Actual Work of Re-valuation To Be Begun Next Week


More Than 100 City People On Oconee After Sunday in The Country

The Oconee has proved to be a great boon to the people who desire to get into the country to spend Sunday as early as possible in the summer, and to stay as late as possible toward the end of the summer. The early Monday morning trip enables them to reach the city in ample time for business. The Oconee continued her early Monday morning trips several weeks later than usual last summer and had a good business. It is not so very long ago that July 1 was the date for people to go up river for the summer season, but this year June 1 found a great number enjoying the de-lights of the country.
