as hereinafter provided) be entitled to draw upon the Society for the full amount of his quarterly salary, including therein the sum required for the quarter of the Mission itself.

(e.) The sum required of the Mission shall in such case be remitted by the Wardens quarterly in advance to the Treasurer, and may consist either of money or written receipts of the Missionary, for produce furnished to him at the market rates: Provided, that two months' grace (but no more) may be allowed the Mission to make up such sum; that is to say, the sum required for the quarter of the ensuing year, ending 30th October, shall be remitted before the 1st September, and for the following quarter before the 1st December next.

(f.) Should the Missionary give any such written receipt for produce, he shall keep a record thereof, and shall make his next quarter's draft for such sum only as shall be due him, after he shall be debited with such receipts in the Treasurer's books.

(g). Should the sum required from the parish not be remitted as aforesaid, the Treasurer shall forthwith, on the expiration of the two months' grace, give notice (C) to the Missionary, requiring him to give notice (D) of withdrawal of stipend as such Missionary, and all such stipend shall be thereupon withdrawn pursuant to such notice; and unless the sum agreed to be paid for the quarter shall be forthwith remitted, no stipend shall be payable for such expired quarter beyond the amount agreed to be contributed on the part of the Society; and none whatsoever for the succeeding quarter: and the Board shall appoint a deputation to inquire into the causes of such default, and shall report thereon at the next meeting of the General Committee.

Provided that in any case, on a Mission ceasing to be in default, though after the period for withdrawal of the stipend shall have arrived, such Mission may be reinstated by the Board if they shall see fit so to do, under the regulations and conditions herein contained.

(h.) In case of the Missions where the Missionary's stipend is secured for life on the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel grant, the Board shall call on the Wardens to enter into the prescribed engagement only in case of the demise of the present Missionary; and those Missionaries shall continue to draw their stipends as heretofore accustomed, unless any shall voluntarily come within the general system adopted for other Missions.

(i.) It shall be optional with the Board to permit any Mission to make a quarterly, half-yearly, or yearly payment at any period in advance, and these regulations, *mutatis mutandis*, shall thereupon apply, generally, to any such Mission.

(k.) The Board shall have full power and authority to make all such further bye-laws, rules, and regulations as may in their opinion be required for their guidance, and from time to time to alter or amend the same as they shall see fit.

5. That in every case of a Clergyman receiving a stipend through this Society, he shall be required to make to the Secretary of the Society, according to such form as the Board of Home Missions may from time to time require, half-yearly, on or before the first days of December and June in each year, a return for the preceding half year, shewing—

(1.) The general limits of his Mission.

(2.) The extent thereof in square miles.

(3.) The estimated number of members of the Church of England living therein.

(4.) The number of Churches, Chapels of Ease, and Missionary Stations respectively, within the Mission.

(5.) Whether or not there is therein a parsonage house belonging to the Mission or provided by the people.

(6.) The extent of the Church and Glebe Land connected therewith.

(7.) The income from such Church or Glebe Land for the year ending 1st April last.

(8.) The amount contributed therein towards the support of the Missionary, from sources other than the grant through this Society.

(9.) The number of public services on Sundays and in the week respectively.

(10.) The average congregation in each place of worship.

(11.) The number of Communicants.

(12.) The number of Baptisms.

A. Infants.

B. Adults.

C. Total.

(13.) The number of Communicants.

A. Added.

B. Removed.

C. Deceased.

D. Present Members.

(14.) The number confirmed.

(15.) Marriages.

(16.) Burials.

(17.) Names of Church Wardens.

(18.) Names of Lay Delegates to Diocesan Church Society and Synod.

(19.) The number of scholars and teachers in Sunday School.

Which returns shall be laid before the Board of Home Missions forthwith, and before the General Committee on the first day of their meeting; and no grant shall from henceforth be payable to any Missionary in default of rendering any such statement or return so long as such default shall continue.

6. That the Board of Home Missions shall, so soon as may be, after the first day of December in each year, make up from such returns, the printed returns and statement required annually by the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, and forward the same, reporting specially to the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel any Missionary who may be in default.

7. That those of the Clergy within the Diocese, not receiving stipends through this Society, be requested to forward to

the Secretary in like manner, on or before the first day of June in each year, the returns numbered 1, 2, 3, 4, 9, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18 and 19, in order that a complete return of the Diocese in these particulars, may each year be published with the Society's Report, as hath been heretofore in part only accustomed.

8. That the Board of Home Missions, in conjunction with the Lord Bishop, shall appoint deputations of Clergymen and Laymen for each Deanery, which each deputation shall visit, for the purpose of holding Missionary Meetings in the several Missions, and taking up collections thereat (not interfering, however, with the usual semi-annual collections, and annual canvass of the Mission on behalf of the Society); and further, of making enquiries as to the power of the Mission to contribute towards the Clergyman's support; such deputations reporting to the Board, and through them to the General Committee of the Society.

9. That the Board of Home Missions, in conjunction with the Lord Bishop, may further appoint special deputations to inquire into the causes of any deficiency of contributions or other pecuniary difficulties in any Mission, and shall have power to call for any returns they may think proper from any of the Parishes receiving aid from or through the Society.

10. That the Lord Bishop be respectfully requested to transmit a copy of these Resolutions to the Venerable Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, requesting their concurrence therein.

11. The Board of Home Missions shall have power, with the approval of the Lord Bishop, to make any grant that the funds may allow in aid of any Mission not already receiving aid, upon such conditions as they may arrange; such grant to terminate, in every case, on the 1st July next ensuing.

12. That a certificate be added to the parochial agreements, which shall be signed by the representatives of the Mission, declaring that the amount given by the Mission is a *bona fide* contribution, and that no part is derived from the rent of glebes or the interest of investments—the property of the Mission.

13. That the Board of Home Missions shall have power, with the approval of the Lord Bishop, if there be available funds, to make a grant not exceeding \$100, to aid in the building of any Parsonage House, when it shall be certified that such grant will complete the building free of debt.

## PROVISION FOR THE WIDOWS AND ORPHANS OF THE CLERGY.

### RULES AND REGULATIONS.

The following plan for a provision for the Widows and Orphans of the Clergy, with the Rules and Regulations annexed, was adopted by the General Committee. (See 36th Report.)

1. The Church Society of the Diocese of Fredericton in the Province of New Brunswick, shall have a special Fund, to be called "THE CLERGY WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND," which shall consist of the present capital held by the Society for this object (subject to its present liabilities) of all subscriptions, donations, legacies, devises, and bequests, and other contributions given and paid to the Society for this special purpose, and of all payments received under these Rules; and this Fund shall be applied to the assistance of the families of deceased Clergymen, in accordance with these Rules, and to no other object.

2. Every Clergyman in this Diocese, duly licensed, whose widow is not already entitled to a pension from the SOCIETY FOR THE PROPAGATION OF THE GOSPEL, wishing to share in the benefits of this Fund, shall within six months from July 5, 1871, or within one year from receiving Holy Orders, or from his admission into the Diocese, apply to the Secretary of the Fund, for a certificate, and shall thenceforth pay annually the sum set opposite his age in the annexed scale. Any applicant after such period of time, shall only be permitted to receive a certificate at the option of the Executive Committee of the Church Society, and upon such terms as they shall direct.

3. Every Clergyman, being a member of this Fund, shall make and forward to the Secretary a yearly collection from every congregation in his Parish or Mission. Assistant Curates, serving under a Rector, or other Assistant Clergyman, shall not, however, be required to make a collection, but shall forward only their own annual payment.

4. All payments shall become due on the first day of January, in each year, and must be paid within thirty days: and all congregational collections must be sent in before the first day of May. If this Rule is not complied with, the certificate shall be considered as forfeited, but may be regained at the option of the Committee, and the applicant shall pay for the new certificate at the rate payable at the age when the same is taken out,

according to the annexed scale, together with such sum as the Executive Committee may require in lieu of payments and subscriptions in arrear.

5. Upon compliance with the above Rules, the DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY undertakes to pay out of "The Clergy Widows' and Orphans' Fund," a yearly pension of One Hundred Dollars to the Widow of each Clergyman holding a certificate, during the widowhood.

6. If the Widow die, or marry again, the pension shall be paid towards the support of such children of the deceased Clergyman as may be under the age of eighteen years. In this case, when the youngest child shall have attained this age, the pension shall cease.

7. The Trustees named in the Will of a Clergyman shall be recognized by the Committee, in the event of the death or marriage of his widow, and shall receive the pension, to be applied by them for the support of the child or children; but if the Trustees so named are unwilling or unable to act, or if Trustees should not have been named, then the Bishop of the Diocese shall himself act, or in writing appoint a Trustee to act, in the application of the pension.

8. If the wife die before the husband, his child or children shall at his death receive the pension, under the limitation as to age expressed in Rule 6.

9. No certificate shall be issued to any Clergyman over the age of sixty years, who is not already in the Diocese at the time of the formation of these Rules; but any Clergyman already in the Diocese, over the age of sixty years, and whose widow is not entitled to a pension from the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, shall be admitted a member of this Fund, on making the annual payment for the age of sixty years, and otherwise complying with the Rules.

10. If a Clergyman removes, with the Bishop's consent, from the Diocese, after officiating in it not less than ten years, he shall be allowed his claim upon the Fund, on continuing his yearly payment, and the amount of the average annual collection from the Parish or Mission, being a sum not exceeding Forty Dollars in all.

11. If a Clergyman is unable to continue his public ministrations, through sickness or accident, upon the production of a medical certificate testifying the same, he may continue his connection with the Fund, upon making his yearly payment.

12. Any Clergyman degraded or suspended from the ministry, or any widow or orphan who shall not be in communion

with the Church of England, shall be entitled only to such payments as the Executive Committee shall prescribe.

13. The Treasurer of the DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY shall be Treasurer of this Fund, and shall, from time to time, under the direction of the Loan Committee, invest every hundred pounds of surplus money, and add the same to the capital of the Fund. A yearly detailed statement of the income, payments, and invested money, shall be published in the Annual Report of the Diocesan Church Society.

14. The pension shall be payable half-yearly, on January 1, and July 1, in each year; the first payment to be calculated for the interval from the death of the insured to the day of payment.

15. The Secretary of this Fund shall be appointed by the Executive Committee, and it shall be his duty to issue certificates, receive payments, donations and collections, which he shall hand to the Treasurer every quarter, or oftener, if required by him.

16. None of the above Rules shall be altered, except at the Annual Meeting of the General Committee of the DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY, after a full year's notice of the proposed change.

### RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE DIVINITY SCHOLARSHIPS' FUND.

1. The Divinity Scholarships' Fund shall consist of the amount already appropriated thereto, of all accumulations of interest, and of all subscriptions, legacies, collections and other contributions given to or applied by the Society for this special object; and the interest of this Fund shall be applied solely for the purposes of the Second Object of the Society, as hereinafter provided.

2. The Treasurer of the Diocesan Church Society shall, from time to time, under the direction of the Executive Committee, invest every \$500 of surplus money of this Fund, and add the same to the capital of the Fund.

3. The entire management of the Fund in all other respects shall be, and hereby is, vested in the Board of Home Missions.

4. No grant shall be made from such Fund until the capital thereof, shall, by accumulation or otherwise, have reached the sum of \$1200, nor shall the grant or grants thereafter to be made exceed in any one year the interest on the capital of such Fund for the year.

5. Every such grant shall be of a sum not exceeding \$200 per annum, and shall be tenable for such a period, upon such terms or conditions, and at such collegiate institutions, as the Board of Home Missions shall, subject to the approval of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese, determine.

6. The choice of divinity scholars shall be made by the Board of Home Missions, subject to the Lord Bishop's approval.

7. The Secretary of the Board of Home Missions shall be the Secretary of this Fund, and he shall conduct all correspondence, and perform such other duties in connection therewith, as the Board may direct.

