





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



MINUTES OF CONFERENCE

HELD IN THE

SYDENHAM STREET METHODIST CHURCH,

IN THE

CITY OF KINGSTON.

Organization of Conference, June 18th, 1879.

THE SIXTH SESSION of the MONTREAL ANNUAL CONFERENCE of the Methodist Church of Canada, was opened in the Sydenham Street Methodist Church, in the City of Kingston, Province of Ontario, on Wednesday, June 18th, 1879, at 10 a.m., the President, the Rev. John Borland, being in the chair.

The President announced the 429th hymn, after which the Rev. W. I. Shaw, LL.B., Secretary, read the 33rd chapter of Ezekiel and the 6th chapter of 2nd Corinthians, and the Revs. James Elliott, D.D., and G. H. Davis led in prayer.

The Secretary called the Conference roll, and one hundred and nineteen responded to their names.

The Conference proceeded to the election, by ballot, of a President, Whereupon, the Rev. George McRitchie was chosen.

The PRESIDENT briefly addressed the Conference, and directed them to proceed to the election of a Secretary.

The ballot resulted in the election of the Rev. T. G. Williams.

The Secretary nominated the Revs. J. Tallman Pitcher and William Philp, Assistant-Secretaries; and the Rev. Charles A. Hanson, as Journal Secretary.

These nominations were confirmed by the Conference.

HORATIO NELSON KIMBALL.

Horatio Nelson Kimball was born in the State of Vermont, in the year 1810. He came with his parents to the Township of Dunham when about 12 years of age; was converted at the age of 17, when he began almost immediately to exercise his gifts, which were of no mean order, as Exhorter and Local Preacher, and many were converted through his labours. When the Methodist New Connexion first opened their work in Dunham he identified himself with that body; and, in 1848, under the superintendency of the Rev. Dr. Crofts, he was ordained to the work of the Christian Ministry, but only remained actively employed for about nine months.

After engaging in secular business he continued to work in connection with the Superintendent until a stroke of paralysis rendered him mentally incompetent. In business, as in everything else, he was very energetic, and, consequently, successful. His declining years were those of suffering, especially the last few months of his life, yet through it all he ever expressed unshaken confidence in Christ the Saviour of sinners, and unclouded hope of a blessed immortality.

The Committee find that the number of claimants on the Fund this year is 308, five of whom receive twelve dollars each. The membership taxable, 21,316, at 37 cents per member, the receipts will be \$7,886 92. To meet the claims for the current year the sum of \$7,575 00 will be required.

The Committee recommend that the claimants be paid \$25.00 each, and that the per capita tax be 37 cents.

The Committee recommends that the membership on the Island of Anticosti be exempt from the per capita tax.

In reference to the Memorial from the Montreal District, relating to the matter of remitting the tax on the membership under a certain age, the Committee begs to say it does not deem it advisable to make the proposed change at the present time.

In the matter of the claim of a child born after the 15th of May in any year, and dying before the return of the birth is made at the following May District Meeting, the Committee recommends that no such claim be recognized, and that no child can be a

claimant on this Fund who is not living at the time its birth is reported.

The Committee also recommend that the membership schedules of next year show the number of children under fifteen years of age.

The Committee further recommend that the Rev. T. G. Williams be Secretary-Treasurer for the coming year.

In reference to the matter referred to this Committee relating to the necessity of a Constitution for this Fund, the Committee respectfully recommend as follows:—That in view of the action of the General Conference, in which it is declared that each Annual Conference shall have a Children's Fund under its own control and management, it is necessary that this Conference adopt such Constitution as it shall deem best adapted to secure the uniform payment of allowances for the children of our Ministers, and beg to submit the following Constitution to be adopted by the Conference:—

CONSTITUTION.

This Fund shall be denominated "The Children's Fund of the Montreal Conference of the Methodist Church of Canada," and is established for the purpose of providing more effectively and uniformly for the payment of the disciplinary allowances of the children of our ministers, and of equalizing the claims for this object of the several Circuits and Missions of our work.

THE COMMITTEE.

The Committee for the management of this Fund shall be composed of the Financial Secretaries, together with a Secretary-Treasurer, to be annually nominated by the Committee and appointed by the Conference. The Committee shall meet annually, at the place of holding the Conference, one day previous to its commencement, and at such other times as may be deemed necessary.

It shall be the duty of the Committee,-

To appoint, annually, a Chairman to preside at its meetings.
 To appoint, annually, two auditors to examine the accounts

of the Secretary-Treasurer, and report to the Committee.

3. To ascertain the amount requisite to meet the claims of the Fund, and the average amount required from each member of the Church for this purpose.

4. To prepare an annual report of the state of the Fund which,

with the Treasurer's report, shall be published in the MINUTES OF CONFERENCE.

THE INCOME.

- 1. The income of this Fund shall be raised upon the several Circuits and Missions according to a rate recommended by the Committee and approved by the Conference, and this amount shall be the first claim upon the income of each Circuit or Mission.
- 2. The number of members for which each Circuit or District shall be reponsible shall be that returned to the previous Conference, with such alterations only as are caused by the change of boundaries, previously sanctioned by the Conference, or such as are exempted by Conference.
- 3. The Financial Secretaries shall be the Treasurers of the Children's Fund for their respective Districts, and shall make a correct record in their District Books at each May District Meeting, of the name, age, and date of birth of each claimant upon the Fund for whom payment is made; a similar record of those whose claims are prospective for the ensuing year; and the number of members on each Circuit for the past year, and the number of members to be reported to the ensuing Conference.

A schedule containing suitable columns for these records, which shall have been furnished by the Secretary-Treasurer, shall be filled by the Financial Secretary and handed to the Secretary-Treasurer the day previous to the opening of Conference.

