Transits of Venus.

Venus revolves round the Sun in about seven and a half of our months, at the distance of about 66,000,000 of miles, while that of the Earth is about 92,000,000. The plane of Venus' orbit cuts that of the Earth's at an angle of only $3^{\circ} 23' 30''$; and though Venus crosses the Earth's plane twice in each of its years, it is only at long intervals that the Earth is in a line with Venus and the Sun at the hour of this intersection—when that planet is seen crossing the face of the Sun, like a small round black spot. These transits occur at regular intervals of $121\frac{1}{2}$ years, 8 years, $105\frac{1}{2}$ years, and 8 years; then $121\frac{1}{2}$ again. The first that was observed was on December 6, 1639; the next on June 3, 1761; and the last on June 3, 1769, one century ago. The next will occur in December, 1874, after a lapse of $105\frac{1}{2}$ years from the last. In 1769, such a deep interest was felt in the expected transit, and in the questions of science it would help decide, that the European sovereigns sent out scientific observers to Lapland and Kamtchatka, to St. Helena, India, and the Cape of Good Hope, and the celebrated Capt. Cook to the Sandwich Islands. A deeper and more general interest will doubtless be shown in the approaching transit in 1874.

That in December 6, 1639, was witnessed by only two observers, young men in England. One of these, a curate named Horrox, only twenty years old, suspecting errors in Kepler's tables—who, with Galileo and Hevelius, asserted there would be no transit till 1761—went over the calculations with great care, and made sure of the result only in time to make it known to a friend named Crabtree. December 6 was the Sabbath; and with the keenest eagerness Horrox watched the Sun through his telescope from sunrise till the hour of public worship, which with real heroism he devoutly attended, and in the afternoon resumed his watching. The sky was somewhat clouded, but became clear before sunset, and to his unbounded delight Horrox found his calculations correct! a beautifully rounded globe was slowly crossing the Sun's disc! For half an hour he gazed on the sight, never before seen by man, and took several measurements. His friend Crabtree also caught a few moments' view of the transit, but was too much absorbed and excited to make any observations.

Planetary Notes.

Mercury will be at stations favorable for being visible March 3, July 1, October 22, being then in the east just before sunrise; also January 15, May 8, September 4, and December 29 being then low in the west soon after sunset. The planet is brightest at these times. Venus will be brightest January 17 and March 30. Mars not coming to the opposition this year, will not be brightest. Jupiter brightest December 13, rising at sunset. Saturn brightest June 16, rising at sunset.

Eclipses for the year 1870.

There will be six Eclipses this year, as follows :

I. A Total Eclipse of the Moon, January 17, in the morning, visible in Asia, Europe and the Western part of North America, but invisible in this Island.

II. A partial Eclipse of the Sun, January 31, visible in the Antarctic regions only.

III. An Eclipse of the Sun, June 28, not visible in America, but in the Southern Pacific Ocean, east of Australia.

IV. A Total Eclipse of the Moon, July 12; visible along the eastern extremity of South America and of North America, at Nova Scotia and Newfoundland, and will be seen on this Island a little before sunrise.

V. A partial Eclipse of the Sun, July 28, in the Arctic regions.

VI. A total Eclipse of the Sun, Dec. 28, invisible in this Island. The line of total obscuration runs through Southern Spain, Algiers, Sicily, Greece, Turkey, and into Russia.

There is farm-work for winter as well as summer. Labor if then accomplished leaves greater time and room for the necessary operations of seed-time and harvest. Many farmers fail to find this work—fail, perhaps, because they look in the wrong place for it, or have very little mind to engage in

anything beyond the necessary chores of foddering and firewood—giving these no very systematic or economical attention. The thorough systematic farmer thinks no duty or chore beneath his attention. He finds no lack of employment for every day in winter. Attention to the comfort and regular feeding of his cattle is repaid by their thrift and growth; the dairy does not cease to be productive; the young stock increase in weight and size; his sheep are gaining in flesh and wool, and promise a healthy increase the coming season.

their vitality for very many years. Instances have occurred of wheat having been grown from seed supposed to have been buried 2,000 years.