8. The above Rules may be altered only by the General Committee of the Diocesan Church Society after a year's notice of the proposed change.

## RESOLUTIONS OF THE GENERAL COMMITTEE.

That in future, no application for grants shall be considered which is not made on the first day of the meeting of the General Committee, or previously.

That when a missionary is absent from his Mission on account of ill health, with leave from the Lord Bishop, his Lordship be authorized in his discretion, to pay to him the whole or any part of the sum granted for such Mission.

That all grants by this Committee for Missionary salaries, and all sums placed at the disposal of the Lord Bishop, shall be for the service of the fiscal year in which the grants are made, and shall expire with it.

That all vouchers for the payment of any sum of money whatever, must bear on the face of them the authority under which they are paid, and the period for which they are claimed, together with the services performed.

That for the future, the Clergy and other collectors of the funds of the Diocesan Church Society, be required, in their list of subscribers handed to the Secretary for publication in the Report, to insert in such lists the names of such persons only as have paid the amounts subscribed.

*Whereas*, The grants made by the Diocesan Church Society from its annual income (exclusive of the grants received from the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel), are made in aid of local contributions for the support of the several Missions :

*Therefore Resolved*, That in future, grants from this Committee will be made mainly with reference to the ability of the members of the Church in the several Parishes to support their own clergymen—the amount of local contributions for Church objects in such Parishes, and the sum paid in aid of the general objects of the Society.

That all bequests made to the Society be funded, as heretofore, and the interest only applied to the general or special purposes for which they are bequeathed.

*Whereas*, in consequence of the limited means at the disposal of the Society, and the great necessity for new and extended work, it has become of great consequence that all local glebes

and other endowments of Parishes should be fully utilized. Therefore,

1. *Resolved*, That the Board of Home Missions be authorized to require from the Church Wardens of every Parish or Mission receiving aid from the Society, full details of all such glebes, church lands, and other investments, yearly or oftener, as they shall see fit.

2. That if it shall appear that any part of the income from the glebes or investments held for the Rector's use, is taken to make up the sum required by the Society from the Mission, the Board may forthwith increase the amount required in proportion thereto; and in case of neglect on the part of the Rector or Church Wardens to collect the interests or rents, the Board be authorized to inquire into the matter, and, if there be sufficient cause, suspend the grant to the Mission until the management be made satisfactory to the Board of Home Missions.

That the Secretary of Diocesan Church Society be requested to furnish the Treasurer with a minute of contributions, reported from every Parish or Mission, specifying the amounts payable to general and special funds; that the amounts so returned be charged by the Treasurer to each Parish or Mission in a book to be kept for the purpose, and that a detailed statement of all contributions then remaining unpaid, be rendered by the Treasurer to the Executive Committee, for their action in the matter, at the October meeting and each meeting thereafter, so long as any amount shall continue in arrear.


That every Missionary be requested to furnish annually to the Treasurer of the Diocesan Church Society the name of the Secretary of each Local Committee.

That hereafter, one yearly return only be required from each Missionary in place of the two half-yearly returns as at present; this return to embrace all the information required by the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel and the Diocesan Church Society.

That all Rules and Regulations made by the General Committee be printed in each Annual Report.

That the certificates of the lay delegates be sent to the Secretary at least ten days before the meeting of the General Committee, to enable him to report to the meeting at its opening the names of those qualified, and that his report shall be accepted as *prima facie* evidence of qualification.

## REPORT.

---

FOR a period of over thirty years the Annual Meetings of the Society have been held, with the Lord Bishop of the Diocese in the chair. His presence and counsel have always been invaluable, and this Society has ever received his warmest support. While the clergy and delegates may well feel the Bishop's absence, and the want of his experience and advice, they will rejoice at the opportunity which is being afforded to his Lordship of joining in the deliberations of the Lambeth Conference, and also of well earned rest and recreation among friends in the mother country.

The present financial condition of the Society is not so favorable as it ought to be. From the Accounts of the Treasurer, it will appear that the balances overdrawn through appropriations of the last two years have been provided for, and that at the close of the fiscal year there were funds sufficient to meet all claims on the Special and General Purposes Account. But it must be observed that these deficiencies have been supplied by proceeds of legacies, and not from ordinary income. Owing in part to the latest calamitous fires by which the city of St. John and other towns were visited a year ago, the sum total of the contributions last year fell short, of the usual amount, to the extent of nearly \$1000. It is much to be feared that there will be a corresponding decrease in the Account for the current year. Moreover the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, so untiring and generous in aiding the missionary work in this Diocese, will largely reduce their appropriation for the present year.

There had been good reason to anticipate that, on the payment of the legacies above referred to, some addition could have been made to the limited stipends of the clergy, and more ample means supplied for new missionary work. Sad

disappointment awaits all such hope, unless the members of the Society are led to continue and increase their annual offerings or endeavor to add to the number of subscribers. As the matter now stands, the Society can do little more, with all its disposable funds, than maintain the missions already on the schedule.

It must be admitted that the time has come when new and long favored parishes should do more by the way of local support, and *voluntarily* relinquish a portion, at least, of what they receive from the funds of the Society. There are many ways, especially in the country districts, by which the members of the Church could aid in the support of the clergy more than they do. If only what is generously done in some missions, was done in all, there would soon be means at the disposal of the Society for carrying out its objects and purposes with greater efficiency.

The following abstract is commended to the careful attention of every member of the Society. It speaks not only of what has been offered by the various missions for the Treasury of the Lord, but most of all it gives some outline and idea of the work which is being done in His name.

ANDOVER.—Rev. L. A. Hoyt has enclosed the following Report:—

“As an impression seems to have grown that I have adopted the motto of the horseleach’s daughter, I shall this year give you a rest, only asking to continue the grants you have made in the past, and thanking you on behalf of the Missions of Wicklow, Edmonston, Grand Falls, New Denmark and Aberdeen, for the generosity extended to them.

The difficulty which presented itself respecting Edmonston and Grand Falls last year, has been solved. The Gordian knot was cut, and the two halves will, I am sure, be a successful and satisfactory Mission. On my arrival at this Mission, seven years ago, I was told that there was no Parsonage, but that a fund had been raised for the purpose. This fund, I ascertained, amounted to sixty-eight dollars and twenty-three cents. In the amount of work I have had in hand, I have had little time to attend to this matter. But this year I have been enabled to purchase at a great advantage a building and premises, very suitable for a parsonage, and the Parish is struggling to free it from all encumbrances.

Last winter I made a new departure in the way of providing services for the lumbermen. It is well known by many country missionaries that their congregations in the winter dwindle to almost nothing. The men are in the lumber woods and the roads are scarcely kept open. I resolved to go where the men were, and find my congregations there. With this intention I went to a large operation on the Mamozekel, about twenty miles beyond the residence of my farthest parishioner, and about eighty miles from home. The heartiness of the service and the generous welcome accorded me, repaid me for my trouble. In the morning, service was held at the Forks of the Mamozekel. About forty

were present, assembled around the camp fire, all joining in the prayers of the Church, or reading the Psalms of David in responsive strain; it was a sight not soon to be forgotten. The singing of the hymns by entire male voices had a telling effect. In the afternoon we met around another camp fire at the left hand branch of the Mamozekel. Here we chanted the Magnificat to "Boyce" and the Nunc Demittis to "Tallis." The whole service was very effective, and proves beyond a doubt, that whether in the cultivated city or in the unbroken forest, the church with her ritual is adapted to satisfy the requirements of all classes. The congregation made an offering of ten dollars as a mark of thanks for this opportunity of worshipping God publicly during the long winter in the lumber woods.

I have been very fortunate in securing the services at Grand Falls of the Rev. G. C. V. Eastman, from Vermont, an experienced priest and a judicious and faithful worker, whose services I hope will be retained.

I fear we shall not be able this year to bring up our contributions to the general amount, as we are affected not only by exceedingly hard times, but are making extra efforts to pay for our Rectory."

BATHURST.—Rev. Henry W. Street writes as follows:—

I am using every exertion to meet any deficiency in the subscriptions for this year, and even yet hope to do better than that, by reporting next week an increase.

Financial matters in this County are far from bright. Cash, owing to the system under which business is conducted, is scarcely circulated. Yet much can be done when there is not only the will, but where also the Scriptural method is carried out of laying by in store our weekly offerings to God. It is astonishing what a prejudice some people have to thus analyzing the proportion they give through the year to God. Possibly they would then be compelled to recognize the total want of sacrifice and self denial in their offerings.

I have been urging the abolishment of the objectionable subscription list as a means of church support, and only trust the people will have the good sense to adopt the better method.

The Society is familiar with the difficulties of Church work in this extensive mission, and well proud should every Missionary be who has to serve it. The enterprise shown of late by the Society, in the division of extensive missions would, years ago, have conduced to the interest of the Church here. At "Salmon Beach" and "New Brandon," the descendants of Churchmen have, for the most part, gone over to the Methodists, and in the town of Bathurst, as well as elsewhere, intermarriage and other causes have helped to weaken our ranks. A new Parish Church has been under weigh, or I should rather say stationary for some years. A difference of opinion as to the site has interfered with my obtaining the necessary means to help in completing it; nearly \$2000 will, I suppose, be required. It is a work I have had very much at heart, for I am conscious that the present dilapidated building is a serious stumbling block in the way of Church growth in the parish. Something must be done, though the struggle to raise means, under the present circumstances, will be very great. Kind friends elsewhere must lend us a helping hand, or the Church must suffer.

BURTON AND LINCOLN.—Hon. R. D. Wilmot writes, that the subscriptions, when completed, will amount to at least \$50 and probably more. During the past year the Church has been painted inside and externally.

CAMBRIDGE.—Rev. Benjamin Shaw reports contributions to the amount of \$74.70.

CAMPOBELLO.—Rev. Cecil P. Wilson writes as follows:—

As I have not been in the Parish for a full year, there has been but one collection for the Diocesan Church Society; yet, notwithstanding, the contributions at the present time amount to \$88.50, including the sum of \$14 for the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel.

Mrs. Robinson Owea has munificently presented a most excellent and con-

venient plot of ground to enlarge the Church yard, and not only has this to be fenced in, but the fence which surrounds the present ground is so decayed that it must be renewed. Happily, there seems every disposition on the part of my people to protect and care for the burial place of their forefathers. We have at present £90 towards this important work, and there is every prospect of its being done this year. The Church cannot, under God, be too grateful to Mrs. Robinson Owen, for the works which she "has showed forth for His Name's sake."

The Sewing Circle, which was organized five years ago by Miss Robinson Owen, last year built a commodious porch for the Sunday School Room. This year they are assisting towards defraying the expenses of the new fence to be erected round the Church. It may not be uninteresting to some to be informed that last year the work of the Circle realized \$42.66, and that during the last five years the large amount of \$394.75, derived from the same source, has been expended for Church purposes.

I may add, that I have experienced the utmost kindness from all with whom I have come in contact, and cannot speak too highly of the zeal and earnestness of the congregation.

CANTERBURY.—Rev. T. Hartin reports contributions to the amount of \$40.

CHATHAM.—Rev. D. Forsyth has forwarded the following report :—

I have very great pleasure in reporting an increase in the amount of contributions to the General Purposes of the Diocesan Church Society for the present year. The half yearly offering on Trinity Sunday more than doubled in amount any former collection for the same purpose, and notwithstanding the prevailing commercial depression, several very gratifying increases have been made in the subscriptions.

At a late Missionary meeting held in St. Mary's Chapel Sunday School House, the following resolutions were passed unanimously :

1st.—*Resolved*, That the Local Committee of the Diocesan Church Society in this Parish realizes the value of the inestimable blessings which it is the purpose of the Diocesan Church Society to extend to all parts of this Diocese, and that this Committee desires to acknowledge its debt of gratitude to Almighty God for continual participation in these blessings.