The Financial Secretary shall not, at the May District Meeting, place upon the list of prospective claimants the name of any child born after the 15th day of May, in the then current year; nor shall any such child be included in the estimates for the ensuing year, nor be paid for by any Treasurer; nor will the claim of any child be admitted whose name was not reported to the Financial Secretary at the previous May District Meeting.

Each minister having children claimants upon this Fund shall, at the Financial District Meeting, furnish the Financial Secretary with a list of their names, ages, and dates of birth.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

Your Committee respectfully requests to submit the following report:—

Your Committee rejoices to believe that the great Temperance question has never been so fully before the people as at present, nor so intelligently understood by them. This is seen in the large circulation of Temperance literature, and in the successful efforts made during the past year to secure the passage of "The Temperance Act of 1878" in several Counties in the Dominion.

Yet, believing intemperance to be as great an evil as ever, as ruinous of the financial, physical, moral, and spiritual interests of men, and believing that "total abstinence" is the only safe course for the individual, and "Prohibition" the only hope for the nation, your Committee respectfully make the following suggestions:—

First,—That Conference declare itself, as it has ever done, in favour of these great principles.

Second,—That each minister and probationer be requested to preach, once during the year at least, in each appointment on the subject of Temperance.

Third,—That each superintendent will kindly, yet firmly, enforce the rule of our Church regarding this matter, viz., "Drunkenness, buying or selling spirituous liquors or drinking them, unless in cases of extreme necessity."

Fourth,—That our people be urged, both by the precept and example of our ministers and preachers, to lend their sympathy and hearty co-operation to every movement which aims at the destruction of the liquor traffic.

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SABBATH SCHOOL REPORT.

The Sabbath-school Committee begs leave to report that, while there is evidence of continued efficiency in our Sabbath-school operations, there are indications of a pressing necessity for still more vigorous action in this department of our work.

The Statistical Report presents an increase for the year of only 12 schools and 30 scholars, while the average attendance is 510 less than last year's average, and the number of conversions less than the number of last year by 185.

While there are 6,408 non-connexional papers taken by our Sabbath-schools—an increase for the year of 1,052, your Committee deprecates the existence of circumstances which limit the circulation of the Sunday-school Guardian to the number of 1,866—a decrease for the year of 245.

Your Committee is pleased to find an increase of 101 copies of the Sunday-school Banner, as also, that about two-thirds of all our Schools are using the Berean Leaves, and that not less than two-thirds are kept open during the year.

While compelled to witness the prevalence of latitudinarian views, it is a matter of regret on the part of your Committee that only about one-sixth of our scholars are taught our Catechisms

Your Committee respectfully request that, if possible, a still more vigorous effort be made to secure an increasingly healthy religious literature for this important department of our work, and that every possible encouragement be given to the more general teaching of our Catechisms.

Your Committee respectfully requests Conference to take such action as may be deemed necessary to still more effectually shield the children and young people of our Sabbath-schools from the pernicious and destructive influences of intemperance and tobacco.

Your Committee recommends that the Rev. William Hall, M.A. be re-appointed Treasurer of the General S. S. Fund.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CHURCH PROPERTY.

The Committee report as follows:—

MONTREAL DISTRICT.

NORTH GORE.—The Trustees of the Church property at Mille Isles, North Gore Mission, request permission to sell said property and apply the proceeds of such sale toward the erection of a church at said appointment. Your Committee recommend that the request be granted.

BROCKVILLE DISTRICT.

WINCHESTER.—The Trustees of Moorewood Church, Winchester Circuit, request permission to exchange fifty feet, more or less, on the front of Morewood church lot, for the same number of feet in the rear of said church lot. Your Committee recommend that their request be granted.

PERTH DISTRICT.

Lombardy.—The Trustees of Lombardy parsonage request permission to sell the east half of the parsonage lot and apply the proceeds to the payment of the debt on the remaining half lot, and the balance, if any, to the erection of a church on said half lot. Your Committee recommend that their request be granted.

PEMBROKE DISTRICT.

Renfrew.—The Trustees of the Renfrew Church and Parsonage property request permission to sell part of the church lot detached by the railroad, together with the old parsonage, and to apply the proceeds to liquidate the debt on the new parsonage. Your Committee recommend that their request be granted.

OTTAWA DISTRICT.

NORTH WAKEFIELD.—The Trustees of the Church at Masham request permission to collect funds within the limits of the Montreal Conference to assist in paying the debt of said church. Your Committee recommend that their request be granted.

Bell's Corners.—The Trustees of the Bell's Corners parsonage request permission to sell said property, to apply half the proceeds to the building of a parsonage at Carp, and half to the liquidation of the debt on the Sandy Hill Church. Your Committee recommend that their request be granted.

QUEBEC DISTRICT.

WINDSOR MILLS.—The Trustees of the Windsor Mills Church request permission to sell a part of the church lot, viz., a small angle sixteen feet from the corner, and to apply the proceeds to the church debt. Your Committee recommend that their request be granted.

STANSTEAD DISTRICT.

West Brome.—The Trustees of the parsonage at Scott-more request permission to sell said property and to apply the proceeds to the erection of a parsonage at West Brome. Your Committee recommend that their request be granted.

FRELIGHSBURG.—The Trustees of the Frelighsburg parsonage request permission to sell said property and apply the proceeds to the erection of a new parsonage on the church lot. Your Committee recommend that their request be granted.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON STATE OF THE WORK.

Two Memorials have been referred to this Committee. The first, from the Ottawa District, in which the Committee would recommend the Conference to concur, is as follows:—

Resolved,—That in consequence of the extreme financial depression through which the country is passing at the present time, and, inasmuch as large numbers of our ministers are inadequately supported, and in view of the fact that both the Missionary and Contingent Funds are heavily laden with debt, and that it is impossible from Connexional Funds or local resources to give an equitable

support to the men we have already employed in our work, this meeting would respectfully memorialize the Conference that it would be inexpedient during the present year to call out any additional men, but that the Candidates recommended by the respective District Meetings be placed upon the list of reserve, to be called out at such times as their services might be required.