Parsnip and onion seed can only be depended on to grow the year after it matures. Beans are safe only for two years, as also are carrot, egg plant, and several of the pot-herbs. Radish, lettuce, spinach, parsley and asparagus, are good for three years. Celery, cabbage, cauliflower and turnip seed, may be tolerably relied on for four years after maturity. Beet, mangolds, tomato, squash, pumpkin, cucumber and melon, are good for five to ten years, and the four last, which are bi-sexual, generally produce the largest proportion of female blossoms, and consequently fruit, when grown from seed that has been kept from three to six years.

Farmers are not aware how much is wasted on their farms, that with little care and trouble might be made into valuable manure. Everything that can be decomposed, either in process of time, with the assistance of the elements, or by the aid of chemical agents, should be saved for the compost heap. Select some place in the barnyard, or adjacent lot, where it will be convenient of access, and there gather your compost, adding from time to time, such solvents as may be necessary. Here bring all the weeds, sods, briars, thistles, &c., that you are compelled to dig and cut up through the summer, and add to these, from time to time, whatever you have of waste material, muck from the swamp, decayed fruits, potato vines, leaves, the deposit from the sink, &c., and at the close of the year you will be surprised at the size of your heap, and be able to see for yourselves how much is really wasted on your farms that might be turned to valuable account.

There are few plants, the seeds of which will not grow in the second year after maturity, if kept in a cool place, neither too dry nor yet too damp. The seeds of most of the grains and grasses will keep

PROFITS OF PEANUT CULTURE.—Five hundred and forty acres on the farm of General Bryan Grimes, at Washington, N. C., are devoted to peanuts. Fifty bushels (and one hundred bushels is not an exaggerated estimate) per acre, at the moderate price of two dollars per bushel, will be \$54,000. Two thousand five hundred pounds of "long forage" to the acre will make 1,350,000 pounds, worth at least fifty cents per 109 lbs., making \$6,750. The peas that are left in the field with the "pops," will fatten 600 head of hogs, averaging 150 pounds, which will be 90,000 pounds of pork, which, at \$3 per 1,000 pounds for fattening, will give \$27,000. Total, \$87,000 for the crop.

THE OPEN FIRE.—"I am a firm believer," says Dr. Cuyler, "in the moral and spiritual influence of an open fire. The importance of good fences is well understood by those who have observed the difference between crops safe from all intruders, and those occasionally trodden down and ruined; between moving on with the work without interruption, and the frequent annoyance of stopping important operations, to run after intruding cattle, colts and pigs. Repairing fences in spring is one of the earliest tasks that claim the farmer's attention. Fences should be annually examined throughout their whole length. New board fences should never be battened on the face or joints over the posts, as the practice tends to cause decay; but when the ends begin to rot and become loosened, battens will secure and make them strong for several years longer. Many old farms are irregularly fenced; but whether old or new, they should, as soon as practicable, be regularly divided in the best manner. The old fences should be removed when necessary, and new ones erected in the right place.

RELAXATION.—That rest of the body which succeeds too hard and successful toil, is not to be compared with the repose which the mind enjoys under similar circumstances. The mind cannot always be attentive—the heart cannot support continual agitation: and both the one and the other require a time for relaxation.

As soon as the meadows are dry enough to bear feet without injury to the turf, they should be carefully picked of all loose and projecting

stones, which might injure a mowing machine, and then well rolled so as to make the surface as smooth and perfect as possible. Stumps should be dug or pulled out, brush and other rubbish removed, and small hillocks levelled down. Meadows which were top-dressed with coarse manure in autumn or winter, which was more or less spread in lumps, should be harrowed as early as possible, so as to break those lumps and spread the whole uniformly. Cattle droppings, on meadows or pastures, should be finely beaten to pieces and well scattered over the surface, as soon as the frost will admit, and before the frost has all disappeared from the soil. It is, perhaps, scarcely necessary to mention that no good farmer ever allows either his meadows or pastures to be touched by a hoof early in spring while the ground is soft. Much is lost by thin and uneven seeding of meadows.

dairyman, and this power extends also to all the productions made from milk, be they cream, butter or cheese.