2nd.—That in the opinion of this Local Committee, the sentiments expressed in the foregoing resolution should be practically exhibited in the liberality of contributions to the general purposes of the Diocesan Church Society, and that it is the duty and privilege of all Churchmen to give of their substance towards the glory of God and the extension of His kingdom.

3rd.—That in consideration of the rapidly extending Missionary work of the Church in this Diocese, and the consequent increased demands upon the funds of the Diocesan Church Society, and in consequence of the withdrawal of aid from the venerable Society for the Propagation of the Gospel—which aid this Local Committee desires fully to acknowledge ; Therefore *Resolved*, That every effort be made to secure increased contributions to the funds of the Diocesan Church Society in the present year.

Since my last Annual Report, the Parish Rectory has been completed and the grounds enclosed with suitable fencing. Some progress has also been made

in preparation for a work of the greatest importance for the welfare of the Church in this Parish, viz.: the refurnishing and ultimate re-erection of St. Mary's Chapel. Our first efforts have been directed towards refurnishing the Chapel with free and unappropriated seats. At a late meeting of the congregation the principle of free seats was unanimously endorsed, and a committee was appointed to ascertain the cost of the proposed change, and to report at a subsequent meeting. I earnestly pray for the early consummation of a work which I am certain will meet with Divine approval and blessing and be a valuable instrument in the development of devotional life and Scriptural worship amongst us.

Through the laudable and untiring endeavors of the ladies of the congregation, a fund has been accumulating for the purchase of a new organ, which I trust we will soon possess in connection with the aforementioned improvements. I pray that all these works may be accomplished in a manner acceptable in the divine sight, and I trust that the gradual development of the system of Sunday free-will offerings is a certain evidence of a desire to return to God for His glory and worship His just proportion of what He has committed to our stewardship.

For the kind and successful help of those ladies who have collected the contributions to the Society, and for all and many valued encouragements from my people, I am thankful to him by whom I trust they may be everlastingly rewarded.

Contributions amount to \$330.28.

DALHOUSIE.—Rev. J. H. S. Sweet writes as follows:—

Since my institution into the incumbency of this Parish I am happy to report that all has been going on favorably and satisfactorily. In connection with Dalhousie I have charge of Campbellton and a little English colony, called the Balmoral Settlement; the former is about sixteen, the latter twelve miles away. I found, when I arrived last August, that no regular services had been carried on in either of these places. I am therefore glad and thankful to be able to report that we have now a regular constituted service at Campbellton every fortnight, and every fourth Sunday at Balmoral. We have no church building of any description at Campbellton, and so, by the kind permission of the Trustees, hold service in the Methodist Chapel. The congregation is not large, but the few I think take a decided interest in our beautiful and ancient Liturgy, and are already talking about building a church of their own. At a meeting of the Church Members last September, at which the Rev. T. Dowling was present, the people decided to subscribe \$80 (eighty) a year towards the general assessment of the Parish. This we thought good as a beginning.

The people at the Balmoral Settlement are far too poor (many struggling for existence) to do anything as yet in a financial point of view. They are always, however, very pleased when I appear among them, and enjoy the services of the church immensely. In time, I have no doubt, the church will be able to make a firm stand among these colonists, and in a year or two, perhaps, they will be able to subscribe their mite towards the clergyman's stipend.

The pretty church in Dalhousie has received one or two additions during the year. H. A. Johnston, Esq., made and presented to the church as an Easter offering a substantial and handsome rood screen. This, together with a four-branched chandelier, recently hung in the Chancel, and an illuminated text round the arch, adds very considerably to the general effect.

The people are making an effort to erect a parsonage, but as they are very few, I am afraid they will find it very difficult unless they receive considerable outside help. We have a suitable site adjoining the Church, and the frame of the building is already up, waiting to be boarded in. As the congregations in connection with the parish are very small, a good house will be the only means of securing to this northern mission the services of a resident clergyman.

We have soon a very great loss to deplore. W. J. Smith, Esq., who for many years has been one of the greatest supporters of the church here—an earnest christian and regular communicant—is about to remove with his family

for "pastures new." This removal will sadly thin our numbers, and lay a heavy burden upon the remaining to meet all necessary expenses. We must not, however, despond, but trust that He who has provided for this, His little flock in the past, will still watch over them, and in the truest and most lasting sense, "Supply all their need."

My Register marks—*Marriages*, 1; *Baptisms*, 23; *Burials*, 2.

My annual list of subscriptions is not yet complete, but I hope to forward between \$20 and \$30 to the Society.

**DERBY.**—Rev. Aug. F. Hiltz reports contributions to the amount of \$102, and has enclosed the following report:—

I am glad to be able to report encouraging progress in the various missions under my care. By casting off, in a measure, some of the most remote stations, I have been able to give more attention to work nearer home with more satisfactory results than would have occurred, if my efforts had been expended upon a more extensive field of labor. By holding three services every Sunday, I can greatly increase the ministrations of the Church for the congregations at the two Churches and two Stations to which I mostly confine my attention, and can thereby consolidate them into more closely organized bodies. With regard to Ludlow, where there are a few families weakly attached to the Church, I would respectfully suggest that it is too remote from head-quarters to permit me to give it such attention as would be profitable, viz.: as would strengthen their attachment to the Church and build them up into a congregation that might at a future day become the nucleus of a new Parish. Unless this can be done, labor, in my opinion, bestowed there might be more advantageously expended elsewhere. I could, however give them four visits yearly, and if the missionaries at Stanley and St. Mary's would do likewise, a monthly service might be provided for them, and their hearts cheered, until the way could be opened for placing a missionary in their midst.

In my immediate vicinity the work of the Church has been reviving and the interest in it increasing. A new foundation, costing \$120, has been placed beneath the parish Church of Derby, steps are in contemplation for doing the same for the Church at Blackville, as well as painting it, and before the ensuing winter, if our efforts are successful, the Rectory will have been completed. Four Sunday Schools have also been established for catechising the children, and libraries in connection with some of them will soon be procured. For such fruits of his labor, small though they are, the incumbent can only offer his most hearty thanks to the Lord of the Harvest, and pray for still more manifest tokens of his goodness and presence.

**DORCHESTER.**—Rev. R. Simonds writes as follows:—

I really have no report to make in reference to Diocesan Church Society matters in this Parish. I took charge only on Trinity Sunday, June 16th. I trust the usual amount will be contributed to the Society.

The people have received me very kindly, and have done all in their power to make us comfortable at the start. They have provided for the Rector a most convenient and well built parsonage, near the Church, and otherwise very pleasantly situated.

On the two Sundays I have officiated here, I have had a. m. and p. m. services, and have given some attention to the Sunday School, in which there are upwards of forty young people.

This will probably be, in future, the regular routine of public duties; and I hope, with God's blessing, to have to perform the work for many years.

**DOUGLAS AND BRIGHT.**—Rev. W. LeB. McKiel has enclosed a list of contributions from his Missions for 1877. He reports the amount from Stanley for 1877-8, \$23.02, and from Douglas and Bright \$50.

**EDMONSTON, MADAWASKA.**—The Rev. W. Shannon writes, that owing to a serious injury in being thrown from a waggon, on his way to St. Francis, he has been obliged to omit some of his duties. He makes the following report:—

Since the change made in this mission at the last meeting of the Society, at which time Little Falls and Saint Francis were united as one mission, the regular morning and evening services have been held as follows—every third Sunday at Saint Francis, the remaining Sundays at Little Falls.

Having no horse of my own, all my journeys to and from Saint Francis (a distance of thirty-two miles) are by stage. I am obliged to go up there on Thursday, as it is the last day of the week on which the stage goes up, and remain until some time in the following week, the intervening days giving me an opportunity of visiting the people both on this side and on the American side of the river. The arrangement whereby Saint Francis was brought into this mission I consider has been of great benefit not only to those in this Diocese, but also to a great number belonging to the Diocese of the Bishop of Maine, as for years those residing at Saint Francis both on the English and American side of the river have never had any opportunity of attending Divine worship, or of hearing the gospel preached, except it happened to be by some wandering preacher of some dissenting denomination.

I took advantage of an opportunity afforded me this last winter of going where I suppose no clergyman had ever ventured before, some thirty miles above the mouth of the Saint Francis to a place called "Allegash," and there baptized eight children.

The people living there were much pleased at my visiting them, and prevailed upon me to renew the visit, some time during the summer.

The services at Saint Francis at present are held in a large room over Mr. Robert Connor's store, where from eighty to one hundred people can be accommodated, and which room on several occasions has been filled to its utmost capacity, the average attendance being between sixty and seventy. This summer they intend putting up a neat little church, the site of which has already been cleared and most of the lumber on the ground.

At Little Falls church matters are as usual, all the members of the church residing here being regular attendants at the services, which are as yet held in a private building.

The foundation for the church here is completed, and work commenced at framing out the building, which is to be according to a plan kindly furnished by his Lordship the Bishop. They fully expect to have the building completed by fall.

Owing to the efforts being made this year in both parts of the mission to put up and complete their churches, besides making up their amount of my salary, I have found it impossible as yet to raise any contribution for the General Purposes of the Society, but I am in hopes that some time during the summer when I get about again I may be able to raise at least as much as last year.

The number of Baptisms for the past year was seventy-two, fourteen of these being children of parties residing on the American side.

The burials were two, one at Little Falls, the other at Fort Kent.

FREDERICTON.—Rev. G. Goodridge Roberts reports contributions to the amount of \$850.

GAGETOWN.—Rev. James Neales reports contributions to the amount of \$53.52.

GRAND MANAN.—Rev. W. S. Covert reports the usual amount.

GRAND BAY.—Rev. J. W. Milledge writes as follows:—

This small mission on the St. John river has been established about four years, but its growth has been much retarded by the depression existing in the shipbuilding and milling industries.

Services are held in a moulding loft, kindly loaned for the purpose by E. Linton, Esq., and which has been fitted plainly but neatly with all the essentials for the orderly performance of divine worship. Morning prayer and Litany second Sunday in the month at 11 A. M. Evening prayer last Sunday in the month, at 3.30 P. M. Average attendance 34. The collection for the

Diocesan Church Society this year amounted to \$12, and other contributions are promised, which will, in all probability, be paid before the publication of the report.

GREENWICH.—Rev. D. W. Pickett reports \$58.53 as the amount of contributions. Mr. Pickett writes as follows :—

I am glad to report that the increased amount required from the Parish by the Board of Home Missions continues to be made up from year to year, and that the contributions to the General Purposes of the Society will be larger this year than last.

There is but little requiring special mention. The usual services have been held in Greenwich, and also in Wickham, whenever the river could be crossed.

A portion of the original Glebe, which remained unsold, has now been disposed of, and the money appropriated to the payment of the debt on the Parsonage, insurance being effected upon the buildings for the amount.

HAMPTON.—Rev. Canon Walker reports contributions amounting to \$65.39.

KINGSCLEAR.—Lieut.-Colonel Maunsell writes as follows :—

I regret to have to report that the collections for the Diocesan Church Society for the current year for the Parish of Kingsclear have not yet been completed. The following financial statement, however, is submitted to shew the amount already obtained for that Society. Further subscriptions will be duly forwarded to the Treasurer.

I may add that in collecting for the funds of the Diocesan Church Society, as in every good work in our Parish, we never cease to mourn the loss of our late beloved Rector, the Rev. J. F. Carr.

KINGSTON.—Rev. Hastings S. Wainwright has inclosed the following report :

The work for the last twelve months has been steadily performed, three services every Sunday. I have been able to do with the loss only of eleven services through storms and other causes. The whole number of services being 149 on Sundays and 49 on week days. This parish being a very extensive one, with a church population in every corner, requires from the missionary a considerable portion of his time in going from point to point, and though not as persevering a visitor as my people would like me to be, yet I find on reference to my diary that I have travelled over 2600 miles, on roads for the most part by no means pleasant and easy to pass over, in the discharge of my Sunday and parochial duties.

