THE SCENE IS SIMULATED

Now the Exciting News Concerns the Far East, and Russia is the Power That is Causing the British Lion to Show His Teeth—British Warships at Wei-Hai-Wei Cleared for Action and Ordered to Be Ready to Sail at an Hour's Notice—Cable News.

The interest in cable despatches has suddenly shifted from Egypt to the east, and this morning's reports indicate a state of affairs which may involve a break between Britain and Russia. Something serious must surely be on the tapis, when British warships clear the decks for action and make ready for sea, as is the case of the squadron at Wei-Hai-Wei. The fact that a large Russian fleet is assembled at Port Arthur, has an ominous look. Of course everything is kept secret as far as possible, but London has received the news with a feeling that grave events are imminent. The surmise is that a Russian regiment had occupied that port, and as Britain had a gunboat there and no protest was made, it was thought Russia was to have a walk-over in securing the valuable strategic position, which would give her control of the whole Chinese province of Manchuria.

BYRDE ENDORSED SALISBURY.

He is a Liberal, But There is No Party Division Now on the Foreign Policy.

London, Nov. 2.—The Right Hon. James Bryce, former Under-Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, subsequently President of the Board of Trade, and now member of Parliament in the Liberal interest for Aberdeen, speaking in Great Britain, when the Lord Salisbury's stand in the Fashoda controversy, declaring that "the military control of all the navigable waters in the Bah-el-Ghazal basin, as well as the Nile, must be secured to Egypt."

ROSSLAND SPECIAL.

Powder Fumes Killed William Cain and Patrick Nolan—More Riches.

Roseland, B.C., Nov. 2.—(Special).—Powder fumes caused the death of William Cain and Patrick Nolan, miners, at the Sunset mine last night. The men went into the mine before the gas was blown out, felt the effects and tried to escape, but were overcome and fell from the ladder, death resulting. MILITARY SUPPLIES.

Furness Liner Bringing a Large Consignment to Halifax.

Halifax, N.S., Nov. 2.—(Special).—The Furness liner Halifax City has a large consignment of supplies for the military authorities here. The ship will be unloaded along at all possible speed and is expected to arrive here on record time. She brings an unusually large supply of ammunition and arms for the station, and is due on Saturday.

WAR RISKS GO UP.

London, Nov. 2.—It was learned today, through the office of the British and Foreign Insurance Company, that rates of war risks on British and French vessels were doubled yesterday; so that French owners must now pay as high as 14 per cent. war risk on sailing vessels. Marine underwriters have been writing war insurance for two weeks past. Up to yesterday the war rate for British steamers was one-eighth of one per cent, and for sailing vessels one-fourth of one per cent. Yesterday risks on British steamers were put up to one-fourth of one per cent, and on sailing craft to 1-2 of one per cent. The French rate has been double that of the British rate and the ratio is preserved in increased premiums. French steamers must now pay one-half of one per cent. war risk and sailing vessels one per cent.

ON THE PARIS BOURSE.

Paris, Nov. 2.—Prices on the bourse today again collapsed, owing to speculators reducing commitments, and the decline in the price of consols in London, influenced by the news from Wei-Hai-Wei. Spanish funds declined heavily, owing to the United States demand for the Philippine Islands. Turkish securities were steady. Gold mines shares declined towards the close of the market, though they slightly improved in tone.

THIS LOOKS OMINOUS.

British Warships at Wei-Hai-Wei Cleared for Action and Made Ready for Sea. Wei-Hai-Wei, Nov. 2.—All the British warships here, the first class battleship Centurion, the first class cruiser Narcissus, the second class cruiser Hermione, the torpedo boat destroyer Whiting, the torpedo boat destroyer Fame, the torpedo boat destroyer Handy and the first class gunboat Peacock, have cleared for action, and are ready for sea at an hour's notice. The first class battleship Victorious and the first class cruiser Undaunted, at Chefoo, not far from here, are coaling to their full capacity.

PEACE AND ONMECA.

Lots of Obtainable Placer Gold in the Latter Country. Vancouver, B.C., Nov. 2.—(Special Letter).—A great many prospectors are returning from the Peace River and Onmecca countries over the Edmonton trail. They report the trail a long and tedious one, but the food supply is so abundant even at the Hudson Bay posts that it pays to go in comparatively light. Besides this the game is very abundant. The report of the Peace River country is not encouraging. It is said that there is gold everywhere, even on the mountain tops, but so fine that it will float in water, and is impossible to separate from the slime in the sluice boxes. This is the verdict of hundreds of Americans.



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Major Walsh Says He Had No Interview With Miss Shaw of the London Times—Allan and Dominion Liners May Be Pressed Into Naval Service—La Patrie Alleges That Late Honors Mercier's Tomb Was Robbed of Floral Decorations—Montreal Notes.