Much of the bad flavour in butter and cheese is not caused so much by anything derived from the cow, or the food which she eats, as by odours imparted either to the milk after it is drawn or to the cheese after it is made, and before it is put in the cloth and rendered impervious to atmospheric influences. Hence the necessity of the greatest efforts being made not only to keep the dairy and every utensil used in a state of perfect cleanliness, but also the attendants should be in every way cleanly in person, and the air kept pure and uncontaminated by any odours whatever. To do this, charcoal, finely powdered, is probably the best and cheapest substance that can be used. It is capable, when fresh, of absorbing ninety times its own volume of ammonia or other gases, which can again be driven out of the charcoal by the application of heat.

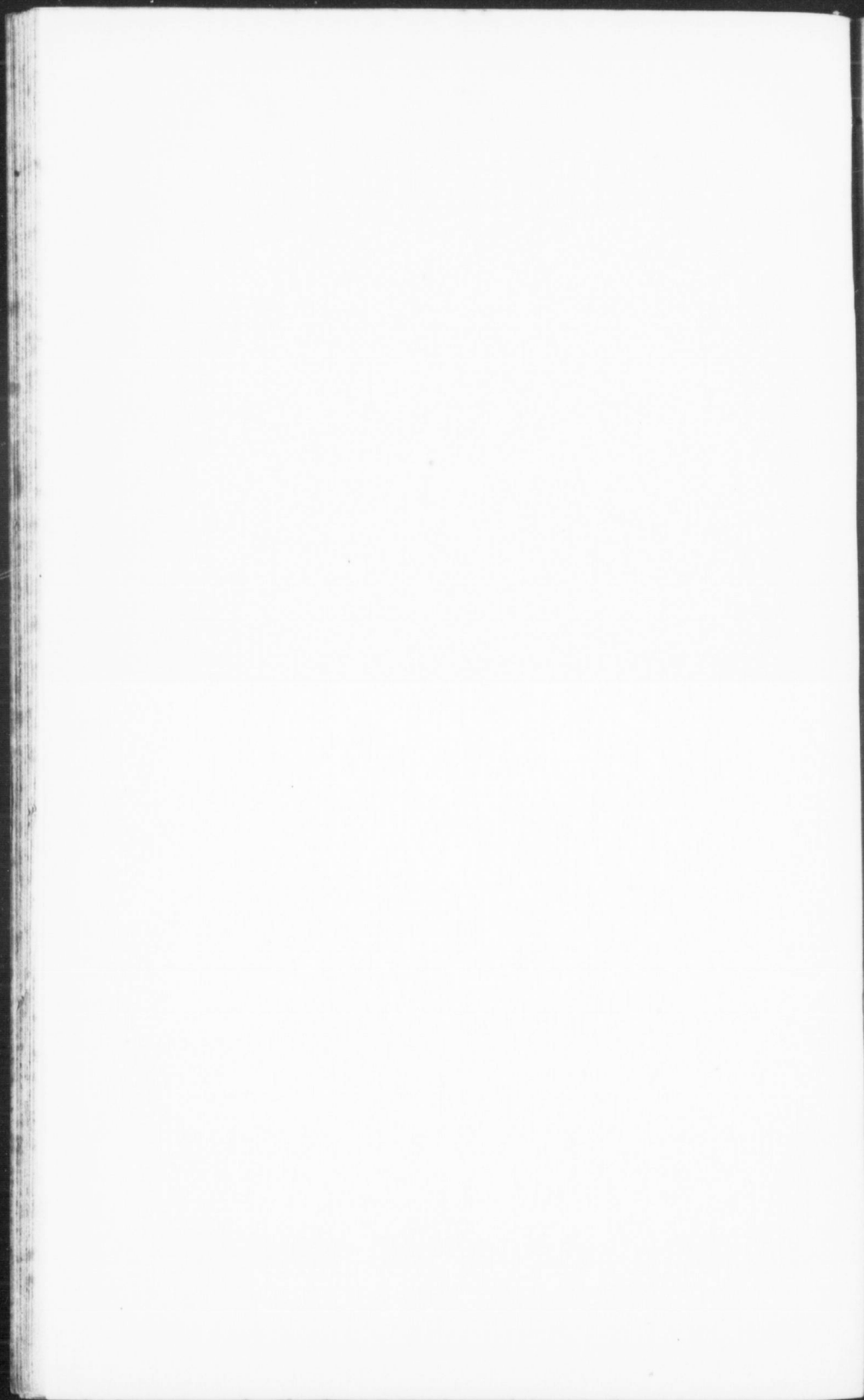

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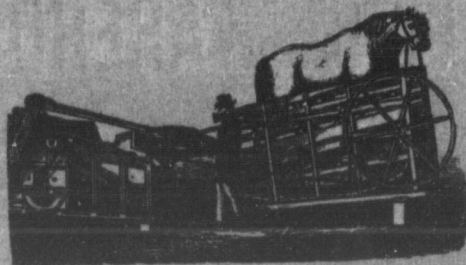

There are two ways in which land may be ameliorated and brought into good tilth and con-

dition for grain crops, and then seeded down to grass. The first is by growing roots with the help of manure, to restore fertility and get rid of weeds, which can be done to most advantage on fields already well worked and smoothed down by the action of the plough. The other is by summer fallowing. The latter is often objected to as entailing a loss of one year's crop, but this is more in theory than in practice, for there are fields on many farms that have remained in a state of rough pasturage, yielding but little grass for years, full of old stump roots, cradle knolls, wild grasses and weeds of every description, that can only be got rid of, and the land brought into a proper system of rotation, by first giving them a thorough summer fallowing, followed by fall wheat or barley, as the crop on which to seed down with clover or grass seeds.

