PLANS FOR VISIT OF CABINET MINISTERS

Plans for the visit of Hon. Mr. Hazen minister of marine, and Hon. Mr. Rogers, minister of public works, to the city are assuming definite shape. They will reach the city on Tuesday evening at 6.30 o'clock. On Wednesday morning at 9.30 o'clock they will make a cruise of inspection about the harbor and into Courtenay bay. On their return to the city they will be taken in automobiles to east St. John to inspect the works in progress there, and hence to West St. John to visit the elevator and other works under construction. At two o'clock they will be the guests of the president of the board of trade at luncheon in the Union Club. At 3.30 o'clock they will meet the members of the board of trade in the council rooms for a discussion of matters connected with the improvement of harbor facilities. A banquet will be tendered the ministers in the York Assembly room in the evening at seven o'clock, after which they will address those present. They will remain in the city until Thursday.

The recommendations to be presented in behalf of the port by the Board of Trade will be completed on Monday morning at a meeting of the council.

FAVOR PROJECT FOR PARK ON FORT HOWE

The use of Fort Howe as a public park was endorsed by the Playgrounds Association last week. The association decided to lay the matter before Hon. Messrs Hazen and Rogers when they arrive in the city. They are communicating with the Commissioners of Dominion Parks and are asking the support of other public bodies in this city.

Commissioner Agar reported on the preparation for starting work immediately at the new public playgrounds at Rockwood Park. The president hoped that school games could be started in the park next year and that, later on, the water from Lily Lake might be used for baths in connection with the playgrounds.

