Kirkpatrick, Edwin Chown, Thomas Masson, Wm. Massie, R. McCammon, Lt.-Col. Moffatt, Dr. Rambaut, Neil McLeod, John Paton, George Hardy, Samuel Gaw, W. P. Lacey, Major Grange, Mr. Black, Geo. S. Fenwick, J. E. Clark, James McNee, John Creighton, W. C. Evans, Lieut. Millar.

2nd Resolution—Moved by Rev. J. Gemley, seconded by Rev. S. Jones:

Resolved—That the example of British Christians, its own intrinsic merits, and the manifestly expressed approbation of our Divine Lord, imperatively demand for the Religious Tract Society the cheerful pecuniary support and the earnest prayers of Evangelical Christians of all denominations.

CONSTITUTION AND REGULATIONS

OF THE

AUXILIARY RELIGIOUS TRACT SOCIETY OF KINGSTON.

I.—The object, Constitution, and proceedings of the Religious Tract Society of London, continuing to have the cordial approbation of the Society in Kingston, it shall bear its former name, "The Auxiliary Religious Tract Society of Kingston."

II.—Its object shall be the promotion of the circulation of Religious Tracts and the aiding of the funds of the Religious Tract Society of London.

III.—The Tracts to be circulated by it to be those published by the Religious Tract Society in London.

IV.—One-fourth of the funds shall be annually transmitted to the Parent Institution.

V.—Each Subscriber shall be entitled to receive, gratis, Tracts to the amount of one-half his annual or other subscriptions or donations.

VI.—Each Annual Subscriber of Five Shillings and upwards shall be a Member.

VII -Each subscriber of Five Pounds at one time shall be a member for life.

VIII.—The business of this Society shall be conducted by a Committee consisting of Fifteen Members or upwards, together with a Treasurer and Secretary or Secretaries, who shall be chosen at the Annual General Meeting of the Society, and that Five Members of the Committee constitute a quorum.

IX.—That all the Protestant Ministers of the City, who are Members of the Society, shall be ex-officio members of the Committee.

X.—The Committee shall appoint a Depositary and Collectors, who shall pay the amount of receipts to the Treasurer when required.

XI.—The Committee shall meet once every three months, or oftener, if required.

XII.—A General Meeting of the Society shall be held on the third Wednesday of January in each year, when the proceedings of the past year shall be stated, a new Committee appointed, and a Report agreed upon, to be printed under the direction of the Committee.

XIII.—All meetings of this Society shall be opened and concluded with prayer.

REPORT.

Another year in the history of this Society has to be added to the great Past, and, ere resigning their charge, your Committee, as in duty bound, present their Annual Report.

Some institutions are temporary and local. The London Religious Tract Society, our venerable Parent, does not belong to this class. Many years have elapsed since it first commenced its beneficent career, and, with increasing age, its resources, its appliances and its usefulness have vastly multiplied. Who can tell how long its line of love and light shall run forward into the, as yet, unknown, yet prophetically announced, glorious Future—a future of coming faith, of successful enterprise in the Kingdom of our Lord and of spiritual glory.

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Planted in 1799, by the hand of Christian love, amidst the social upheavings of that memorable period, and springing up with little pretension and with as little circumstantial help, it has become a mighty tree, whose branches literally cover the earth and whose leaves are for the healing of the nations. By its instrumentality the Gospel has been proclaimed in simple, yet expressive, language to nearly all kindreds and peoples and tongues, and that not through human voice, which, however effective in certain cases, must nevertheless die as soon as uttered, but through the agency of the press, which secures at least much greater perpetuity.

As might be expected, the Kingston Auxiliary bears no comparison as to age, dimension or usefulness with its Parent. Nay, with reluctance we confess, it is not as useful as the wealth of the city and the demands of the field require, yet it should be remembered that other Catholic institutions urge strong claims for help, and that, with its actual resources, not a little has been done.

Your Committee now call attention to

I.—THE DEPOSITORY.

Mr. Edward Stacey, whose faithfulness and efficiency in the discharge of his duties merit continued confidence and support, is still your Depositary.

The stock, recently replenished by a new supply from England, is well worthy of examination. Those who wish to have a sound Christian literature will not be disappointed; those who desire what is new, merely because it is so, may, on examination, not find what they want.

II.—TRACT DISTRIBUTION.

This may justly be regarded as the main practical sphere of our Society's operation. Forty-one distributors, nine males and thirty-two females, belonging to the several churches, have been at work during the year, and 157,312 pages of Tracts have been issued from the Depository for circulation. As the Tracts thus issued are wholly gratuitous, the expense, \$126:20, has been equal to the resources of the Society; but if additional laborers could be secured in this department, the increased expenditure would be cheerfully met. It does not speak well for the aggressive power of the Church of Christ that laborers are required and cannot be secured by the most urgent appeal, to distribute the Word of Life to the perishing in our midst.

Earnest men and women might find, if so disposed, a most appropriate introduction to the poor and perishing of the city through the instrumentality of our Tracts, and yet the opportunity is not embraced as it might be.

III.—COLPORTAGE.

Your Committee, impressed with the importance of having the publications of the Parent Society widely circulated throughout the regions around the city, addressed an earnest appeal to the Committee in London for aid to support a Colporteur. The committee replied that the principles of the Society did not permit a grant for colportage, but generously granted a supply of Tracts. Your Committee then assumed the responsibility of employing Colporteur Downie for two months. The sales were confined to the publications of the Parent Society and the Holy Scriptures, with the Metrical Psalms.

From his reports and journal during these two months the following facts are evident:

First. That the field demands earnest culture, although there exists little disposition to purchase religious books. The taste for reading religious literature does not generally exist and needs to be stimulated. Second. That while the Colporteur is received kindly, and by a few generously entertained, the want of hospitality painfully increases his labor and his pecuniary expenses.

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We regret to be compelled to state, on strong evidence, that our region of country compares very unfavorably with any other in our Province. This, however, only proves the necessity of evangelistic effort.

The Colporteur, during the two months of his engagement, travelled 327 miles, made 872 visits, sold 40 bound bools, 64 children's books, 20 Bibles with Psalms, 32 Testaments with Psalms, and distributed gratis 270 tracts; in all, 426 publications.

While it is true that your Society is perfectly solvent, it is no less evident that a larger capital is necessary for efficient work, unless your account with the Parent Society be unjustly large. Will not some generous friends of the Society come forward, and by their liberality place the Auxiliary in a more independent position?

VI.—PARENT SOCIETY.

During the year ending March, 1865, over three hundred new publications were issued. To this fact we call special attention, inasmuch as many amongst us are under the impression that the Society does not materially add to its old stock. The total circulation, at the above-mentioned date, amounted to forty-one millions seven hundred and ninety-four thousand six hundred and fifty-three.

The total receipts during the year amounted to £110,928 stg., being an increase of £3,122 stg. over the previous year, the total amount of expenditure being £109,479 stg. The total amount of benevolent receipts, inclusive of legacies, was £13,356. The grants amounted to £14,626, exceeding the receipts £1,307.

With gratitude your Committee record their obligations to the Parent Society for a handsome donation of Tracts. They are unable to report any contribution to the Benevolent Fund of the Parent Society, but have to confess, instead, that the amount due on their business account is far too large.
