



PREFACE.

The Western Counties Annual and Almanac for 1887 is now offered to the public. It will be seen at a glance that it is a decided improvement upon, and a much larger and more substantial work than, the Old Kent County Annual which it purports to supersede.

It is hoped that at least beyond captious criticism the new venture will meet with general approval. MORNING AND EVENING STARS, 1887.


Venus will be an evening star to Sept. 21st, then a morning star.

Saturn will be an evening star from January 9 to July 18th, then a morning star.

ECLIPSES, 1887.

In the year 1887 there will be four eclipses, two of the sun and two of the moon, but only one—a partial eclipse of the moon February 8th—is visible in Canada. It occurs: Moon enters Shadow 3.56 a.m., middle of Eclipse 5.04 a.m., Moon leaves Shadow 6.12 a.m.

The grant to Her Majesty includes income from the Duchy of Lancaster which yields some \$275,000 per year. Besides, as her private estates, she owns the estates of Osborne, Claremont and Balmoral. She must also have many millions invested. She also owns property at Cobourg and Hohenlode in Europe.

The grant to the Prince of Wales includes \$50,000 to the Princess and the Revenue of the Duchy of Cornwall worth some \$300,000 annually. Marlborough House is given him as a London residence. His private estate amounts of 14,884 acres yielding a rental of \$47,000 yearly. He

receives also a considerable sum for military services.

Prince Alfred receives free the furnished Palace of Clarence House. He is heir to the Duchy of Saxe Cobourg-Gotha, worth \$150,000 per annum, and his wife has an annuity of \$56,250 from the Russian Government, and is the richest heiress of Europe.

Bagshot Park is given to Prince Arthur, and like his elder brothers receives a large sum for military and other appointments. The husband of Princess Louise is heir to the Argyle Dukedom

Cousin George, Duke of Cambridge, pockets besides his Annuity of worth \$254,310 per year. \$60,000, emoluments to the extent of \$51,015 per annum. Prince Edward and Prince Leiningen also receive liberal salaries, probably fairly earned. Take it all in all, not only the Queen and family but her "cousins and her aunts and uncles too" are liberally pensioned by the much enduring British taxpayer, and are not apt to suffer for the want of a square meal three or four times

HOUSE OF LORDS.

Excepting perhaps the one or two creations occasioned by the late changes in Ministries, the membership of the House stands at about 540, an increase of some 20 members since 1884. The Roll comprises: 3 Princes of Royal blood, 2 Archbishops, 2 Dukes of Blood Royal, 29 Dukes (22 sit with inferior titles), 33 Marquises (13 sit with inferior titles), about 185 Earls (45 sit with inferior titles), 40 Viscounts (8 or more sit with inferior titles), some 219 Barons and 3 Lords of Appeal in Ordinary. Of the number 12 are minors.

Included in the above aggregate are 16 Scotch representative Peers who are elected by the Peerage of Scotland from amongst their number for each Parliament. There are also 28 representative Irish Peers elected for life. Lords of Appeal sit by virtue of their office. Bishops also sit by virtue of their Bishoprics—temporal Baronies. Seven Junior Bishops, although spiritual Peers of Parliament, have no seats in the House The 16 Scotch Peers elected last July (1886), comprise 10 Earls and 6 Lordships.

Many Peerages have no representation in the House of Lords. In Scotland 21 leading Peers,

in Ireland 67, and in England 7 Peeresses in their own right.

The first name on the Roll is that of the Prince of Wales who is followed by the Royal Dukes, the Archbishop of Canterbury, Lord Chancellor, Archbishop of York, Lord President of Council and Lord Privy Seal. The political classification of the Lords, not reckoning the Royal Dukes who are supposed to be neutral and abstain from voting on political questions, is in round numbers 300 Tories and 240 Liberals, although in party questions many Liberals vote with the Tories.

Some 440 members and their families own (nearly) 15,000,000 acres of land or fully one fifth of the United Kingdom. Of the Church Beneficies of the Church of England, 4000, or nearly 1/4 of the number lie in the patronage of the Lords, scarcely 850 lying in the patronage of the Crown. They or their families are also for the most part Lord Lieutenants of Counties and in

that capacity appoint almost all the County Magistrates.

No English Peer or Peeresses can be arrested for debt, need not serve on juries or be called out in the militia. They can sit in any court in England with their hats on, may carry arms, and if they commit a felony they must be tried by their Peers. They do not require the suffrages of the people to elect them to the House; they go there independently of the people, legislate independently of the people if they are so disposed. Ability, talent, popularity—the requisites of a popular choice in the representation for the House of Commons-form no consideration or object with them. "Let their acts be ever so objectional they cannot be ousted at the polls. There is no such a thing as a dissolution of the House of Lords; no such a thing as a political death, but practically a political immortality. They step into the temple of honor through the tombs of their fathers and go on as they did, and because they did—a priveleged class, which in consequence has begot ignorance, selfishness and arrogance.

POPULAR PARLIAMENT.

The Roll of membership numbers 670. England and Wales return 495 members, Scotland 72 and Ireland 103 members. Counties are represented by 377 members, Boroughs by 284, and Universities by 9 members. Under the new Distribution Bill, of 1884, England and Wales gained 6 new additional members and Scotland 12. Ireland stands the same.

The present electorate, as resulting from the new Franchise Act of 1884, is 5,711,325 or about one elector to every six of population. The following table shows the electorates prior to and under the present Franchise Act, and the representation in the House prior to and under the present Distribution Act.

The anomalies in the old representation were great. One Borough had only 2,426 of a population, 42 less than 7,000, 72 less than 10,000 and 5 less than 20,000, and the lot returned 144 members. Warwick with a population of 12,000 returned 2 members, whilst Glasgow and Liverpool with populations over 500,000 each, returned but 3 members, and London with a population of over 4,000,000 returned only 32 members. The new Bill greatly equalizes the

In the old House, and the present is not far unlike, 200 members were landowners, owning over 2,000,000 acres, and nearly seventy were sons or heirs to Peers. Some 275 represented the aristocratic interest, nearly the same number the land interest, 165 the fighting interest, 125 the law interest, 115 the official interest, 120 the railway interest, 75 the literary interest, 25 the banking interest, 25 the liquor interest and about 160 the trade and manufacturing interest. In

this classification many members are supposed to appear in different representations.

Three members of the House have sat over 50 years Mr. Talbot has sat continuously for Glamorgan since 1830, C. P. Villiers has sat continuously for Wolverhampton for 50 years. W.

E. Gladstone has sat since 1832 and Lord Granville about 50 years.

The old qualification for members of £600 for Counties and £300 for Boroughs, has been abolished, and majority—21 years of age—is now the only qualification necessary. Parliaments are limited to seven years duration, unless sooner dissolved.

The political complexion of the present House is 317 conservatives, 76 Liberal-Unionists, 192 Gladstone Liberals and 85 Nationalists. It is, however, somewhat singular that although the Liberals were beaten badly as to membership, the aggregate votes polled in the contested elections were largely in favor of the Liberals. The members receive no pay or indemnification

Provinces and Oudh, Punjab, Central Provinces, Burmah and the great and half regal Governorships of Madras and Bombay, governed in kingly style by Grant Duff, Esq., and Lord Reay respectively. The Governor Generalship of India is Vice regal in standing. Besides the salary named he receives £12,000, say \$60,000, as an allowance.