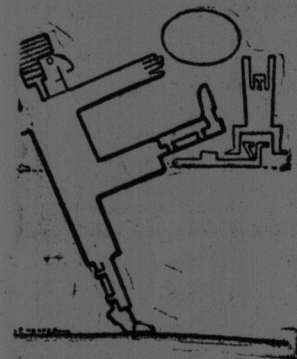

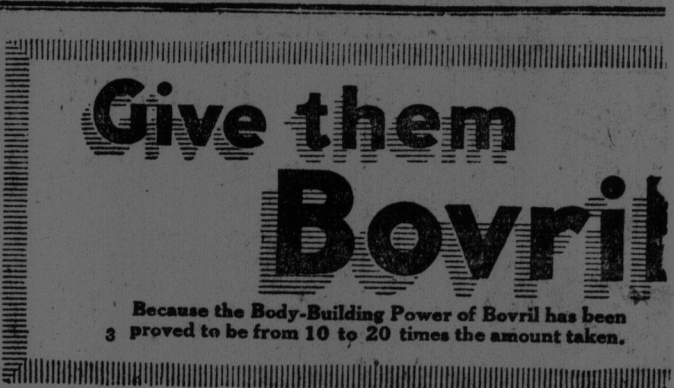

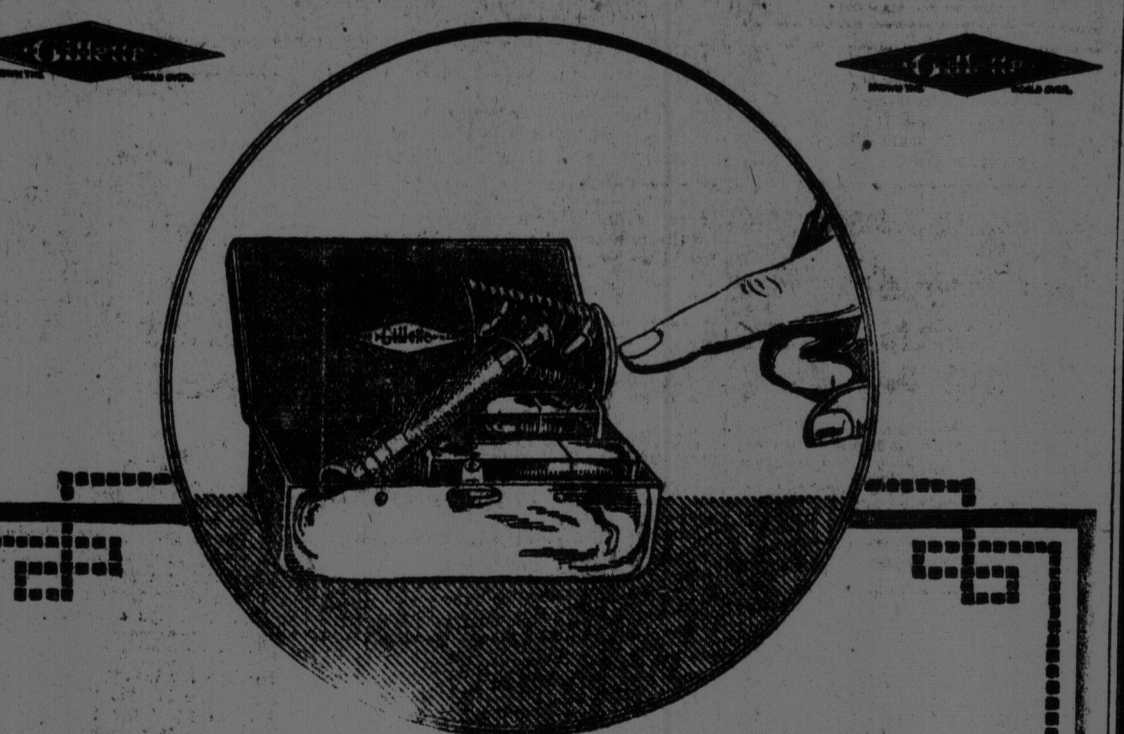

BUSINESS MEN ARE RUSHED

A Period of Activity Reported in Many Lines, With Mills Running and River Closing Time Approaching

During the summer business around the North End has been somewhat dull but with the starting of the mills about six weeks ago conditions have changed decidedly for the better until at the present time business is at its best and things generally are booming in that section of the city. All the mills are running at their full capacity trying to make up for the time lost during the summer and to meet the demands of the lumber merchants. In consequence of this activity the tug boats are kept very busy especially as it is near the end of the season and it is necessary to bring down the logs before the river closes. The river steamers are also exceedingly busy even for this season of the year as the fall freights are considerably heavier than they have been for several years. Extra men have had to be engaged to handle the freight and in some cases the large warehouses owned by the steamboat companies at Indian town have not been able to contain the large amount of freight handled and it has had to be piled on the wharf. Hundreds of barrels of potatoes are being brought to the city every day.
The up-river freights are also very heavy as the farmers are laying in their winter supplies. VETERAN SONGSTER CHATS OF THE OLD DAYS AND THE NEW

John W. Myers Recalls the Popular Harmonies of Twenty-Five Years Ago and Says They are Better Than Today--The Names Bring Pleasant Memories

Quite as interesting, as it always is, to all who are fond of old-time tunes, business reminiscences or past histories in any life-walk to hear a man like John W. Myers, who opens at the Imperial, Monday, veteran songster, relate his experiences. Perhaps more absorbing still is to have him indulge in a running comparison of songs of a generation, or a decade ago, with those of today. Briefly stated, the old-time writings of the present suffer rather miserably by the process of deadly parallel applied by the man who made Edison records famous.

John W. Myers had long since won his spurs as a vocal entertainer and even today, after a stately career in minstrelsy, straight ballading, concert work, and at the still more universal phase of entertaining, phonographic recording--is keeping his light brightly burning on the outside of the biblical bushel. Quietly and without flamboyant references to his rather illustrious past, he is spending a well-earned vacation upon appreciative ears in high-class picture houses as are found on the Keith-Albee circuit, and in various sections of the continent--houses willing to pay the price for superior talent and thus fling back the continual imputation, "cheap," upon inconsistent artists.

It was as far back as 1877, nearly thirty-four years ago, that Mr. Myers began his career in the old London Theatre on the Bowery. Tom Donaldson was manager there and such things as illustrated songs were in the mythical past. Mr. Myers simply sang his number in a programme of varied talent and was considered an "act." Motto was then quite vogueish, after which, parodies became popular, each and every ballad receiving burlesque treatment in turn. After three years in the London Theatre, thus establishing himself as a purveyor of popular melody will remember, he joined Liverly's Minstrel at the 14th street theatre. Later, he became a member of the next troupe, after which he became a leading soloist with Thatcher Primrose & West's Minstrels. At the termination of a successful stay with this band of entertainers Mr. Myers associated himself with the Wood & Emerson's Minstrel in San Francisco, staying with them a year. Returning to New York he signed with the Broadway Musical in the old San Francisco Music Hall on Broadway. Later he was found with the "Little Tycoon" Company, the Edison's Godeiro's Opera Company of Chicago, and later with the "Natural Gas" Company, and later with the "Horse and Horse." Mr. Myers' last work of a purely stage character was in Kean's Imperial Theatre, New York, where he finally assumed stage direction for a period of fifteen months. In this protracted experience in management of different kinds the subject of this sketch took up the then new fad of phonograph music, and for more than twelve years exerted his energies wholly in this direction, which branch of the vocal art he became universally known.

