New York, N. Y., Nov. 17.—The toll of life and permanent injury paid by "Swag Hogs" employed in the construction of the Pennsylvania tunnel under the east and north rivers, 3,000 were treated for the common disease, popularly known as the "chills," twenty died and others were left paralytic or otherwise permanently injured.

Remarkable Pianist Who Has But One Arm—A Picture That Would Not Be Copied— French Medal for Kitchener

Count Stephen Zichy, who arrived in the United States on Sunday last from Europe on board the American, and now staying for a few weeks in New York, is a pianist of Count Geza Zichy, who has been named in the Hungarian Academy of Music, on the occasion of the celebration of the centenary of Liszt, a sealed package, with a stipulation that it should not be opened for another ten years.

Count Geza Zichy was one of the most intimate friends of the famous, and perhaps himself the most celebrated amateur pianist and composer in Europe. This is all the more remarkable since he lost his right arm at the age of sixteen, as the result of a shooting accident, and plays with his left hand, but with such skill and genius that the absence of the right hand is not noticed.

I have known him for many years, and have often watched and heard him play, both when among a few relatives and friends in an amateur concert, so far as I could see, he accomplished his playing with one hand by means of the wonderful flexibility which has developed in the thumb. He uses the latter for the melody, with the utmost delicacy of touch and the way in which the accompaniment of the air is played, sometimes two octaves lower, by the remaining four fingers, is nothing short of marvellous, especially during his long and famous, when opened his compositions have been a couple of patriotic operas, one entitled "Alma Mater," which has been produced with much success in Berlin, in Vienna in the opera houses, and other German capitals, and in Pesth, where for twenty years he filled, without pay, the court office of conductor of the Royal Opera, at the present moment he is president of the Royal Hungarian Conservatory of Music.

The Evening Chit-Chat

TWO women were talking about reading poetry. Said one, "I can read poetry with an intellectual appreciation, but I don't really enjoy it as you do. And even the living have, was secured, and acquired with difficulty. I remember I used to hate poetry in school and wonder why people didn't say what they had to say in good, straight prose, instead of rhyming it and sing-songing it. How is it that you are so fond of poetry?"

Answered the other, "Because I've always heard it since I was a baby. Before I could talk mother used to read and repeat poetry to me. And as soon as I could talk at all, father taught me scraps of poetry—not silly rhymes—but beautiful bits like 'The world is so full of a number of things, I'm sure we should all be as happy as kings.' Often I didn't understand the things at the time, but the meaning came to me afterwards, and I always liked the sound."

The ability to really enjoy good poetry is undoubtedly rare in this prosaic century. Cultures seldom deliberately acquire it. But everyday folks more often regard poetry to the end of their lives as a foolish way of saying in rhyme and song what could be said in plain prose. Surely then, any child owes his parents a debt of gratitude if they have given him the precious possession of a life long enjoyment of poetry by the simple method of reading and repeating good poetry to him in his childhood.

The wonder to me is that more parents do not do this. Before a child can talk, he understands a great deal of what is said to him. Everyone who has ever had anything to do with a baby knows. Ask the little one who will not say anything but "papa" and "mama" and "all gone" or something like that, where his eyes, nose or his toes are and see how promptly he points them out.

Well, then, why not occasionally, when you are cuddling, rocking or playing with him, read or repeat some good poetry to him? He may not understand it at all, but being a child, untrammelled by the grown up's need of seeing common sense in everything, he will surely enjoy the music. And the chances are that he will understand some of it and make up childish pictures for the very little ones. What shall you read? Well, there's Stevenson's Child's Garden of Verse, Eugene Field's poems and some of James Whitcomb Riley's for the very little ones. Gilpin's riddle, Holme's Grandmother Story, Longfellow's Hiawatha, The Courtship of Miles Standish, Paul Revere's Ride, Whittier's Maid Muller, Barbara Frietchie, and even some of Shakespeare's sonnets.