The congregations have on the average been good at churches and stations, 30 baptisms, including one adult, and 10 marriages. And I am sorry to add that the mortality in the parish for the year has been very great. The funerals exceeding the baptisms by six, out of which number (36) 12 were regular communicants. A great loss to any parish, more especially when I remember that many of them were young and active members, and all staunch supporters of the church. But what was our loss I have good ground for hoping was their gain, and so far take consolation in the pious ejaculation of the patriarch, "the Lord gave and the Lord hath taken away; blessed be the name of the Lord."

In February last was organized a Society for raising funds in the least objectionable way, for church purposes, which Society is called the Mite Society in connection with Trinity Church; thanks to an active and earnest band of lady helpers, it has, so far, met with a fair success, considering the tightness of

the times and the frequent calls upon the slender purses of my parishioners; all, without a single exception, being sons and daughters of toil.

The first work to which this fund is to be devoted, will be the painting and repairing of the parish church.

The amount collected for the year for the Home Mission Fund amounts to \$86— which, with our offerings to Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, and Algoma—brings up our list to \$100.

**MONCTON.**—Rev. Edwyn S. W. Pentreath has enclosed the following report :

Notwithstanding a considerable decrease in the population of the town, and much depression in business, I am glad to be able to report that this parish is stronger numerically and financially than it has ever been. The money contributed to the building fund and current expenses is largely in excess of any former year.

I report with great thankfulness the completion of the interior of the Church. The amount expended on it during the past year has been \$1150.00, and all this, with the exception of a grant of £50 from the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, has been raised in the Parish.

During the progress of the work the church was visited by large numbers of persons, and it may be safely said that for design and finish the interior is second to none in the Diocese. The tower and spire are still incomplete. We hope to finish them this summer. I desire to thankfully acknowledge the following gifts :—

McDonald Bros., of Halifax—Two Standards for lighting the chancel.

The amount contributed by the Parish this past year for all purposes has been \$1750.00, of which the Ladies' Society of "Willing Workers," gave \$300.

During the year we have lost the services of Mr. and Mrs. E. B. Chandler, Jr., by their removal to Petittcodiac. The debt of gratitude owed them for their generous and self-denying work for the past twenty years can never be repaid. I fear that our contributions to the Diocesan Church Society will not exceed the \$60.00 for which we are assessed. The Society must kindly make some allowance for us, in consideration of the large amount we have had to raise this year for parish purposes.

**MUSQUASH.**—Rev. Henry M. Spike writes as follows :—

We are making most earnest efforts to increase our subscriptions to the Diocesan Church Society as the claims of the Society are very urgent. I have informed the parishioners that there is a large deficiency in the funds of the Society, and we should make extra efforts to meet it.

The parishioners are making zealous efforts to sustain the work of the church, and to be acquainted with its distinctive principles and apostolic teachings.

We hope to send you between \$60 and \$70 as our contributions to the Society when the list is closed some time next month.

**NEWCASTLE.**—Rev. Herbert Hugh Barber writes as follows :—

The work of the church in this parish during the past year has, I am glad to say, been steadily progressive. Our congregations are larger than they were and much less fluctuating. The number of communions made is more than double that of previous years.

In making a report of the proper appreciation by a congregation of the services of the church, I think we should judge not from the numbers who attend our joyous worship of festival days, but of those who assemble during the more solemn seasons when the services are not so attractive. services during Advent, Lent, and especially Holy Week, were much more numerous than last year. Our Sunday School house has been completed, and the number of our Sunday scholars is gradually increasing.

Respecting Baie des Vents, I am happy in reporting progress here also. During the past year the church has been restored and well painted, as also the churchyard-gates and rails.

The congregations have been large, and the services much more hearty. This last has been greatly enhanced by the organ being brought into use again after a silence of twenty years.

In this part of my parish I have been enabled to establish two new mission stations—one in Escuminac, about fifty miles from Newcastle, once a month; and the other in the Village about eight miles beyond Baie des Vents, twice a month.

In reporting on this part of my parish, I cannot too strongly call the attention of the Board of Home Missions to the importance of making it into a separate mission. The people themselves are anxious to have the services of a clergyman among them, and will gladly do their utmost to support one. It is only through the generous help of a layman, Mr. E. P. Flewelling, that I have been enabled to carry on this work, and here I would most thankfully acknowledge his work.

I am not yet able to close my subscription list for the Diocesan Church Society, &c., but I hope to be able to send the Treasurer \$75.00 more than last year, and thus make a total of about \$200.

**NEW DENMARK.**—Rev. N. W. Hansen writes as follows :—

It affords me great pleasure to report a good attendance at the services of the Church, and good feeling throughout the parish. There is no division among the people, but all belong, professedly at least, to the Church.

The colony is being increased every year by immigrants from Denmark. The children are being educated by me in the principles of the Church of England, and by the time the Danish language will have disappeared, there will be found here a large congregation saved for the church through the instrumentality of the Diocesan Church Society.

Through the aid of the church people, we hope by the blessing of God to have our church ready for consecration by the time of his Lordship's return from England. I have commenced working a little amongst the English people in my neighborhood, and when I have learnt the English language better, I hope to be able to do more.

Last winter I established a Church of England Temperance Society in the Colony, and it is a great satisfaction to me to find that the greater and better portion of the Colony have joined it. Contributions \$15.50. Times are still hard here. If, however, the Society will have patience with us a few years, we hope by the blessing of God to do better.

**NEW MARYLAND.**—Rev. Finlow Alexander writes as follows :—

I have pleasure in reporting the condition of the mission of New Maryland as satisfactory. The number attending the service of the Church has much increased in the last year.

A Sunday School has been established under the superintendence of Mr. Cowie, a Student of Divinity, of whose zeal and affectionate care for his trust, I cannot speak in too high terms.

The collection this year for the Diocesan Church Society will, I trust, be as large as usual.

**NORTON.**—Rev. E. A. Warneford trusts in spite of the continued hard monetary pressure, to make up the usual amount of contributions, viz., \$80. "If," Mr. Warneford adds, "soliciting each and every member of the church in the Parish will advance the cause, it shall be done."

**PETERSVILLE.**—Rev. Joseph Smith has sent the following report :—

The hue and cry throughout has been "hard times!" "money scarce!" and

I am sorry to say, that the amount realized towards the general purposes of the Diocesan Church Society is 88 cents less than that of the previous year, being \$45.90, and the amount for Foreign Missions is \$4.51.

Pressing upon the minds of the people the importance of maintaining their interest in, and relations to the Diocesan Church Society, many see the advantage that will accrue, and readily give in their support; but others—whether from the want of confidence in God's holy cause—or want of a right appreciation of the good work of the Church and the Society, or from fear and love for self, do not gracefully exhibit that godly disposition, "Freely ye have received, freely give."

Here I would make acknowledgment of the various acts of kindness the people have respectfully shown to Mrs. Smith and myself during the year—first in offering to our acceptance a very serviceable buffalo robe, then, by way of surprise, bringing to the parsonage such necessities of life, and also of the kind and hospitable manner they have always bid me welcome to their houses, together with Mrs. Smith, when accompanied by her.

The statistics forwarded with this will be some little index of the Church work in the parish, but the leaven of the gospel, though silently working, is for the present wisely held from us, to bring our faith and patience into exercise, and to make us rely upon Him who said, "what I do thou knowest not now; but thou shalt know hereafter."

POINT DU CHENE, SHEDIAC.—Rev. G. S. Jarvis, D. D., reports contributions from the parish to the amount of \$30.00.

PETITCODIAC.—Rev. Cuthbert Willis writes as follows:—

I beg to report that during the past year the work in the Missions has been carried on under difficulties and somewhat interruptedly owing to my continued loss of vocal power. With the assistance of my brother clergy and of Mr. Wyllie during the whole of Lent, and my lay reader, Mr. Chandler, the services have been fairly kept up and well attended. Mr. Chandler has rendered me most efficient aid as Lay Reader, and since he has taken up his residence in Petitcodiac, has trained the choir, and now superintends the Sunday School. I cannot but feel grateful for his ever ready assistance in every parish work.

I am now in correspondence with several clergymen in the United States, and expect permanent help very shortly.

The subscriptions not yet completed, will, I hope (although the Portage is now in the Mission of Waterford), reach the amount of last year, or about \$70.

PRINCE WILLIAM AND DUMFRIES.—Rev. LeB. W. Fowler reports contributions to the amount of \$35.00.

QUEENSBURY.—Rev. A. H. Weeks writes as follows:—

I have nothing of especial interest to report. Few as we are, and scattered over a large tract of country, travelling takes up a large portion of my time. During the last year storms and bad roads have not interfered with this as much as usual. I have succeeded in organizing several classes for the instruction of young people and children in different parts of my mission. The whole number attending—69. The average attendance about 50. The work has hitherto fallen almost entirely on myself, but there seems to be a prospect of efficient help ere long.

I send \$75.00 to the General Purposes of the Diocesan Church Society.

RICHIBUCTO.—Rev. N. A. Coster reports contributions for the Society as 1.84, apart from nearly \$25 for the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel

Mission and for Algoma. Mr. Coster wishes to induce the Society to continue the allowance the same as last year, towards the mission of Weldford, without calling for additional contributions from Richibucto.

**RICHMOND.**—Rev. Henry H. Neales has enclosed the following report:—

No one can know much of the real prosperity and success in spiritual matters of the work done in any Mission. That remains for the day "When every man's work shall be tried so as by fire."

There are, however, many outward signs of life and progress in a Parish, which are cheering and encouraging to all interested in the work of the church for her great Master. I will mention some of these, as visible in this Mission.

Since my last report, the roll of communicants has increased from 65 to 78, the congregation have continued exceedingly good, and the number of Sunday School Scholars has increased from about 70, as reported last year, to 110.

St. Paul's Church, at South Richmond, has been finished, and a stained glass east window put in, all at a cost of about \$250, of which the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge gave us the liberal sum of \$96. A Sunday School house is in course of building, which will be completed and paid for by the 1st of August. This has been the voluntary work of the people, without any urging, or exertion on the part of the clergyman.

The Rectory and Parish Church have been insured for a term of three years, for \$2,000; also, St. Paul's Church for \$1,000. The sum of \$42 has been contributed for the purpose of securing a communion service, the Lord Bishop having given us a handsome silver pattern.

An old debt of \$75 has been paid off during the past few months.

To make a long story short, the Parish of Richmond has contributed within the last twelve months, about \$1250 for church purposes.

The week day services during Lent were, apparently, well appreciated. The average attendance at the daily morning services, during Holy Week, was 22; while the daily evening services drew a large congregation, which gradually increased until Good Friday evening, when the Church was full, and this at a season when the roads were very poor.

I have to regret the loss of two active Laymen in the work of the Mission—Mr. C. E. Currie has gone to Montana, and Mr. H. B. Montgomery to Fredericton, to continue his preparation as a candidate for Holy Orders. Other good men and true, however, are still with us. Mr. Henry Jameson, for instance, whose aid in the Sunday Schools is so valuable.

Miss Sincock, who has been our very efficient organist for some months past, has been called by duty to another part of the County. Her place, however, has been supplied by one who, I trust, is equally devoted to the service of Christ. The Sewing Society has done, and is still doing a good work for the church.

I should like well to record my hearty thanks for much personal kindness received from my people, during the past year, as well as for the cordial support they have given in the work of the church.

Contributions amount to \$105.

**ROTHESAY.**—Rev. Francis Partridge reports, that the collections and subscriptions from the parish will probably amount to \$200.

**SACKVILLE.**—A subscription list has been enclosed, amounting to \$40.57.

**ST. ANDREW'S AND CHAMCOOK.**—George D. Street, Esq., Secretary of this Committee, reports contributions from St. Andrews, \$122.44; Chamcook, \$47.65—total \$170.09. The usual offerings were made for the Widows' and Orphans' Fund and the Missions of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel.