Mr. Myers' reflections upon the songs of long ago as compared with melodies that had way these days are poignant in the extreme. He seems to think the latter day deceptions of sharp and flats are lacking in true sentiment, whether it be national, amorous or, indeed, in the good old days everybody, indulged in voguish ballads because there was something in them. He speaks strongly to finer sensibilities and gripped the heart with that "human interest" so much praised about nowadays. The Blue Alaskan Mountains was an old-time song of the way love-song that has away for many a day and Mr. Myers relates with much gusto how "The Maid in the Mill" and "The English Boy" was popularized across the continent after his specialising treatment with Reed & Emerson's Minstrel.

The old publishing houses, Willis Woodward, the Dixon's, T. B. Harris and others put on the market many early eighties amongst many other songs the following great successes: "Mary Green," "When the Robins sing," "I'll wait My Love," "As far back as 'Twas Fifty Years Ago," "My Pretty Red Rose," "Grandfather's Clock," "There's a Letter in the Candle," "Stick to Your Mother," "Tom and Jerry" were notable success, each and every one of them. Mr. Myers says that called for dramatic rendition, at least something more than the street-lawyer term and that treatment rendered popular music by many vocalists nowadays.

Harrison & Hart, stellar comedians of more than a quarter of a century ago, were largely responsible for the popularizing of that quaint old bit of sentimentality "Dad's Dinner-pail" and also brought to light the rage of a half-decade "The Mulligan Guard." Fully two-score years ago Billy Corbridge, another vocalizing funsmith, created a furore in a little nonsense song sung in a little nonsense dance. This novelty was introduced in the Old Opera House in Broadway. Harrison & Hart held forth at the Comique. Then Tom Dixon, a contemporary entertainer, who was considered the Sims Reeves of America, never failed to make a big hit in the English ditty "Sally in our Alley."

About sixteen years ago "Two Little Girls in Blue" was introduced at the Imperial Theatre Broadway, and directly after that came Charles K. Harris' great hit "After the Ball." Other songs of this period were "Little Annie Rooney," "Daddy Wouldn't Buy Me a Bow-Wow," and "Sweet Marie." The majority of this stuff Mr. Myers thinks was not up to the standard of the oldtime song, pot-bolling writers have indulged in one steal after another, appropriating not only the themes, characteristics and styles of contemporaneous songs, but have harked back to the old days and have pilfered line after line, melody after melody. Even such semi-sacred classics have been copied in later day songs to wit: Mendelssohn's "Spring Song," "Killamey," "House Sweet Home," "The Old Folks' Home," etc.

On the other hand the last decade has been dotted with some really fine writings, distinctive and of lasting merit. Ernest R. Ball Mr. Myers considers worthy of the appellation "the Tost of America" and there are numerous other writers in lighter vein who are greatly enjoyed because of their originality. Some of the refreshing exceptions to the rule which Mr. Myers makes particular note of are the mixed national ditties