One half of the sea going vessels of the world fly the British Flag, manned by 300,000 sailors. Two-thirds of the ocean steam fleets belong to the British, and five-sixths of all steamers sailing to American ports are British bottoms. Fifty per cent. of the commerce of the world is carried in British Ships. Two-thirds of the annual tonnage built belong to Britain. The banks of the Empire transact one-third the business of the entire world. Her manufactures comprise one-third those of Europe. Thirty-four per cent., or more than one third of the world's commerce belongs to the British Empire. About 30 per cent. of the steam factory power in the world is British. The wealth of the Empire is computed at \$62,300,000,000, justifying the old expression that it is the richest State on the face of the earth. The earnings of the United Kingdom, per inhabitant, is double that of Europe, and those of the chief British colonies equal to any nation. It is, in fact, an Empire—"a nation full of life and energy," as Secretary of State, Mr. Frelinghuysen, of the United States wrote to his son, adding "when people tell you that Great Britain is going to decay don't believe them." It is the greatest nation in the world. In illustration of these assertions the following comparative tables will be found convenient and appropos.

The debt of Great Britain is now properly \$3,585,000,000. It is decreasing rapidly and at the present decrease ratio under the sinking fund now in operation will wipe itself off early in the next century—1900. It stood in 1815 at \$4,200,000,000 and consequently has decreased over \$600,000,000—\$100,000,000 of which is since 1870. But for expensive wars continually cropping up the debt would go down as fast as that of the United States. It forms a safe investment for the monied, is carried at the lowest interest in the world and held entirely within the people of the country. The debts of the Colonial Empire are also held within the British people themselves. The debts of the Colonies are also to a great extent set off by profitable public works.

selves. The debts of the Colonies are also to a great extent set off by profitable public works. The debt of the United Kingdom bears lighter upon her people than any other country save perhaps Germany and the United States. The people bear fewer local debts. The debt of the country may be high according to her thickly settled population, but her people are wealthier and earn higher wages and incomes. Her artisans and laborers receive nearly double the wages received on the European Continent, although less than in the British Colonies and the United States. Reference to the debt and wealth ratio, will show Russia, Austria and Italy bearing a heavy debt burden—debts which are carried only at excessive interest and continually increasing.

The wealth of Great Britain is estimated as \$40,640,000,000, and the income \$6,000,000. The wealth of the Empire is over \$65,000,000,000. The capital of British capitalists invested in the Colonies is alone \$3,100,000,000 and proportioned as follows:—

But this is not all. The Colonial Empire also furnishes ready to hand a considerable force of trained and armed men. The Canadian volunteers number 37,350. Regiments of militia are organized in the Channel Islands and volunteer corps in the colonies of West Indies, Cape, Ceylon, Hong Kong, Malta, Natal, New South Wales (including artillery corps) Tasmania, Victoria, western Australia and India. Besides, in urgent cases of emergency when the empire is seriously threatened, the able-bodied men of the British speaking colonies alone, say between the age of 18 and 45, would furnish an army of 1,000,000 and those of India, many millions more.* In fact, on short notice an additional available force of 1,000,000 trained soldiers could be put into the field and kept there an indefinite period. No other nation could stand the expense of two campaigns.

The navy comprises about 275 vessels nearly all in commission, the great portion of which are steam vessels of great size, strength, speed, heavily armoured and armed with the heaviest of guns. It will match any two navies of the nations of the world. It is manned by 59,000 sailors and marines with a reserve of 40,000 more.

Many of the vessels forming the column "other vessels" are small ships or steam craft, as for instance those of Holland; others again are gunboats. The army of Holland includes 30,000 men in the Indies. The army of Turkey is properly very much larger, although not directly with the colors.

The cost of the British Navy, say per every 100 tons of tonnage, is little more than one-half that of France and Germany and but one-third that of Russia. The cost of repairs and maintenance is equally as favorable to the British in comparison. So, also, is the cost of coal and engine room stores. Looked at as a guardian of ocean shipping, the cost of protecting every 100 tons of shipping, is annually for France \$3,890, Russia \$3,470, Austria \$1,280, Italy \$935, and

Great Britain only \$575.00.

But numerous and strong war vessels are not alone all powerful. In the event of a war, the vessels of nations having few or no ports outside their own country labor under serious disadvantages. Without coaling at short intervals, of from ten days or two weeks, (and in war coal becomes "contraband of war" in neutral ports) the greatest ironclad becomes useless, and the fast cruiser-commerce-destroyers of an enemy mere logs upon the waters. Without a fine transport service only available in the possession of fine fast passenger fleets and manned by a ready reserve of sailors, no nation can carry on a successful foreign campaign. Britain, possessing a

cordon of fortified stations the world round, can, and at any time, either repair, equip, coal, run for shelter or safety and bring her prizes to, at convenience. Her ships are seldom—need be seldom—beyond a 1,000 miles of her own friendly ports. Coal is truly King! This was shown lately, when on the eve of a prospective Russian-English war, the former country endeavoured to secure through some Sunderland (England) dealers a supply of 10,000 tons of coal. Contrast Britain's position, when in addition to her enormous out-put at home she has at command the mines of Nova Scotia, British Columbia, New Zealand, Australia and large accumulated stores at every port of her own the world round. She also holds every strategic position which would enable her to protect her own interests and harass an enemy. For instance, no enemy's fleet could leave the mediterranean sea by passing Gibraltar! No enemy could leave it by the Suez Canal and Red Sea, for Perim and Aden practically closes that route as a cork does a bottle. Can't and Malayan Sea is equally at her mercy, and from thence the whole Indian Coast and Malayan Seas are under her sway. Cordons of Forts and harbours guard both African shores and the routes to Australia. It is the same on the American continent, and Hong Kong, Port Hamilton &c., guard the Chinese seas. A powerful nation indeed, and do not be foolish to belittle it.

Great Britain, Sweden and Norway, Denmark, Holland, nearly all Germany and Switzerland, the United States, Canada and British Colonies, have, as the prevailing or predominant religion, either the Episcopalian, Protestant, Reformed or Lutheran. All of South America, Spain, Portugal, France, Belgium, Austria and Italy, generally profess the Catholic Religion. Montenegro, Roumania, Russia and Servia follow the Greek Church; and Turkey, Persia, the Mohammedan faith. Most of the leading nations allow universal toleration.

Assiniboia returns 2, Alberta I, and Saskatchewan I, in all 4 members from the N. W. Territory to the House of Commons. The N. W. Council is partly appointed and partly elected.

Senators are appointed by the Crown (Dominion Cabinet) for life. Parliaments of the House of Commons, if not sooner dissolved, terminate every five years; Parliaments of Local Assemblies every four years. The pay or indemnity of Senators is \$1,000; of members for the House of Commons \$1,000, and of members of the Assemblies (Ontario at least) \$600, for every ession or year, besides mileage for travelling expenses to and from Parliament. In the Dominion Parliament the merchants rank first with 85 representatives; the lawyers come next with 54; farmers, 34; doctors, 16; mill owners, 16; gentlemen, 14; builders, 12; and journalists, 8. In point of nationality seven races or their descendants are represented; English, 58; French, 49; Irish, 44; Scotch, 35; American, 20; German, 4; and Danish, 1.