**ST. GEORGE AND PENNFIELD.**—Rev. Ranald E. Smith, has submitted the following report:—

Hard times—decreasing offertory—failing subscriptions—pew rents uncollected—is our report from Saint George. Never has it suffered such commercial depression. The work in the granite mill suspended—the railroad work

stopped—little being done in lumber. Many persons have been compelled to leave the place. Small though it be, our offertory is our great stand-by.

Notwithstanding this, the "Women's Church Work Association," have furnished the means to thoroughly refurnish the Chancel of St. Mark's Church, and it now presents a church-like appearance. We look forward to further restorations.

Pennfield Parish has not been so much affected by the depression, or if it has, zeal has overcome difficulties. I have a large and increasing congregation there. On Whit-Tuesday I baptized nine children in Christ Church, of ages varying from 11 years to infancy. The number of communicants is gradually increasing. The renovation of the church fabric here has been a great help in building up the spiritual temple, and there is an increasing reverence, a larger attendance, a greater appreciation of the Church's services, and a greater promptness in meeting church dues.

Of late I have held services in a new school-house in another section of my mission, viz., L'Etang. The attendance here was large, the house being filled. Here too, I baptized 13 persons of varying ages, two being adults. There are more to be baptized in July, one being an adult. The people in this district seem to value the privilege of the church's services very highly. Altogether, since my last report, I have baptized 47.

We are doing what we can for the Diocesan Church Society. It has always been well supported in this Mission, owing a great deal to the efforts of my predecessor. If we fall short this year it will not be on account of a diminishing interest in the Society's work, but on account of the severe commercial depression reigning here. We hope our contributions will amount to \$150.

ST. DAVID, &c.—Rev. Joseph Rushton reports that the contributions from this mission will amount to \$40, and writes as follows:—

In making a report of my work in this parish during the past year, I have to acknowledge the universal kindness which I have received at the hands of all the parishioners.

I have not been able to accomplish as much as I desired, for having my own parish in Saint Stephen, I have only been able to give a service on every alternate Sunday in the week, and I have everywhere found a growing desire to have a resident Rector.

During the eleven months I have driven nearly 1500 miles, made 150 parochial visits, held 65 services, baptized 30 persons, and had four funerals.

I shall be very glad to resign the parish if the Society can provide a Rector; if not, I will continue as I have done, to work among the people and give them such services as I possibly can.

I trust the contributions will be at least \$40; the list is not quite completed.

ST. JUDE, CARLETON.—Rev. D. B. Parnter writes, that it has long been his desire to have this parish united to the Diocesan Church Society, and a resolution to this effect was adopted at a late meeting of the vestry. "Having been," Mr. Parnter adds, "since the erection of the church, indebted to the Colonial and Continental Society for an annual grant, we are necessarily bound to remit our yearly collections to this Society. I will, nevertheless, endeavor to raise a small sum for the Diocesan Church Society."

ST. JAMES.—Rev. W. Armstrong reports contributions amounting to \$50. He writes as follows:—

I am sorry not to have any general subscriptions from my parish, but having to make the largest demands I can upon my people for the re-erection of my church destroyed by fire last June, to avoid as much as possible unnecessary debt, I think I am justified in not attempting to make the usual collections, all my parishioners having also experienced great losses from the fire.

ST. MARY'S, &c.—Rev. W. Jaffrey writes as follows:—

Since the division of his mission he has been enabled to devote the whole of his time to the parish of Saint Marys, and with every prospect of satisfactory

results. The people seem to take a greater interest in church matters than heretofore, and although none of his parishioners are wealthy, yet they seem willing to do what they can towards carrying on the good work, and no doubt when they shall have finished their church now in course of erection, they will give a good account of themselves to the Society. At present, however, they can do very little more than collect a sufficient amount of funds for their present necessity.

The amount of subscriptions and collections this year will be about \$40, which, when added to Stanley subscriptions (not yet heard from), will exceed the amount reported last year.

**ST. MARK.**—Mr. T. B. Hanington, Secretary of this Committee, reports contributions to the amount of \$463.35, of which the sum of \$57 is reserved for the Special Widows' and Orphans' Fund, leaving \$406.35 for the General Purposes of the Society.

**ST. MARTINS.**—Rev. J. R. Campbell has forwarded the following report :—

I have had twelve months additional experience of this parish since I last wrote to you. That experience has been chequered, and has proved to me that the desire to have a resident minister under the conditions of contributing \$300 a year, and providing forthwith—as was necessary—a house for the clergyman, was beyond the ability of the people. At first sight, things seemed favorable ; but eight or nine hundred dollars subscribed by the parishioners and friends in Saint John and elsewhere, only served to lead us into, and to cause us to persevere in, an enterprise beyond our resources. The result has been a long continued strain. It might not have been so but for the combined calamities of last June (when the frame for the house was already on the ground), and the subsequent rise in building material and labor, together with the long continued depression of the times. An arrangement, however, was made at the Easter meeting whereby, although for three years to come the local burden on individuals will necessarily be heavy—provision has been made for the final extinction of the debt, so that henceforth another addition may be made to the list of parishes in the Diocese which have a parsonage. This, I believe, makes the thirtieth.

The Society will readily understand that the immediate effect of frequent calls on a people few in number, and almost entirely composed of the mechanical members of the most depressed industries in the country—lumbering and shipbuilding—is not exhilarating. They quite understand the circular of the Secretary of the Board of Home Missions touching the reduced Society for the Propagation of the Gospel grant and lessened Diocesan subscriptions, but they are without the means to give practical expression to what they so clearly understand. However, the Society can count upon our doing what they can.

Whilst the *material* prosperity of the church in this parish has increased very considerably in value during this last year, the building up of the Spiritual Temple has not been neglected.

I reported last year about 25 communicants ; I now return double that number.

**ST. PAUL.**—Mr. T. Barclay Robinson reports contributions to the amount of \$545.77.

**ST. STEPHEN—CHRIST CHURCH.**—Rev. Joseph Rushton reports contributions to the amount of \$30.

**SHEDIAC.**—Rev. G. S. Jarvis, D. D., reports contributions for the general purposes of the Society, \$57, exclusive of offerings for the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel Missions.

**SIMONDS.**—Rev. G. Schofield reports as follows :—

During the year ending June 1st, I have had 39 baptisms, 7 marriages, and 33 burials. The number of deaths in the parish is unusually large, and the number of sick persons who have recovered is also large.

In so widely scattered a parish as this, a large amount of visiting, involving many hundreds of miles of travelling has thus been rendered necessary. But

I do not begrudge this. Indeed I think that at such times the most favorable opportunities present themselves for real usefulness. It is in dealing with individual souls that we can speak most pointedly and personally, and it is on this that I have come to rely very much for a large amount of real usefulness.

At Moosepath I have been assisted as heretofore by my dear friend, G. Herbert Lee, Esq., who is deservedly loved by the people for his works sake, and is worthy of his honored name, "George Herbert."

We had hoped before this to erect our long-expected church there, but the men had no work either at the foundry or the nail factory for about six months in the year, and were thus unable to contribute anything towards the building, and the great fire in St. John on June 20th, made it impossible to obtain aid from the churchmen there, who have always been so ready to help their less wealthy brethren.

We have deposited about \$400 at interest in the Bank of New Brunswick—we have also a promise yet available of \$150 from the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, and we have the piece of land granted by the Diocesan Church Society measured and staked off by the kindness of Hurd Peters, Esq. As soon as times mend therefore we are ready to arise and build. But I would not have it said of me, "This man began to build but was not able to finish."

One very great discouragement in this parish is that very many of our young men and women move away either to St. John or the United States, in search of more remunerative employment. Out of 690 children whom I have baptized, a very large proportion have emigrated, leaving the older people and the children behind them. When our people come to learn that farming is the most healthy and most independent life a man can live they will not so readily be lured away by the attractions of larger cities, but will rather labour truly to get their own living and to do their duty in that state of life unto which it has pleased God to call them.

I have a fortnightly service at Black River, at Loch Lomond, at Golden Grove, at Garnett's Settlement, and (with the assistance of Mr. Lee), a weekly service at Moosepath. I have also a week-day service at Mispeck.

During the year I have conducted public worship 146 times, and the attendance has been on the whole very good.

SPRINGFIELD AND JOHNSTON.—Rev. J. H. Talbot report contributions to the amount of \$80.

SUSSEX AND STUDHOLM.—Rev. Canon Medley makes the following report:—

In sending my report I desire first of all to thank the Board of Missions for the grant which has been made to Waterford, and would inform the Society that with the consent of the Bishop and the Rector of Salisbury, the Rev. C. Willis, a portion of the Mission of Petitcodiac has been joined to Waterford, thus giving it another station church, and also the aid of some more church people. I think, if properly worked, this new and poor mission may eventually prove to be a thriving one, and I hope and believe that the present missionary in charge, the Rev. John Lockward, who has recently come from the Diocese of Newfoundland, is the right man in the right place. If not altogether forgotten I should like to say a word for deserted Albert. Last Advent, in company with the Rector of Springfield, I took upon myself to visit this almost forsaken Mission, and found, in spite of the lapse of some fourteen years since a resident missionary has been stationed there, that church life is by no means extinct. The services which we held were largely attended, and at Hillsboro' which has generally been considered a hopeless place to hold church services in we were not only most hospitably and kindly treated by Mr. Tomkins, the manager of the plaster works, and his son-in-law, Mr. Osman, but were put up for a night by the Methodist preacher, who also gave us the use of his meeting house. And what was better still, we left Hillsboro' with the assurance that if a clergyman was sent to Albert, the sum of \$100 would be given from that one place.

Now I know very well that no blame can be attached to the Church Society

for the neglect of Albert, but I would take upon myself to suggest that if the grant made to that County could be increased for a few years until a parsonage house could be built, and the Mission worked up, the name of Albert might be more frequently heard, and greater inducement given to some clergyman to serve it. I trust this year we shall see one if not two delegates from Albert present at the Church Society meetings, who will be able to describe the urgent wants of the mission more fully than I can, but should they be unable to attend I hope such encouragement will be given to the members of the church in Albert as will lead to their obtaining the services of a resident clergyman without further delay. With regard to my own work in Sussex and Studholm, I can say that the fruits are abundant, and that I anticipate greater results in years to come, if God so wills, since by the setting off the mission of Waterford from my mission the work will be made much more practicable.

I am sorry to say the annual subscriptions to the Diocesan Church Society have not as yet been all paid in, but I think the amount of them will not be less than last year, say \$180.

TRINITY, ST. JOHN.—Rev. Canon Brigstocke, reports contributions to the amount of \$510.08.

UPHAM.—Rev. S. Jones Hanford reports as follows :—

My mission is made up of the parishes of Upham and Hammond—with three churches and three stations, and for the last year I reported—

Baptisms, including one adult .....	25
Marriages.....	7
Burials .....	8

The contributions amount to \$108.57.

I know every effort should be made to increase, and trust that by calling upon as many as I can we shall make up a fair total.

Those to the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel for the year amounted to \$7.

WELDFORD AND KINGSTON.—Rev. W. B. Armstrong hopes to report an amount of contributions equal to if not greater than that of last year. He writes as follows :—

The services in these parishes have been regularly kept up during the past year. The winter was an exceptionally fine one here as elsewhere through the province, though in the breaking up of the cold weather, the roads were almost impassable.

The congregations have been good during the greater part of the year, with the exception of the winter months, when many of the farmers take their horses into the woods to engage in lumber operations. Thus their families, living many of them at a long distance from church, are denied the opportunity of attending divine worship.

We have five Sunday Schools now in operation. The parish being very much scattered we are obliged to have them in different directions. Four of these are in Weldford, and one in Kingston. And here I would take the opportunity of thanking those kind fellow workers, who have so faithfully and perseveringly performed their duty in this part of the Master's vineyard, and without whose self-denying efforts the work could not at all be accomplished.