With reference to the second—condemnatory of sundry practices in connection with socials held in private houses,—your Committee would recommend the Conference to direct that all gatherings for Church objects should be governed by the rules of the Church; and that such things as games of chance, comic songs, tableaux, and foolish amusements should be discountenanced, at all times, as destructive of the spirit of piety.

Knowing the severe financial crisis through which the whole country is passing, pressing as it does most heavily on the region occupied by this Conference, necessitating many of our people, with a hope of bettering their circumstances, to transfer their home to the Far-West, your Committee awaited with some degree of foreboding the tabulated returns by the Statistical Committee, and these, when completed, only proved their fears to be too well grounded.

Notwithstanding the in-gathering that has followed revivals, which have gladdened several of our Circuits, and the addition of those from our Sabbath-schools, that have, by God's blessing, graduated into the fellowship of the Church, after allowing for deaths, desertions, and removals, there remains a net decrease of 447 members, a result which should cause much self-examination and humiliation before God.

With the evangelical doctrine and increasingly active labours of the other branches of Christ's Church, in all of which we find ground for thanksgiving, it is evident that, if we would hold our own, we must give more special attention to the children under our care; and by more systematic

pastoral work, by stimulating our class-meetings, by more fervent wrestlings in prayer and closer study of God's word, endeavour to add to the Lord Jesus those who, while in many respects with us, are not yet savingly joined to Christ.

Your Committee believe that if the prescribed form for the public reception of members were more regularly employed, it would serve to impress the importance of the privilege into which they enter, the responsibility they assume, and the solemn nature of the covenant then made.

The Sabbath-school returns are to the effect that there is a slight increase of the number of scholars and teachers—677 conversions are announced, but considering that 2,000 of the teachers are members of the Church, larger results should be attained. While your Committee rejoice at the efforts made to prepare teachers for this work, by the holding of Conventions and Normal Classes, they are convinced that much more may be done by increased attention, on the part of the scholars, to our Catechisms and to the committing to memory of the Holy Scripture.

At this critical moment in our history, when the operations of the Missionary Society are so hampered by debt,—and it has become a matter of grave and serious consideration whether we will not have to withdraw from many positions hitherto occupied,—it is extremely desirable that there should be a grand consecration of substance to the Lord, that, delivering ourselves from the crushing pressure of financial responsibility, we may, as a Church, be able to sustain the Missions already existing, and be ready, as the providence of God may indicate, to enter open doors, and move forward to glorious victory, through our Lord Jesus Christ.

Moved by the Rev. J. Elliott, D.D., seconded by the Rev. J. J. Leach, and

Resolved,—That the thanks of this Conference are due, and are hereby tendered to the Choir of this (Sydenham Street) Church for the eminent services rendered in connection with the various services during its sittings.

Thanks to "Ladies' French Missionary Society" of Montreal and of Stanstead.

Moved by the Rev. L. N. Beaudry, seconded by the Rev. Edward DeGruchy, and

Resolved,—That the cordial thanks of this Conference are due, and are hereby tendered to the members of the "Ladies' French Missionary Society" of Montreal, for their generous financial assistance and sympathy in the prosecution of the French Mission work in that city; also to the members of a similar Society in Stanstead, for their aid in maintaining during the year two French students in the Stanstead Wesleyan College, in their preparation for the ministry of our French Missions.

Thanks to Toronto and London Conferences.

Moved by the Rev. John Borland, seconded by the Rev. Hugh Johnston, M.A., B.D., and

Resolved,—That this Conference desires to express its gratitude to the ministers and friends within the bounds of the Toronto and London Conferences for their hearty sympathy with the Educational work of our Church in the Province of Quebec, and hereby acknowledges especially the help rendered by the Preachers' Meetings in Toronto, Hamilton, and London.

Thanks to Revs. W. Galbraith, B.C.L., and W. Jackson.

On motion it was

Resolved,—That the thanks of this Conference are due, and are hereby presented to our ministerial brethren of the City of Kingston, for their attention to the comfort and convenience of the members of the Conference while attending its session in this city.

Standing Resolutions.

Ministers Changing Circuits.

Resolved,—That this Conference requires that every minister changing Circuits be responsible for the pulpit work on the Circuit which he is leaving until after the second Sabbath after the close of Conference.

Financial and other Returns.

Whereas the Financial Returns sent from the Districts to the Conference are frequently incomplete and incorrect, making it quite impossible to compile perfect and accurate tabular statements for the Minutes of Conference, it was

Resolved,—(1) That the Financial and District Secretaries be required to have their accounts and tabular statements audited and certified as correct before handing them to the Conference authorities.

(2) That the Secretary of Conference, when sending the books for the May District Meetings, shall call the attention of the Chairman to the above resolution.

(3) That this Conference direct the Financial Secretaries to settle with the Treasurers of the several Funds on the basis of the returns in the District Financial Schedule, and the Treasurer of each fund to affix his signature underneath the total sum, in attestation of its agreement with his account; and that the Statistic Committee compile the returns for the printed minutes from these attested schedules only.

Treasurer and Financial Secretaries.

Resolved,—That it shall be required of every Financial Secretary, either by himself or by a proxy, to meet the Treasurers of the several Connexional Funds, to report the receipts of their respective Districts, on Tuesday, at two o'clock p.m., the day before the annual meeting of the Conference.

Income of Domestic Missions.

Resolved,—That the Financial District Meeting shall examine into the circumstances and probable income of Domestic Missions, in the same way as in respect to Circuits, and suggest the amount that should be appropriated for the support or assistance of such Missions.

Chairmen and Domestic Missions.

Resolved,—That the Chairmen of Districts forward to the Missionary Secretaries the amount recommended by the several September Financial District Meetings for the Domestic Missions, as soon as practicable after the close of each meeting.