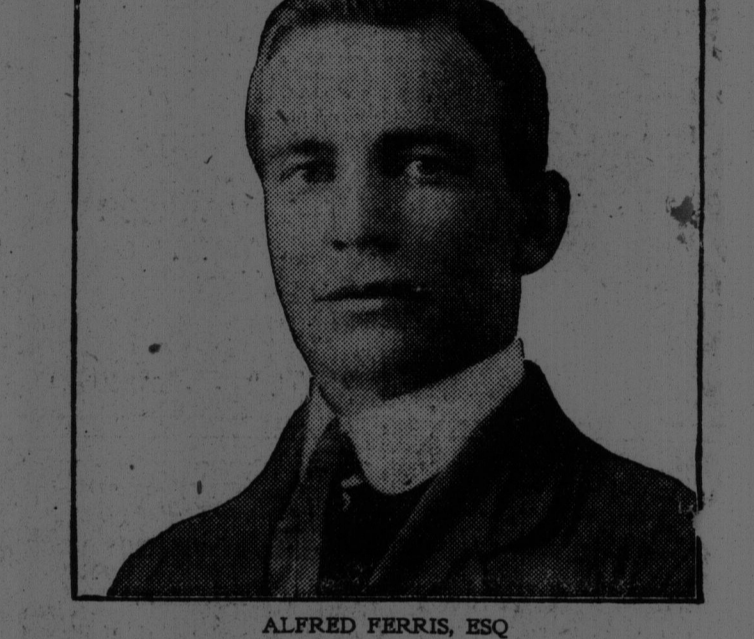

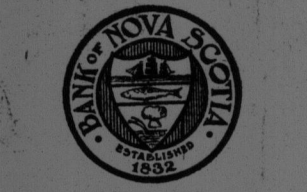

LAND OF NEW HOPE English Clergymen Speak on the Emigration of the Poor to Canada.

(Times Special Correspondence) London, Oct. 28.—Paying the fares of poor parishioners to Canada is a comparatively modern feature of charitable work in many English churches which has displaced the "coals and blankets" form of charity so common years ago.

It is growing constantly, and for the purpose of raising funds to send people to Canada or Australia.

"We found," said a clergyman, "that our charitable organizations were called upon year after year to provide relief for the same people and we decided to do something of more permanent character. If it was impossible for a man to maintain himself in this country the only thing to do seemed to be to remove him to another country where he could. We have always been careful to send men out only with the authority and approval of the government officials and I emphasize this point because I understand that in Canada there is a disposition to believe that clergymen relieve the charitable charges on their parishes by getting rid of the poor. This may occur in isolated cases but I am convinced it is not frequent."

"The aim is to send out men of good character and physique. There have been many encouragements. Only a few years ago we aided a man in this way and he wrote us last winter desiring to take part in similar charitable work and to provide sufficient money to enable five worthy people to go to Canada."