We have had during the year forty baptisms.

I feel very strongly the disadvantage of living at such a distance from my parish, as in the event of a clergyman living away from his people, a great deal of his personal influence is lost, neither can he take that interest in their affairs which he should.

At present, however, the people of Weldford are not in the position to enable a clergyman to live in their midst.

Contributions for General Purposes \$58.50, for Society for Propagation of the Gospel, \$6.00, Church at New Denmark \$8.00.

WICKLOW.—Rev. J. E. Flewelling reports contributions to the amount of \$40.00, and he writes as follows:—

I am pleased to report an increased interest in church matters during the year, a better attendance at services, and also a heartier appreciation of the church's services.

I have had much to cheer my heart for what has been done. "I thank God and take courage." The spiritual growth of the Church in this mission is only known to the great I AM.

I have received money enough to buy a private communion set for the use of the clergyman officiating in St. Barnabas' Church, and also enough to purchase a public set for the use of this church. On June 11th, which was the second anniversary of consecration of St. Barnabas' Church, and third of the beginning of my work here, we commemorated the day (St. Barnabas') by holding a missionary meeting in the evening in said church, at which stirring addresses were delivered by Revs. L. A. Hoyt, R. M. Edwards of Fort Fairfield, and T. Neales. Although the night was wet yet there was a large attendance. This evening's meeting will be long remembered by both pastor and people.

WESTFIELD.—Rev. E. S. Woodman reports contributions to the amount of \$65.00.

WOODETOCK.—Rev. Thomas Neales writes as follows:—

During the past year the Sunday and week-day services in the churches and at the stations have been regularly held with scarcely an omission. The mission, through the assistance given by the Diocesan Church Society has had the benefit of the services of Mr. W. J. Wilkinson, of the University of New Brunswick and late King's College, Windsor, who has done good work as Lay Reader, and we hope to retain him for at least another year. We have to record the loss of many faithful members of the church who have passed to their rest, no less than eight of whom were regular communicants. Among them our church-warden, G. H. Ketchum, Esq., in whom we lose a kind friend and a zealous member of the church he loved.

Contributions amount to \$280.00.

From the foregoing Reports it will be observed that while apparently more than usual work has been performed by the missionaries during the past year, the sum total of the contributions will again fall short of the required amount.

Now, may it not fairly be asked of every member of the church in this Diocese, is not this work undertaken by the Society one deserving of more zeal and more generous support? In reading the above reports several instances will be noticed in which the duties in parishes and missions are constantly on the increase, calling more and more for additional clergymen. But beyond all the points now reached, often too infrequently, there is that vast field already "white unto the harvest," there are members of the church and others equally dear to Him who would have them cared for, in a state of spiritual destitution. There are church edifices being closed—falling into ruin, the young left uninstructed, the sick unvisited, means of grace withheld.

Mr. Schofield, from the Board of Home Missions, presented and read a report, which on his motion was received, and the recommendations contained therein were referred to the Board to be elected to-day.

Report of the Board of Home Missions for the year ending July 1st, 1878.

During the past year alterations have been made in the terms of grants to various Missions, as follows :

MAUGERVILLE.—The application made from this Mission to the General

Committee for an increased grant having been referred to the Board, was agreed to, and the amount was increased \$40. A deputation was at the same time appointed to visit the Mission, but as yet they have not been able to attend to that duty.

**NEW MARYLAND.**—The amount required from this Mission has been reduced to \$60.

**POINT DUCHENE.**—The grant to this Mission has been increased \$60, and amount required has been reduced to \$340.

**QUEENSBURY.**—The amount required was reduced \$40, and at the same time the people were notified that if the sum of \$160 was not guaranteed for the next year the Board would not recommend a continuation of the grant.

**ST. MARYS.**—Stanley having been separated from this Mission and the people having informed the Board that they were unable to contribute more than \$80 towards the support of the Missionary, it was agreed to receive that sum for this year. Notice was at the same time given that a larger sum would be required hereafter.

**WATERFORD.**—The grant to this Mission has been made \$500, conditional upon a contribution of \$200. This Mission has only had occasional services during the year until the month of June, when the Reverend J. Lockward took charge. Only a small part of the grant will therefore be required.

**WICKLOW.**—The sum required from this Mission has been reduced \$20 and the grant has been increased the same amount.

**WELDFORD.**—The sum required from this mission has been reduced \$50 and the same amount has been added to the grant. At the same time the people of Richibucto were informed that they would be required to make up this sum next year in addition to their present contribution if they continue to receive the services they have had from the Missionary in the past.

**WOODSTOCK AND STATIONS.**—This grant has not been drawn, but \$100 of the amount has been paid to a Divinity Student who has served in the Mission under the direction of the Rector. This grant was made upon condition of the payment of \$100 by the Mission.

The Missions of ALBERT, McADAM and STANLEY being vacant, no part of the grants has been required. The Board have not thought it desirable to recommend a continuation of the grant to McAdam. The grant to Westmorland has not been paid as the people have not entered into an engagement with the Society as required.

**NEW MISSIONS.**—Upon the application of the people a grant of \$200 conditional upon a contribution of a like sum was made to the Mission of Madawaska. The Mission consists of Little Falls, St. Leonards and St. Francis. The grant to Grand Falls was continued upon the former conditions.

Upon the application of the Missionary at ANDOVER for aid to a new Mission to consist of the Parishes of Kent and Aberdeen, which was referred to the Board by the General Committee, a grant was made of \$500 upon condition of a contribution of \$200. The grant has however not been drawn as the Mission has not been supplied.

At the request of the people of SACKVILLE and DORCHESTER, and after full consideration of the representation of the Rector, and with the approbation of the Bishop, the Board have made separate grants to each of these Missions on the following conditions:—Dorchester to contribute \$600 and receive a grant of \$160. Sackville to contribute \$380 and \$160 income from Glebe, and receive a grant \$160. This change involves an increased expenditure on the part of the Society, which the Board hope the General Committee will approve in view of the importance and extent of the work in these Missions. The Rev. Richard Simonds, lately Rector of Burton and Lincoln, has been appointed Rector of Dorchester, and the Rev. R. J. Uniacke, lately of the Diocese of Nova Scotia, has been appointed to Sackville.

The grant made to the new Mission of Stanley has not been drawn owing to the much regretted illness of the Rev. W. O. Raymond, which prevented him going there when appointed by the Bishop.

The grant to DALHOUSIE has been so arranged that the Mission is now held to include Dalhousie and Campbellton, which the Board thought desirable by reason of the increasing importance of the latter Station.

**TRAVELLING MISSIONARY.**—The grant made for a travelling Missionary has not been drawn, as no person has been found to take that office. The Board, recognizing the importance of this work, and knowing the difficulty of securing a person suited to the position, recommend the General Committee to increase the grant to a \$1000 next year.

There being no resident Clergyman in the Mission of St. David, a grant of \$150 was made to the Lord Bishop to defray the expense of occasional services to be given by the Rector of Christ Church, St. Stephen, conditional upon a contribution of \$100 by the people in the Mission. The Board hope that before long this Mission will secure the services of a resident Missionary.

A grant of \$100 upon condition of a contribution of \$60 by the people, was made to a Divinity Student preparing for ordination, and doing duty at St. Andrews and Chamecock, and a grant upon the same terms to a Missionary for duty at Grand Bay and South Bay.

**SPECIAL GRANTS.**—Under the resolution of the General Committee authorizing such appropriations, and upon certain conditions therein stated, the Board have made grants of \$100 each to Chatham and Derby, to complete the Parsonage houses in those Missions. The latter grant has not yet been drawn.

The Board have also made a special grant of \$50 to aid in defraying the travelling expenses of a Missionary coming from the Diocese Newfoundland to take charge of the Mission of Waterford. This is only a provisional grant, which will require the sanction of the General Committee.

In consequence of a letter received from the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel,—a copy of which is attached to this Report—confirming the withdrawal of £225 sterling or about \$1000 currency of their grant, and of the fact that the collections and subscriptions in the Diocese have fallen off about the same amount for the past year, the Board issued to the Clergy a circular containing this information, and requested them to make the same public and urge upon their congregations the necessity of making an earnest effort to sustain the funds of the Diocesan Church Society this year. Were it not for the addition made to the income of the Society by interest on late bequests, all proposals for new work in the Diocese would have to be abandoned for the present, and perhaps a general reduction in grants, already too small, would have been a necessity.

Donations and a special grant amounting to over \$600 have alone prevented a much larger deficiency this year.

The Treasurer's Report shows that a great improvement is necessary in respect of the subscriptions to the Society. Not only have the amounts promised been considerably less than were expected, but the payment in many instances has been far too long delayed. This will appear from the following statement:—

If the members of the Church in the Diocese desire that the salaries of the

Clergy shall be paid when due, it must not be forgotten that to a great extent the matter depends upon the promptness with which subscriptions and collections are forwarded to the Treasurer. The statement submitted shows that in some cases, which the Board hope may be explained, amounts promised at the beginning of the year were not paid until the last month of the same. From five Missions receiving grants from the Society the Treasurer has not received anything. In these cases the Board recommend their grants for next year be made conditional upon the payment of the amount of subscriptions and collections reported and still unpaid for the past year. The Board have much pleasure in reporting that in view of the position of the Society's funds, the Parish of Moncton has for the second time offered to contribute an additional \$40, and accept a corresponding reduction in the grant from the Society.

The estimate of income and expenditure for next year, and the returns, correspondence and minutes of business transacted by the Board during the past year, accompanying this report.

MY DEAR LORD,

Last summer your Lordship wrote to acquaint the Society with the disastrous consequences of the fire in St. John, and requested the Society to postpone for a year the reduction of the grant. The Society could not accede to that request, it would have caused injury in many ways. They therefore sought to raise a special fund, and made a public appeal. This, however, brought in only a little over £20, which was added by our Treasurer to your Special Fund, of which they have advised you. At our last Monthly Meeting when the accounts of the past year had been audited, the Society was in a position to consider the case again. I should to say the result was that a special grant of One Hundred Pounds (£100) was made, and this amount can be drawn at any time. While we must persevere in the reduction of the annual grant as proposed, we hope that by this special gift, your Lordship and the Synod will be enabled to make provision this year for the Clergy whose stipends might have been diminished in consequence of any falling off in the subscriptions received by the Church Society last year in St. John.

On motion of Mr. Jarvis, the following resolutions of which notice had been given in 1876, were adopted.

(6.) *Resolution.*—That the following be the Rules and Regulations of the Fund created in accordance with the Second Object of the Society for the establishment of Divinity Scholarships, and assistance when necessary to those who may be under preparation for the ministry, especially sons of clergymen, to be known generally as "The Divinity Scholarships Fund."

1. The Divinity Scholarships' Fund shall consist of the amount already appropriated thereto, of all accumulations of interest, and of all subscriptions, legacies, collections, and other contributions given to or applied by the Society for this special object; and the interest of this Fund shall be applied solely for the purposes of the Second Object of the Society, as hereinafter provided.

2. The Treasurer of the Diocesan Church Society shall, from time to time, under the direction of the Executive Committee, invest every \$500 of surplus money of this Fund, and add the same to the capital of the Fund.

3. The entire management of the Fund in all other respects shall be, and hereby is, vested in the Board of Home Missions.

4. No grant shall be made from such Fund until the capital thereof shall, by accumulation or otherwise, have reached the

5. Every such grant shall be of a sum not exceeding \$200 per annum, and shall be tenable for such period upon such terms or conditions, and at such collegiate institution as the Board of Home Missions shall, subject to the approval of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese, determine.

6. The choice of the divinity scholars shall be made by the Board of Home Missions, subject to the Lord Bishop's approval.

7. The Secretary of the Board of Home Missions shall be the Secretary of this Fund, and he shall conduct all correspondence, and perform such other duties in connection therewith, as the Board may direct.

