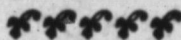

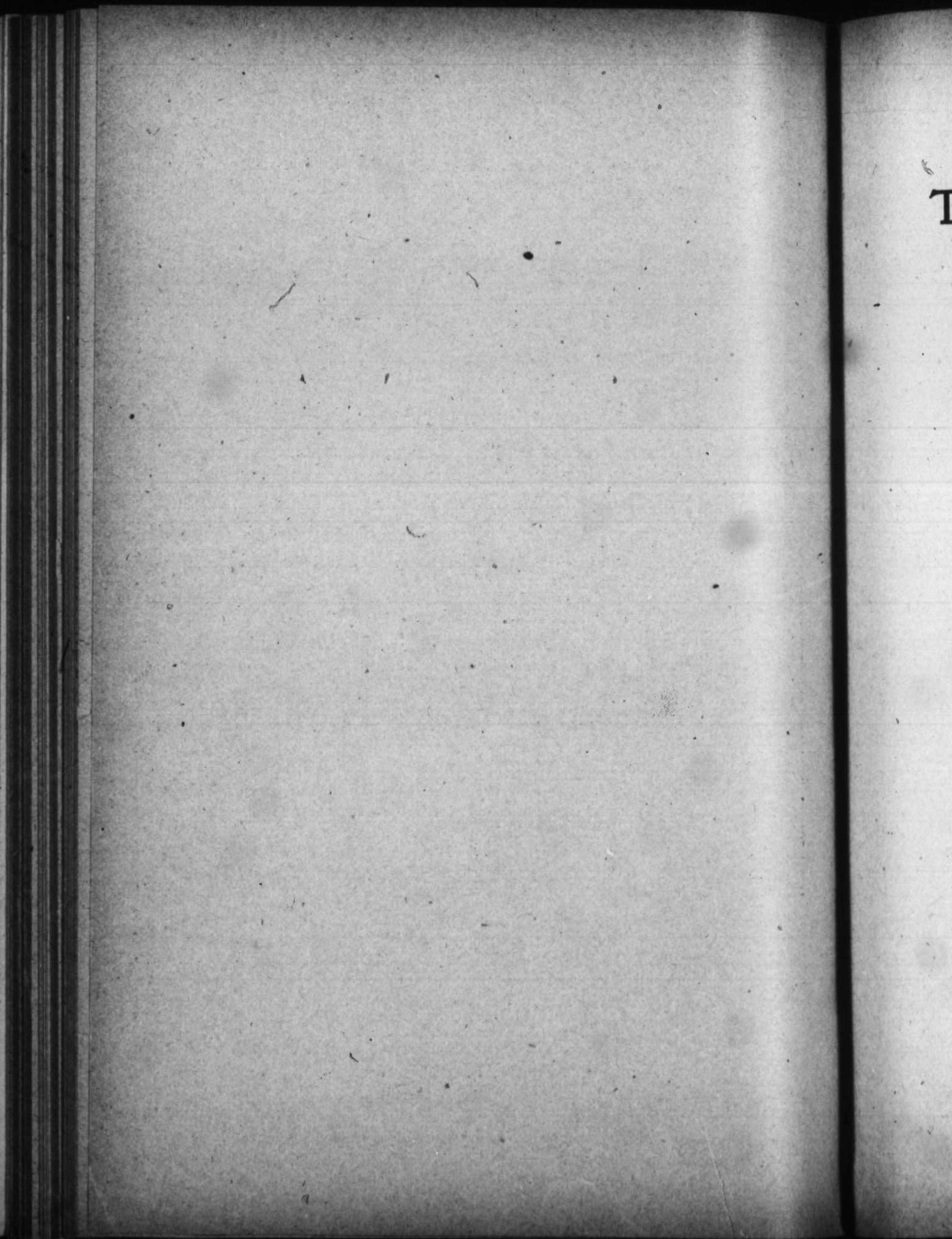

FORTY-SIXTH ANNUAL REPORT
OF THE
INDUSTRIAL REFUGE.

