VISITS DISPENSARIES

Rev. Mr. Wilson Speaks of On-

Rev. Mr. Wilson Speaks of Ontario System, Which May be Introduced Here

Rev. W. D. Wilson, chief inspector, returned yesterday from Toronto. While there he visited the Ontario government dispensaries, operating under the new system enacted in that province which is that all liquors both wholesale and retail are handled exclusively by the government and high prices for liquor for medicine overcome.

The inspector said that he made three visits to the dispensaries in Toronto and that they were doings, as he termed it, "a rushing business." On the first day they opened in one dispensary \$5,000 worth of business was done and in an other \$1,600 worth. In two days of from three to four hours each, it is reckoned that from 1,400 to 1,600 customers bought liquor in these places. The inspector says that this is only the amount of business done in the retail places. No estimate was given as to the business done in the wholesale dispensaries.

One of the chief advantages of the new system, he said, is that one price prevails throughout the province and prices are comparatively low. The dispensaries are selling Hennessey's One Star brandy at \$1.25 an imperial quart and Irish whiskey at the same price. They also handle all kinds of Canadian whiskies, which are sold at \$1.85 an imperial quart and \$1.25 a reputed quart. The inspector said that an act of similar nature had been passed in this province, also that all licenses have been issued for only six months. The inference is that the system now in force in Ontario will probably be in force in New Brunswick.



While the strike has been general mong the building trades it was said ast night that so far as the metal trades were concerned, the strike has practically failed at least fifty per cent of the men being back at work.

Preparations for a lengthy turmoil have been taken by a citizen's committee of 10,000. Meetings have been held by both strikers and citizens but they have been of the most orderly character. The most serious phase of the strike is related in the position of many settlers at coast points, who have been cut off from provisions on account of the seamen's strike and refusal to take vessels from docks. Much privation is reported on this account.