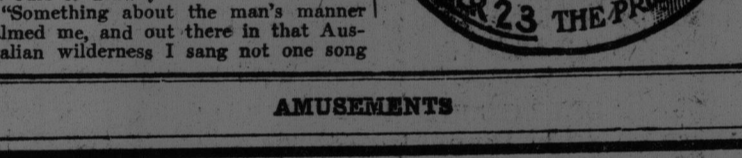

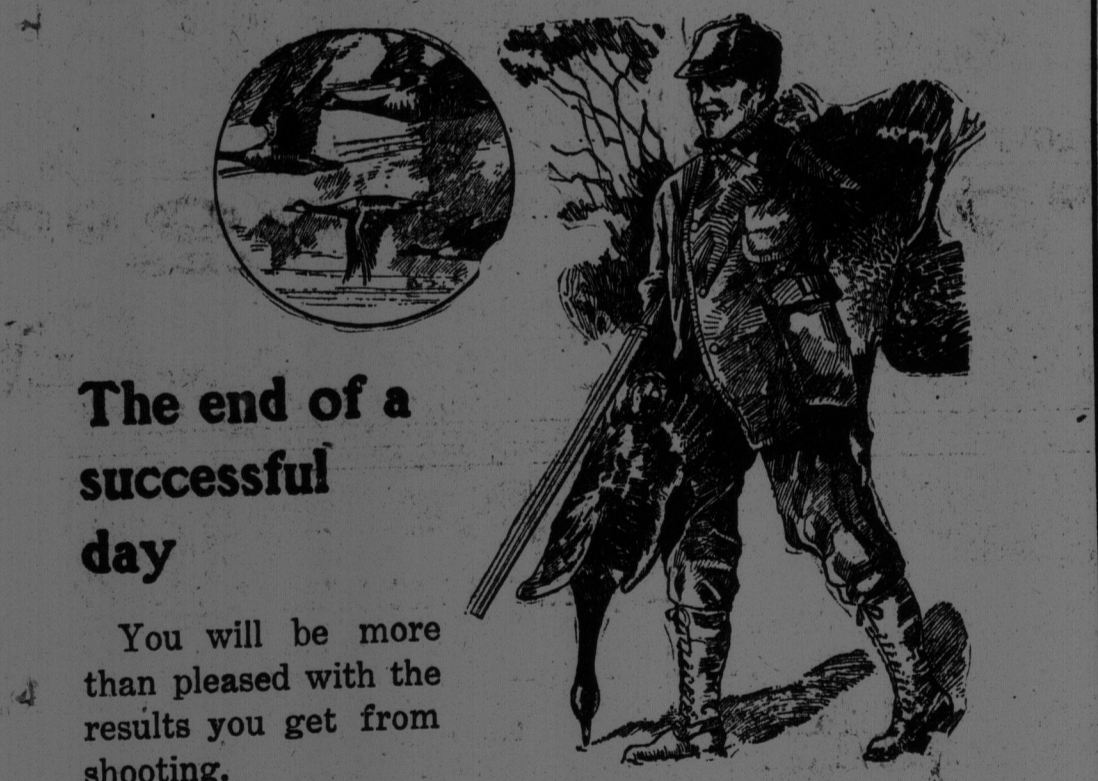

The bride, who was in a blue and white gown, was escorted by her brother, Alexander D. McLean, who was becomingly gowned in a navy blue tailcoat suit with blue and white stripes and with ostrich plumes. After a short trip through western cities Mr. and Mrs. Elliott will proceed to the residence of the bride's parents, where Mr. Elliott is engaged in business.

NEW DREDGE MEETING

EXPECTATIONS IN THE COURTENAY BAY WORK

The Norton Griffiths dredge Don Fedon, which is now at work in Courtenay Bay, inside the breakwater, is making excellent progress, and is fulfilling the expectations of the company's officials. At present she is standing on the mud at low tide, and can work only when the tide is high. In a very short time, however, she will have dredged a basin of sufficient size to enable her to stand at all times of tide, and she will then be able to work continuously.

The other work which is being carried out by the company and their contractors, the Courtenay Construction Company, is also progressing favorably. The new wharves are being pushed out towards the mouth of the harbor at a rate which is proving satisfactory to the contractors.

The local office has not been advised definitely when the head of the company, Norton Griffiths, M.P., will arrive in St. John, but he is expected here next week and it is thought will arrive about the same time as Hon. Messrs. Rogers and Hasen.

TEN BOYS IN JUVENILE COURT

At a session of the juvenile court this morning before Magistrate Ritchie ten boys were arraigned, seven on charges of being members of a disorderly crowd at Dorchester street extension, and three reported for truancy. They were severely lectured and were sent to the guard room where they remained for some little time, and where they seemed to be enjoying themselves as well as could be expected. His Honor told the boys charged with disorderly conduct that they would each be liable to a fine of \$8 or two months in jail, and he added that if it could be determined that any of them had done damage to property he would be strongly inclined to send the miscreants to Dorchester or to the Boys' Industrial Home.

As to the boys charged with shouting and acting disorderly in Dorchester street, Policeman Gibbs said that they had been in the habit of congregating in that street from different parts of the surrounding neighborhood, playing "peggy" tossing coppers, shouting and in other ways making a disturbance. Different residents had complained of it. On last Sunday they had been particularly noisy.

George Fleming, of the Phoenix foundry, gave evidence that they had been greatly troubled with boys doing damage to their windows and other parts of their property. He did not identify any of the lads in court, who were between fourteen and sixteen years of age, as having done so but he thought that the many windows which had been broken in the foundry had been smashed by them.

The three truants admitted the offence. They had been attending Winter street school, and had made very poor time since the opening of the present term. One, a lad of fourteen years, had missed thirty days, and said he did not want to go back to the school because the principal had beaten him so severely when he had a sorely injured hand.

HOW IS THIS FOR HEALTH RECORD?

In Seven Deaths of Fifteen This Week Deaths Were of Persons From 66 to 80 Years Old

St. John's claims as a healthy city receive strong support from the Board of Health figures for the last week. During this period there were only fifteen deaths; three of these were due to senility at the ages of seventy-eight, seventy-nine and eighty years; four others were at which death occurred were sixty-six, sixty-seven, seventy-two and seventy-five years. Of the others one death occurred at the age of twenty-six years, but this was due to accident, and another died at forty-seven years. All other deaths reported were of infants.