It will be interesting to note that at an early period of our history the establishment of a Canadian nobility was an "idea" of Pitts and attempted to be carried through the Imperia Commons. An historian speaking of it says, "if it had carried many a pleasant farce woul be witnessed—the Duke of Ontario leading in a cart load of hay, my Lord Erie pitching, and Sir Peter Superior making the rick; or perhaps his Lordship would figure as a petty-fogging lawyer, his Grace as a pedlar and Sir Knight as a poor parson starving on 5,000 acres of clergy reserve lands." If Gourlay were now alive he would see these same persons railway magnate who run the Government for their own interests, leading politicians who use their positions to fill their pockets by selling R. R. Charters, grant Government bonuses to railways in which they are interested, or political brokers who effect Government contracts, acquire ranches and timber limits, for an interest or blind share in the same.

The Hamilton and Northwestern and the Northern Railway of Canada are operated jointly asone system. The Montreal & Vermont Junction Ry. is operated by the Central Vermont; so also is the Stanstead, Shefford & Chambly. The St. Lawrence & Ottawa is now included in the Canada Pacific system. The North Shore now also belongs to the Canada Pacific system.

The cost of the Windsor Branch is included in that of the Intercolonial. The cost of several railways forming the Canada Pacific, Grand Trunk, and New Brunswick systems, represent the cost to the present proprietors. In the case of the North Shore and Canada Central (Q. M. O. & O. Montreal to Ottawa) the Dominion Government pays 5% on the Dominion bonus to the Quebec Government. The G. T. R'y own about 525 miles of railway in American territory—3116 miles in all. The cost of the Great Western system was about \$50,510,500. The old Grand. Trunk railway (original) was about \$171,719,000.

The Government grant is \$96,000. This extension will be 29¾ miles in length. Unless on special occasions the Government grants do not exceed, and generally are \$3,200 per mile. The Montreal and Lachine Railway, and the St. Lawrence and Champlain Railway-theformer built in 1847, were the initial Canadian Roads. There were but 55 miles of railway in operation in 1850; in that year, however, the Grand Trunk, Great Western and Northern Ry's. were commenced upon, and were more or less open in 1853 and 1854 respectively.

Of the 22 Presidents, 13 were of English descent-Washington, Adams, Jefferson, Madison, Monroe, Quincy Adams, Harrison, Tyler, Taylor, Pierce, Lincoln, Garfield, and Cleveland. Five (5) were Scotch—Irish lineage—Jackson, Polk, Buchanan, Johnson, and Arthur Two (2) were of Scotch descent Grant and Hayes; one of Welsh descent-Jefferson, and one of Dutch descent, VanBuren.

Several have risen from the ranks, Lincoln was a Railsplitter; Garfield was a Canal Boy; Andrew Johnson was a Tailor and Cleveland a Newspaper Boy.

AMERICAN CANAL AND RAILWAY LAND GRANTS.

Land Grants were first made to the different States as the works for which they were given being intirely local undertakings confined to such States. The first grant was to the States of Indiana and Ohio for the purpose of constructing the Wabash and Eric Canal. This was in 1827. Subsequent grants for different canal schemes followed, receiving 4,500,000 acres.

The first railway grant was made to the States of Illinois, Mississippi and Alabama, and out of this came the Illinois Central railway. This was in 1850; and between that date and 1861 Western States received 53,000,000 acres for railway purposes.

Direct Grants to railway corporations were first made in 1862, the first being to the Union

Pacific Railway. The principal of these grants were:

1 Union & Central Pacific Railways. 22,500,000

2 Northern Pacific Railway 46,000,000

3 Atlantic & Pacific Railway 27,000,000

and with lesser grants fully 200,000,000 acres have altogether been granted for railway purposes. In 1864 the grant to the Union Pacific Railway was doubled, and it was in connection with this second or additional grant that the "Credit Mobilier" scheme scandal arose. No land grants

HOMESTEAD ACT

first came into operation in 1862, concurrently with the first Pacific Railway grants and was one of the first acts approved by Abraham Lincoln. Under it some 700,000 entries have been made and some 85,000,000 acres taken up by settlers.

THE WESTERN DISTRICT.

This territory originally formed a chief and the early settled part of the old District of Hesse, one of the four divisions into which Lord Dorchester had divided the Upper Country (Ontario) in 1788 and which, upon the sitting of the first Upper Canada Parliament in 1792, was changed in name to the Western District and then comprehended a considerable area—all west of a meridian passing through the extremity of Long Point. It included the State of Michigan and other now American territory—indeed Detroit was the District town and at the said Parliament was then represented. For, although the lands of Michigan had been ceded to the newly fledged U. S. Republic by the treaty of 1783, their cession was deferred until re-ceded under the Jay treaty of 1796, because of a breach of faith on the part of the latter Country in connection with the U. E. Loyalists.*

In 1794 territorial counties and townships were formed and first named as presently, (previously townships had been called by numerals); and in 1796 the boundaries of the Western District confined to the said meridian on the east, Lake Erie on the south, and the Detroit and Sinclair Rivers on the west, and included all lands north westerly, not within the bounds of the Hudson Bay Company and the treaty of the United States.

In 1798, new districts were formed—twelve in all—the Western, now confined in area to about what is now the Counties of Essex, Kent and Lambton; the latter two forming one County—Kent, the County of Essex, comprising the Townships of Rochester, Mersea, Gosfield, Maidstone, Sandwich, Colchester, and the tract occupied by the Huron Indians upon the Strait, together with the Islands on the Strait, Lake Erie and Lake St. Clair, opposite thereto; and the County of Kent comprising the Townships of Dover, Chatham, Camden, (distinguished by being

*For, as Lord Caermarthen puts it to Mr. Adams, "that you have not kept faith with us—you agreed to permit the refugee U. E. Loyalists to return to the various states to collect their debts. called Camden West; the Moravian tract called Orford, and distinguished by being called North and South Orford, Howard, Harwich, Raleigh, Romney, Tilbury, East and West; and the Township of Sinclair, occupied by the Shawanee Indians, together with the Islands on Lake the Township of Sinclair, occupied by the Shawanee Indians, together with the Islands on Lake Erie and Lake St. Clair, opposite thereto. The date of incorporation of other townships with their names and boundaries will be found upon reference to the tabulated list of Western District Townships given elsewhere. Lambton County became, substantially, a separate County as County for political purposes, and an independent County for general purposes, and to Kent formerly the north portion of Zone, originally called North Orford, and the boundaries of some other townships have been slightly changed. Tilbury West, originally in Kent, was added to Essex County in 1852.

The townships comprising the electoral divisions of West Middlesex and West Elgin formed part of the same Western District until 1798, thence that of the London District. The District Town of this territory was some time Vittoria, Norfolk County, but in 1826, London became the same. Under the Municipal Act of 1849, Middlesex and Elgin assumed a joint existence in 1850, but in 1854 Elgin County separated therefrom, becoming an independent county of itself.

Chatham is the only paid Fire Department. Sarnia and Windsor have Water-works; Point Edward has also a pipe on the main street operated by G. T. Ry. Water-works. The annual cost of the Chatham paid Fire Brigade is about \$5,000, which includes 3 horses, 5 paid permanent officers and some II men who are upon a small salary and subject to fire calls, and domicile at the Station House—Besides the Paid Officers of the Water-works at Windsor, about 28 men are paid about \$50 each and subject to fire calls. †The salary of the fire engineer, Petrolia, includes duties as Chief of Police. *Salary includes position as Chief of Department. Alvinston, Arkona, Belle River, Essex Centre, Forest, Kingsville, Newbury, Oilsprings, Sandwich, Thedford, Wardsville and Wyoming have no fire brigade.