Montreal, Nov. 2.—(Special).—Major Walsh, late Administrator of the Yukon, has made a very important statement to a personal friend here regarding Miss Flora Shaw's charges, as far as they relate to himself. The Major declares he only saw the Times correspondent twice. The first time she came to the Major's office and asked him if she could have a couple of hours' interview with him. He complied, and Miss Shaw was to return and talk to him from 3 to 5. She, however, failed to show up, and soon after the Major met the Times correspondent in the street. She asked about his office hours, and Major Walsh told her he was at home from 9 in the morning till 5 in the afternoon. Again, he says, Miss Flora Shaw came not, and, in fact, the Administrator did not see the lady journalist afterwards.

Major Pressed Into Service. Although nothing has yet been heard officially from the Admiralty, the Allan and Dominion Lines expect that their best boats may be requisitioned at any moment. It is understood that the Esmeralda and the Californian will be selected from the Allan, while the Labrador and the Scotsman from the Dominion Line will be also pressed into the English naval service.

Charged With Wholesale Stealing. A man named Edmond, residing at 200 Bedford, Mass., is in the toils here charged with stealing horses, harness and carriages from different people at the locality just mentioned. The thief had been located, but as soon as he heard that the officers were on his track, he fled and did not come to Canada. He accuses other people of the crimes with which he is charged, yet his accusations are not relied upon.

New York State. Ex-Governor Washburn of Minnesota, who arrived here to-day en route from New York, states that the wheat crop in Minnesota and North and South Dakota will reach 200,000,000 bushels, and that the mills at Minneapolis are grinding 1,000,000 bushels per week. General Washburn, in speaking of the political interests, states that there is no very great amount of interest taken in the coming election, and that this will, of course, augur ill for the Republican party. The General declares that no one can tell what is going to happen.

Stole Floral Offerings. La Patrie claims that early this morning some people took from the Front's tomb in Cote des Neiges Cemetery several of the floral offerings that were placed there yesterday afternoon.

Prohibition Talk. La Patrie, the organ of the Hon. Mr. Turle, speaking of the comparatively small majority in favor of prohibition, says: "Is it possible to believe that, in the face of these figures, the partisans of forced temperance will dare to speak in the name of the country and claim such an arbitrary law?"

Chief Powell of the Telegraphers arrived from Ottawa this evening, and states that he has a promise from Hon. A. G. Blair that the grievances of the F. C. R. will be attended to. The trouble on the Canada Atlantic, he adds, has likewise been arranged.

EAST NORTHUMBERLAND.

Douglas Asked J. H. Ross to Take a Drink and Asked Him for His Vote at the Same Time. Colborne, Ont., Nov. 2.—At the afternoon session of the Election Court to-day, the personal charges against Mr. Douglas, however continued. They were all similar to those of the morning, and, except in two cases, there was no allegation that liquor had been purchased after the election writ had been issued.

James H. Ross of Warkworth swore that when Mr. Douglas asked him to take a drink he had asked him for his vote, and when he promised to consider the matter he had treated him again.

Mr. Edward Cochrane, the Dominion member for the constituency, who had done some stumping for Dr. Willoughby, testified that on the Friday night before the nomination he was in a bar in Brighton with some others, and one of those present proposed that Mr. Douglas should "see" the drinks. Mr. Cochrane, with the intention of relieving Mr. Douglas from an embarrassing situation, proposed that he should do so, saying to Mr. Douglas that, of course, he could not, Mr. Douglas, however, told him that he could do so, and, despite Mr. Cochrane's representations, he did "set them up." When the evidence for the petitioner had been completed this portion of the case was left uncompleted to allow the witnesses for the respondent to arrive.

The next charge was that in which Geo. Johnson of Cranston Township, is accused of having offered to buy the votes of Fred and Victor Ellis at \$12 each. The Ellis brothers swore that the offer had been made, and Mr. Johnston made a general denial.

The court then adjourned until 9 o'clock to-morrow morning.

CONSPIRACY CASE CLOSED

Stares-Cook Combination Acquitted by Judge Snider Yesterday.

Stares Was on the Stand for Over Three Hours—Why He Did Not Keep Books—Other Charges Dropped—Cook Had No Interest in the Firm—News From Hamilton.

Hamilton, Nov. 2.—(Special)—The conspiracy case in which Stares and Cook, furniture dealers, are the defendants, was continued before Judge Snider this morning. J. R. Shaw of the Furniture Dealers' Association, Toronto, swore that in the presence of Detective Heffernan, Hotelkeeper Clancy of Toronto said that both Stares and Cook owned him money last July when he received consignments of furniture from them. He said that he had no invoice at the time, although he produced one in the witness box yesterday.