These figures seem to prove that if a person born in St. John survives the first year in which the death rate is the highest everywhere irrespective of climate or other conditions, the chances of living for the full limit of three score years and ten or even more are excellent. When a city is so healthy that old age becomes one of the chief causes of death there is little more that can be said in its favor in that regard.

The fifteen burial permits issued by the board during the week were because of deaths as follows—Senility, three; infant, two; cancer, trauma, asthma, diphtheria, malnutrition, hemorrhage, enteric-scoleritis, bronchitis, broncho-pneumonia, and acute nephritis, one each.

APPRECIATES LOCAL MEN'S WORK FOR GOOD ROADS

Letter From Premier to Percy W. Thomson About Roadway and Westfield Highway Work

At the meeting of the board of trade this week, the report of the traffic committee submitted by Percy W. Thomson, said:— "The bureau co-operated with the good roads interests and secured from Hon. Messrs. Fleming and Morrisey a grant of \$1,000 for two of the main highways in the vicinity of the city and inspected such work from time to time every week during its progress, besides arranging for the major part of the contracts."

Mr. Thomson has just received from Premier Fleming, in connection with this matter the following letter:— Woodstock, N. B., Nov. 7, 1913. Percy W. Thomson Esq., St. John, N. B.

Dear Sir: I am in receipt of statement signed by yourself and others in regard to the amount of money expended on Robesay and Westfield roads under the direction of the Automobile Association during the past summer. I want to bear a little word of testimony of my appreciation of the public-spiritedness of the men who contributed the \$1,420 and of those who gave care and oversight to the expenditure of that amount as well as the \$1,000 contributed by the government. It is the kind of co-operation, mutual assistance, that is always sure to bring results. Yours sincerely, J. K. FLEMING.

"TO SAVE THE HIDE OF ST. JOHN'S REPRESENTATIVE"

Halifax Paper's Comment on Mr. Hazen and the Royal Line Steamships

(Halifax Echo) The officials of the Canadian Northern chose Halifax as the winter terminus for their boats, upon the basis of merit alone. If they are required to abandon Halifax they will do so merely because Mr. Hazen succeeds in forcing them to do so.

Now the people of Halifax have nothing especially against Mr. Hazen, but no good reason exists why the business of the port should be interfered with, simply to save the hide of St. John's representative in the cabinet. It is manifest from the articles recently appearing in the St. John Standard that Mr. Hazen is working tooth and nail to have the Royal boats give Halifax the go-by, in order that he may supply the citizens of St. John with a soap, to compensate them for the loss of the Empresses.

There is little need for argument. The course of our own business men is clear. They should call upon Mr. Borden, the representative of Halifax in the cabinet, to see to it that the interests of this city are upheld.

MORE GENERALS FOR CANADA

Important Changes in Divisional Staff Foreshadowed—Retirement of General Cotton

Montreal, Nov. 8.—Important changes in the divisional staffs of the dominion are likely to be made in the near future, according to an Ottawa rumor. The alterations will include the gazing of all divisional commanders as generals, and the abolition of the office of either assistant adjutant general, or the combined office of deputy assistant adjutant and quartermaster-general. There are at present about five generals on the staff of the Canadian militia, and it is said to be part of the plans of the department to increase this number considerably.

Apart from the comparatively few generals at present in office, it is felt that the divisional commanders should have this rank as they have in England, thus giving them more power. In addition to this, the retirement of General Cotton, inspector-general of the dominion, is rumored and may take place next year.

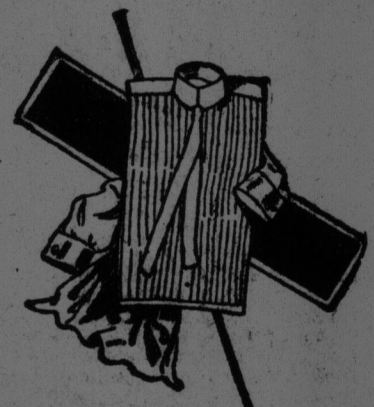
BADLY BURNED TAKING BREAK OUT OF OVEN
