Fate of Chapman, Few Hours From Gallows, Lies With Pardon Board

Will Be First Victim of New Hanging Machine

ASKING FOR BODY

Attorneys Have Put in Claim For Remains of Bandit

HARTFORD, Conn., April 5-Unless the state board of pardons at its meeting today grants a commutation of the death sentence, a development considered very unlikely, Gerald Chapman, a slender little outlaw, who shot Policeman James Skelley to death when surprised while robbing a safe at New Britain, Conn., nearly two years ago, will be the first victim of Connecticut's new hanging machine at midnight. When, at the hour of twelve, the prison clock strikes the end of the condemned man's third reprieve, Father Michael P. Barry, Roman Catholic chaplain at Weathersfield prison, will hold the crucifix aloft and lead the death party slowly into the death

GROTESQUE MACHINE Its a grotesque thing, but merciful, this hanging machine, which yanks a man to the ceiling and then gives him an additional jerk as he comes down.

From a pulley in the centre of the death chamber ceiling, a rope disap-

pears into another room.

There, in the ceiling of that room is another pulley over which the rope winds. At that end of the rope is a heavy bag. There is a trigger in this side chamber, which releases the heavy weight. A peep-hole in the wall, gives ample room for the executioner to see the signal given by the warden. No one knows who releases the wigger.







DEAR DOROTHY DIX—I am married to a man who makes a small salary and have seven children, the oldest 9 years old, the youngest 2-months-old twins. 


