DECIDED ELEMENT OF HOPE IN THE TRADE CONDITIONS

Immediate Outlook for the Stock Market is Favorable—Bache & Co. and Henry Clews are Both Optimistic

(Henry Clews' Letter.) General trade conditions, while somewhat mixed, present a decided element of hopefulness. Business is steadily moderate in volume, yet the tendency is certainly towards improvement, especially where orders have been stimulated by concessions in prices. More activity is shown in iron and steel as the result of lower prices, and the revival of building, especially of large structures, is attributable to this cause. The general condition of business is steady and confidence is rising. There is no doubt that recuperative influences are soundly at work; costs are being reduced, and only time is required to bring about more normal conditions. Of course, the tariff is still an impediment. There is no special anxiety, however, regarding final results. Little probability exists of any disturbing reductions, and now that the Payne bill will all its objectionable features have practically been removed from the House the prospects are that a more favorable measure will be introduced by Senator Aldrich. It is believed that the government will be best advised to do nothing to revive the stamp tax, which can be made to produce a large revenue in the easiest, most effective and least objectionable way. Evidently the tariff will be revised by its friends, and there is little reason to look for any radical or important changes. This minimizes the importance of the tariff in the stock market, which will probably feel only indirectly the relief which most effective anti-tariff measures are pending, and that it is to the advantage of the great banking interests to have the market react buoyant and more active appearance. The situation, however, as already shown, has its unsatisfactory elements, and while adding in cheerful expectations regarding the future we can only advise the taking of some profits on the vigorously pronounced rally.

DUBOIS CAUGHT BY MONTREAL POLICE

G. T. P. Sub-Contractor, who Swindled Farmers and Laborers in this Province, Arrested on Saturday

Montreal, April 12.—(Special)—Omer John Dubois, who is wanted for swindling farmers and laborers along the route of the Grand Trunk Pacific in New Brunswick, and for whom the police have been looking since last December, was arrested here Saturday and taken to the police headquarters. He admitted his identity, but denied that he was guilty of any misappropriation of funds. Dubois is a contractor on the Grand Trunk Pacific. Last December he left Fredericton, owing it, as alleged, local merchants and storekeepers and farmers along the construction line. He has in his possession a large sum of money which he is now held here for. The name of the firm of Mc Coy and Wilford to which he is said to have turned over the money is not known. Dubois is a Belgian, who came to Canada some time last summer. He does not talk much English, but allowed himself to be interviewed by a reporter. He is a sub-contractor with engineering experience.

IMPROVEMENTS TO WIRELESS 'PHONE

French Inventors Have Improved Their Apparatus—Minister of Marine Tests It

Paris, April 12.—Naval Lieutenant Colin and Jeanne, the inventors of a wireless telephone apparatus with which they succeeded last fall in communicating with ships at sea, today introduced a new and greatly improved apparatus. The minister of marine exchanged conversations with operators at Melun, a distance of 30 miles and he declared that the result was a vast improvement over that obtained by the ordinary telephone. The sound was clearer and purer. In December 1907 dispatches from Berlin declared that Waldemar Poulsen had succeeded in telephoning without wires from a suburb of Berlin to Longby, near Copenhagen a distance of 230 miles. The dispatches said that the sound of music played in Berlin was distinctly heard at the other end. That messages were twice exchanged and that the transmission left nothing to be desired in the way of clearness and audibility.

VIRGINIAN ALWAYS PICKED UP THE NEWS

Big Allan Liner Was in Wireless Communication With Land All the Way Across the Atlantic

Allan line R. M. S. Virginian, Captain A. H. Vipond, from Liverpool, reached the island yesterday morning at 11.30 and docked at No. 6 berth at 2.30 in the afternoon.

The Virginian sailed from Liverpool on April 2 with 1,170 passengers—sixty-six first, 272 second and 832 steerage.

The voyage was uneventful. No very stormy weather was met with, though head winds were encountered. The steamer, to avoid the ice, followed the long southern route.

An innovation this voyage was the use of the new long distance wireless outfit on the ship. Communication was maintained with Ireland for a distance of 2,000 miles, and before communication there was lost it was picked up with Cape Cod. Press despatches were received every evening and helped to enliven the voyage.

The Virginian brought over about 2,000 tons of general cargo. This is the big turbine's last trip here this season.