WATER WORKS.

Sarnia and Windsor have Water-works, the former cost some \$100,000 and the latter \$148,ooo (originally \$127,000). The income of the Windsor Water-works is \$21 000; of the Sarnia Works about \$7,500. The Sarnia Works have a paid staff of one chief engineer at \$600 and two assistants at \$550 each. The staff of the Windsor Works is a Secretary at \$700, one chief engineer at \$900 and two assistants at \$660 and \$640 respectively.

The Pioneer newspaper of the district was the "Emigrant," published at Sandwich by John Cowan, the first issue of which is dated 17 Nov., 1831, the prospectus reading:—

"The attention which we have been obliged to bestow on the management of the office will not allow us to present our readers with a prospectus of the Emigrant in the present number. We shall briefly state that the paper will be devoted to foreign and domestic intelligence, agriculture, horticulture, the mechanic arts, the sciences, domestic economy and literature; and the support of morality, religion and temperance. The Emigrant will be especially devoted to the agricultural interests and a developement of the resources of this hitherto almost unknown district, with a view of attracting attention to a country which offers to the industrious emigrant advantages not surpassed by any on the continent.

ED."

The second newspaper was the "Western Herald," published at Sandwich by H. C. Grant which first appeared 27 Feb'y 1838, and the third and first Chatham newspaper "Chatham Journal," published by Charles Dolson, 30th July, 1841.

OUR NATIVES.

The existing Indians of the Western District are still comparatively numerous, although, as will be hereafter noticed, a large number are foreign to the soil—not to the manor born—and are now confined exclusively to their settlements. These settlements or reserves are tracts of land which were reserved for their own use, out of the larger tracts which they surrendered to the Crown. The number, area and population of the reserves, date of contracts, and other particulars concerning them are as follows:

Anderdon Reserve, the oldest in the Western District, dates from the 19th of May, 1790, when by treaty the four nations—Ottawas, Chippewas, Pottawattomies and Wyandotte Hurons—for a consideration of £1200 surrendered to the Crown the tract of lands (2,000,000 aeres) lying south of the Indian Line and west of Fish Creek, reserving for themselves the small portion of it situated on the Detroit River, some 7x6 miles square, and inclosing an area of 23-500 acres. By a surrender dated 11th September, 1800, 1240 acres (Huron Church Reserve, 1078 acres) were transferred to the Crown for a consideration of £300, of which 130 acres of the same were set aside for military and other purposes. A farther and large surrender was made in 1836, when 14,620 acres passed into the hands of the government to be sold for Indian interest, 7,550 acres of which was to be for the exclusive benefit of the Wyandottes and the balance for the other Indians generally. It was at this time that a portion of the Wyandotte tribe in Anderdon and the Wyandotte tribe then located at Sandusky removed to the State of Missouri. Subsequent sales reduced the land area to 4,900 acres, at which the area of the reserve now stands. In 1832 the Indians numbered 374; in 1847 they were 368; in 1850 but 90; and at present, per last census and government returns, 86. Under the act of 1880 many of the Indians have been enfranchised. "Brave" White, the father of Sol White, M.P., was the last chief.

CARADOC OR UPPER THAMES RESERVE results from a treaty dated 18th July, 1822, between the Chippewa Indians and the King of Great Britain, whereby the former surrendered into the latter for a tract of land—"long tract"—north side of the River Thames, part of which had already been covered by the treaty of 9th March, 1819, extending from the Township of London to the Township of Sombra (Sombra had been surrendered by treaty 7th September, 1796, 88,000 acres), and containing 580,000 acres of land, reserving unto themselves a portion of it, comprising 15,320 acres. In 1834, for a consideration yielding £160, 3,225 acres of this reserve was sold, leaving as the present area some 12,095 acres. The unoccupied lands of the reserve are leased to white settlers in the interest of the Indians. There are practically three

The Chippewas only settled permanently on the reserve about 1830. In 1857 they numbered 340; in 1885, 452, or with the Munseys, 575.

The Munsey Indians occupy the northern portion of the Caradoc settlement. They are foreign Indians, coming from the United States in 1800 to the number of 240, and settling on the reserve with the consent of the Chippewas. They occupy about one-third of the reserve, but own no portion of it This large and increasing occupation was more than the Chippewas calculated, and in consequence ill-feeling arose, causing the removal of many Munseys to Moraviantown. In 1857 they numbered 240; now only 123 are located there.

POTTAWATTOMIES INDIANS occupy also a portion of the Caradoc reserve, but own none of the land. They live in rear of the settlement, and number a few families, some 20 persons.

THE DELAWARE OR ONEIDA SETTLEMENT, occupying lands in the Township of Deleware, are also foreign Indians, who arrived from Oneida Lake, U.S., in 1840. They then numbered 436. This reserve contains 5,400 acres (originally 5,000), and was purchased with money brought with them by the Governor-General of that date. In 1857 they numbered 517, and are now about 770 strong.

Moravian Settlement dates from 1793, when an order-in-council was passed, granting under the auspices of the Society of Moravian Missionaries, to a number of Deleware Indians who had been christianized and brought from the United States, 51,160 acres in Zone and Orford. This settlement is particularly interesting in its being the scene of the battle ground fought between the American and British armies in 1813, when the brave Tecumseh fell. Their village, then located on the Zone bank of the Thames, was the immediate theatre of the fight, and in the immediate neighborhood lie buried those who fell in the struggle, as also some of the early missionaries. In 1821 the reserve north of the London road on the Zone side was surrendered to the government, and in 1823 surveyed and formed into the Township of Zone (it had hitherto been called North Orford). In 1836 another surrender covering 25,000 and including those already surrendered for an annuity of £150, and again another surrender in 1857 covering lands in Orford reduced the limits of the reserve to the present bounds—an area of barely 3,000 acres. In 1817 the population was 167 (in 1794 it was 164); it is now 275.

Walpole Island Reserve, according to some authorities, was set aside shortly after the revolutionary war, for the purpose of placing thereon a number of scattered bands of Chippewa Indians, who had been engaged in the war on the British side, and were being collected by their own kinsman, Col. McKee, of the Indian Department—the "White Elk," according to Indian nomenclature. Be this as it may, the reserve was at all events covered by the treaty of 1825-27, when Wawanosh and other Indians surrendered the lands lying in Lambton county and the Huron district—Huron, Bruce, Perth, and part of Middlesex—and reserving the portions now known as Kettle Point, Sarnia, St. Clair, Walpole, etc. The Chippewas first settled permanently on the reserve in 1831, and the Pottawattomies in 1841, but meantime many white settlers—profligates and others—had possessed themselves of the best lands through fraud or otherwise, so that in 1837 there was scarcely an acre of arable land left, and in 1839 it was necessary to pass an act of parliament to recover the stolen lands, which being done were put in charge of a resident superintendent. At this time but 300 Indians remained on the reserve, but in 1842 when the government notified absentees that presents would not be paid them the number increased to 1140. In 1850 the number decreased to 1,000, and at present the population is: Chippewas (and merged Ottawas), 640; Pottawattomies, 170; in all 810. The area of the reserve is about 10,000 acres. The old Moore or St. Clair reserve, 2,575 acres, also belonged to the Walpole bands, being transferred in 1836 from the Sarnia bands along with \$1,400 as a share of the Huron tract annuity.

