SCIENCE OF CITY CONTROL

Glasgow Has Reduced Municipal Ownership of All Public Utilities to an Art.

TORONTO MAY PROFIT IN THIS

Street Cars, Telephones, Light and Other Commodities in the Field.

Glasgow, or in the local vernacular, "Glesca," is one of the many reasons for Scottish brag and, perhaps, its best excuse.

The name is not steeped in the romance and glamor which glorifies Edinburgh, but the municipality has reduced to a science the principle of public ownership of public utilities.

The city stands forth an unrivalled monument of the qualities which have given Scotland its place in the world's history.

He who owns Glasgow as his birthplace knows he is a citizen of no mean city, but of one rich in memories of the past and rich in life to-day.

Only in January last the corporation celebrated the 1300th anniversary of the death of St. Kentigern, or St. Mungo—clerk of venerable memory—founder of the city, and its patron saint.

His monument, a stately cathedral founded on the spot where he built his humble dwelling place—at once church and cell. His life is enshrined in the ancient form of the city's motto, "Let Glasgow flourish by the preaching of the truth."

Scotland did not like the Union, but the Union made Scotland. In 1707 the population of Glasgow was only 12,000. A century later it was 75,000—in 1811 it reached the 100,000.

By 1831 it had doubled; in 1851 it topped 300,000. In 1871 saw 478,000. The census of 1901 gave the population as 761,709, occupying an area of 12,688 acres.

Including the independent burghs of Govan, Kinning Park and Partick—really integral parts of the city—and the outlying suburbs, the inhabitants of the geographical area of greater Glasgow to-day exceed a million.

The average density of London is 51 per acre; in Glasgow it is 84, and in some districts 300 per acre. The average density of the population live in houses of one room, 45 per cent. in houses of two rooms, 45 per cent.

Under public ownership it foundered serious and pressing character, and made the task of administration doubly difficult.

Franchises—Water System. So far back as 1855 Glasgow began to acquire control of its public franchises. In that year the corporation obtained from parliament an act authorizing the utilization of the chain of lakes formed by Lochs Katrine, Achray, Venachar and Drunkle, about 35 miles distant.

The charm of that romantic district, which embraces the Trochairs, has been sung by the Wizard of the North in that finest of his romances, "The Lady of the Lake." These lakes yield a practically unlimited supply of what has been pronounced by experts to be the ideal water for domestic use.

The works were opened by Queen Victoria on Oct. 14, 1859, and have been enormously extended in more recent years. It is not possible to estimate all that this measure has brought of benefit to the citizens. In the mere matter of cost the relief was immediate and continuous. Under private ownership the rate was 32 cents per 50 or 60 gallons, while public ownership has reduced it to 24 cents.

This means to-day an annual charge of less than 24 cents per head for every citizen of the city's management and bold policy of the Town Council of the future.

Gas and Electricity. For years Glasgow suffered and chafed under the heel of a private monopoly, the Gas Company. The rising tide of discontent overflowed in 1868 and as extensions were then urgently required it was resolved at all costs to do away with the monopoly.

At the time the corporation was presented to parliament, but before the battle was joined the company came to terms. The city agreed to pay to the former shareholders 9 per cent. on \$1,500,000 of 10 per cent. maximum dividend stock and 6-3/4 per cent. on the balance of the purchase price. These terms were onerous, but the result has been a valuable boon to all classes, especially the poorer.

Electricity. The corporation has taken advantage of and has stimulated gas consumption, which is still increasing, despite the introduction and popularity of electric lighting.

Very Cheap Light. The corporation in due course undertook to supply electricity to the public and private properties. The highest price charged under public ownership in Great Britain is an amount one-third of the price charged in Toronto.

As to the Tramways. City tramways and their management have proved to be the crux of the battle royal waged between the supporters and opponents of public ownership. In view of the importance of the matter, not only in itself, but in its bearing on the situation in Toronto, a somewhat more lengthy analysis of the experience of Glasgow may be pardoned.

The tramways of that city have now been under the control of the Town Council nearly nine years. Sufficient time has therefore elapsed to test the efficiency of the service and the reliability of the financial results.

These have not escaped the keen eyes of public transit the civic tramways indeed, cannot be denied, except in points of the wisest detail. Upon the balance sheets and profit and loss accounts a fierce attack has been made.

In the first years of the experiment the accounts served to show a serious deficit in one of the most distinguished tramway accountants in England. Unfortunately for the city, there was no prophecy and predicted utter and disastrous collapse within a brief period.

Time, whose verdict is unchallengeable, has written futility and error rudely over these victimations. It is absolutely beyond denial that the service has been eminently satisfactory and that the financial results, in view of the many improvements made in the interest of the employees, are surprising and creditable in a high degree.

Service Roads Come In. It is a fact that in 1870 the tramway question came to the surface in Glasgow.

Tramways were in the air and enterprising promoters turned naturally to Glasgow as affording a fair field for exploitation.

In that year the corporation undertook to acquire the tramways, supply 200 cars, 50 omnibuses, 2000 horses of an average value of \$125 each, all harness and appliances, etc., also to endow the local company with heritable property of the value of \$100,000.

When the corporation was settled, it was found that the local company had received equipment amounting to about \$200,000 and that the promoters' right to lease represented close on \$300,000. This undoubtedly represented the working company through the currency of the lease.

The lease between the corporation and the company was for 23 years from July 1, 1871. By it the corporation undertook to lay the tracks. The company agreed to pay an annual interest charge on the full amount of the sinking fund large enough to clear entire cost of lines at expiry of the term of a renewal fund of 4 per cent. on cost of lines for the purpose of keeping them in repair; to receive from the city in perfect order in 1874, and to pay a mileage rental of \$700 per street mile. A tariff of 4 cents was also adjusted. The first section was opened for traffic on July 19, 1872.

Friction after a time developed between the company and the city, largely over system extensions. Branches thought by the corporation to be necessary and the public convenience were strongly opposed by the company, and the agreement had to be modified in 1881. In 1882 negotiations were opened for a renewal of the lease, but as the company declined to reduce the operating hours of its employees and give effect to other reforms required by the city, these failed for result. There being no proposal to introduce any other private company, the Town Council took up in earnest the advisability of itself undertaking the conduct of the system, and the parties faced each other and prepared for the struggle.

In 1883 the corporation offered a complete service of competing omnibuses, and as it declined absolutely to withdraw from the city, the corporation ceased negotiating for the acquisition of the company's plant.

At this juncture the Tramway Committee of the council was left with two years in which to organize a municipal service. This involved the acquisition of sites, the erection of stables, sheds and offices, the purchase of cars, engines and other equipment, the organization of a great transport organization, the engagement and training of employees and the purchase of the plant and fares. But so successfully was all this accomplished that on the morning of the 1st of January, 1884, the city service began with 108 cars, the horses doing only half work at first.

Our charges, reviewed of course, were to establish one-cent fares. In three months the original service had more than doubled. Our charges were reduced to one cent. The fare was issued, the two-cent stages were greatly lengthened and long routes cut. All the routes were now run in a neat uniform, their hours shortened to ten daily, and their wages raised. The result was a service that has never been finally abandoned the field.

Some Valuable Data. No better day can be given of the vast improvement effected by the corporation than the following comparative table, prepared by the late Lord P. The municipal system of telephones, having scarcely more than commenced operations, can only be mentioned. It is claimed, however, that there are already three times as many telephones in the city as when the corporation extended its service. There are no applications, indeed, were made, that the system had to be greatly enlarged, and a great deal of work has been done, charged by the National Telephone Company varied from \$70 to \$125.