Probationers Attending College.

Resolved,—That in all cases when Probationers, who have travelled four years, are then allowed by the Conference to attend College, their reception into full connexion and their ordination are thereby deferred.

The Book-Room.

Resolved,—That every Minister and Preacher is henceforth peremptorily required to settle his account with the Book Steward at or before the meeting of Conference.

Resolved,—Should any Minister or Preacher, having claims on the Connexional Funds, fail to pay up his account with the office as above directed, it shall be the duty of the Book Steward annually to draw upon the Treasurer of any of those Funds an amount not exceeding one-fourth of the claim of the brother on such fund towards the payment of his debt; and the Treasurer of such fund is hereby directed to honour such drafts when presented.

Superannuated Ministers' Fund.

Resolved,—That whereas the rule requires that all widows, claimants on the Superannuated Ministers' Fund, shall be members of our Church; therefore it shall be the duty of

the Chairman of each Annual District Meeting to make enquiries into the case of widows residing within their respective bounds, as to their membership, and report the fact annually to the Conference.

Systematic Beneficence.

Resolved,—That this Conference earnestly recommends each of its Ministers to bring the subject of Systematic Beneficence before the Congregation under his charge at least once a year.

Youth of the Church.

Resolved,—That whereas provision is made in the Discipline for the spiritual culture and welfare of the children of our Congregations, and whereas notwithstanding in too many instances they are permitted to wander away from the fold to which they legitimately belong, and are either lost in the world or become absorbed by other churches, the claims of the children, as provided for in the Discipline, should be wisely and conscientiously responded to.

French Missions.

Resolved,—That our French Missionaries be required, before taking up or continuing any English work, to obtain the expressed sanction of their own Chairman and the the English Superintendent within the bounds of whose Circuit or Mission the proposed work is situate, as well as that of the Chairman of the English District.

ANNIVERSARIES AND OTHER PUBLIC SERVICES OF THE CONFERENCE.

THE SABBATH SCHOOL ANNIVERSARY

Was held in the Sydenham Street Church, Kingston, on Wednesday, June 18th, 1879, beginning at 7.30 p.m.

The President, the Rev. Geo. McRitchie, occupied the chair.

Addresses relative to the interests and importance of the Sabbath-school work were delivered by the President, and the Revs. D. V. Lucas, M.A., and S. Bond.

The meeting was closed at 10 p.m. with the benediction.

THE ANNIVERSARY OF THE MONTREAL CONFERENCE BRANCH OF THE EDUCATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE METHODIST CHURCH OF CANADA

was held in the Sydenham Street Church, Kingston, on Thursday, June 19th, 1879, beginning at 8 p.m.

The Rev. A. Lee Holmes, M.A., Principal of the Stanstead Wesleyan College, occupied the chair.

After singing, prayer was offered by the Rev. W. I. Shaw, LL.B.

After a brief address by the Chairman, the Rev. W. Scott, Treasurer of the Montreal Branch of the Society, presented a report of the finances of the year.

The Rev. W. I. Shaw, LL.B., presented a Report of the work accomplished by the various Educational Institutions of our Church.

The Rev. Alex. Hardie, M.A., Moral Governor of Stan-

stead College, and the Rev. Geo. Sanderson, D.D., of the London Conference, and the Rev. E. A. Stafford, were severally introduced, and commended the work of the Educational Society to the sympathy of the Christian Church.

OPEN SESSION FOR THE RECEPTION OF CANDIDATES FOR ORDINATION.

The open session of the Conference, for the reception into full connexion with the Conference of the Candidates for the Ministry who had completed their probation and passed through the prescribed Course of Study, was held in the Sydenham Street Methodist Church, in the City of Kingston, on Friday evening, June 20th, 1879, beginning at 7.30.

The Rev. the President occupied the chair.

The 744th hymn was sung, and the Rev. John Armstrong led in prayer.

The President briefly explained the nature of the solemn services of the evening, after which the Secretary read the list of Candidates as follows:—

The President then called upon the Candidates, who severally related their conversion to God and their call to the work of the Christian ministry.

It was then moved by the Rev. Leroy Hooker, seconded by the Rev. James Elliott, D.D., and supported by the Rev. S. S. Nelles, D.D., LL.D., and

Resolved,—That the Probationers, whose names have been

read by the Secretary, be received into full connection with the ministry of the Methodist Church of Canada, and that on the Sabbath next they be ordained by the imposition of hands to the office and work of the Christian ministry.

The resolution was adopted by a rising vote of the Conference.

The Rev. the President delivered a brief charge, impressing upon the Candidates the important duties of the office of the ministry.

At the hour of ten the Conference adjourned, the Rev. Dr. Sanderson pronouncing the benediction.

MEETING FOR THE PROMOTION OF HOLINESS.

By official appointment, a meeting for the above object was held in the Queen Street Methodist Church, on Saturday evening, June 21st, 1879, beginning at 7.30, and was led by the Rev. John Scanlon.

There was a good attendance, and the presence of the Holy Spirit was manifest.

ORDINATION SERVICE.

The Ordination Service was held at the close of the Conference Love-Feast, in the Sydenham Street Church, Kingston, on Sabbath, June 22nd, commencing at 11 a.m.

The Rev. S. S. Nelles, D.D., LL.D., preached from the last clause of the 19th verse of the 6th chap. I. Timothy.

The Secretary read the names of the Candidates who were to be Ordained as follows:—Samuel D. Chown, Samuel Ellery, W. T. Smith, and W. H. Sparling, B.A., and presented them to the President for that purpose. The President then proceeded, assisted by

several senior ministers, to ordain them ministers, according to the form prescribed by the Discipline of the Church.

MISSIONARY MEETING.

The Annual Conference Missionary Meeting was held in the Sydenham Street Methodist Church on Monday evening, June 23rd, 1879, beginning at 7.30.

