CHICAGO, July 7.—Litigation to the probable aggregate total of \$8,000,000 las been discouraged by a ruling of fudge Holdom. In the superior court, has been discouraged by a ruling of Judge Holdom, in the superior court, to the effect that the city of Chicago was not liable in any degree for the Iroquois Theatre fire. WIFE CUT HUSBAND'S THROAT.

Murdered Him With a Razor While

Frank Holt, under arrest here for the murder of Clarence Myers at Kansas, has confessed. Holtman said: For years Mrs. Myers and I had been friends, she loved me and I loved her and we wanted to get married. We planned the murder three weeks or more before the crime. The night of the tenth of May I went to the Myers house at three o'clock. I met Mrs. Myers at the house and the two of us went to Myers' bedroom. He was apparently asleep, but just as we entered he called out, "Well, you're here again." He grabbed at me and as he did so I struck him with my club, a billiard cue. Then I held him while his wife cut his throat with his razor. After the crime I went to my home and after sleeping a while I went to the depot and left town. Mrs. Myers gave me \$10 to get away.
