WAR CLOUD OVER CUBA

All the Indications Point to an Outbreak of Hostilities.

EFFORTS FOR PEACE SEEM TO HAVE FAILED

United States and Spain Pushing War Preparations With All Vigor-Pennsylvania Railroad Ordered to Provide Special Trains for the Transportation of Troops-General Lee and All Americans to Leave Havana at Noon To-day-It is the Last Call-Spanish Volunteers for Army and Navy-War Looked Upon as Inevitable.

The war cloud hangs darkly over Cuba this morning. All the despatches tend to show that hostilities may break out at any moment.

A significant incident is the order of the United States Government to the Pennsylvania Railroad to have two special trains ready on Monday to convey New Jersey troops to the sea coast.

GRAYER THAN AT ANY TIME HITHERTO.

Washington, April 8.-The Spanish-American situation is now regarded as more grave than at any time hitherto. The hopeful views of peace heretofore entertained have given way to the conviction that the issue between the United States and Spain has become well nigh irrevocable.

The probability that the Spanish torpedo fleet will rendezvous at Porto Rico may have contributed to the determination to withdraw the United States Consul there.

POWERS WILL DO NO MORE.

Inquiry at the Foreign Embassies and Legations to-day makes it plain that the action of the great powers yesterday in presenting a joint note to President McKinley, urging peace, constituted all that these powers will do.

IT MUST MEAN WAR.

General Lee Will Leave Havana This Morning After Handling His Consular Flag.

Tampa, Fla., April 8.-The program for the departure of General Lee from Havana has been announced as follows: The Olivette will enter Havana harbor on Saturday morning and General Lee will at once notify all Americans that this will be their last chance to leave the island under the American flag.

PRESIDENT WAS SERIOUS.

No Expectation on the Part of the Administration That War Can be Averted.

Washington, April 8.-The Cabinet meeting occupied a little over an hour and a half. It was mainly devoted to an informal discussion of the situation.

New York, April 8.-An evening paper says that orders were issued at the Pennsylvania Railroad station, Jersey City, to-day that two special trains must be held in readiness on Monday afternoon next to transport New Jersey troops to the sea coast.


MINISTERS WORKING TOGETHER.

Usual Fruitful Session of the Cana-
dian Association.

Several Important Amendments Adopted.
-To Negotiate with the A. A. A. of C.
-Will Recruit into Goal Nets
-A Good List of Officers Elected-Reports
of the Play for a Year.

The Canadian Lacrosse Association held
the eleventh annual convention at Rich-
mond Hall yesterday, under most favorable
circumstances. There were delegates from
all parts of Ontario, even as far east as
Cornwall, 34 clubs being represented, as

The day's work was commenced by a
council meeting, held at the Rosin House
in the morning, at which the different ad-
ministrative matters were passed and audited
by Messrs. M. B. Clonnes and W. H. Hall.
The day's work was then proceeded. Pres-
ident J. J. Craig, Ferguson; T. R. Ghanville,
Mount Forest; D. A. Rose, Toronto; F. Mc-
Millan, Beaverton; J. D. Bailey, Toronto; W.
H. Hall, Markham; H. B. Clonnes, Fort
Perry; A. E. Cameron, Beaverton.
The election of officers was the next or-
der of business, and some good speeches
were made by the nominees. The follow-
ing were elected to look after the interest
of the association for '98:
Hon. president, J. J. Craig, Ferguson (accl.);
president, T. H. Lennox, Acton (accl.); first
vice-president, T. R. Ghanville, Mount Forest;
second vice-president, T. McMillan, Beaverton;
secretary-treasurer, W. S. Hartley;
council, E. F. Seagram, Waterloo; H. B.
Clonnes, Orillia; W. Phelan, Acton; W. H.
Thompson, Mitchell; E. McIntyre, Grand
Valley; W. H. Hall, Markham; I. King, Per-
ry; A. E. Cameron, Beaverton.
The session adjourned until 8 o'clock, and
promptly at that time the meeting was
called to order. Then came the slow, tedious
work of threshing out the numerous
amendments to the constitution, which al-
ways cause hot discussions, and some of
them this time were very warm, the chair-
man having to ask for order on one or two
occasions.
No letters to Hisself.
A great many of the amendments pre-
sented cannot appear in this issue, but in
future in any championship matches,
where home-and-away games are arranged,
the home club must pay the traveling and
hotel expenses of the visitors. If any club
in the association agrees to pay another
club's expenses, it is understood that they
do not carry out the agreement, it shall
forfeit its membership till the debt is paid.
On motion of Messrs. Thompson and Bailey,
it was adopted that the order of business
at the annual meeting be as follows:
Reading of secretary-treasurer's report; Pro-
fessional Committee's report; election of officers;
election of new clubs; consideration of am-
endments to constitution and rules; general
business.
In the form of certificates, the words,
"and is a bona-fide resident of, or within
a radius of two miles of, the place named
therein" was adopted.
The home club in all matches shall be
responsible for the expenses of the visitors
of spectators.
If either club demand it, the referee shall
order the game to commence promptly at
the advertised time, and shall put the ball
in play, if only one team is on the field.
E. R. Keen, H. O'Leahin, Allan and J.
Craig were appointed auditors for 1908.
Messrs. F. W. Rose, D. A. Rose and H.
McConally were chosen as a committee to
arrange as to constitute and rules general
business.
The amendment that caused the hottest
arguments was that made by D. A. Rose,
and was not in being that the C.L.A. deal
with its own expelled members, without
reference to the A.A.A. of C. It was shown
by several of the retiring officers that the
association had recommended the rein-
statement of Glover, and that they had
been ignored by the A.A.A. Finally, it
was recommended to the new council to en-
ter into negotiations with the A.A.A. of
C. to endeavor to place the relations on a
better footing.
Seaford, Athletics of St. Catharines,
Jones of Toronto, Young Toronto, Elms
and Tecumseh declared their intention of
entering the senior section this season.
The committee chosen as the place for the
next annual meeting, although Mr. Kvan
declined, was the C.L.A. deal. It was sug-
gested that the intermediate series be brought
to rest, as well as the semi and final match-
es. Owing to the resignation of Mr. Vance,
W. S. A. Hartley was appointed to fill the
office, which occurrence somewhat curtailed
the details of this report.
The various districts were won by the
following: Northeastern, Orillia; York,
Markham; Northwestern, Arthur; Bruce, no
competition; Quince, Madoc; Southern,
Simcoe; Royal, Streetsville; Huron, Jr.; com-
petition; York Junior, Elms II.; Central,
Dufferin of Orangeville; Grey, Dundas;
Western, Huron, Twin City of Berlin.
The other championships were won as
follows: Seaford, Tecumseh, Toronto; inter-
mediate, Dufferin of Orangeville; junior,
Elms II. of Toronto.
On account of Mr. Moore of Barrie being
removed from the county, Mr. R. R. Keen
of Orillia was elected in his place by the
council.
This report was followed by that of the