The Rev. Geo. Sanderson, D.D., occupied the chair.

After singing, the Rev. W. I. Shaw, LL.B., led in prayer. Addresses were delivered by the Revs. Dr. Sanderson, Wm. Halstead, John McDougall, Geo. Cochran, and Dr. Douglas.

An appeal was made on behalf of the "Relief and Extension Fund," to which there was a liberal response.

The meeting was closed at 10.30 p.m. by the benediction.

A telegram was received from the Toronto Conference containing fraternal greetings, which was acknowledged and reciprocated.

COURSE OF STUDY

TO BE

PURSUED BY CANDIDATES FOR THE MINISTRY IN THE TORONTO CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH OF CANADA.

Preliminary.—English Branches: English Grammar and Composition, Arithmetic, Geography, Ancient History, (Schmitz), Modern History (Collier's British Empire). Biblical History: New Testament History (Smith's). Theology: Wesley's Sermons, I. to LII.; Wesley on Christian Perfection.

The standard of qualification for young men recommended to be received into our Conferences as Probationers, shall not be lower than fifty per cent. of the marks on the Preliminary Course of Study.

Any Candidate who may present a public school teacher's certificate of the second class, or a certificate of having passed a matriculation examination at any of our Universities, shall not be required to be examined on the English branches of the Preliminary Course; but he shall be required to pass an examination on the subjects of Biblical History and Theology—two and three, Preliminary Course—before the Examining Board of his Conference, or for the College at which he may be pursuing his studies.

First Year.—Biblical Introduction (Angus' Hand book, Pt. I.); Biblical History (Smith's Old Testament History); Theology, (Fletcher's Checks, Chap. I. to V.)

Second Year.—Exegesis, (Wesley's and Watson's Notes on Matthew; Wesley's and Whedon's Notes on John); Church History, (Kurtz History of the Church to the Reformation, Stevens' History of Methodism to the death of Wesley); Theology, (Watson's Institutes, Part II., Chap I. to XVII.)

Third Year.—Exegesis, (Wesley's and Whedon's Notes on Romans); Rhetoric, (Whately's); Church History, (Fisher's History of the Reformation); Theology, (Watson's Institutes, Part II., chap. XVIII. to the end); Pearson on the Creed.

Fourth Year.—Theology, (Watson's Institutes, Parts III. and

IV.); Apologetics, (Hopkins' Evidence of Christianity; Garbutt's Dogmatic Faith); Logic, (Whately's); Metaphysics, Hamilton, (Bowman's American Edition); Stewart's Active and Moral Powers; Discipline of the Methodist Church of Canada.

COURSE OF STUDY FOR GRADUATES IN ARTS'

Candidates who have proceeded to a degree in Arts, or who may do so prior to Ordination, shall pursue the following Course of Study:—

Preliminary.—Theology, (Wesley's Sermons, I. to LII.; Wesley on Christian Perfection); Biblical History, (Smith's New Testament).

First Year.—Biblical Introduction, (Angus' Hand-book, Part I.); Theology, (Fletcher's Checks, I. to V.)

Second Year.—Biblical History, (Smith's Old Testament); Theology, (Garbutt's Dogmatic Faith); Hopkins' Evidences of Christianity.

Third Year.—Exegesis, (Gospels of Matthew and John in Greek; Wesley's, Watson's, and Whedon's Notes on Matthew and John); Church History, (Kurtz' History of the Church to the Reformation); Theology, (Watson's Institutes, Part II., chap. I. to XVII. inclusive, and Parts III. and IV.)

Fourth Year.—Exegesis, (Epistles to the Romans in Greek; Wesley and Whedon's Notes on Romans); Church History, (Fisher's History of the Reformation; Stevens' History of Methodism to the death of Wesley); Theology, (Watson's Institutes, Part II., chap. XVIII. to the end); Discipline of the Methodist Church of Canada.

COURSE OF STUDY FOR PROBATIONERS AT COLLEGE.

All Candidates on Probation, except Undergraduates in Arts, who are recognized by their Annual Conference as such, on being appointed to College, shall pursue the following Course of Study:—

First Year.—Systematic Theology; Exegesis; the Greek Language; Homiletical Studies; Rhetorics and the English

Language; Logic; Church History; Hebrew, or Natural Science.

Second Year.—Systematic Theology; Exegesis of the New Testament in Greek; Homiletical Studies and Elocution; Metaphysics; Church History; Hebrew or Natural Science.

Third Year.—Historical Theology; Exegesis of the New Testament in Greek; Homiletical Studies; Ethics and Evidences; Old Testament Exegesis, or Natural Science.

The option allowed in No. 5 each year shall be determined by the Faculty of Theology according to their judgment of the circumstances and ability of the student.

COURSE OF STUDY FOR CANDIDATES FOR THE GERMAN WORK.

All Candidates before being recommended to the Conference to be received on trial, shall pass a satisfactory examination in the following subjects:—

Preliminary.—Elements of German Grammar; Nast's Larger Catechism; The Calverin Church History; The Discipline of the Methodist Church of Canada.

After admission on trial, they shall be examined each year during their probation as follows:—

First Year.—Jacoby's Compends of Doctrines and Scripture Proofs; Wesley's Sermons, Vol. i.; Hare on Justification; Kurtz' Sacred History; Webster's General History; Wurst's Grammar.

Second Year.—Wesley's Sermons, Vol. II.; Wesley on Christian Perfection; Fletcher's Appeal; Sauer's Church History; Wurst's Grammar.

Third Year.—Nast's Introduction to the New Testament; Lisco's Exposition of the Creed; Nast's Wesley and his Coadjutors; Pearson on Infidelity; Ahn's First Course of English.

Fourth Year.—Warren's Logic; Luthard's Apologetics; Harless' Christian Ethics; Ahn's Second Course of English.