Don't cure your hay too much. It hurts it to dry it to a crisp in a scalding sun. That wasn't the way our mothers used to cure herbs. They didn't want the life burnt out of them. Let us learn a thing or two from them. If you have grain to cut, don't let it stand a day too long. It musn't get fully ripe. It ought to be cut a week before it is hard, and then it will be worth more than if allowed to ripen. Don't try to mend the roof of a barn after the hay is stored in it. Nails are not good to mix with hay.

The people of Abyssinia are so well aware of the great loss which their country has suffered by the death of Theodorus, that they begin to venerate him as a saint. The German missionaries in Abyssinia report that thousands of pilgrims visit his grave, where a number of miracles are said to have occurred.

Didn't the weeds get a good start in the hurry of hay-time? Potatoes and root crops are apt to be neglected in the press of work. Those turnips look as if they needed thinning. If there are any spots where the mangolds, carrots or ruta-bagas look poorly, a little superphosphate scattered over them may start them up into a better condition. It is not too late to sow English turnips. The seed ought to be hoed or raked in, or else the first shower may float it off. A large supply of English turnips, a kind of a makeshift crop, is very useful on going into the winter. They help to break the sudden change from grass to hay in November and December, and they cost but little to raise. It is a good time to drain low lands, to ditch meadows, to haul off rocks, to plough lands that may be wanted for tillage next year, and to clean up bushy and rocky pastures. Bound-out mowing lots may be ploughed and immediately seeded down, with a good top-dressing of manure. Shares' harrow is the best to use on sod land. Now look out for the August caterpillar in your orchards. He is a mischievous fellow.

Observers, who have made the trip over the Pacific Railroad, notice the absence of song birds from the region through which the road passes. One of these observing travellers says that for five hundred miles he saw nothing in the feathered shape but hawks and sage hens, the latter a greyish white and somewhat mottled bird, rather larger and longer in body than our partridge.