auditors, which showed receipts of \$1013.55,
disbursements of \$587.77, leaving a balance
in the bank of \$425.78.

MEET GOES TO PETERBORO.

Nitawa Bicycle Hustlers Beaten by a Big Majority.

Capital Gets Back with Beament in the Presidential Chair - Montreal News with East Kensington - Walter Gets the Racing Board Chairmanship - All the Amendments were Ruled Out and the Organ Starts at Home.

The annual meeting of the Canadian Wheelman's Association was held yesterday in the Auditorium. Although the membership of the association is less than 10,000, it represents the organized interests of cycling in Canada, and as such its proceedings are of importance to everyone who rides a wheel and its annual gathering makes Good Friday the day of days in bicycling circles.

At this year's assemblage no unusual excitement was manifested, and beyond the discussion of suggested amendments to the constitution relating to fees and the Wheelman, the routine matters of receiving reports, electing officers and selecting places for the Ontario and Dominion meets occupied most of the time. The reports, however, were unusually interesting and evinced a good year's work in the carrying out of measures of benefit and importance to all wheelmen and wheelwomen.

Mr. Walker asked how it was, then, that Aiton was allowed to ride for the Dominion championship.

Mr. Ryckman said the race was open to all who were members of the Dominion association. He commented upon the need for funds for the sending of a representative to Scotland. The Executive had to act in haste, but there was not with any of them any suggestion of a representative to be sent who would advertise their goods.

Manufacturers of everything a wheelman would stand for to Ottawa and send as many delegates, if not more, to the Executive than they would to any other meeting. Mr. Ryckman said he had promised to attend the meeting, but he had to go to work.

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mistake, too, in the man they sent. He was not the outstanding bicyclist champion of Canada. It was an unwise choice, the Executive claim that it was only a man available; if they had an explanation the delegates would have to go to it.

A YEAR'S CANADIAN CYCLING

C.W.A. Officers Present Exhaustive Annual Reports

And Both Were Adopted as the Annual Meeting of the Association—President Orr, Secretary Donly and the Various Chairmen Pass on the Work of the Different Departments.

A feature of the annual meeting of the Canadian Wheelmen's Association was the reading of the exhaustive annual reports, all of which were adopted without alteration.

The secretary-treasurer, among other things in his report, said:

Gentlemen.—This is my 15th annual report as your secretary-treasurer. Time was in years past, that the report of the secretary-treasurer was a mere statement of the Association work. To-day, thanks to the wider interest taken in C.W.A. affairs by members and a more generous division of the labor of directing its progress among numerous chairmen of committees, my report may now be confined to a few dry statistics in regard to my office.

Our advancement in the matter of membership is a matter of some interest. At the close of the Association year, 1897, we had on our membership register 6388 names—a figure which had only grown to 6922 by the 15th of last month. We are in a position to say we have not retrograded materially. There has been no falling off in that respect—but, unfortunately, your Executive Committee, last spring, decided to hold a general meeting in Toronto, as a result of the Baggage Bill Rights, enjoy a boom in membership. As a result of this boom in membership, we were able to pay some expenditures that were needed and which we considered our obligations as to income warranted us in doing. The result has been that while we have progressed so far as finances are concerned, we are not so well off as we were 12 months ago. At that time our surplus of assets over liabilities was \$382.20, now the surplus is turned into a deficit of \$383.07.