The Candidates shall present a written sermon each year on some subject embraced in the course of study.

COURSE OF STUDY FOR CANDIDATES FOR THE FRENCH WORK.

All candidates before being recommended to be received on trial for the French work, shall pass a satisfactory examination in the following subjects:—

Preliminary.—French Grammar and Composition; Arithmetic and Geography; Ancient and Modern History (Lenormant); Methodist Catechism, No. II; Sermon on the Mount (Wesley).

After admission on trial they shall be examined each year during their probation as follows:—

First Year.—Voie du Salut (Wesley); Manuel de la Bible (Angus, Part I., Chaps. I. to III); Perfection Chretienne (Wesley); Traite de la Verite de la Religion (Abbadie); Etude Biblique (Godet); Histoire de la Reformation au xvi. me siecle, (D'Aubigne, Vol. I. et II).

Second Year.—Revue Theologique (Bois); Manuel de la Bible (Angus, Part I., Chaps. IV. to VII); Histoire de l'Eglise (Bonneson); Histoire de la Litterature Française (Vinet); Philosophie Naturelle (Ganot).

Third Year.—Epitre de St. Jacques (Chapuis); Homiletique (Vinet); Histoire de la Theologie Protestante (Dorner); Manuel de la Bible (Angus, Part II., Chaps. I. to IV); Rhetorique (Girord).

MODE OF EXAMINATION FOR THE MONTREAL CONFERENCE.

Candidates for our ministry and probationers shall be examined by means of printed papers prepared by the respective examiners.

There shall also be an oral examination if required.

In addition to the usual thorough Theological Examination of Candidates before the District Meeting, the Chairman shall examine each Candidate as to his Studies and General Reading for the year, with a view to giving advice as to his course and method of study. No Candidate shall be allowed the year of probation until the studies for that year are completed.

The examination of Candidates shall be held in each District, under the supervision of the Chairman and the Examiners resident on the District, on the first Wednesday in May in each year; and at such place as the Chairman

shall appoint. All papers shall be sent by the Examiners to the Chairmen not later than the last Wednesday in April in each year. The answers to the papers shall be sent by the Chairmen to the respective Examiners, who shall forward to the Secretary of the Board the valuation. The Secretary shall prepare the Certificates, and forward them to the Chairman of the District, to be presented by him to the May District Meeting. The Secretary of the Board shall send the Chairman of each District the name of any Candidate or Probationer who may have taken part of the subjects in any given course, and the standing he has attained; but shall not issue the certificate in any year's course until the Candidate or Probationer has completed it; and, further, no certificate shall be issued unless the Candidate has reached the passing point in all subjects, except in cases where the papers have failed to come to hand.

REGULATIONS RESPECTING CANDIDATES.

Every person before being received as a full Local Preacher shall have previously laboured at least three months as an Exhorter, and three months on trial as a Local Preacher; and no Candidate for our Itinerancy shall be recommended by a Quarterly Meeting to a District Meeting, who has not laboured at least three months as a full Local Preacher.

No Candidate shall be recommended by any District Meeting, to be received on trial for that year, who does not produce a certificate from the Examining Committee of the District to which he belongs. But the cases of all young men on trial shall be reported to their respective District Meetings.

All recommendations of Candidates to be received on trial

shall be made at the February Quarterly Official Meeting, and the Candidates recommended shall appear before the next meeting of the Examining Committee of the District to which they belong.

If in any given year the number of Candidates recommended by the District Meeting shall be greater than the Stationing Committee deem it prudent to employ for that year, the Examining Board shall meet at Conference, and determine who are the most suitable to be employed in our Itinerant work, and who are to be placed on the List of Reserve; being governed by their own class lists and those of the District Meetings.

The District Meeting shall examine, as heretofore, all the Candidates in regard to their religious experience and belief of our doctrines, together with their general qualifications and suitability for our Itinerant work, and shall arrange them in three classes, according to the results of the Examination.

The Conference requires Candidates for our Ministry to preach a Trial Sermon before the District Meeting by which they are recommended, or before a Committee appointed by the District Meeting, who shall report their opinion on the sermon, and embody it in the recommendation of such Candidate to the Conference.

Nothing in our present Course of Study shall be understood to prevent a District Meeting, in special cases, from recommending a Candidate to the Conference for reception on trial, after examination by the Chairman, before the District Meeting, on the subjects of the preliminary Course of Study.

THE PASTORAL ADDRESS

OF THE

MINISTERS COMPOSING THE MONTREAL ANNUAL CONFERENCE,

TO THE

SOCIETIES UNDER ITS CARE.

DEARLY BELOVED BRETHREN,

As shepherds appointed over the Flock of God, and called with a divine calling, we greet you in the name of the Lord. The apostolic words, "Grace be unto you, and peace, from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ," express our constant and heartfelt prayer on your behalf.

We record, with fervent gratitude, the many indications of the divine favour during the sessions of our present Conference. It will be remembered by us as an occasion of profitable fellowship with one another, and also with the Father of our spirits. Not the least of our occasions for thanksgiving is the fact that while death has stricken down the aged and the young, and our brethren of the Western Conferences have mourned the fading out of some bright names, by the mercy of God not one in the effective ranks of the Montreal Conference has fallen.

Since our last session the second General Conference of our Church has been held. Its legislation was so cautious in conserving our institutions and usages as nearly as possible in their primitive forms that it amounts to a

re-affirmation, on the part of the pastors, and of the people, of their confidence in the time-honoured methods of our Especially is this true concerning the classmeeting, which, in our past history, has been among the chief means of promoting our spiritual life. It is both gratifying and assuring to us to know that ministers and people are disposed to cherish this peculiar institution. Through the influence of Methodism, other Churches have, to a very great extent, modified the form in which they present their doctrines, and now receive and teach many views which were once peculiar to our Church, and in other particulars there has evidently been a growing into the forms and methods which prevail amongst us, so that now almost the only marked distinction which remains to us is the provision for testimony from all the people, and the broad and Catholic spirit of fellowship, which so happily results from it. We have the more particularly to call your attention to this subject from the fact that, after free and full discussion, our recent General Conference affirmed strongly that the class-meeting shall continue to be the condition of membership in our Church, and that to relinquish it would be to yield that godly fellowship for the preservation of which we were raised up as a people. We therefore, affectionately urge you to maintain this means of grace in the highest efficiency, and to seek to make it an agency through which we may gather the unsaved into Christ's fold, instead of depending so largely upon special services.

