THE EASTERN WAR AND MIS

The Hermit nation, Corea, is the cause belli. It is a peninsula, somewhat like Italy, lying between China and Japan. It is noninally independent, but for various reasons both China and Japan have assumed a certain kind of guardianship. Early in the year a rebellion occurred in the south, and China without consulting Japan undertook to quell it. At this Japan took umbrage, and ordered troops to the scene of action. Partial order being restored, China wished Japan, to withdraw her troops, which the latter refused to do until the former answered the question whether Corea was independent or not. Matters became more complicated, until Japan assumed the right to enforce what she, considered wers her just demands in relation to Corean matters. A battle was followed by a nasval engagement in which the Japanese showed a vast superiority to the Chinas in modern military equipment and tactics, defeating her opponent with great loss and taking many prisoners. This battle was followed by a nasval engagement in which they showed the same superiority. In fact China showed the accustomed incapacity of eastern nations in conflict with civilized nations. Japan however demonstrated that she had been thoroughly innoculated with modern ideas, and in possession of best appliances and strated that she had been thoroughly innoculated with modern ideas, and in possession of best appliances and knowledge of their use. In short her methods and means wers western and abreast of the progress of the day in scientific warfare. Steadily China is being driven back, and Japan is marching nost after post, and being driven back, and aspeak march ing on, taking post after post, and threatening an attack on imperia Pekin. It seems strange that a nation of three or four hundred million should fly before one of thirty or forty but numbers count for little when they are not properly cuitipped, and are opposed by engines of warfare of such deadly character as those which have been developed in the last score of years. The Coreans seem to be rather more favorably inclined to the Japanesr, and at present it would ap-pear that extensive changes political will be the result in Corea and possibly in China sleep.

The box, in shape, is the same as our light western egg cases, only the two compartments should measure just one foot square seah, inside measurement. The sides, bottom and top should consist of at least two pieces each, and can lead with inch wire nails and should not quite meet, say, a distance between each of one-quarter of an inch. This is to leave an air space. The fruit should be as nearly one-sizes possible, and remember, very large or very small sizes are not desirable. Apples about two to three inches in diameter are the most inviting for table fruit. The fruit must be hand picked and free from bruises, cashs, drub or other blemiskes. There is no need of facing. All sides must be alike, as buyers open side, bottom or top when inspecting. Each picce of fruit must be wrapped in paper same as are oranges and lemons and with some such paper, (newspaper, or old paper will do). Fack sang, but do not press sufficient to bruise, or pack too slack, so that the fruit to accomplish the swip of the sapele, or mark it with heavy penoli, also the initials of the packer or shipper.