SARNIA RESERVE, which includes all the Lambton reserves (excepting the old Moore reserve transferred to Walpole) dates from 8th July, 1827, when, for an annuity of \$4,400, the Chippewa Indians surrendered 2,200,000 acres known as the Huron tract, reserving for themselves the following portions: River Aux Sables, 2,650 acres; Bear Creek (leased only), 400 acres; Kettle Point, 2,446 acres; Sarnia, 10,280 acres; and Moore or St. Clair, 2,675 acres. In 1840, for an yearly consideration of \$2,600, 2,540 acres of the rear portion and 198 acres of the portion adjoining the town of Sarnia, of the Sarnia reserve were sold, and subsequently in 1849, or since, the Moore reserve was sold on behalf of the Walpole bands. The present area of the reserve is 6,200 acres at Sarnia and about 5,000 at Kettle Point and River Sauble. The Indians first settled permanently on the reserve in 1831. In 1851 the population was 680; in 1857 but 512, and at present about 484.

The Caradoc Indians sustain three school teachers at the cost of \$200, \$200, and \$250 respectively. The Oneida Indians sustain three school teachers, partly by Indian school fund and partly by English church and Methodist church missions; salaries about \$250 each. The Moravians sustain one teacher at their own expense, \$350. The Sarnia Indians sustain one teacher at their own expense, \$250, and two teachers, \$200 and \$250, at the expense of the Methodist mission and the Indian school fund jointly. The Walpole Indians sustain one school teacher, salary \$300, at their expense jointly with English church missions, and one teacher, salary \$250, at expense of Indian school fund and Methodist missions. The Mount Elgin Institute is supported from Indian funds.

In 1810 the old Western District contained 22 shops and 10 taverns. There were two Roman Catholic, and one Church of England, churches. In 1817 there were 43 shops, 23 taverns, 2 churches, 6 ministers, 14 schools, 6 doctors, 10 windmills, 4 water gristmills, 1 water sawmill and 5 distilleries. In 1842 but 76,899 acres were cultivated and 41,726 wild lands taken up. The total assessment was but £323,551 (\$1,294,204). There were 15 stone horses and 4,669 3-year-old horses; 3,849 4-year-old oxen; 9,219 cows, and 4,843 and other taxable cattle. There were 19 sawmills, 13 gristmills, and 8 distilleries; 31 4-wheeled carriages, 46 2-wheeled carriages, and 71 wagons; 61 shops and 10 storehouses.

Excepting the Village of Delaware (the location of Eben Allen's grant of 2,200 acres by Governor Simcoe in 1793), which contained a few settlers, the Muncey Indians and a few whites strung along the London Road at long intervals, there was no substantial settlement in West Middlesex until 1830. In 1842 Mosa contained but 1,154, and in 1850 1,775 population; Eckfrid, 1,174 and 1,091 (?) respectively; Metcalfe in 1850, 953; and Delaware and Caradoc in the former year (1842) 468 and 972 population respectively.

Settlement commenced in West Elgin in 1803-1811. In 1817 Aldborough had a population of 400, I school, I store, and I tavern; Dunwich 500, I school, I store, I tavern, and grist water-mill; and Southwold 900, 3 schools, I store, and 2 taverns. The same townships in 1842 had a population of 737, 712, and 2,890 respectively. Dunwich and Aldborough were settled in 1803 and Southwold in 1811.

MERCANTILE LAW.

PROMISSORY NOTES, BILLS OF EXCHANGE, ETC.

The words "value received" are not legally necessary in a promissory note, but should always be inserted, so as to express a consideration for the promise.

A note drawn on Sunday is not void, but the law will not aid in its collection.

If a note be lost or stolen it does not release the maker; he must pay it. A note obtained by fraud, or from a person in a state of intoxication with intent to defraud. cannot be collected.

A consideration must be given for a note to make it valid, as between maker and payee, bu an innocent purchaser (one ignorant of the facts) may recover the amount from either of them

A note falling due on a Sunday or a legal holiday is not payable until the day following.

A note commencing "I promise to pay," and signed by two or more parties, becomes a joint or several note.

Notes bear interest only when so stated, and then only legal interest until paid. But any interest may be collected if so stated.

A note made by a minor is void. So is one made by an idiot.

An endorser of a note is exempt from liability if not served with a notice of its dishonor. Signatures made with a lead pencil are good in law.

Trade orders (a form of draft used by tradesmen) should be presented by the payee within a reasonable time, otherwise the maker will be relieved from liability if the amount cannot be re-

Cheques are treated the same as bills of exchange and must be presented the same day as received or the day following

Demand notes are payable upon presentation without grace and bear legal interest after demand if not so written. An endorser of a demand note is holden only for a reasonable time.

Time promissory notes are entitled to three days of grace after the time for payment has expired; if not then paid the endorsers, if any, should be legally notified to be holden.

LEASES, TENANCIES.

An agreement for a lease must be in writing A lease for 3 years or over must be in writing; under 3 years a verbal lease is sufficient A tenancy by the year requires a six months' notice to end it; a monthly tenancy a month's notice, and a weekly tenancy a week's notice. No notice is required where the time of the lease is definite. No rent can be distrained for until due. Landlords can generally follow goods after their removal from the leased premises for 30 days and will have precedence of all claims against the same, save for taxes.

PARTNERSHIPS.

Each individual of a firm (excepting special partners) is liable for the whole amount of the debts of the firm.

A special partner is only responsible for the interest or capital he has in the business; but he cannot (must not) interfere in the management.

Any one who permits his name to be used in a firm, or who shares in the profits of the business, is liable to the public as a partner.

The acts of one partner binds all the others when done in pursuance of the business of the firm, but one partner cannot bind his co-partner by an instrument under seal unless he is authorized by

Death of a partner always dissolves a partnership unless provided against in the agreement. The sale of a partner's interest without consent will also dissolve partnership.

CONTRACTS.

A verbal contract for the sale of lands is not enforceable by action. The fact that money was paid to bind the bargain makes no difference; it must be in writing. A minor, idiot or lunatic cannot convey lands unless with the sanction of the Court of Chancery; conveyances otherwise made are void.

A verbal contract (other than for lands) must be supported by a consideration; an agreement without it is void. A contract made by letter or telegraph is binding. Contracts for the sale of goods over \$40 value must be in writing or accompanied by a cash payment.

SUNDRIES.

Principals are responsible for the acts of their agents when done under the scope and by virtue of the agency. A subsequent ratification of an agent's act will bind the principal.

Guarantees must be in writing and definite as to what is covered.

Interest cannot be collected on open accounts unless there is an express or implied agreement to pay interest. Printed bill heads intimating a claim to interest is in law good. Interest is calculated by the legal rule.

Six years from the last payment is the limit for action on promissory notes and accounts

Married women can acquire and hold property and may carry on business independent of their husbands and be free from their debts. The wages or earnings of a married woman acquired in any employment or trade carried on separately from her husband shall belong and pertain to her

A servant is bound to obey the reasonable orders of his or her master or mistress, and disobedience will justify a dismissal. Master or servant must give reasonable notice to terminate Wrongful dismissal, or desertion of employment are causes for an action of damages.

A chattel mortgage must be renewed within 30 days preceding the expiration of one year from the date of the last filing or it becomes void as against judgment creditors.