Simon Lawry testified to seeing a bale of what appeared to be wool leaving the rear of the King William Hotel, and gave a horse value at the assignment. On the Saturday night of the assignment he saw young Alfred Stares running out of the store, with a chain getting away with half a dozen, two at a time.
 Thomas Wallinger, an employe of Stares & Co., held Cook up to the witness stand on Friday, Aug. 5, the day before the celebrated assignment. There were a lot of upholstered goods in sight then. The Sunday after the assignment the witness examined the stock, and the only piece of upholstered goods there was a couch.
 Jake Mendel told the new familiar story of his purchase of furniture from Stares & Co. on Friday, Aug. 5, the day before the celebrated assignment.
 John McCarthy, hotelkeeper, Tillamook, bought furniture from Stares & Co., and gave a horse value at the assignment, and a note for \$47 in payment. He paid \$10 on the note, and also has a hotel bill against Stares, dated July 22, as a counter account.
 This closed the evidence for the prosecution.

Mr. Carswell, counsel for the prisoners, held that no case had been made out. The only thing that could be proved by the Crown was that no books had been kept for a month before the assignment.
 The Crown Attorney contended that when Stares and Cook went down to the store after the assignment and the latter secured the bundles of leashes of Stares, intending to, and did, pick out some of these leashes, which the creditors had never seen since. There were no entries of any of these leashes in any of the books. He said that if Hunter had not seen the leashes in the store, they would never have been heard of again. That some of them were heard of, and all was shown by the discovery of one in Cook's pocket.
 Evidence for the defence was given this afternoon. Stares was on the stand nearly three hours. He swore Cook was only an employe, with no interest in the business. He explained the various transactions, denying acting dishonestly or in any way connected with Cook to defraud the creditors. He also denied that any property was concealed anywhere. He admitted paying \$325 out of the \$350 he got from Cook on Aug. 5, the day he assigned. He attributed his failure to check books since last June to "carelessness." Cook, however, worked at Stares on wages since March. He denied conspiring with Stares or knowing anything of concealed goods.
 Judge Snider, after reviewing the evidence at length, held that the charge of conspiracy had fallen through, and he acquitted the prisoners. Several other charges of theft and concealing property were also dropped.

Council, Tired of One, Makes a Shut-
tlecock of the Other,

Not Seemingly to Know Where It is
At—Institution is Still Closed,
Pending Further Consideration—
Market Improvement Goes on
Merrily, Still Finding No Lions in
the Path—Who's to Be the Archi-
tect?—The Aberdeen Reception
Embarrassed—\$500 to Merritt—
Varied Resolutions—Sheppard and
Lamb Have a Tilt—Yesterday's
Council and City Hall Notes.

Yesterday afternoon's Council meeting revealed two things. First, it showed that the two mayoral candidates appreciate the maxim that silence is golden, and secondly, that Council has found a new football in the crematory closing controversy, in the interim, during which that music hall but, the elevator question, is temporarily laid aside.

The aldermen were started at the outset to learn by the following letter that the successful tenderer for the enclosures was tired of his bargain:

Office Toronto Fence Co., Nov. 2, 1898.
John Shaw, Esq., Mayor:
We hereby withdraw our tender for enclosures for elevators for new City Hall and ask for the return of our deposit.

Yours truly, Joseph Lea.

Who Got Their Work in?
Mr. Lea has troubles of his own now in the shape of the stairway contract, not left completed, and it is probable that he was induced by representations from parties who profess a desire to see the work of completion expedited, to make the compromise with the Board of Control, it will be recalled, recommended him to get this extra contract. But it was a lukewarm recommendation and Mr. Lea's tender was cordially endorsed when he moved to give it to the next lowest tenderer, the Cleveland Company. But when he also proposed that the whole length and give Mr. Lea back his deposit of \$100, Controller Hubbard and Ald. Lamb voted a general protest. A compromise was finally effected on the basis of a resolution by Ald. Leslie to give the Tyler Wire Works Company of Cleveland, Ohio, the contract at \$500, the question of refunding to the Toronto Fence Company, the lowest tenderer, their deposit was left to the Board of Control, at least a part of the elevator contract is finally awarded.

\$500 for Cyclone Sufferers.
Lawrence E. Sker, the secretary of the Citizens' Committee, having appealed for a grant to the cyclone sufferers, Ald. R. H. Graham moved, seconded by Ald. Crane, that the sum of \$500 be granted those who sustained serious loss through the cyclone in the neighborhood of Merritt, Ont.

Ald. Graham recalled how cyclone sufferers had no insurance to fall back on, like those who had previously been assisted after losses by fire, and the motion passed unopposed.

Market Improvement Endorsed.
The St. Lawrence Market improvement scheme was given a further impetus by Ald. Denton and Mr. Donald, and endorsed by the Property Committee.