8. The above Rules may be altered only by the General Committee of the Diocesan Church Society, after a year's notice of the proposed change.

SOCIETY FOR THE PROPAGATION OF THE GOSPEL IN FOREIGN PARTS.

19, Dela'ay Street, Westminster.

June, 1878.

MY DEAR LORD,

1. I have the pleasure of announcing the amount of assistance which the Society can promise for the year 1879. The terms of the Society's Resolution are :—

(7) That the sum of 2,100*l.* be granted for the Diocese of FREDERICTON in the year ending 31 December, 1879, to be administered by the Bishop and Committee in accordance with the Society's Bye-laws and Regulations : that this grant be also charged with any claims for pensions which may arise in the year and be admitted by the Society ; with any expense

for the passage of missionaries from this country to Fredericton, which may be incurred here in accordance with the Regulations ; and with any other expense strictly appropriate to the diocese and sanctioned by the Society.

Also that the sum of 120*l.* be granted for six *Divinity Exhibitions* at King's College in 1879 : three of 25*l.* each, and three of 15*l.* each. In connection with this grant the Society desires to represent to the College authorities the desirableness of submitting the attainments of the Divinity Students to be tested by the Preliminary Theological Examination conducted under the auspices of the Theological Faculty of the University of Cambridge, of which the Regius Professor of Divinity, Dr. Westcott, is the head.

2. I am instructed to add to the above promise an appeal to the Missionary zeal which we are sure is felt by all true members of the Church, as strongly in Foreign Parts as in England. It is the earnest wish of the Society to exercise whatever influence it possesses in fostering a Missionary spirit among all our brethren, and engaging their sympathy specially in that world-wide work among the heathen to which our Branch of the Church seems to be providentially called. We propose that "*in every Christian congregation which derives help from the Society an Annual Sermon should be preached on the work of the Society, and a Collection should be made in its aid.*" We would further ask you to let us hear, before the end of this year, of any contributions from your diocese which should be printed in our Annual List. We trust that by stirring up the zeal of many hearts in this cause, the advance of the Church of Christ in the world may, by God's blessing, be accelerated.

The Days of Intercession, which, in the last six years, united us all together in common prayer, continue to have many happy results.

4. May we ask your attention to the Report printed on the next page, on the Inadequacy of the Society's annual Income ? Can you, without serious injury to the diocese, relieve the Society of any charge for Missions or Parishes which have received aid for nine years or longer ? If you think you cannot, will you kindly state the circumstances which lead you to that conclusion ? The Society's object is simply to transfer to new work any funds which are not absolutely needed for old

#### REPORT ON THE INADEQUACY OF THE SOCIETY'S INCOME.

The Standing Committee feel it their duty to represent to the Society most forcibly the utter inadequacy of the Society's annual income under the head of General Fund, to the wants of the Colonial Church, annually laid before the Society. The following statement represents the wants and the means in each of the last two years :—

Last year an attempt was made by the Society to meet the wants of

the Church in Foreign Parts : the method chosen was a proposal for an increase of the available income of the General Fund. Though successful in some dioceses, the attempt was on the whole a failure. As it is not to be supposed that the Church of England would willingly decline to enter on the new fields of evangelistic work to which Providence is annually calling us, the attempt must in some form or other be renewed. The Standing Committee submit the following suggestions.

1. That some of the Colonial Missions, which have for a long period received and still receive support from the Society, should be required to depend on local resources ; and where a Mission of many years standing is still inadequate to the support of a resident clergyman, it should be annexed to a neighboring Mission and receive periodical visits from a neighboring clergyman. In adopting this plan the difficulty arises of fixing a definite term of years which, without unfairness, shall be applicable to various Missions whose circumstances are not identical. Ten years ago the Society (Regulation 46)\* laid down nine years as the time during which it might contribute towards the support of a clergyman in a Colonial Mission : and if this rule were to be strictly enforced, it would doubtless, have the effect of setting at liberty a considerable sum annually to meet the new wants of the Foreign Churches. It is therefore submitted for consideration whether the Colonial Bishops in whose dioceses such Missions exist should be requested to relieve the funds of the Society from farther charge in respect of such Missions.

2. That in the case of Missions to the heathen, (a) a definite period should be fixed at which the circumstances and condition of each Mission should be considered, with a view to either the removal of the European Missionary to a new sphere, and the transfer of the Mission to native clergy, or the abandonment of the Mission ; and that (b) all native clergymen should be placed on the same footing as Colonial clergymen in respect of the period during which they will receive part of their support from the Society.

3. That an attempt should be made this year to increase the income of the Society in this country, and that it should be made in two ways : (a) by persevering in the appeal made last year for an increase by one-half of the amount of contributions from each diocese to the General Fund ; and (b) by making collateral appeals for Appropriated Funds to meet certain definite wants, selected by the Society out of the whole number which have been communicated, as the most pressing and most likely to meet with a response.

\* "The time which a Christian congregation or Mission is allowed to receive grants from the Society will not, under ordinary circumstances, exceed nine years : in which time it is expected that a church, a parsonage, and an endowment fund will be provided.

Mr. Schofield, from the Board of Home Missions, presented a report recommending the Schedule of grants to the Missionaries, submitted by the Board of last year ; the Board also recommended a grant of \$100 each, in aid of the Parsonages, at Andover, and St. Martins.

They cannot recommend the application for aid in the purchase of a Burial ground at St. Martins, nor that for aid in the repairs of St. Paul's Church, Kingston.

On motion, the report was received.

The Missionary Schedule was then considered in detail by the Committee, and subject in some instances to further consideration of the Board, the following list was adopted for the Missionary service for the current year, subject to the condition recommended in the report of the Board of Home Missions.

Pentreath gives notice that at the next annual meeting he or some one will propose an amendment to Article XIII., Section 1 of the Constitution, by cancelling the said Section and inserting the following: “Section 1.—This Society shall hold its anniversary meetings in rotation, at Fredericton and Saint John, and such other places as the Society at its next preceding annual meeting may decide, on the first Thursday in July in each year.”

The Rev. J. R. Campbell gives notice that he will move—

That the following words be added to the 13th Article of Rules and Regulations of the Board of Home Missions:—“And “likewise to grant, if there be available funds, a sum not “exceeding \$—, to aid in completing the purchase of any “burial ground, provided always, that such proposed burial “ground shall have the approval of the Lord Bishop.”

Mr. Frith gives notice as follows:—

That in order to provide funds for the *Fifth* object of the Society the Clergy be requested to ask the offerings of each congregation worshipping in a consecrated Church or Chapel annually, during the month of July for that object:

That funds thus obtained be placed at the disposal of the Board of Home Missions, subject to the following conditions:

1. That the offerings each year be made and appropriated in aid of the erection or completion of a church or chapel in the Diocese, to be specified and announced by the Board, previous to taking up such offerings.

2. That the annual contributions thus obtained be appropriated in the mode in which applications may be received, subject to approval by the Board. Should two or more applications be received at the same time, the right of priority to be decided by lot.

Mr. Jarvis renewed the notices previously given by him, and upon his motion it was resolved, that the subject embraced in the said notices be referred to a committee for further consideration, to report at the next meeting of the committee; and it was further resolved, that Messrs. Jarvis, G. A. Schofield, B. L. Peters, G. R. Parkin, and the Rev. G. G. Roberts, do compose the said committee.

(1.) For alteration in Constitution.

That the words "towards the education of children of such clergymen," be struck out of the 7th Clause of Article IX. of the Society's Constitution, and that, instead thereof, the following Clause be added to such Article as an Object of the Society:

11. The creation of a fund to assist in the education of the children of the clergy.

(2.) *For addition to Constitution.*—That the following addition be made to Article XV. of the Constitution of the Society:

The clergy are further requested to preach annually one other sermon in their respective churches, with a collection on each occasion, for the special funds of the Society, which collection shall, unless otherwise provided, be equally divided between (1) the Widows' and Orphans' Fund, (2) the Aged and Incapacitated Clergy Fund, (3) the children of the Clergy Education Fund, and (4) the Divinity Scholarships' Fund: provided that such special collection may, at the option of the

congregation from whom the same shall be received, expressed through the Rector or Missionary at the time of forwarding the same, be limited to some one or more of the special funds or purposes of the Society in such proportions as he may direct: and provided, also, that the yearly collection required by the rules of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund in the case of Clergymen joining such Fund shall, in such cases, be considered as the special collection hereby requested to be made, but shall be applied as such rules shall direct.

(3.) *Resolution.*—That the following be the Rules and Regulations of the Fund to assist in the education of the children of the Clergy:

I. The Fund to assist in the education of the children of the Clergy, shall consist of the amount now specially appropriated thereto, of all accumulations of interest, and of all subscriptions, legacies, collections, and other contributions given to or applied by the Society for this special object; and the interest of this Fund shall be applied solely to assist in the education of children of clergymen actually serving in the present Diocese of Fredericton, or of children of those who may have died in such service, or retired therefrom, with the Bishop's approval, on the ground of age or infirmity.

2. The Treasurer of the Diocesan Church Society shall, from time to time, under the direction of the Executive Committee, invest every \$500 of surplus money of this Fund, and add the same to the capital of the Fund.

3. The entire management of the Fund shall be, and hereby is, vested in the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Church Society, who, if they shall so think fit, may vest such management in a sub-Committee at their discretion.

4. No grant shall be made from such Fund until the capital thereof shall, by accumulation or otherwise, have reached the sum of \$4000, nor shall the grant or grants thereafter to be made exceed in any one year the interest on the capital of such Fund for the year.

5. Applications for grants from such Fund shall be made in writing through the parents or guardians of the applicant to the Secretary of the Fund, and every such application shall be accompanied by a statement of any and all private property, pension or income of the parent or parents, if living, or directly or indirectly available for the support and education of such applicant, if the parent shall be deceased. The Executive Committee, or its sub-Committee may, in any case require

further statements, which shall thereupon be furnished for their information.

6. Each case shall be determined on its own merits by the Executive Committee, or its sub-Committee, subject to the approval of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese.

7. In the event of any application being favorably considered, the Executive Committee, or its sub-Committee, shall determine in each case the amount of the grant, which shall be made for a single year only, but may, at the option of the Committee be continued for one or more years, but not after the recipient shall have reached the age of eighteen years, and every such grant shall be made upon condition only of the education of the applicant at some educational institution within the Dominion of Canada, conducted in accordance with the principles of the Church of England, and recognized or approved by the Synod of the Diocese in which it shall be situate.

8. A Secretary of the Fund shall be appointed by the Executive Committee, and he shall conduct all correspondence, and perform such other duties in connection therewith as the Executive Committee, or its sub-Committee, may direct.

9. The above Rules may be altered only by the General Committee of the Diocesan Church Society, after a year's notice of the proposed change.

(4) *Resolution.*

That the sum of \_\_\_\_\_, being the amount of the investments belonging to the 7th Object Fund of the Society, be and hereby is specially set apart as a fund to assist in the education of the children of the Clergy, in accordance with the present 11th Object.

(5.) For amendment to the Rules of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund.

That the following be added to Clause 3 of such Rules: Whenever the amount of such collection or collections, in any parish or mission shall exceed in any year the sum of \$5, such surplus shall be divided equally between (1) the Widows' and Orphans' Fund, (2) the Aged and Incapacitated Clergy Fund, (3) the children of the Clergy Education Fund, and (4) the Divinity Scholarships' Fund: provided that any such surplus may, at the option of the congregation from whom the same shall be received, expressed through the Rector or Missionary at the time of forwarding the same, be limited to some one, two or three only of such funds.

(2b.) Also, that the words "one hundred dollars," in the 5th Clause of such Rules be altered to "two hundred dollars," and the form of certificate at the end of such rules be altered in like manner; such alterations to apply also from the year 1879, inclusive, to the case of the claimant (or claimants) on that fund, become such since its establishment on its present basis in 1871.