A late Chancery Court decision makes the discharge of certain real estate mortgages compulsory upon presentation of the full sum of principal and interest at the time being.

Purchasers of Canadian railway tickets may demand within 30 days of the issue thereof, a refund of all the unused or unearned portion of the same equal to the full amount of the ticket less the ordinary rate between the points of getting on and stopping off.

Where money has been sent as part payment towards a maturing note with the request or understanding that a renewal be granted for the balance, holders of the note refusing to grant a renewal must return the payment of money to the sender.

The courts are undecided as to the rights of telegraph companies to remove portions of trees interfering with their wires; but the latter have no right to mutilate them if other courses are

reasonably available and open for the passage of their lines.

An idiot or a person of unsound mind cannot make a will. A will made under fear of bodily injury is void. A gift made by will to an attesting witness thereof, or to the husband or wife of the witness, is void. A will should be signed by the witnesses in the presence of each other and

Ignorance of the law excuses no one. The law compels no one to do impossibilities. a fraud to conceal a fraud.

CAPIAS—IMPRISONMENT FOR DEBT.

No capias shall issue from any court against the person of any one unless the debt is for an amount over \$100, and only then upon the affidavit of a person that he knows he is to abscond. It is supposed imprisonment for debt has been abolished. With the above exception it is, so

far as the large debtor is concerned; he may, in spite of executions to any extent, which do not effect his large income or official salary, travel the public ways with every freedom and laugh his debtors (and the courts) to scorn. But an unfortunate and impecunious small debtor, perhaps most likely in receipt of a miserable wage only, may be ordered by the county judge to make such monthly payments towards the payment of the debt as his honor may see fit, and in default committed to jail! A queer anomoly of law!

ABSCONDER'S GOODS

May be attached upon any attempt to remove them from the Province or County by any person to whom the absconder is indebted, in a sum not less than \$4, and not exceeding \$100, or \$200 if the amount or balance of the original amount is ascertained by the signature of the absconder.

MECHANICS' LIENS.

Unless there is an express agreement to the contrary, every mechanic, machinist, builder, miner, laborer, contractor or other person doing work upon or furnishing materials to be used in the construction or repair of any building or erection; or erecting, furnishing or placing machinery of any kind in, upon, or in connection with any building, erection or mine, shall, by virtue of being so employed or furnishing, have a lien or charge for his price of work, machinery or materials upon such building erection or mines, and the lands occupied thereby, or enjoined therewith, and limited in amount to such sum as is justly due to the person entitled to such lien. Claims may be filed before or during the progress of the works aforesaid, or within 30 days

from the completion thereof, or from the supplying or placing of the machinery aforesaid.

Claims shall cease at expiration of 30 days from the time the work is done or delivery of material; and if, within 90 days after registration of claim, no steps have been taken to realize upon it. For prior claims by way of mortgage, etc., see 38 Vic., Chap. 20, Secs. 3 and 4, and for registrations against lands registered under "Land Titles Act, 1885," see 49 Vic., Chap. 16, Secs. 46 and 47.

GARNISHEE ACT.

No debt due or accruing to a mechanic, workman, laborer, servant, clerk or employee, for or in respect of his wages or salary, shall be liable to seizure or attachment under this Act, unless such debt exceeds the sum of \$25, and then only to the extent of such excess.

GOODS OR CHATTELS EXEMPT FROM EXECUTION.

1st. The bed, bedding and bedsteads in ordinary use by the debtor and his family.

2d. The necessary and ordinary wearing apparel of debtor and his family.

3d. One stove and pipes, and one crane and its appendages, and one pair of andirons, one set of cooking utensils, one pair tongs and shovel, one table, six chairs, six knives, six forks, six plates, six tea cups, six saucers, one sugar basin, one milk jug, one tea pot, six spoons, all spinning-wheels and weaving looms in domestic use, and 10 volumes of books, one axe, one saw, one gun, six traps, and such fishing nets and seines as are in common use.

4th All necessary fuel, meat, fish, flour and vegetables actually provided for family use, and not more than sufficient for the ordinary consumption of the debtor and his family for thirty days, and not exceeding in value the sum of \$40.

7th. Articles in secs. 3, 4, 5 and 6 are not exempt from seizure in satisfaction of a debt contracted for such identical articles.

The debtor may select out of any larger number the several articles exempt from seizure under

Bees are also exempt, save in section 7. Absconders' goods (goods of absconders) are not exempt.

WAGES-MASTER AND SERVANT.

Any one or more Justices of the Peace, upon the oath of any mechanic, servant or laborer against his master or employer concerning any non-payment of wages, may summon such master or employer to appear before him or them at a reasonable time, to be stated in the summons, and he or they shall examine into the matter of the complaint whether the master or employer appears or not, and upon proof of the cause of complaint the Justice or Justices may discharge such servant or laborer from the service or employment of such master, and may direct the payment to him of any wages found to be due, not exceeding the sum of \$40, and shall make such order for payment of the said wages as to him or them seems just and reasonable, with costs, and in case of non-payment, for the space of 21 days after such order has been made, such Justice or Justices shall issue his or their warrant of distress for the levying of such wages, together with the costs of conviction and of the distress.

INSURANCE ACT.

Any person may insure his life for the whole term thereof, or for any definite period, for the benefit of his wife, or of his wife and children, or of his wife and some of the children, or for his children only, or some, or one of them, and may apportion the amount of the insurance money as he may deem proper, where the insurance is effected for the benefit of more than one.

Upon the death of the person whose life is insured, the insurance money due upon the policy shall be payable according to the terms of the policy, free from the claims of any creditor or

If a person who has heretofore effected or hereafter effects an insurance, on the terms of this Act, finds himself unable to continue to meet the premiums, he may surrender the policy to the Company granting the same, and accept in lieu thereof a paid up policy for such sum as the premiums paid would represent, payable at death in the same manner as the original policy; and the said Company may accept such surrender, and grant such paid up policy, notwithstanding any such declaration or direction in favor of wife and children, or any or either of them of the

The person insured may, from time to time, borrow on the security of the policy, such sums as may be necessary to keep the said policy in force, and the sums so borrowed shall be a first lien on the policy, notwithstanding any such direction in favor of the wife and children, or any

ROAD LAW.

In case any person in charge of a vehicle, or of a horse or other animal, used as the means of conveyance, travelling or being on any highway as aforesaid, is through drunkenness unable to drive or ride the same with safety to other persons travelling on or being upon the highway, he shall incur the penalties imposed by this Act.

PENALTIES.

Proved under oath by one creditable witness before any Justice of the Peace having jurisdiction, \$1 to \$20 at discretion, with costs, to be paid forthwith or distress enforced, and failing, imprisonment from I to 20 days.

Persons guilty of using profane or indecent language, or driving furiously, are subject to the above penalties.

EXEMPTIONS FROM TOLL.

Persons going to and from Divine service, and vehicles laden with manure from incorporated villages and towns.

ROAD MANNERS.

The Road Law now practically gives the traveller the use, for the time being, of the right half of the highway in which to perform his journey, and in its proper enjoyment no one has the right to hinder or obstruct him. The law says the road shall be sufficiently wide to permit of two teams easily passing abreast, and that each team shall turn towards the right. Not only does the law apply to teams, but also to conveyances and vehicles of every description. It applies even to foot passengers, who may choose such part of the right side of the road as he may see fit, and teams must yield it to them. This is clearly so in winter, and no one is obliged to step out into the snow for any vehicle.

