United States and Spain Pushing War Preparations With All Vigor-Pennsylvania Railroad Ordered to Provide Special Trains for the Transportation of Troops-General Lee and All Americans to Leave Havana at Noon To-day-It is the Last Call-Spanish Volunteers for Army and Navy-War Looked Upon as Inevitable.

The war cloud hangs darkly over Cuba this morning. All the despatches tend to show that hostilities may break out at any moment. The official recall of Consul-General Lee from Havana, and that official's notification to all Americans to be on board ship there at noon to-day, shows that war is expected. The Spanish Government also appears to expect an early outbreak, and the people are showing an enthusiasm born of desperation. They consider, according to the telegrams received, that the United States is determined to force a conflict, regardless of what they believe to be justice, and volunteers are forthcoming for both the army and navy. The Government have shown no disposition to concede the demands of President McKinley, and are pushing war preparations with the utmost vigor. The proposal of an armistice in Cuba has also been rejected; thus the prospect is for an immediate outbreak of war. GRAVER THAN AT ANY TIME HITHERTO.

Washington, April 8.-The Spanish-American situation is now regarded as more grave than at any time hitherto. The hopeful views of peace heretofore entertained have given way to the conviction that the issue between the United States and Spain has become well nigh irreconcilable. The preparation for all eventualities is proceeding steadily. One significant evidence in this direction developed when it was learned that the United States Consul at Porto Rico was about to leave his post. It is expected that General Lee will take the boat from Havana to-morrow noon. Whether he will leave the vice-consul or other subordinate temporarily in charge is not made known. Considerable depends upon this, as his retirement with his entire staff would mean the complete termination of all official communication between the United States and the Island, whereas the leaving a subordinate in charge would continue at least a semblance of these official relations. The determination to have the United States Consul at Porto Rico leave indicates that the Government is not alone turning its attention to Cuba, but to Spain's other colony of the West

The probability that the Spanish torpedo fleet will rendezvous at Porto Rico may have contributed to the determination to withdraw the United States Consul there.

POWERS WILL DO NO MORE.

Inquiry at the Foreign Embassies and Legations to-day makes it plain that the action of the great powers yesterday in presenting a joint note to President McKinley, urging peace, constituted all that these powers will do. There is no present purpose to take further action or to follow up this guarded and diplomatic utterance with any suggestion of mediation or intervention. It was stated to-day by influential members of the diplomatic corps that the joint note contained nothing between the lines which indicated a further purpose. This was the view taken by the Administration yesterday, and to-div this is fully borne out by the attitude of the foreign representatives who are in close touch with their foreign office. It is important at the present juncture, in that it practically eliminates the influence of the powers at Washington beyond a sentimental expression toward peace. There is no doubt, however, that these foreign influences will be strongly urged at Madrid towards securing further concessions, though the foreign representatives here begin to doubt seriously whether Spain is in a position to concede any more. For years he had a seat in the County Council as Reeve of North Marysburg, the township in which he resided. His long connection with municipal councils enabled him to rende important service to the country wher legislation respecting municipal matter came up in the House. He was again the Patron candidate at the last election and was defeated by dissensions in the Patron and Reform ranks, He leaves a widow two sons and two daughters. The funera will take place Sunday.







Called Out by Spain for War With the United States-The Orders Were Sccret. New York, April 8.-A special to The

New York, April 8.—A special to The World from Hayana says: Spain is calling out every fighting man in Cuba for war with the United States. The order for the long-expected military draft has been issued by Captain-General Bianco, after a council of war at the Palace with the generals. A copy of the order has been sent to every town in Cuba.

It commands every male Spanish subject between the ages of 10 and 40 to register for immediate military duty at the office of the commandante of the district. The place of registration in Hayana is the military palace, the residence of General Parrado and Dr. Congosto.

The utmost serrecy has been maintained in everything connected with the order. It is not mentioned in the gazette, the official receptacle of everything that emanates from the palace. But officials there admit its existence and consider it a sort of finishing touch to war preparations. A man at the palace who is very close to the Captain-General, said to a New York World correspondent: "This order will not be much of a surprise to the inhabitants of the island. It has been talked of for a long correspondent: This order will not be much of a surprise to the inhabitants of the island. It has been talked of for a long time. The only wonder is that it was not issued long ago.