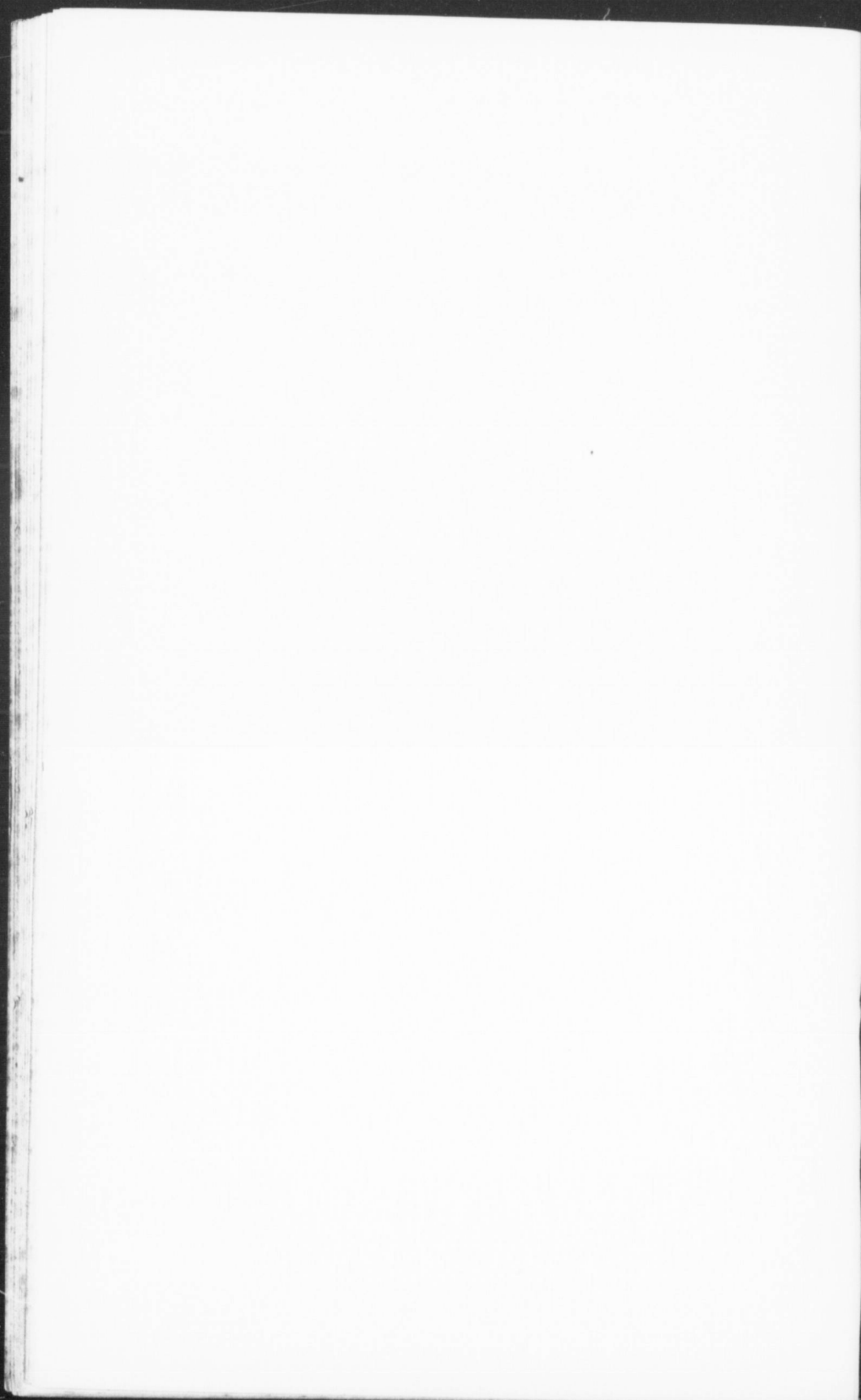

If you have to buy straw, it is better to do it in thrashing time. No farmer should sell straw, hay, or corn stalks, unless he spends the money for extra manures.

The cabbages and root crops need weeding again, perhaps. If you can apply a little liquid manure now, it will push ahead these crops very rapidly. Pastures may now be dressed with fine manures, like ashes, lime or bone dust. The fall rains will soak them into the surface. Grass seed may be sown. In fact it is the best time, on the whole to lay down lands to grass; and if there are any spots on the mowing lots, or on the pastures, that need re-seeding, sow now upon the surface, and go over with the harrow. Winter wheat and rye ought to go in now, on land well prepared. Rye is a good and paying crop. Why don't you raise more of it? Every farmer ought to raise enough for his own use. If you have feed enough, it is a good time to buy more cattle or sheep. The more stock, the more manure.