If the law is so clear for teams meeting one another it is equally so for teams passing. Where a team desires to proceed faster than the earn it may overtake, the latter or advance team must turn off and allow sufficient space and reasonable opportunity for the rear and faster travelling team to pass without delay or obstruction

Such is the law whatever the conveyance or load, and whether the one side of the highway be a deep mud puddle and the other side high and dry. But it applies only to the proper use of the road, not to its abuse. No one has a right to feed his cattle there or to cut grass or trees, much less to deposit logs, wood, old wagons and other things thereon. Nor has he a right to mutilate and destroy fences and trees, stone or maltreat animals, and use abusive language. It will simply protect him in his right to pass and repass on it in an orderly and becoming manner.

Now as to road manners, which in many cases are at variance with the law and sometimes not very creditable to people practising them. Do unto others as you would be done to. Always promptly give the full half of the road space; you will be apt to be equally treated. If your neighbor has a heavy load consult his convenience as far as possible; you may sometimes be loaded. It has been customary to turn out for logs, wood and heavy loads. In winter it is sometimes dangerous for such loads to turn out. But remember it is not a right, it is a favor, and those receiving it should reciprocate—a fact which, I am sorry to say, is seldom done.

*Quail shall not be hunted, taken, or killed during the years 1886, 1887, and no Wild Turkeys during the years 1886, 1887, 1888, and in each case thereafter only between dates named.

Eggs of the birds above mentioned shall not be taken or destroyed at any time.

Fishing without license prohibited. Indians are subject to the game and fish laws. No person must buy, sell, or have in possession, fish or game in the prohibited time. Game cannot be sold beyond 15 days after prescribed time. Deer cannot be killed at any time for the purpose

of exportation. Traps or snares shall not be employed in taking any birds (excepting ducks) at any time, nor shall batteries, swivel guns, sunken punts or night lights be used in taking any game water-fowl at any time. Nor shall any muskrat house be cut, speared, broken or destroyed at any time. Breach of these laws, fines from \$5 to \$50 with costs—the full fines to be paid the

It is not lawful to catch or kill any of the above-named fish by means of spears, grapple hook,

negog or Nishigans at any time.

No one shall fish for, catch, kill, buy, sell or possess the young of any fish above-named. Fishing by means of nets or other apparatus is prohibited without Government license.

LAND MEASURES AND HOMESTEAD LAWS.

Under the improved system of survey now in force—a system practically in use in all Western States—surveyed lands in Manitoba, N. W. Territories and the Western States are laid off in four-sided townships of six miles square, containing 36 sections of 640 acres, or one square mile each, which are sub-divided into quarter sections of 160 acres each, and in the case of Canadian lands is exclusive of road allowances.

The sections of a township are numbered I to 36, and in the American surveys as per annexed diagram read from the north east corner, but in the Canadian surveys read upwards from the south-east corner. Nos. 16 and 36 form the school sections of the American township, and Nos. 11 and 29 those of the Canadian townships, Lots Nos 8 and 26 in each township are the Hudson Bay Company's sections. The School Lands are reserved for the support of schools established in the township, and on the American side cannot be sold until the upset price of \$7 per acre is realized. Where there are railway grants and the sections alternate with Government sections, the latter invariably compose the even sections and railway lands the odd sections of a township.

CANADIAN LAND GRANTS, HOMESTEADS PRE-EMPTIONS, ETC.

Homesteads, for 160 acres, are available to every man of the age of majority, or any woman who is the sole head of a family, free of payment, who will make a continued residence thereon, and occupy and cultivate the same for a period of three years—say building a house, and breaking and cultivating each year 10 or 15 acres—in one word making a home of it for self and family. Homesteads not exceeding 160 acres and buildings thereon of whatever value are exempt from

Pre-emptions, for 160 acres additional, are available to every homesteader who may occupy and cultivate the same, and will pay, in one sum (some 4/10 of the price) at the end of three years the balance in easy after instalments of \$2 or \$2.50 per acre, according to the class in which the lands are situated, and provided that he or she may have fulfilled the obligations of homestead to which the pre-emption is attached.

ENTRY.—Persons entering upon homesteads must do so within six months of the time of recording certificate of entry, and may not absent himself or herself from the homestead for a longer period than six months without special leave of the Minister of the Interior. The fees for certificate of entry is \$10; for pre-emption \$10 additional. Title lies with the crown until the patent

No tree culture claim is allowed as in the United States.

AMERICAN LAND GRANTS, ETC.

The pre-emption law gives to any citizen of the United States, and to those who have declared their intention to become such who are heads of families, or single men, or women over the age of 21 years, 160 acres of land within the limits of land granted to any railroad company, at \$2.50 per acre, or outside of railroad limits at \$1.25 per acre, on condition of permanent improvement

The homestead law grants to the settler 160 acres beyond railroad limits, or 160 acres within the limits, on condition of permanent improvement and continued residence for five years, without costs, except land office fees, which do not exceed \$18 for 160 acres. By paying Government price, \$1.25 or \$2.50 as the case may be, the settler may prove up and acquire title at the expiration of one year's continued residence. Homesteaders cannot absent themselves for a longer period than six months at any one time within the first two years or so, and must practically make the homestead their home for the balance of the term. Homesteaders disposing of their claim and improvements do not transfer therewith the period of completed homestead services. Purchasers must commence a homestead term of five years anew.

160 acres, either within or without the limits of a railroad grant, on condition that one-sixteenth of the land so taken shall be planted with trees, cultivated and protected for eight years, when final proof can be made and patent secured.

Under the operation of these laws, any settler (every son and daughter of a family, if of age) can secure from 240 to 320 acres of land at a most trifling cost. Homesteads in regions requiring irrigation cover 640 acres.

Homesteads are exempt from execution. Until lands are patented no taxes are payable.

A person cannot take up a homestead and a pre-emption at the same time. But a homestead and a tree claim, or a pre-emption and a tree claim may be held at the same time, and in the latter case he or she may prove up on a pre-emption and then enter upon a homestead. Entry upon a homestead must commence within 6 months after recording same; upon a pre-emption at

HANDY FACTS FOR EVERYBODY.

A cask of lime (240 lbs.) will make from 7 4-5 to 8 cubic feet of stiff paste.

A cask of cement (300 lbs.) will make from 3 7-10 to 3¾ cubic feet of stiff paste. Eight (8) bushels of good lime, 16 bushels of sand and one bushel of hair will make enough good mortar sufficient to plaster 100 square yards of wall. One-third barrel stucco and four times the same in white sand will hard finish 100 yards.

Two thousand ordinary sized lath, 13 lbs. nails, 3½ barrels lime, 3 bushels hair and 6 loads sand will plaster 100 square yards of two slipped-coats of wall.

Two thousand ordinary sized lath. 13 lbs. nails, 4 bushels hair, 4 barrels lime, ²/₃ barrel lump lime, one-half barrel cement, 2½ bushels white sand, and 7 loads ordinary sand will plaster 100 square yards of three-coat hard finished walls.

Stone mortar requires 8 parts cement, 3 parts lime and 31 parts sand. Brick mortar requires 8 parts cement, 3 parts lime and 27 parts sand. Coarse brown mortar (common lime mortar) requires 1 part lime, 2 to 2½ parts sand and 1-6 part hair.