AYLESWORTH BACK FROM WASHINGTON

Hon. Mr. Aylesworth Returns From U. S. Capital Where Amendment to Waterways Treaty Was Discussed

Ottawa, April 11.—Hon. A. B. Aylesworth has returned to Ottawa after a brief visit in Washington, where he went to discuss the rider placed upon the waterways treaty by the United States senate. The rider is rather indefinite but appears to exempt the United States from the provision of the original treaty for an equal restriction upon Canada and the United States in respect to the diverting of water to the Soo for power purposes. It was to obtain an official interpretation of this rider that Mr. Aylesworth went to Washington. While there he had conferences with the secretary of state and senator Elmer Root. It is learned that Mr. Aylesworth was given to understand that to protect navigation and to control all power developments in the Soo the United States proposes to acquire the absolute title to all the property along the rapids on the American side and for this purpose a bill was put through the American congress at the last sitting authorizing the government to take this property by expropriation and \$1,000,000 was voted to be expended for this purpose. The administration of this fund is under Mr. Dickinson and he proposes to acquire the property at once.

PASTORAL STAFF FOR BISHOP OF MONTREAL

Montreal, April 11.—(Special)—Saturday the late of the diocese of Montreal presented to Bishop Faubert a pastoral staff for the diocese. The bishop had been subscribed to by representatives of the various congregations over which his lordship has been called to preside. A special service was held at the cathedral for the occasion.

HIGH SCHOOL TEACHERS HOLD CONFERENCE HERE

Principal Myles, of St. John, Advises Organization for Improved Conditions

The second meeting of the N. B. High School Teachers' Association was held in the St. John high school building on Saturday afternoon with the president, A. B. Mages, of Moncton, in the chair. After the adoption of the constitution and by-laws the meeting proceeded to the discussion of the salary question. The president introduced this subject in a brief but carefully prepared address, claiming that the ratepayers of this province were not paying nearly as much towards the salaries of high school teachers as were those of Manitoba, Ontario or Nova Scotia. Principal Myles, of St. John, expressed the belief that the teachers could arrange about a better condition of affairs through organization and quoted instances in this province where even incomplete organization had in the past resulted in material increases of salary. He felt that a teacher's experience should be a factor in any schedule that should be drawn up and that the city high schools should follow the lead of Ottawa, Toronto, Winnipeg and other cities in having regular increases up to a fixed limit. He also felt that this organization might further urge the board of education to maintain or even raise the requirements of the Grammar school license and thus keep the supply of teachers within reasonable limits.

Cars for Women Only in New York Tunnel

ONE OF THE NEW CARS RESERVED FOR WOMEN. The first car for women that has ever run in New York started from the Hoboken terminal at seven o'clock Friday morning. Signs were hung on pillars and at the entrance of the rear car of each train, reading, "This car exclusively for women." The guards at each door were dressed to call out "The rear car for ladies," a fine distinction that caused some amusement. The results during the morning rush hours when the new plan was in operation were encouraging both to the management and to the deputations from the Women's Municipal League, which has been foremost in urging its adoption. The rear car was crowded for almost every trip.

MINISTRY YIELDS TO POPULAR PRESSURE

British Government Has Decided to Lay Down Eight War-Vessels During This Year

(Special Cable to New York Herald). London, April 9.—According to a distinguished naval leader with whom I have had an interesting conversation, the cabinet has now completely given way on its naval construction policy and the whole of the Dreadnoughts required this year, eight in number, will be commenced as soon as the necessary slips can be provided. The four that it was at first intended to order will be taken in hand immediately and orders for the necessary material will be placed before the end of the present month. The second order will, my informant continues, be ordered in the early part of the summer.

He saw him with bank notes on the night before his arrest. He said he did not know that Kerrigan was provided with liquor in a room in the hotel after being refused in the bar.

Robert Waters, a diminutive young man, pleaded guilty to intoxication and to intoxication and profanity, and both were remanded.

Andrew Laghen insisted that he always bore that name and was always a Scotchman. Sergt. Baxter said Laghen masqueraded under six different names. He was also remanded.

Edward Ousjek, aged 15, admitted assaulting John Novlan, aged 16, on April 6, in front of the market and at the foot of Waterloo street. The dispute originated over the privilege of selling papers at the market entrance. The Ousjek boy was liberated under suspension of a \$20 fine or two months in jail.

The hearing of the insane immigrant was resumed at 2.30.