Harvesting continues through this month on most farms. Some of the roots may come out of the ground towards the close, but as a general rule this is the month of greatest growth of swedes and mangolds. The barn-yard may be cleared, the manure hauled out and ploughed in. It will be so much gain upon the spring's work. The yard should then receive a dressing of muck or loam, enough to act as an absorbent for any liquid manures that would run to waste. Some compost manures in heaps on the field, but this makes a great deal of extra work. It is a good plan to haul muck to the barn, or store it in the cellar, or somewhere under cover for use in winter. It is a good time to cut timber. The wood is now matured for the year, and it is better to cut all deciduous trees at this season than later. Something may be done in getting the buildings, fences, &c., ready for winter. In stormy weather, some inside work is to be preferred, and any needed repairs should be made in the barn. How is the fall feed in the mowing lots? Don't let the cattle eat too closely. A part may be fed off if it is heavy, but close feeding is bad economy. Don't forget to attend the fairs in your neighborhood.

The roots must be stored early this month. Let them dry a little in the sun or wind, before putting them in bulk. The work of handling them is very considerable; but it pays to dry them, and even let them "sweat" a little in the pile. There is the top-dressing

to go on also. A good top-dressing protects the grass roots, and if the surface is level, the waste of manure is very slight. Many a piece may be kept in good grass by a frequent top-dressing, and grass is the crop that we want in New England. Continue to cart out and plough in manure, if this job is not already finished. Cattle ought to be housed early, and not exposed to the chilling storms. Cows in milk will fall off, unless care is taken to bring them gradually to the winter feeding, by means of turnips or other succulent fodder. Fattening animals should now be pushed forward rapidly, hogs and sheep especially. It won't do to let them fall off now. Trim grape vines and fruit trees. Protect half-hardy plants. Snug up, and get things in order for a long winter. Better house and feed young cattle early. Don't let them gnaw the grass down to the roots. Start the farmer's club.

The chores will take a good deal of time. It's about as well to make pork of those April pigs. It don't pay to feed fat hogs after the weather has got to be as cold as this. Store pigs ought to have warm pens; warmth saves food. Can't you give them a few raw roots now and then? They keep

them healthy and thriving. Sheep do not need quite so close housing. They like an open shed. Young cattle must have warm shelter, plenty of food, and a good carding once a day. Cows in milk ought to have roots and shorts or warm mash every day. It will keep up the flow of milk, and if they give but three quarts a day it pays to milk morning and night, up to within six weeks of their coming in. Fattening stock need the eye of the owner. They must be pushed on rapidly now; a change of food is good for them, and so is a daily carding. The horses must be kept well shod. The evenings are long, and there is time for reading, study, and the farmers' club. Take an inventory of all the stock and tools, and sum up the work of the year. Square of those debts, if you would close the year in peace.



Prince Edward Island contains an area of about 1,250,000 acres, nearly all of which is fit for cultivation. It is divided into three Counties and 67 Townships. The population is 90,000—of whom about 40,000 are in Queen's County. The population of Prince and King's Counties is nearly equal. Charlottetown, the Capital of the Island, is in Queen's County, and contains about 7000 inhabitants. Responsible Government was granted in 1851. The number of Schools now in operation is 330. In 1852, when the present Free Education Act was passed, the number was 160. There is besides the Prince of Wales College (public,) and St. Dunstan's College, (R. Catholic,) a County Grammar School in Georgetown, Summerside and Charlottetown, and 15 similar Schools throughout other parts of the Island. The whole cost of public Education, which is under the control of a Board of Education, consisting of nine Members and two Examiners, is defrayed out of the general revenue. There is a School Visitor for each County, who reports to the Board and the latter to the Government. By the census of 1861, there were on the Island—856 Threshing Machines, 3 Tobacco Factories, 89 Fishing Establishments, 141 Grist Mills, 46 Carding Mills, 176 Saw Mills, 9 Fulling and Dressing Mills, 48 Lime-kilns, 9 Brick-kilns, 159 Churches, 55 Tanneries, 20 Breweries and 1,239 Fishing Boats. The number of Sleighs and Carriages manufactured that year was 1,151. There were grown or manufactured in 1860—

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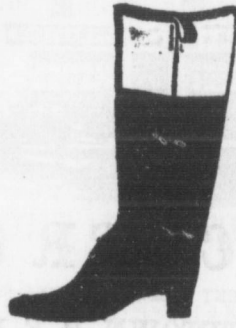
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