Ald. Denton, in a letter, notified his colleagues that he would be absent for a couple of weeks, he requested to keep the crematory warm, intimated that he preferred to be an alderman rather than ask for the contract of architect, and that he would be absent until April 1, at least, for an experiment.

Ald. Leslie, who was in Omaha, when this was decided upon, moved in Committee of Council yesterday to have this report referred back, to have the reports of Dr. Sheppard in favor of keeping it closed and persons are not aware of their duty in regard to their heart's content if they have on hand a bottle of Dr. J. Fun Over Aberdeen Reception.
This resolution by Ald. Lynd and Leslie gave opportunity for some little flickers of sarcasm: "That the use of the Pavilion be granted the committee of citizens on Saturday evening, Nov. 5, for the purpose of holding therein the farewell banquet to His Excellency the Governor-General, and that the rental fixed therefor by bylaw be charged to the appropriation for reception purposes; and further, it is the desire of this Council that His Excellency the Governor-General and Lady Aberdeen be made the guests of the city during their stay here."

Ald. Score spoke in its favor, but Ald. Lamb objected "the first gentleman of our city" for his adaptability for such exalted functions. The latter resented this and Ald. Lamb persisted in his "less manly" by making enquiries as to the cost of the reception.

Said Ald. Lynd: How would it do for Ald. Lamb to move that His Excellency be limited to two tickleups a day? [Laughter.]

The motion carried with unanimity.

Will the People Chime to This?
"N. B. De Bellis" shouted Ald. Bowman, when Ald. Tallam, with the studied zest of a few months' consorting with British bootleggers, moved, seconded by Ald. Score, that "That leave be granted the introduction of a bylaw in Council providing for the purchase of 10,000 debentures for the purchase of a deal of 10 balls for the new municipal

buildings, to be submitted to the electors on January 1."

The Reception Committee will take up this Hallam perpetrated subject.

Give Us \$400 and We'll Cough Up.
The Assessment Commissioner wrote, notifying Council that an award in the Sunnyside matter had been made and that it could be fitted upon payment of \$400 costs "I think," said he, "it would be wise for the Council to give instructions to have this award taken up. The arbitrators were Messrs. George A. Case, Ed. Galley and J. J. Whitby."

This arbitration, it will be remembered, was to ascertain how much the city should pay for a strip of property belonging to the orphanage in order to extend Queen-street into High Park. The Council set the costs to be contracted at \$75. The understanding is that if the city agrees to take over the property the city pays half the costs, but if not it pays it all. The Board of Control must decide whether to pay the fees or not.

Leslie on the Water Rates.
This notice of motion by Ald. Leslie bore between his lines the marks of Treasurer Lynd's hand: "That it is in the interest of the public that such reductions shall be made in the water rates of the city, so that only such amount as is necessary for maintaining the average volume and running the water-works be collected from the consumers of water, and that hereafter the amount required for interest on the debenture debt and for sinking fund purposes be raised by general taxation."

That's a little-er," growled Ald. Crane, who saw other marks, in the shape of electors' crosses, between the lines.

Another resolution by Ald. Leslie and Frankland, to have a report to the Fire and Light Committee about moving Carlaw-avenue gas lamps out to the curb, was referred to the Fire and Light Committee.

Hot Race in Ward 1.
A third by Ald. Leslie and Richardson, stolen from the hands of the other two members from Ward 1, was carried: "That the Toronto Street Railway be now only giving a 24-minute service on Queen-street out of the Woodbine, the City Engineer be appointed to interview the company as to a more frequent service on that section."

The Business Tax Revived.
Ald. Davies advanced two notices of motion, reading thus: 1. "That the Committee on Legislation and Reception report upon the advisability of applying for legislation to the advantage of the city, for the purpose of enabling the city to access all stocks and personal property of retail merchants at the wholesale price, whether paid for by the retail merchant or not; also to consider the advisability of abolishing personal tax and substituting a business tax in lieu thereof."

And re City's Right to Petition.
"That the Legislation Committee also consider the advisability of applying for legislation giving the city the right to petition for or against any needed or proposed local improvement, to the extent of one-third of the total cost thereof, or to such an extent as the city's voters of the cost may appear."

Votes Recorded and Divided on Crematory.
Apart from what has already been mentioned the reports were generally concurred in. The discussion of the afternoon, however, centered upon the matter of closing the eastern crematory. This question resembles that of the elevators in that Council does not know where it is at with respect to it, and differs from it only in that it is the conflict of domestic or civic rather than outside influences which is causing the hesitation and still-er. game.

Board of Health, it will be remembered, visited this institution, and with Dr. Sheppard's recommendation that the crematory be closed, and the matter was referred to Council, and was closed. Then it got back to the Property Committee, which, on a catch vote of 5 to 4, favored the Board of Health. The Board of Control, and instead, laid before that body the report that the institution be kept closed until April 1, at least, for an experiment.
