

Savings bank depositors are often invited to draw out there money and buy with it "gilt edged securities" which will pay them twice the interest rate they are getting. If they leave their money in the bank they can get it when they want it. The interest is small but certain. If they buy the securities which have tempting interest rate they will not be able to and may not get it at all.



To the mind of the German, military supremacy is probably as important as naval supremacy is strength in the security of union. The new France which has grown up under the Republic would not be a menace to any neighbor; but the old France was, and the Germans have not forgotten it and are not very likely to forget it for some time to come. More than that, the German ambition has been awakened and she is, at the same time, beginning to feel her strength and importance. The nation that goes up against Germany in fair tight has got her year's work paid for in advance. All this however, will prevent the Kaiser from stacking his arms in the corner and allowing them to rest.

Father Gapon's Body Found Hanging in Deserted Villa?

ist. Tetersburg, May 13.—The mystery of the tate of Father Gapon apparently was corpse, which has almost positively been DROWNING OF TWO cleared up to day by the discovery of a hanging in the upper chamber of a lonely villa in the summer suburb of Ozerki, Fin-land. The villa was rented April 8 for the ner and a deposit paid by an unknown man from St. Petersburg, who, after vieitse several times in o with a young workman, disappeared April 11, taking the key with him. The proprietress of the villa, alarmed at the acn-appearance of the tenant, notified the police who entered the house. Breaking down door they were confronted by a body in a long coat, hanging from a neil, the feet touching the floor. Decomposition of the face made positive identification difficult, but the features resembled those of Gapon and the clothing corresponded with that worn by the missing labor leader. As the usual symptoms of rtrangulation were absent, it is conjectured that the man was killed elsewhere and his body brought to the villa on the night of April 10. This would agree with the date of the execution of Gapon given in informatian of the secret police and with the death sentence of the former priest as announced in recent de-Palmer, aged one month and six days.

SERVE MORE CURRANTS.

They Are Said to Contain More Nutri-ment Than Lean Beef.

Only a few years ago nobody knew that there was any food value to the little dried so called Greek currants. Since then food chemists have demon-strated that there is far more nutrition Laking, physician to King Edward, says that nutrition in white bread is greatly increased by them and that thirty parts of currants should be addthirty parts of currants should be added to seventy parts of dough. To add them to bread, wash, dry well and mix with the flour after sifting it with salt. They also make a good winter substitute in all bread and batter recipes that the former better the substitute of the substitut that call for fresh buckleberries. The best variety to get are the Zanti currants, which come from the island of Zanti. They are really not currants, but are a small variety of seedless

To use them with sour cream salt a cup of sour cream. Put in a little less than you believe to be just enough to neutralize the acid. Beat it until feamy. Sift a pint of four with one cup of sugar and one teaspoonful of baking powder. Add one cup of dried currants or fresh bluebe bake as muffins.—Exchange.

DRESS HINTS.

To take care of silk dresses properly they should never be brushed, but rub-bed with a soft piece of merino. White gloves cleaned promptly after each wearing will last indefinitely. If the stains are allowed to dry on they

There is a pinching that makes forgetfulness impossible, and when I find a woman addicted to the habit of removing her stays when safely intrenched within her chamber I know her for a victim of fashion. She is much more common than you may know. I never understood how any-body could find life endurable when every day held a measure of torture, fully known and appreciated at its real value beforehand. I am not an exponent of ugliness, but I dare believe that it is possible to combine comfort and grace with the happiest results. I have seen it done, I am sure.—Milwaukee Wisconsin.

The cleaning of the scalp should be very carefully and tenderly performed. It is best to use warm water with a mild soap, rubbing in gently and with the ends of the fingers, then rinsing with tepid water. Drying should be done by gently pressing the hair and scalp with a very dry towel, continuing until thoroughly dry. Fanning is another safe process. If any applica-tion is necessary to bring hair thus dried into shape, dampen with a solu-tion of bichloride of mercury. Stiff brushes are especially injurious to the tender scalp, causing the hair to break and irritating the delicate skin cover-ing of the head.

Little Red Spots.

If you see a tiny spot, bright red, that persists during many months and gets slightly larger, make up your mind to have it destroyed. If let alone it will enlarge and become a great blemish. Any surgeon can, by the use of caustics or electrolysis, remove the spot in a few minutes. These things are called "naevi," and they are made up of dilated capillaries, neither ar-teries nor veins, but the tiny vessels that write the two.

