The Canada Temperance Act.

When the above Act became law in this County, a few of the dealers at once made a change in their business and discontinued the sale of liquors, for which they had previously been licensed. Others thought proper to set the law at defiance, and continued selling as they had done under the old law. The friends of the Act were fully aware of the traffic going on, yet as the decision in the case before the Privy Council of England was shortly expected to be given, and as there was a reasonable doubt as to what the decision would be, they took but little notice of the illegal sale, but waited patiently for the time to arrive when the law should or should not be declared legal. That time arrived, and steps were at once taken towards the carrying out of the law, those believed to be selling illegally being cautioned that if they continued to sell, proceedings would be entered against them. No diminution of the sale of intoxicants took place, persons under the influence of liquor were to be seen staggering about our streets more frequently than before, and the darkness of night was at times rendered hideous by the yells and fearful language of the poor besotted victims of this illegal traffic, as they fought their way homewards.