On motion of Mr. J. F. Robertson, seconded by Rev. G. M. Armstrong, it was—

*Resolved*, That a committee be appointed to obtain subscriptions for making a provision for the Widows of the Clergy who have no claims on the present Widows' and Orphans' Fund, in order to pay to each widow the sum of \$100 per annum, and that the funds so collected for this special purpose be placed at the disposal of the Executive Committee for distribution, and that the following Gentlemen do compose the said committee: Messrs. J. F. Robertson, T. W. Daniel, and G. R. Parkin.

The Honorable S. L. Tilley left the chair, and Mr. W. M. Jarvis, V. P., took the same; whereupon, it was, on motion of Canon Brigstocke, resolved unanimously, that the warmest thanks of the Committee be tendered to His Honor for so kindly acting as Chairman of the late meetings, for the interest he has manifested in all the proceedings, and for his kind and impartial conduct in the Chair.

## ANNIVERSARY MEETING.

---

St. JOHN, July 4th, 1878.

The Anniversary Meeting was held in the St. John's Church School Room, on Thursday, at 2.30, P. M.

Mr. W. M. Jarvis, V. P., in the Chair.

The Secretary presented the Annual Report.

On motion, it was resolved that the same be received and printed under the direction of the Executive Committee.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE  
DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY.  
FOR THE YEAR ENDING JUNE 5TH, 1878.

The Committee met at Fredericton, on the 6th July, 1877, and an abstract of its proceedings will be found in 42nd report, pages 62 and 63.

The next meeting of the Committee was at St. John on the 3rd October, when the Secretary reported that the printing of the Annual Report was in progress, and an order was passed authorizing the Treasurer to pay Mr. Cropley's bill for the same, on the satisfactory completion of the work.

The Treasurer submitted a statement of his Account, made up to the 30th September, ult.

The Treasurer, from the Finance Committee, submitted a Report in which it is stated that the insurance of \$6,000 on the Seovil property on the North Market Wharf, in the City of Saint John, has been paid, and that the Committee have entered into a contract for the erection of a new building on the premises, for the sum of \$4,200, and that the new building has been leased to the former tenants at a rental of \$840 per annum for three years, from the 1st May next.

The Committee also report the payment of \$7,000 on Capital

The following resolution was adopted:—

That for the period, during which the property of the Seovil Trust will be yielding no income, the Treasurer be authorized to advance, out of the principal of the fund, or out of the General Fund of the Society, the annual quarterly allowance of \$100 to the Rector of St. James' Church, Cambridge, and other necessary expenses and charges upon the fund, to be recouped hereafter from the rents and interest of the said property.

Mr. Schofield, from the Board of Home Missions, presented a report stating slight changes in certain missionary grants, and the appropriation of \$200 in aid of a separate mission at Little Falls.

A bill of the Secretary for incidental expenses was ordered to be paid.

The Committee met at Fredericton on the 2nd January, 1878, when a letter was read from the Treasurer stating that owing to illness a statement of his Account had not been furnished, but that it would be forwarded to the Secretary at an early day.

The Committee met at St. John on the 12th March.

The Secretary stated the reason for the omission of the meeting on the usual day (it having been Ash Wednesday), and the appointment of the present time under the direction of the Lord Bishop.

The Chairman of the Finance Committee stated, that at the request of the Lord Bishop, he had communicated with the Solicitor of the late Miss Bailey on the subject of a bequest by her to the Society, and was informed that the executors were about filing their accounts, when full particulars will be furnished to the Society. It was resolved, that the Finance Committee be requested to secure the services of a Solicitor to attend on behalf of the Society at the passing of the accounts of the estate referred to.

The following resolution, passed at a late meeting of the Deanery of Saint John, was submitted :

"That the attention of the Executive Committee be called to the Widows' and Orphans' Fund, with a view of increasing the inadequate provision of the Widows and Orphans of the Clergy of this Diocese, who are members of the Fund, and to consider whether any steps can be taken to induce the Clergy generally to become subscribers to the said fund ;" whereupon, it was resolved that the Committee, appointed by the General Committee in July last, to consider certain proposed amendments with reference to the Widows' and Orphans' Fund, be requested to take the foregoing resolution into consideration.

A Committee of Arrangement for the Annual Meetings of the Society was appointed, and it was resolved, that notices of the said meetings be prepared under the direction of the said committee, and the following Gentlemen were appointed members of the same:

The Treasurer submitted a statement of his Account.

An account of the Secretary was ordered to be paid.

It was *Resolved*, that the Secretary be authorized to affix the seal of the Society, under the direction of the Finance Committee, to a release from the Society of any claim upon the estate of the late Hon. W. Chipman, upon full payment of the legacy and interest.

The Committee met at Fredericton on the 5th June, when the Secretary presented a report of the proceedings of the Committee for the past year, which was received and ordered to be laid before the General Committee.

He also read a letter from the Treasurer, with reference to his statement of account at the close of the fiscal year, showing that the amount overdrawn will be made up by balances due the Society on the account of the past year.

The Secretary presented the following Report of the Book Depository Committee, which was received; and also an account of the said Depository for the past year, which was ordered to be printed in the Annual Report.

It was *Resolved*, That the Secretary of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund be authorized to receive the premium, &c., due by the Rev. F. Alexander on the 1st July last, if paid on or before the 28th June next, with interest—the payment of the same having been omitted through forgetfulness.

#### REPORT OF THE BOOK DEPOSITORY COMMITTEE.

The Committee, to whom was entrusted the management of the Depository of the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, beg to submit their Annual Report and Accounts.

The Depository was opened in October, 1874, a grant of \$800 having been made out of the Capital Funds of the Diocesan Church Society by the General Committee in July of the same year.

The whole of the stock was destroyed in Messrs. McMillans store during the fire on June 20th, 1877, but on July 26th the claim of the Committee on the Queen Insurance Company was accepted, and the sum of \$1,000 was placed to their credit.

The Committee regret, owing to the very limited space placed at their disposal in Messrs. McMillans temporary store in Canterbury street, that the stock of books has been necessarily limited and their operations curtailed, but the arrangements now made with the same firm at their former site, 98 Prince William street, will, they have reason to believe, meet the increasing requirements of the Diocese.

In October last the Committee issued a printed notice to the effect that "a reduction is made of ten per cent. on *all* publications to members, and on Sunday School Library Books to Clergy and Superintendents."

The Committee have lately received a memorandum from the Society's Accountant, notifying them that their miscellaneous books could no longer be supplied on such favorable terms as in 1877, but in order to be of service to Sunday Schools, they do not propose any change in prices.

The Committee beg to draw attention to "The Dawn of Day, an illustrated weekly magazine for Sunday School and Parish use," the first number of which was published in January last, at the price of one half-penny each number.

It is hoped that Catalogues of the Publications of the Society may be placed in the hands of the Clergy of the Diocese at the meetings of the General Committee of the Diocesan Church Society.

The Treasurer's Account accompanied this Report.

Permission was granted to the Rev. W. LeB. McKiel and Rev. H. H. Barber to join the Widows' and Orphans' Fund, on the usual conditions.

Read by the Secretary the Report of the Finance Committee, and it was resolved, on the recommendation of the said Committee, that the account of the debt of the ex-Treasurer be written off by the Treasurer.

It was also *Resolved*, That the Finance Committee do provide a place of safe-keeping for the securities of the Society, and a proper box to contain the same.

It was *Resolved*, That the Treasurer be authorized to pay Messrs. McMillans bill for stationery and blank forms, on the certificate of the Chairman.

On motion of Rev. Canon Brigstocke, it was *Resolved*, That a Committee be appointed to prepare at their discretion, through the ensuing year, an "occasional paper," containing a statement of such facts and information as may be deemed likely to further the interests of the Society, and report the

same for the approval of the Executive Committee, and that the Revs. Canon Brigstocke, T. E. Dowling, E. S. W. Pen-treath, Mr. G. A. Schofield and the Secretary, do compose the said Committee.

It was *Resolved*, That the Treasurer be authorized to pay to the widows of the clergy, who have no claim on the present Widows' and Orphans' Fund, \$100 each, as soon as the special fund provided for by the Committee appointed at the last meeting of the General Committee, will allow.

It was also *Resolved*, That the thanks of this Committee be tendered to the press of the city for the extended reports of the late proceedings of the Society.

## REPORT OF FINANCE COMMITTEE.

TO THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY :

The Finance Committee beg to report as follows on the transactions of the past year :

1. *The Chipman Bequest.*—Since the last Report of the Committee, the Executors of the estate of the late R. F. Hazen, Esq., deceased, who have also charge of the estate of the late Chief Justice Chipman, announced their determination to pay over the whole amount of this bequest in money. Up to the 1st May last they had accordingly paid to the Treasurer \$20,000, and since that date they have paid in \$2,000 more. The remaining \$18,000 will, it is said, be handed over very shortly. Since the death of Mrs. Chipman, 4th July, 1876, the executors have paid interest on the whole amount of the bequest unpaid half-yearly—the last payment being up to 4th January, 1878. As the will of the late Chief Justice Chipman requires that his legacy to the Society shall be kept invested in either real estate, or Government or real securities, the amount received has been applied to the purchase of Debentures of the Province of New Brunswick. A separate account has been opened with the Trust, and all the Government securities held by the Society transferred to it ; while their place has been supplied by Saint John Water and other Debentures. At present this Committee are restrained from investing in the security of bond and mortgage, by a resolution of the Executive Committee ; but in view of the terms of this bequest it may become desirable to reconsider this resolution.

2. *Miss D. B. Hazen Trust.*—The only alterations in the state of this Trust during the year is the leasing of the following lot and tracts of land, viz. :  
Lot 30x80, on the City Road, to Edmund Riley, at \$30.

A tract of land, consisting of about 200 acres, on the old Westmorland Road, Parish of Simonds, for one year, to Patrick Fitzpatrick, at \$30.

A tract of about 170 acres, on same road, to J. & D. Horgan, for one year, at \$40.

A tract of about 100 acres, on the main road to Hampton, to Wm. Mackey, for one year, at \$30.

The large arrears of rent which accumulated during the three years that this estate was under litigation have been found very difficult to realize. In some cases a compromise can scarcely be avoided, in others the Committee can only recommend legal proceedings, if satisfactory arrangements are not very speedily made with the Society.

3. *Special Fund.*—Amounts, as follows, have been transferred for investment during the year, namely :

Of this sum, \$2,412 remains uninvested, owing to the difficulty experienced in obtaining satisfactory securities, except at a heavy premium.

4. *S. Scovil Trust*.—The building on the property belonging to this Trust, which was destroyed by the fire of June, 1877, was insured for \$6,000. With this sum the Committee are glad to be able to say that they have not only had erected a thoroughly good and substantial brick building, but also to pay off to Mr. White the balance due him for improvements and repairs on the old building, and to carry the sum of \$240.84 to current account of the fund. The new building is also rented for \$840, in lieu of \$650, the rental of the former store.

5. *Ex-Treasurer's Debt*.—As there seems to be no prospect of recovering the balance of \$786.20, due and unpaid on this Account, the Committee recommend that it be written off.

6. An opportunity is afforded for the safe keeping, at a small annual cost, of the securities held by the Society. Up to the time of the great fire they had been kindly received and kept in the vault of the Bank of New Brunswick, where they fortunately escaped destruction. At present the Committee is indebted to the Manager of the Bank of British North America for a place in the vault of that Bank. But the Bank of Nova Scotia offers the advantage of a place of deposit in a vault in the Bank Building, which will be under a double lock, of which the Manager will hold one key, and an officer of the Society the other. The rental for this accommodation is \$10 a year, and it will be necessary that a tin box adapted to the vault be got. The Committee recommend that one of these cells be rented and the deposit box procured.

All of which is respectfully submitted.