HAVE A SYSTEM.

Mind and Body.

Care must be taken that the time as apart for the various items of house-work is long enough to allow these to be theroughly done and also that the arrangement is such that both mistress

In many well regulated houses a time table is hung on the kitchen wall, with the work of each day carefully noted as well as the time to be devoted to each item. The work of each household can easily be arranged so that there is little to be done on the

that there is little to be done on the last day of the week, which most people regard as a half holiday.

An early start must be made every day. In all households, whether great or small, each apartment should be thoroughly cleaned once a week. It is a good plan to have a day set apart for each room, and one day every two weeks at least ought to be devoted to the cleaning and arrangement of cupboards and what are known as "odd corners."

If windows are cleaned regularly the work can be both easily and quickly performed. Bright windows and fresh curtains generally indicate the char-acter of the interior of a dwelling. Ironing ought to be done as soon as possible after the washing is finished, as one never gets the work performed so quickly and efficiently as when the clothes are newly taken from the line. Boston Traveler.

AN AID IN CLEANING.

"If more women knew how quickly and thoroughly coal oil acts as a clean-ing agent there would be fewer tired backs and aching bones on cleaning day," said a little woman, whose apartment is always as fleckless as the

"Ever since the hint was given to me by a practical friend, a fifty years' housekeeper," she continued, "I've been learning to use the oil for more and more purposes each week-in fact, I am a coal oil crank. I wipe up my stained wood floors with a rag moister, ed with the oil and find that in addition to removing every scrap of dust it darkens the boards a little every time, which is a disideratum in my case, as

"All the woodwork I wipe with another rag on which I sprinkle a few drops of oil. Anything of porcelain, like a bathtub, it cleans most beautifully; also the bathroom washstand and closet, only taking the precautions to change your cloths. The wall back of my range is painted a deep red. When it becomes greasy and dusty I find that the oiled cloth makes a splendid cleanser, although I confess I tried it in the first instance with fear and trembling.—Philadelphia Press.

LAUNDRY LINES.

Calico dresses should be soaked in strong salt water for an hour before washing, so as to set the colors.

If a cup of thin boiled starch is put in half a tub of rinsing water for table linen and handkerchiefs they will be greatly improved in appearance.

Tie a lump of arrowroot in a thick cotton cloth and boil it with the fine white pieces to give them a daint odor more delightful than from sache

To prevent goods from fading drop into a pall of water a teaspoonful of lead acetate and let it dissolve. Soak the goods in this mixture for half an hour before washing them in the or-Colored ginghams should be washed

through thin starch water, without any soap, and then rinsed in soft cold water and hung to dry in a shady place, as few colors can stand to be exposed

A Pretty Basket, There are many pretty and useful things that can be made with a crochet hook and a ball of common twine. Baskets may be made in bag shape, then starched and shaped over a suitable dish. The dish must be slightly greased before stretching the bag over it, so that it will come off readily after it is dry. Two coats of varnish will be need ed after it is stiffened with starch. By mixing a little bronze paint and some urpentine with the last coat of varnish a very pretty basket is secured. Shellac varnish should be used with the paints, and gold or silver paint may be sed instead of the bronze if preferred

LIFTING A BABY.

much heavier in proportion to its body weight than that of an adult. The brain of a newborn baby is about 14 per cent of its entire body weight, while a grown person's is but 2.37 per cent of its weight. At the same time its spine is very weak, the bones of it are soft, being, in fact, more of the con-sistence of gristle than of hard bone.

Now, this is why a young baby's straight, which, by the way, is a thing that never should be done until it sits up of its own accord. This it will not be slow to do as soon as its muscles are strong enough, which is generally when the infant is about four or five

In lifting a baby, therefore, it is most important always, before beginning to der the back of the head and neck, so as to support them well. At the same time the other hand and forearm should be passed round the child's joins, so as to support both back and thighs and prevent the legs from hanging down. When both hands are in position, then

Never lift a baby up with one hand. This is an absolute rule, to which there is no exception. Both hands must always be used at the same time in lift-ing an infant. Neglect of this simple rule may cause muscle strains and jars


In carrying a baby see that its head is well supported against the arm and that its legs do not dangle from the knees. At the same time do not hold it so as to constrict its move Keeping a baby held with its back bent and its limbs doubled causes deformities. It also causes wasting of the muscles. These cannot grow strong unless they have free room to exercise. A should always be able to use its limbs freely.—New York American.