Surely all of these have either music or story enough to hold even very young ears.

Personally, I think we must our children's brains and comprehensions by the weak mental position in the way of stories which we give them. I think the child who hears great and beautiful things will soon come to vaguely appreciate part, if not all, of their meaning.

And would a man or woman who is reading and delighting in some beautiful poem will pause to thank you for his power of enjoyment.

BARONESS WHO WAS CAB DRIVERS' FRIEND

Berlin, Nov. 17.—The "cab driver's friend" of Berlin is dead. Mrs. Palmer-Davies was a German baroness, born in Frankfurt-on-the-Main, where she married an English minister, local superintendent of the British and Foreign Bible Society. Even as a girl she showed the philanthropic element that was in her, for at the age of fifteen she set up and conducted a school for cab drivers' children. Her husband was subsequently promoted to Berlin, and here Mrs. Davies through her aristocratic connections was brought into contact with leading personalities of her time, the Kaiserin Augusta Victoria, mother of the present Kaiser, Bismarck, Molke, Roos and other ministers and high officials. In the German capital she continued the work she had devoted herself to, and among the plans she realized for lessening the winter hardships of the "cab drivers' lot" was the establishment of an ambulatory kitchen providing warm food and drinks at nominal price.

The city police were at first opposed to the innovation and refused the necessary licenses, so that Mrs. Davies was compelled to walk in advance of the kitchen, politely requesting the police to let them pass.



THE CHINESE SITUATION

Peking, Nov. 16.—Premier Yuan Shi Kai's new cabinet was named in an imperial edict today, but it is questionable whether it will stand.

One of the members expressed amazement at his appointment. It is believed that few of the new ministers have been consulted and it is expected that a number of them will decline to serve.

The cabinet comprises curious appointments. Liang Chi-Chiao, appointed vice-president of the board of justice, is a great Chinese reformer, who was exiled by the late emperor dowager, as Yuan Shi Kai's suggestion.

Chang Chien, appointed president of the board of agriculture and commerce, is a member of the new government, who has lost his astuteness and intuition, while others hold that he is playing a deep game.

His real object may be to convince the throne that a capable cabinet cannot be formed, but he gives the impression to visitors, both Chinese and foreigners, that he is determined to defeat the rebels.

The combined forces are now marching on Nanking, where a battle with the Manchus army is pending.

MORRIS MUCH BETTER IN THE GEYER BOUT

New York, Nov. 14.—Carl Morris, the Oklahoma giant, knocked all the fight out of Denver Jack Geyer in nine rounds at the Olympic A. C., in Harlem, last night.

When the ninth round ended Geyer was so badly punished that referee Charley White stopped the bout. Morris showed an improvement over the form he displayed in his losing battle with Jim Flynn in the Garden several weeks ago.

Geyer was game and willing, but could make no impression on the big locomotive engineer.

Morris was cool under fire, did much effective sight-fighting and inflicted much damage. He tried hard to score a knock-out in the fifth, seventh and ninth rounds.

He closed Geyer's left eye and punched his face until it was a mass of bruises.

Morris wants to meet the winner of the Paine-Kennedy bout, arranged to take place in Brooklyn, Nov. 20.

With room for not more than 1,200 persons the club's arena soon was jammed to the suffocating point. More than 1,000 late comers were turned away when the ticket supply was exhausted. It was surprising that the bout would have crowded a larger building and that a mistake had been made when the Empire A. C. turned out to the Olympic.

The ring was fourteen feet square. Here is how the bout went by rounds: First Round—Geyer rushed in, but Morris mixed it, and with a left on the jaw jarred the Denver man. Geyer never made another attack with serious claim.

Second Round—Morris met a rush with a stiff left on the mouth. They mixed it both landing body blows. Geyer used his right into the ribs and a left on the neck. Geyer clinching. Geyer blocked a swing, but Morris at close quarters uppeared him in the stomach. Morris landed a left over the eye and a left on the mouth. Geyer clinching. Morris had the round.

