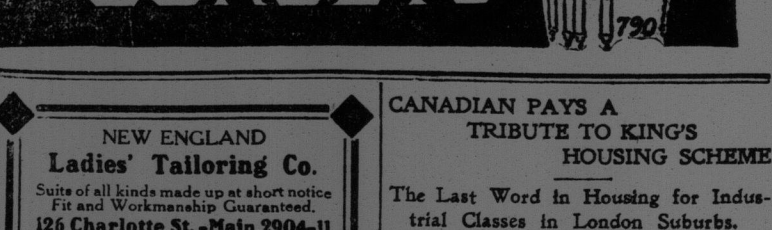

TALES OF SURVIVORS

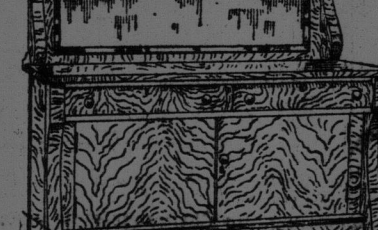

THE COMMUNITY SPIRIT.

Whenever people come together in a closely populated community they find, that however much they may differ individually in some things, they have great common interests; and that those interests which are common to them all are more important in every day life than are their points of difference.

The home-coming of the bodies of some of the victims of the Empress of Ireland disaster brings home a keener sense of sorrow and of local sympathy for all who were bereaved in that great calamity.

This is the week in which the Royal Commission will begin its work. The Dugal charges were made early in April. The people will hope, and the provincial government also should hope, that the inquiry may now proceed with all possible despatch.

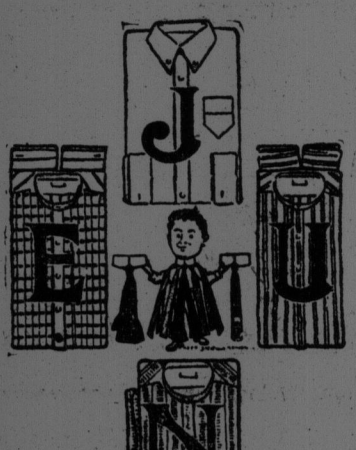

EXPECT BODIES TOMORROW

Relatives of Adj. and Mrs. DeBow at Depot Today--Frank Hamilton Probably Killed by Impact of Steamers-- Another New Brunswick

Saddened in heart and spirit, mourning relatives and grieving friends at noon today awaited the arrival of the Atlantic express in the Union Depot, as it had been expected that the bodies of Adjutant and Mrs. Everett DeBow would be brought home for burial. But disappointment was added to their sorrow, for the bodies were not on board. A wire to the local Salvation Army headquarters announced that they would be brought here tomorrow.

A despatch to the press said today that the body of Frank W. Hamilton, assistant purser on board the ship, had been received up to late today at the home of the grief-stricken parents, Mr. and Mrs. John W. Hamilton, of 236 Watersloo street, who have the sympathy of a host of friends in their bereavement. In a message to local Knights of Columbus, members of the council in Quebec said that diligent search was being made for Mr. Hamilton's body, but up to last evening they had been unable to identify it. The wire said that it was the opinion there that he had been killed in the collision between the steamer, as his berth was said to be about where the Stordahl crashed into the Empress. Mr. Hamilton was about twenty-six years of age, and was the only child. He had a bright future before him in C. P. R. circles, and had already met with success. His loss is a severe blow to his parents who are heart-broken at the shock of his death.

Another New Brunswick The bodies of Major and Mrs. David Creighton, of the Salvation Army, have not yet been identified. It is not known, of course, whether or not they were picked up. Both are well known in St. John. Major Creighton has been stationed at many points throughout the eastern provinces. He belonged originally to Sussex, N. B., where his father, Henry Creighton, and another brother, also named Henry, survive. Two brothers, Cyrus and Wilfred are in Calgary, Major and Mrs. Creighton are a sore loss not only to their relatives and friends, but to the army also. He was assistant immigration secretary in Toronto. They leave five children there. Mrs. Creighton belongs to Woodstock, Ont. Major Creighton, who was about forty-five years of age, had been for twenty-eight years engaged in army service, and was a valued member.

Like Major and Mrs. Creighton, two others well-known in this city, Adjutant and Mrs. DeBow sank together to their deaths in the disaster. Both belong to New Brunswick. Mrs. DeBow was a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Wm. McKim, of Armstrong's Corner, about four miles from Welsford, and Mr. DeBow belonged to Pettitodice, where his parents survive. Mr. McKim is in the city today, thinking that the body of his daughter would be taken through to Pettitodice to be buried by the side of her husband. It was at first thought that the body would be put off the train at Welsford, but later arrangements would indicate that it will be taken for burial to her husband's home, as her sorrowing father said, with tears dimming his eyes this morning.

Roy Fenly Sentenced - Death of John Munroe - Presentation to Minister

Fredericton, June 1--Roy Fenly formerly of Sussex, arrested last week on the charge of breaking into Crotty's pool room and stealing \$88 was sentenced to five months in jail this morning. REV. F. S. PORTER ON VISIT TO TROSSACHS

Gem Missing From Ring of Reminiscences of Those Who Leave This Section Out of Tour of Scotland

In the letter from which some extracts were printed in Saturday's Times, Rev. F. S. Porter refers also to some distinguished speakers whom he heard while in Great Britain. One of these was Sir W. R. Nicol, editor of the British Weekly, who is a potent personality in Europe; Rev. R. J. Campbell, and Henri Bergson of Paris, who delivered the Clifford Lecture in the University of Edinburgh. Mr. Porter says that Bergson is moulding the thought of this generation in the realm of philosophy as perhaps no other single individual with the possible exception of Emerson in Germany. Although the lecture was delivered at five o'clock in the afternoon, Mr. Porter found it necessary to go at half past three to get to the lecture.

Mr. Porter reserved a visit to the Trossachs for the end of his wanderings and writes: "And surely this is a place calculated to resuscitate any jaded mind or body. The scenery here at Loch Katrine, where the wind blows free from the heath-clad hills, and its towering peaks, 'Venue, and Ben An, and its Ellen's Isle and Silver Strand, combined with all its historic and romantic associations, gives one all that could be desired of satisfaction. One may visit Scotland, but if he has not traversed this country there will be a gem missing in the ring of his reminiscences."