To much the same effect was the action of the General Conference relating to the itinerancy. Notwithstanding the difficulties and hardships, which sometimes arise in working a system that has to do so intimately with the comfort and happiness of so large a number of families, it was seen that the itinerancy was the best system for supplying the whole Church with pastoral service, and we rejoice to say that your ministers return to their various fields of labour in the same spirit which actuated their fathers in the ministry, ready "to endure hardness as good soldiers of Christ." On some of our poorer Circuits and Missions, there

has been during the past year real suffering on the part of the minister and his family, but we rejoice to find that the messengers of God's truth choose affliction with the people of God, preferring rather to endure temporal loss than that

God's poor should be left without the Gospel.

We commend to your affectionate and prayerful sympathy the Pastors appointed over you for the next year. If the itinerant system—one source of our Church's great prosperity from the beginning—is in the future to abide in the confidence of ministers and people, then, as the Conference must use all godly consideration in making the appointments, so there must be, on the part of the people, forbearance in receiving the ministers appointed to them, and a readiness

to enter heartily into their plans of labour.

We cannot ferbear to urge upon you the importance of the spiritual care of the young. If you fail to impress your children with the paramount claims of Christ you leave them exposed to attacks from every possible form of error No power can then preserve them from the worldliness which so abounds in the spirit of this age. may be overwhelmed in the subtleties of scientific infidelity. They may be taken a willing prey by some most degrading Yours to-day, very soon they may be swept hopelessly beyond your reach, separated from you by that broadest and deepest gulf which can lie between human beings-the great moral distance which stretches between the pure and the impure, a distance which anticipates the impassible gulf between the saved and the lost. A parent can contemplate nothing sadder for his children than that their faith should be dethroned. That these deplorable results may be avoided we entreat you to be diligent in the cultivating of family religion. The Christian home is the Church in miniature. Do not for one moment think that you can commit to others the sacred responsibility of teaching your children the way Let it be your constant study to surround them, as with the atmosphere of a temple, with the influences of a thoroughly Christian home, so that their first lispings may be of Christ, their first imaginings of his love, their first

steps to his footstool, and their first moral act an act of consecration to His service. We also urge you to encourage your children's attendance upon the classes organized especially for them, that, so, they may grow up with a sense of attachment to the Church. Next, perhaps, to home and parental influence, the Sabbath-school is the most helpful agency in fostering the attachment of children to the Church, and in keeping up in them a lively interest in the study of the word of God. More than two thousand one hundred children meet regularly in class, and during the last year about seven hundred have been converted. Let us not forget that in the coming years the recruits who are to fill the vacant places in our ranks through deaths, defections, and removals, and who are to constitute the increase of our Church, are to come to us by way of the Sabbath-school. We trust, therefore, that it will have that place in your hearts, and that measure of your time and labour which its importance demands.

In connection with the religious care of children, we deem it our duty to urge our own denominational institutions of learning upon the attention of those among you whose sons and daughters are about to receive a collegiate training. Cobourg, Whitby, Hamilton, and Stanstead, our colleges provide for youths of both sexes as great educational advantages as can be secured in the country, and, what is of incalculable importance, the same religious influences as affect them in the most carefully ordered Christian home. Wesleyan Theological College, Montreal, we are happy to say, is doing thorough and efficient work for the Church. The fidelity and ability with which its work is performed by the Professors are such, we think, as to secure for it the continued confidence of our people. Our University at Cobourg has been at a disadvantage, as compared with institutions favoured by Government patronage and endowments. The prospect of receiving scholarships, sometimes equivalent in value to hundreds of dollars, which are offered at some colleges, as the reward of special excellence in various departments of study, has been a great inducement

where some difficulty has been expected in meeting the necessary expense. We are glad to say that the three Western Conferences have this year adopted a plan of endowing scholarships by the several districts embraced in the Conferences, which will enable Victoria University to offer as great inducements in the way of premiums to successful competitors, as others, more wealthy, have done. We are also pleased to inform, you in this connection, that the Rev. A. Hardie, M.A., and the Rev. J. G. Crozier, the agents appointed by the last Conference to solicit aid for the Stanstead Wesleyan College, report that they have received subscriptions that amount to more than forty thousand dollars, a sum sufficient to remove the indebtedness of that institution.

It is generally well known that our Missionary Society has been for some time carrying on its work under the embarrassment of a large and increasing debt. This subject has received the most careful consideration from the very best minds among us, both lay and clerical, and the conclusion has been reached, that we cannot find our way out of the difficulty by withdrawing from any part of the work we have undertaken. It is our fervent prayer that we may be able to maintain our character as a Missionary Church. Accordingly, the several Conferences have resolved to unite during the next two years in the effort to raise a Relief and Thanksgiving Fund of one hundred and fifty thousand dollars, for the purpose of discharging this debt at once, and of placing the fund for the support of the Superannuated Ministers in a better condition to meet the increasing claims upon it. We know that you have always manifested the warmest sympathy with efforts to promote the comfort of the worn-out ministers; while your liberality in the support of missions has placed our Church in a position of great influence. We appeal to you in faith and with confidence, that the great undertaking will receive your prayerful sympathy-those who have much, giving much, and those who have little giving little. We are not unmindful that this

appeal is being made after several years of unparalleled depression in every department of trade and manufacture in our country. We know that enormous wealth has disappeared by shrinkage in the value of all kinds of propertynor have the losses been confined to those "who have kept back by fraud the hire of the labourers"-but the innocent have suffered with the guilty, and we feel the truest and deepest sympathy with you all in the trials through which you have passed. But we desire above all things that both you and we may learn the lessons which Providence designed to teach in these hard experiences, that we trust not in uncertain riches, nor consider that we answer the end of

our being by mere accummulation.