Third Round—Morris opened with a right on the side of the head. A right hand on the cheek, but he missed a right to the jaw. Morris put a left on the neck and a right in the body. ANOTHER NEW THEATRE HERE

Waterloo Street Building to Be Remodelled—Ready for Start in Spring

St. John is to have still another moving picture theatre. Plans were completed this week for the formation of a company of local business men who will take over the property in Waterloo street at present occupied by Anland Brothers as a store room for furniture. The building is opposite the Gem and is a three-story brick structure.

It is to be made fire proof and up to date in every respect and when completed the promoters say it will be one of the finest theatres this side of Montreal. The building has a frontage of forty feet and runs back from Waterloo street, 110 feet. Plans for the new building were completed by Architect Neil Brodie this week and it is expected that tenders will be called for at an early date. The work will not be started, however, until the spring, but will then be rushed to completion.

The place will have a seating capacity of about 1,000, with a first and second floor. The stage will be a large one, and on each side will be two boxes, two accessible from the lower floor, and two others from the balcony. The latest style of opera chairs and fixtures are to be installed, and there will be an orchestra pit immediately in front of the stage.

The house will be used for pictures and vaudeville, and will be put on one of the large vaudeville circuits. The house will have its own orchestra.

When completed, the city will then boast of six moving picture houses. The new Keith theatre will be completed about the same time as the Waterloo street house.

The new company will apply for incorporation within a few days, and final arrangements will be made, so that everything will be ready when the time comes for a start.

MEN WHO RESCUED SURVIVORS OF THE WITCH HAZEL HERE, TODAY

Schooner Lena Gertrude in Port—The Elma Floated and Taken to Slip

The schooner Lena Gertrude, Captain Smith, which went to the aid of the schooner Witch Hazel, when she struck off New Haven on Sunday last, arrived in port this morning and is tied up at No. 7 berth on the West Side. It was the crew of the Lena Gertrude that saved the lives of Bennett and Joseph Miller, of the Witch Hazel.

Both the Miller men greatly praised the daring shown by Captain Smith and several of his crew in taking them off the wrecked vessel. The Lena Gertrude will load here. J. Willard Smith is the agent.

The schooner Elma which ran aground near Hilyard's slip, yesterday morning was floated last evening and is now lying in Gregory's slip. It is not thought that any great damage was done, but it is thought probable that a survey will be made before she is moved. When repairs are made she will be taken through the falls to complete loading cargo.

AN AUTOMOBILE CASE BEFORE COURT

A Partnership Matter Arises, Also, in Action Against C. W. Fawcett

The case of Joseph M. Roach of St. John and Brockton P. Harrison of Houlton, Maine, vs. Charles W. Fawcett, of Sackville, was before Judge Forbes in chambers this morning. The plaintiffs were agents for the "Overland Automobile Co." They say they entered into an agreement with Mr. Fawcett the defendant, to sell five cars for them. A special agreement was made with the defendant, and as a guarantee that he would take the five cars they required him to deposit \$20 on each car, which was done. The plaintiffs claim that Mr. Fawcett took from them only three cars, and then retained from a note which had been endorsed over to him for collection, \$18.25, in payment of the money deposited and \$18.25 paid for gasoline and freight charges.

The case is rather peculiar as Mr. Harrison, since the agreement, has gone into partnership with Mr. Fawcett and contends that the partnership exists. This morning Mr. Roach and Mr. Harrison were examined, and at times the cross-examining by counsel was quite interesting. This afternoon Prof. Killam and Mr. Fawcett will probably be placed upon the stand. The court adjourned until two o'clock. The jury trying the case is composed of Frederick Estey, John Hamilton, Sydney Gibbs, Dominick Hayes and Edward Evans. Stephen H. Bustin appears for the plaintiff and H. A. Powell for the defendant.