"No; the men who register will not be assigned to military duty at once. They will be given instructions in the manual of arms for an hour or so every day, but will be permitted to attend to their regular vocations the rest of the time. Should any emergency arise, however, they will at once be sent to the field or to the defence of some seaport town."

Cuban sympathizers in Havana are jubilant over the military draft. They say it only shows to what straits Spain has been reduced. The great majority of the men who will be compelled to serve under the Spanish fing are Cubans, whose sympathies are with the insurgents. Many of them already have brothers and fathers fighting under Gomez and Garcia. They certainly cannot be very loyal or enthusiastic at the prospects of dying for a country that they have been taught from their earliest childhood to hate.

CONDUCTOR SNIDER'S FUNERAL.

The Remains of the Honored Grand Trunk Evangelist Laid Away -Beautiful Floral Tributes.

Fergus, Ont., April 8.—One of the most representative funerals ever held in this place was that of W. K. Snider, the popular conductor on the Grand Trunk Railway. His death took place at Windsor, and after a funeral service there his remains were brought to Fergus last night. Conductor Snider may well be cafled a self-made man; beginning as a newsboy on the train, ne made his way, up till he was one of the most honored and trusted conductors on the continent. About 10 or 12 years ago he became a decided Christian, and nis evangelistic services were valued and sought after, both in Canada and the United States. His place as master of the platform was acknowledged by all who knew him. The funeral services were conducted by Rev. T. W. Jackson, assisted by Revs. J. G. Scott and S. Sellery, Guelph; Dr. Henderson, Berlin; D. N. Snider, a cousin, of Milton, and Revs. J. B. Mullan, J. H. McVlear and M. Swann of Fergus, Railroad men and friends from Palmerston, Durham, Hamilton, Toronto, Guelph, Lucknow and London came to pay their last tribute of respect. The pali-beaters were Messrs. Richard Baxter, Burlington; Rébert Snider, Guelph; James Cline and George Cline, both of Wingham, all cousins of the deceased, and A. B. Munson, London, and D. W. Hayes, Lucknow, railroad men. A very arge and respectable body of the Independent Order of Foresters also took part in the services, he being a member of Court Brock, Toronto, which sent a beautiful wreath. The floral tributes were numerous, but one from his brother conductors deserves special mention. It was a beautiful archway of flowers, with gates ajar in the centre and "Our Brother's Last Trip" in the foundation.

He leaves a wife, daughter of Mr. Thos. Milne of this place, and one daughter. Flanncially they are left in comfortable circumstances, and have the sympathy of a large circle of friends.





Modern Miller says: Pacific coast exports of wheat were comparatively heavy. The growing winter wheat crop is not out of danger. Central States report too much water and many lowland fields destroyed. Central Southwestern advices are more satisfactory, with wheat fields looking better under a marked improvement. Oat fields through Kansas have suffered more than wheat. Far West, Texas and Oklahoma cannot yet determine extent of recent damage, while San Francisco wires prospects have become much worse and outlook very discouraging.

Argentine Shipments. In fourteen weeks Argentine wheat shipments have aggregated 13,888,000 bushels, against 1,623,000 bushels for the same period last year. Argentine shipments during the past week have been 672,000, as against 1,184,000 bushels last week, and 64,000 the corresponding week of last year.

Thoman's cotton report for April shows only one state with acreage for 1898 contemplated at last year's figures, mamely, Louisiana. It is a fact, however, that the average reduction does not promise to be more than 3 per cent. The big producers like Texas, Georgia, Alabama, Mississippi and South Carolina are seen with 97 to 99 per cent. of their 1897 area under cultivation, the tendency being to increase earlier estimates. The difficulty always in the way of curtailing output is present this year. That the late crop should be followed by one of a much more moderate size is agreed on all hands; that it will not be seems the only conclusion to be drawn from developments so far, Small planters are enlarging on last year's acreage, and the possibility is presented of another crop of 11,000,000 bales or more in spite of efforts of the more Important interests to improve the situation by limiting operations.