If wealth comes in the diligent pursuit of business, let it be thankfully received as a trust committed by God, whereby we are enabled, as His stewards, to do much good; but if we fail of this, yet is it God's will, and none the less may our lives be grand and complete in His sight. Therefore, we have prayed that the present, notwithstanding the great depression in trade, may be a peculiarly favourable time in which to carry out a great enterprise for the advancement of the cause of God. Very many must have revised their views of earthly possesions, and must have learned that the surest investments are what has been used for good works, and such persons will be better prepared than in times of fullhanded prosperity to devise liberal things. As a guarantee to you of the strength of our conviction that the undertaking must be made successful, we may state that already the ministers at the Conference have subscribed over four thousand dollars. And now, if all our people will but give to this work a place in their thought and sympathy, and do what they do in connection with it, as a part of religious experience, we are well assured that not only will it prove a triumphant success, but that we will ever look back upon it with such feelings as will make it, indeed, a means of grace. More closely than is realized by worldly men are these topics on which we have spoken connected with true spiritual religion. "God loveth a cheerful giver." "He

that soweth sparingly shall reap also sparingly, but he that soweth bountifully shall reap also bountifully." It is taught in the New Testament dispensation, as well as in the Old, that the duty of giving of our substance to God's cause is as important as prayer. The fulfillment of many most precious promises is contingent upon the performance of this duty. The Jewish dispensation laid upon the people the obligation of giving a tenth of all to God's cause. will not fail of our duty if we recognize this general principle of proportinate giving, and then unite with it the broad principle of the Gospel that every man is to give "according as God has prospered him." On no point do we need to guard our Christian life more jealously than against a growing spirit of worldliness. Our affections take so naturally to this present world, and the attachment grows so imperceptibly, and so many plausible reasons for it are ever present to our minds, that our danger of suffering loss and of making final shipwreck of faith is greater, perhaps, from this cause than from all others combined. Nor do we find in the Bible, or in experience, any sure protection against this danger, except what our Lord taught the rich enquirer after the way to eternal life, "Sell all that thou hast and give to the poor." Nothing so tests the strength of our "love of money" as liberal giving. And just as we fail to experience pleasure in this duty is our need of the discipline afforded by its performance. Idolatrous altars may be destroyed by sacrifice to the true God. The setting aside of a proportionate part of our income to be sacredly regarded as the Lord's, and to be distributed, according to our judgment, among the various claims that present themselves is the only course by which giving may become a true pleasure and a means of grace.

Studying, as we do, the happiness of our people, and yet bound to watch for your souls, suffer from us a few earnest words on the subject of amusements. We recognize the need of suitable recreations, but realize the danger to spiritual life of many ways in which it is sought in society. To state exact rules for the sure guidance of those earnestly

seeking the right way is by no means easy, when the forms of that against which we guard are endless, and ceaselessly changing. We cannot come nearer to what is exactly right than the language of the General Rules, where we are warned against "such diversions as cannot be used in the name of the Lord Jesus." It is proper, also, to add that the pursuit of amusements ought always to be regulated by the necessity for recreation. Nothing more surely stamps with condemnation many popular forms of pleasure than the fact that instead of being a relaxation from toil they are labour itself, and, for a time at least, disqualify those who engage in them for the active duties of life. We would that your home-life be bright, that your children, grown into youth, may find the hearthstone of home the gladdest spot on earth-endeared not only by the fragrance of a father's godly counsels and example, and the memory of a mother's fervent prayers, but, likewise, sending down through the coming years the echo of its innocent mirth, and the glowing radiance of its childhood's joy-an inspiration to noble deeds when out on life's rugged highways. But innocence, purity, and simplicity must characterize every form of amusment employed, or, otherwise, it will disappoint of the end which is contemplated. We would speak a warning word against some usages of fashionable society, which, while employed to hold youth at home, are so higly seasoned in character that they serve to stimulate the desire for pleasure to a degree which cannot possibly be satisfied by that which any Christian home can provide. While the Church does not ignore the natural demand for pleasant recreations, it at the same time disclaims all pretence of competition, in this respect, with the theatre and the ball-room. It does not pretend to gratify the same tastes. But to those who seek true relaxation from bodily or mental toil it offers the quiet, restful hour of the prever and class-room, as furnishing strength to the spirit, while refreshing the overtaxed mind and body. It also encourages and participates in gatherings of various character with the design of promoting a truly joyous life, only asking that such decorum be observed, and

such pursuits be allowed, as are in harmony with the spirit of true godliness.

We re-affirm all that has many times been strongly uttered on the subject of total abstinence from intoxicating drinks. "Look not upon the wine." While such disastrous results are constantly flowing from the use of alcoholic drinks, it appears written in the ruin and untold miseries of millions, with the clearness of demonstration, that absolute safety can only be found in entire abstinence.

In all things we will seek by word and deed to bear testimony to the spiritual character of true religion. To this end we exhort that, like Daniel, you will daily honour the closet of secret prayer; and, like the parents of Samuel and Timothy, cause those who are of your households to know the Scriptures of truth. Remember also that the way of God is in the sanctuary, and thither let us bring such prayerful fervency that there the fires of devotion may burn and glow as they did in the olden time upon Mount Moriah. And let us comfort ourselves with the thought, that if we are faithful to our convictions of truth and to our experiences of inward light, God will assuredly have use for us until the latest day of life.