A cord of stone, 3 bushels of lime and a cubic yard of sand will lay 100 cubic feet of wall. One (1) barrel of lime (it must be good) will lay 1000 brick; 2 barrels of lime one cord of

To the cubic foot it will take 15 bricks for an 8 inch, 22½ for a twelve (12) inch, and 30 for a sixteen (16) inch wall of standard bricks—8x4x2 inches. Mortar will fill 1-6 space.

Five courses of brick will lay one foot in height on a chimney; six bricks in a course will make a flue eight inches wide and twelve inches long, and eight bricks in a course will make a flue eight inches wide and sixteen inches long.

One thousand shingles, laid 4 inches to the weather, will cover 100 square feet of surface, and

5 lbs. of shingle nails will fasten them on.

It takes 9 shingles to the square foot if exposed 4 inches to the weather; 8 shingles if exposed 4½ inches, and 7 1-5 shingles if exposed 5 inches to the weather.

One fourth pitch of a roof takes rafters 9/16th the width of a building; one-third pitch 3-5

the width. A building 30 feet wide will require 18-foot rafters, exclusive of projection.

A square of slating (or slate) is 100 superficial feet, standard lap, 3 inches. The pitch of a slate roof should not be less than one inch in height to four inches in length. The dimensions of slates are from 7x13 to 16x24 inches, in thickness from 3 16 to 5-16 of an inch and in weight

from 2½ to 4½ lbs. per square foot.

One-fifth more siding and flooring is needed than the number of square feet of surface to be

covered, because of the lap in the siding and matching of the floor.

Laths are from 11/4 to 11/2 inches by 4 feet long, and a bundle contains 100.

INTERESTING FACTS AND USEFUL THINGS TO KNOW.

Kerosene applied with a rag to stoves will keep them from rusting during the summer. It is also an excellent preservative to apply to all iron utensils about a farm.

To prevent lamp chimneys from cracking put them into a kettle of cold water and gradually heat until it boils, and then let it as gradually cool.

To cleanse mica take a little vinegar and water and wash it corefully with a soft cloth; the acid removes all stains, and if a little pains are taken to clean the corners thoroughly and wipe them dry, the mica will look as good as new.

To purify water apply alum in a powdered state at the rate of one tablespoonful to a hogshead of water; stir well. At the end of a few hours the water will be clear and fresh.

If you clean your mirror with a soft paper instead of a cloth, time and trouble will both be saved, as there will be no lint, and the glass will have a better polish.

To remove stains from ivory take two tablespoonfuls of boiling water, and in it dissolve as much oxalic acid as will lie on a sixpence. Dip a linen rag into the solution whilst it is hot, and rub the stains with it. When they disappear the ivory must be wiped with a damp sponge.

To drive nails, screws, etc., in hard wood dip the points in soap or grease before driving. To draw nails give them first a smart blow to start them from their rusted position. To clinch cut nails first heat them red hot, then dip them into cold water.

A spoonful of salt thrown upon a coal fire while it is low will help it very much.

Oil can be removed from carpets or woolen stuff by applying dry buckwheat flour plentifully. Never use water.

Cut fingers and bruises of all kinds, if wrapped in cloth wet in alum water, heal with a rapidity that is truly wonderful.

For the sting of a bee use ammonia, wet salt, or a slice of an onion.

Protecting window plants. Few people seem to realize the protection there is in common brown paper, or in the ordinary paper on which newspapers are printed. In a fairly well-constructed dwelling house, if the plants be taken from the windows in the evening, placed in a corner near the fireplace free from draught, with a newspaper thrown over them, they would generally be safe.

One part carbolic acid to eight parts olive oil in saturated linen rags spread over burns or scalds and covered with oil silk to exclude the air is an excellent remedy.

The best emetics to take in case of poison being swallowed, is common mustard mixed in warm water, or tartar emetic in warm water. After thorough action continue by giving warm water alone.

Kerosene will remove stains from clean varnished furniture; it will also soften boots hardened by water, and will also, if applied with a rag, make your tea-kettle as bright as new.

A piece of rubber belting tacked round the pulley will prevent belts from slipping. Carbolic acid is the best of all disinfectants, and if applied with a considerable volume of sand

or freely diluted in water, is the best for water closets and out door use. In sick rooms equal parts of turpentine and carbolic acid, say a half teaspoonful in boiling water from time to time repeated, is an excellent disinfectant and air purifier.

Rubbing the glass of windows inside and outside with glycerine will prevent their frosting in

cold weather.

An earthen bowl full of quick lime, which should be changed when slacked, will remove all

damp and mildew from closets.

If the inner sash of shop front windows are made close fitting the outer or street windows may be kept free from frost by simply boring small holes and permitting the outside air to freely enter the space between the windows.

Multiply the length by the width, and the product by the height, all in inches; divide by 2150 (the capacity in cubic inches of the Winchester bushel, the English being 2218-2), and the product will give the number of bushels in the bin. The grain should be spread level.

RULE TO MEASURE CORN IN A CRIB.

Measure the width, depth and length, and multiply as with grain bin, in inches; divide the product by 4.300, and the quotient will be the number of bushels. Where the crib is wider at the top than the bottom, measure for width at such a height as will give you true width.

RULE TO MEASURE ROOTS IN A PIT OR ROOT HOUSE.

Ascertain the cubic dimensions in inches as in preceding rules for grain, making allowance for the slope of the ridge by measuring only half the height or so much of it as would be required to level the top and have a solid cubic heap. A space which would hold twenty bushels of corn in the ear, would hold thirty of roots and forty of grain.

RULE TO MEASURE HAY IN THE STACK OR MOW.

If it be a square or oblong stack with a pitched roof, measure the height in feet from the bottom to the eaves; add to this half the height from the eaves to the ridge, and altogether this will tom to the eaves; add to this half the height from the eaves to the hige, and anogether this wife give real and total height. Multiply the total height by the breadth, and both by the length. Divide the product by 27 and the quotient will be the number of cubic yards in the stack. Multiply the number of cubic yards by the weight in lbs. of a single cubic yard, which will be pretty correct—to say 80 lbs. for a new stack, 100 lbs. for one a few months old, and 112 lbs. for one a year old—and the product will be the contents of the stack in lbs., divide this by 2,000, the number of lbs. in a ton, and the quotient will give the number of tons.

To find the weight of hay in a round stack, find the height of the eaves and add one-third of the measurement from the eaves to the top, which will give the true height. Measure the girth, multiply it by itself and the product by the decimal, .0795; this will give the area of the base. Multiply the area by the true height, and the product will be the contents of the stack in cubic feet; divide by 27 to complete, as with square stacks.

To estimate contents of mows, where the top is level, the process is the same as with the square stack, omitting the allowance for the sloping roof.

INLAND REVENUE RETURNS

For the Dominion the consumption per head in round figures is: 11/4 Galls. Spirits; 21/2 Galls. Beer; Petroleum the same as Spirits and Tobacco 2 lbs. The selfish and filthy habit of tobacco using might also very fitly enter the denunciatory category of temperance enthusiasts.

An average of the past 2 or 3 years show that 25,000,000 lbs. grain was used, 1,400,000 galls. of proof spirits made and \$1,400,000 duty paid each year at Walker's Distillery, Walkerville.

County Councils of 5 members elected directly by the people.