As considerable misapprehension appears to exist as to the work carried on in the Toronto Industrial Refuge, the Managers have thought it well to present, in this our Forty-sixth Annual Report, a somewhat detailed account of the object of this charity. Formerly known as the Magdalene Asylum, it was, for many years, the only Refuge in the city for fallen and degraded women. The work was begun in 1853, and carried on for about seven years in a small two-story house on Richmond Street. The accommodation becoming insufficient for the number of women seeking admission, it was with unfeigned gratitude that the committee received from the legatees of the will of the late Dr. Burrowside, the gift of three acres of land and a large frame building on Yonge Street, Yorkville. This was an important movement in advance, and for thirteen years the work was carried on there most successfully. In 1873, however, a new home became an absolute necessity, the old building having become very dilapidated. It in turn was sold in order to assist in the erection of the present commodious premises on McMurrich Street.

As heretofore stated, the Home has now been in existence for forty-six years, and from its inception till the present time, the object has always been the same, viz., "To give to every woman without reference to country or creed, an opportunity of reforming." That she may do so we believe, and have had that belief strengthened by experience, that time and a certain amount of exclusion from outside influences is necessary. Therefore we wish each woman to remain in the Home at least twelve months,

during which time she is under moral and religious influences; and while cared for and made comfortable, is required to do her share of the various kinds of remunerative work which are carried on. Thus she assists materially in meeting the necessary expenses, while, at the same time, this course of life is fitting her, both physically and mentally, for usefulness after she leaves the Home.

Attacking the most difficult problem of city life, and having to deal with the class which it is least possible to help, we should be satisfied simply to do our work without expecting to see much result. On the contrary, however, we have, under the Divine blessing, had repeated evidences that we are, in a measure, successful in helping some of the fallen of our own sex to withstand temptation and lead purer and nobler lives.

During the past year, 18 women were admitted, which, with the 30 remaining on Sept. 30th, 1898, makes a total of 48. Of these 4 went to service, 1 died, 4 left of their own accord, 5 went to relatives, 2 to the hospital, 1 to the asylum, and 1 was discharged for insubordination—leaving 30 in the Home at the present time. Seven of those who came under our care during the year, are under twenty years of age—a fact which gives great satisfaction and encouragement to the Managers, inasmuch as the young are more susceptible to good influences than those of maturer years who have travelled long on the downward course and become more or less callous.

The only death we have to record is that of Julia Rushford, a woman over sixty years of age, who had spent many years in the Home. She had no specific disease, but her health seemed broken, and after several months of gradually failing strength, she passed peacefully away, on November 10th, rejoicing, we trust and have reason to believe, in her Saviour.

Mrs. McMartin and her assistant, Miss Calder, continue to merit the confidence and gratitude of the Board for their kind and judicious management of the Home. We would draw attention to the laundry department, which, through

their efforts, has reached a marked degree of excellence. The proceeds from that source alone during the year were \$1685.13, an amount which helps largely to meet the running expenses of the Institution.

It is with regret that we omit from our list of Honorary Directresses the name of Mrs. Heron, whose death occurred last July. She was for over twenty years a faithful member of the Board, and though finding it necessary, some time ago, to retire from active duty, did not cease to take a deep interest in the welfare of the Homes.

We would take this opportunity of thanking the kind friends, who so faithfully and earnestly attend to the religious instruction of the inmates, Dr. Adams for his attention to their dental needs, and Dr. C. L. Starr for professional services gratuitously given.

The annual Christmas tree provided by the Sunday School teachers and the phonographic entertainments given by Mr. W. R. Barrett, were thoroughly enjoyed. Our thanks are due also to Messrs. Dudley & Burns for reduced rates in printing the annual reports.

THE SIXTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE AGED WOMEN'S HOME.

In presenting the Sixteenth Annual Report of the Aged Women's Home, we feel that it is unnecessary to enlarge upon the good work being done in the Institution—it being recognized as one surely deserving the support of all benevolent citizens.

While reviewing the labors of the past year, we would publicly express our fervent gratitude to a loving Heavenly Father for the peaceful prosperity which has attended us. The yearly statistics are as follows:—42 in residence on September 30th, 1898; 15 admitted since (6 of whom left and 7 were removed by death), leaving 44 on the register at the time of writing.

We take great pleasure in reporting that during the past year the building has been renovated and decorated throughout, with the result that visitors are frequently heard to remark upon its home-like appearance.

It would be difficult to estimate and value the services of our esteemed Matron. The Managers feel that the amount of success which has attended the Institution is largely due to Mrs. Peacock's peculiar fitness for the duties of her position, which is certainly no sinecure. Miss Robinson's unwearied efforts to alleviate the sufferings of the sick, are much appreciated; as is also the faithful work of the serving staff, most of whom have been connected with the Home for a number of years.

Again we offer our sincere thanks to the clergymen and laymen who conduct the religious services, and to the Pansy Band, the Walmer Road Workers and other kind friends who visit the inmates regularly. Nor would we forget our Medical advisers, Drs. Wm. Caven and Scadding, assisted by Drs. G. Boyd, Stenhouse, K. C. McIlraith and Fenton, to whom we continue to be indebted for their unfailing kindness and attention to the sick.

FIRST ANNUAL REPORT OF THE AGED MEN'S HOME.

The new branch of our work, the Aged Men's Home, has now been in operation for a year. We are indebted for it to the generosity of the late Mr. Neil Currie, and we are satisfied that it is supplying a long felt want, inasmuch as it is already filled almost to its utmost capacity—20 being on the register on September 30th, 1899.

The Managers are devoutly thankful for the success which has attended their efforts in this direction, and pray that many aged men, who have reached the stage when their active usefulness must be laid aside, may be permitted,

in the eventide of life, to share with their fellow-travellers the comforts and benefits of this Home.

The charge for admission is very moderate indeed, being on an average of only \$7 per month. As will be readily understood, this sum is not sufficient to pay all the running expenses of the Institution, and we are therefore under the necessity of relying upon the voluntary contributions of those who, in the past, have responded so liberally to our appeals for aid in supporting the other Homes under our management.

Mrs. Christie, who has been in charge since the opening of the Home, has been unremitting in her attentions to those entrusted to her.

In caring for the temporal comfort of the inmates, their spiritual welfare has not been neglected—services being conducted each Sabbath evening by the Christian Endeavor Societies of churches in the vicinity.

And now we close with the usual appeal to our friends and the public. We have endeavored to give you a true account of our work and we confidently look for a renewal of your interest and liberality. "Freely ye have received, freely give."

ANNUAL MEDICAL REPORT OF THE AGED MEN'S AND WOMEN'S HOMES.

During the past year fifteen women have been admitted to the Aged Women's Home, making a total of 57. Of these 7 have died and 6 been discharged. The average age at death has been nearly 78 years. In one case of old standing antritis, an attack of influenza was followed by a very acute and fatal tuberculosis. In another la grippe exerted a fatal influence upon the heart in a chronic asthmatic. In two, disease of the heart ended life—one very gradually and the other somewhat suddenly. In the three

remaining, chronic Bright's disease was the cause of death. The health of those employed in the care of the inmates and the Home has been excellent, and the general sanitary condition of the building good.

The Aged Men's Home has closed the first year of its existence with 20 persons in residence. Two of these are aged women living with their husbands. The health of the inmates has been good, there having been only one death during the year. The house itself is very comfortable and in excellent condition.

MEDICAL REPORT OF INDUSTRIAL REFUGE.

Aside from the numerous trivial ailments which are always found where any number of inmates are congregated, it is a great pleasure to be able to report that the general health of all in the institution has been excellent. We have to report the death of one, who after a somewhat lingering illness died at an advanced age.

The better ventilation and sanitary condition following the alteration in the building, together with the scrupulous cleanliness maintained by the Matron and her assistant, are probably largely responsible for the clean bill of health.
